European Peace Talk Persists Despite Increase in Warfare; Is Hitler's Collapse Imminent?

INTERNATIONAL:

Scattered generously in dispatches from Washington and Europe have been suggestions concerning the peace to follow war. Few Englishmen or Frenchmen now believe Versailles was a just treaty; they now hope to lick Hitler and give Germany a rational post-war settlement. Most important, there is growing talk of a European confederation whose units might include: (1) Eastern Europeans, encompassing nations from the Gulf of Finland to Rumania, with Poland dominant.

(2) Southeastern Europeans, allying the Balkans to Italy. (3) Central Europeans, drawing the Catholic German, Czech and Rhineland peoples nearer to France. (4) Northern Europeans; an alliance of Scandinavian countries. (5) North Central Europeans, permitting Austria and Sudetenland to remain with the Reich.

Biggest visionary of the week was none less than Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain: "A war aim . . . means defeat of our enemy, the defeat of that aggressive, bullying mentality . . . If the German people can be convinced that spirit is bad . . . they will abandon it . . . When we have achieved our war aims, we can establish a new Europe, a Europe with a new spirit . . . In such a Europe it would be recognized that there can be no lasting peace unless there is a full and constant flow of trade . . . In such a Europe each country would have the unfettered right to choose its own form of internal government."

At Washington the state department found the cause of international peace a good argument on which to hinge its plea for renewing the reciprocal trade treaty act, which expires next June. Assistant Secretary George Messersmith indicated the administration considered its treaty a basis for lasting peace when Europe's war is finished. Next day Secretary Hull himself jumped into the fight, indicating he wouldn't be content to postpone the renewal until after 1940's election, even though the 22 agreements already made could be continued without a congressional vote.

TREND

JAPAN—Indicating business' displeasure with the Tokyo government's anti-U. S. attitude, the commercial newspaper Chugai Shogyo demanded that immediate action be taken to obtain a new agreement replacing the present abrogated one, which expires JANUARY 28.

AGRICULTURE—A Gallup poll showed 70 per cent of the U. S. approves the food stamp plan for distributing surplus products to needy families, indicating strong support for an increased surplus commodities appropriation at the next congress.

UTILITIES—Meeting at Washington, private utility leaders are discussing plans for a super network of private and public electric facilities throughout the East. Item: A new 220,000-volt line from Chicago to New York.

FINLAND—Russia continued tugging to break Finnish-Russian relations, apparently to justify armed action. Latest charge: That Finnish border artillery had slain three Russian soldiers, wounded seven others.

ASIA:

Chiung's Woes Into Kwangsi province's provisional capital of Nanning marched Japan's warriors, nipping effectively one of the two major supply routes whereby the Chinese government gets its supplies from French Indo-China and British Burma. On one side of his face Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek laughed for publication, asserting this Jap coup meant little; 150 miles to the west, in Yunnan province, runs another supply route. But inwardly General Chiang could be worried. First thing the Japs did at Nanning was establish an air base from which to harass Kunming, capital of Yunnan.

LABOR:

Film Strike Whether A. F. of L. movie unions are powerful enough to shut down 20,000 U. S. film theaters is a question no movie producer is anxious to test. Directed by William Bloyf (whom Chicago authorities sought on a 17-year-old pandering conviction) studio unions in Hollywood demanded a 10 per cent wage increase and threatened to close theaters if it was refused. Projectionists had promised their co-operation. Producers refused at first, claiming they had lost foreign markets since the war and faced sharp production curtailment. Unionists countered with not too far-fetched charges of "exorbitant salaries" paid to stars. As the deadline neared, producers capitulated. Until February 15 the unionists will have a 10 per cent increase.

RUMANIA:

Dangerous Step? France and Britain were certain Rumania's King Carol had capitulated to Germany when he signed an economic pact with the Reich last spring. But a few days later Carol went home and promptly executed all the Nazi plotters he could find. When war was declared he reiterated his neutrality, only to run against combined pressure from Germany and Russia. The former, seeking wheat and oil, demanded new trade concessions. The latter looked covetously at Bessarabia, which Rumania got from Russia after the World War. Meanwhile Rumania tried desperately to form a solid neutral Balkan bloc.

Late in November King Carol again asserted his independence, but not without showing partiality. Rather than capitulate to Germany's demands for more raw material, his cabinet resigned. In a pinch, the king turned to a strongly pro-Nazi politician, George Tatarescu, whose coalition cabinet was designed to keep peace within Rumania. Nevertheless, Rumania's Balkan neighbors viewed the step uneasily. Not without reason, Italian politicians feared Carol had upset plans for a neutral bloc.

