'Crop' of Manganese Is Boon to Alabama

ANNISTON, ALA.-Farmers in this section of Alabama soon will have a new "money crop" in man-ganese, with establishment of a company here to buy the ore.

Numerous deposits of manganese

The ore ranges in value from \$2.50

to \$22.50 a ton. The company plans to blend the ore to use in making steel, dry-cell batteries, paints and glass. Manganese sulphate, extensively used as a fertilizer in the Carolinas and Florida, will be a by-product.

The company announced any farmer who has manganese on his land can dig it in off seasons, haul it to the plant and get cash for it.

In Western Etowah county a manganese pocket has yielded 194 tons of ore in the last 50 years and the new plant will employ 35 to 50 persons, it was announced.



Southern Forests Are Being Utilized For Public Benefit

MEMPHIS.—The 13 national forests of the South, containing 9,000,-000 acres of government-owned mountain and forest land are being developed so that all of their resources, not just their natural beauty, will serve the public. Mile after mile of forest-covered slopes and plains stand as monuments to the forest fire fighting effectiveness of the state and federal forest officers.

Water is one of the most important natural resources. Forest-covered slopes give rise to rivulets that join to make creeks, that flow together to form rivers, that produce water power, bear commerce, and, in so many ways, contribute to the well being of mankind. Many cities are dependent upon the regulated flow of water from forested areas for their domestic supply


