CCC Lads Rescue Lost Fur Trapper

SAN FRANCISCO, CALIF.-Out of the Far North comes a story of a lost trapper who was rescued by CCC enrollees in Mt. McKinley National park after three days wander-


ing in the wilds of Alaska. Reports reaching here tell how Donald Harper, clad only in two flour sacks and old discarded boots, narrowly cheated death in attempting to reach civilization for supplies.

Harper and two partners left their trapper's cabin, some distance outside the national park at Minchumina lake, for Fairbanks. When the party came to glacier fed 50-foot wide McKinley river, Harper was the first to try the crossing by swimthe first to try the crossing by swim-ming. He tied his clothing to a packboard, but while struggling against the icy, treacherous current, he momentarily lost consciousness. However, he reached a sand bar on the other side minus the pack. His partners did not try to follow him. Harper Pushes On.

Harper, sans clothing, left the river bank to resume his way. He found an unoccupied cabin at the end of the first day walking, which cut his feet in a score of places, while branches and mosquitoes attacked his body. In the abandoned cabin he found the flour sacks and old boots. Without a map or compass, the next two days were filled with many hardships, with emphasis' on hunger. He slept on the cold damp tundra only when so exhausted that he could not walk. He was almost at the end of his endurance when he wandered into the Wonder lake CCC side camp in an isolated section of the national park. He was given first aid, food and clothing. His only statement: "I almost didn't make it."





Came Pilsudski. In 1926 he became dictator and ruled Poland until his death in 1935. While his dictatorship was in force he kept the entary forms of government intact. But his word was law. After his death a new constitution was adopted, but another strong man, Marshal Edward Smigly-Rydz, took over. With him came another powerful figure, Josef Beck, the virtual dictator of Poland's foreign policy.

Through these years the country developed its industry, resources and army. Growing bold, and backed by pledges of support from France and England, Poland, when threatened by partitioning by Germany, decided to fight once more for her independence and unity.



Chinese Celebrate Legendary Rituals Of Buddhist Origin

LOS ANGELES .- On the fifteenth night of the eighth moon, according to Chinese legends, the beautiful goddess of the moon weds the strong and wonderful man of the sun.

To celebrate the festive occasion, which falls on September 27 by American calendars, Los Angeles Chinese each year don their finest embroideries and engage in mock battles and strange festive dances, including the ritual dance to the moon executed by the Buddhist devotee and his novices.

Chinese women, believing the night auspicious for romance, offer incense to the goddess of love, and Chinese fathers dress their daughtern at the doorway as an omen of

The happy festival, during which more than a hundred merchants of the Los Angeles China city hold open house, serving sweetmeats, nuts and tea to all who enter their doors, also perpetuates the celebration of the Chinese expulsion of the Mongol invaders, more than 600 years ago.

Origin of Custom.

Oppressed by the Tartars, who had established a soldier to rule each Chinese household, the Chinese used their friendly custom of passing moon cakes on the night of the moon festival, to outwit the unwel-come soldiers. A Buddhist priest, knowing that the moon cakes contained an ingredient never touched by Mongols, advised the Chinese to bake a message inside the festive sweetmeats, which would set the date for the Mongol expulsion. The plan was successful and the Buddhist priest who started the fateful chain of hidden letters became the first Ming emperor and founder of the Ming dynasty under which Chinese culture progressed to great