PEOPLE:

Elliott's Network In New York, Son Elliott Roosevelt announced his Transcontinental Broadcasting system, boasting 100 lesser stations, would take the air January 1. Sample outlets: New York's WMCA; Chicago's WJJD and WIND; Hollywood's KFVB; San Francisco's KYA; Pittsburgh's KOY; Kansas City's KCMO; Minneapolis' WDGW.

Dimpled Senator At Bucharest, dimpled Prince Michael of Rumania took his seat in the senate as one of the nation's counselors, a few days after his eighteenth birthday.

U. S. Tourist Spending A survey made by the United States Travel Bureau shows that in 1935 recreational travelers spent more than \$5,000,000,000 in the retail sales outlets of the country.

Toys for Christmas Made From Spools By RUTH WYETH SPEARS

SO MANY readers have asked for more spool ideas after seeing the directions for spool shelves in Sewing Book No. 3, that I know you will love making these amusing toys.

The two spools for the doll's arms are strung together with cord. Start with these, then bend the body wire over the center of the cord. Run both ends of the



wire through the two body spools, then bend the wires and run them through the spools for the legs. Bend in flat loops for the feet. Twist wire around the bonnet spool and fasten to body tightly so the bonnet tips up at the back. Cut a face out of a fashion magazine or draw one and paste it on the front of the bonnet spool. The dress is of two straight pieces; the bright sash and bonnet ribbons match.

One end is cut off the spool for the dog's whiskers, then run both ends through the head and neck spools. Run one end through the two leg spools, then both through the body and one through the back spool. Twist together around the tail.

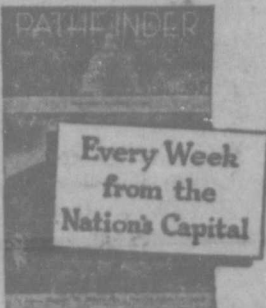

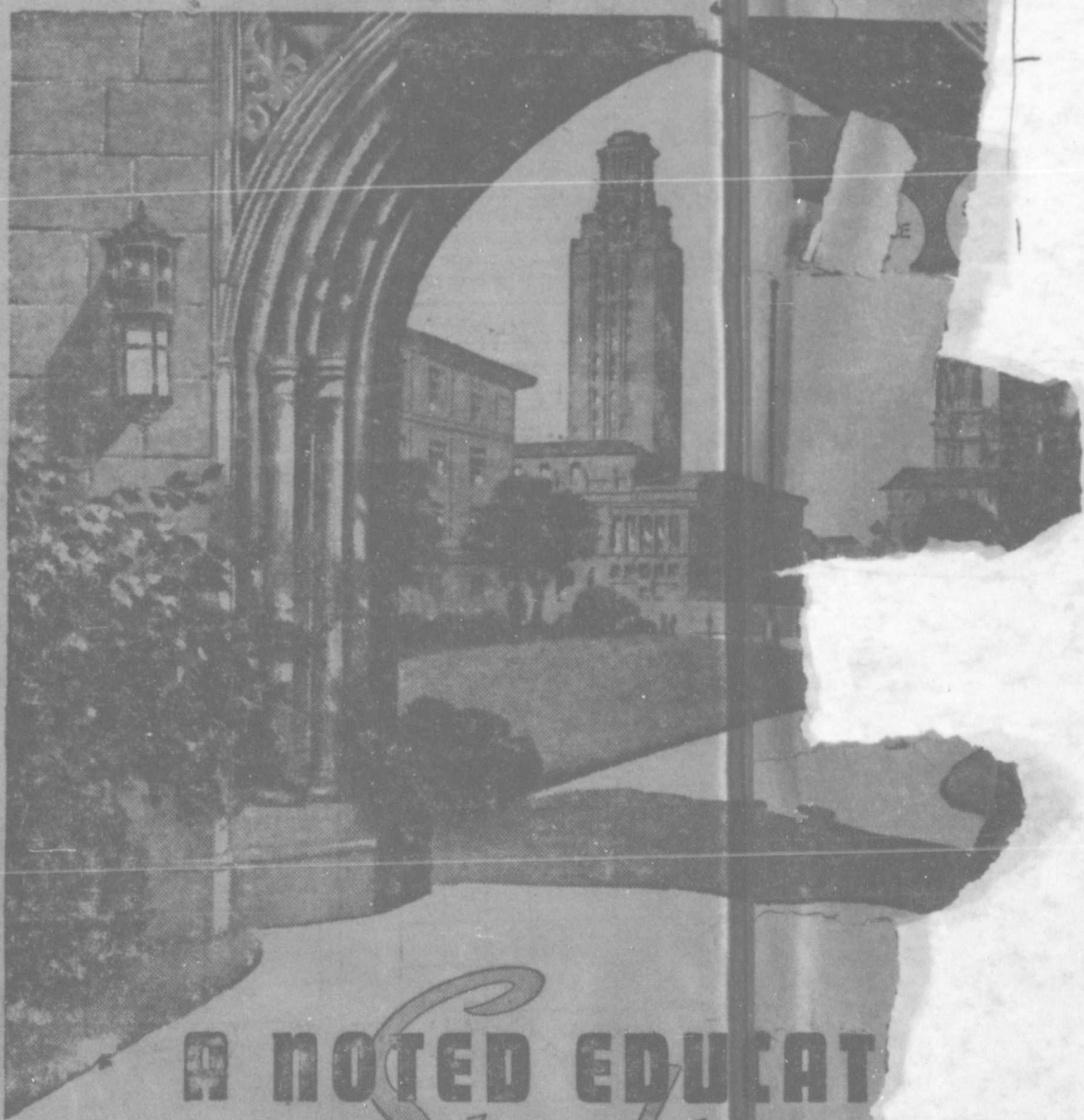

Wright Brothers' Aide Fears War Bombs Will Destroy Inventors' Original Airplane

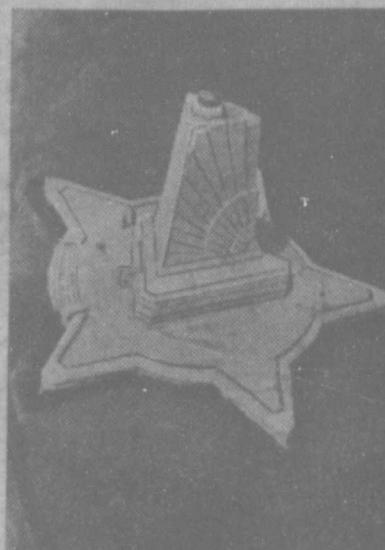
COINJOCK, N. C.—Cap'n Bill Tate of this city is fearful that the war planes of Germany will devour their own mother. The captain, who helped the Wright brothers make the first airplane flight at Kill Devil hill 36 years ago, wants the United States to return the original Wright plane from England at once.

"One bomb would destroy this ship and rob all of us of this treasure," said Captain Tate. "It certainly is not safe at Kennington museum."

Tate visualizes the monsters which sprang from the humble plane raining destruction down upon the fragile ship which birthed them all. He is one of the few persons who were confidants of the Dayton, Ohio, bicycle makers when they came east to experiment with their "kite."

Dispute Led to Stiffment. The original plane was sent to the English museum as a result of a dispute between Wright and Smithsonian officials over the wording of the plaque to be placed upon the exhibit. Ever since then, natives of this vicinity have been dreaming of bringing the plane back to Kill Devil. Beneath the soaring pylon of Wright Memorial beacon, the coastland people hoped to erect a museum building to house the plane and other aviation relics.

Captain Tate, veteran of the light-house service, also urged that steps be taken to force publication of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh's findings as arbiter of the dispute as to whether...

Langley or the Wrights deserve most credit in the invention of the airplane. Lindbergh has reported in favor of the Wrights, Tate said, but he asserted that the report had been "suppressed."

Interesting to cotton growers is the fact that maximum storage rates on government loan cotton has been reduced. For storing and insuring cotton already under loan or held by the government the rate will now be 12 1/2 cents per bale per month.

Glancing over live stock marketing reports and judging from the number of cattle now on the nation's farms it is safe to predict that the number of cattle fed for market this winter and next spring will be larger than last year.

Texas claims to have the oldest farm in the United States. Near Ysleta, this farm has been worked continuously since 1540, when it was established by the Franciscan Fathers who came to this country with Coronado.

Country Home Magazine says that burr clover makes "very fine winter feed for poultry." Once started, it reseeds itself every year and makes a luxuriant green feed, which can be used for fall and winter pasture.

Farm products have over 400 different uses in addition to their food value, according to a recent scientific agricultural study.

Use of Cotton Bagging To Wrap Bales Gaining

ATLANTA, GA.—A drive to persuade growers and ginners to use cotton bagging to wrap bales in order to absorb a part of the 11,500,000-bale surplus is beginning to show signs of success.

Reports from all sections of the cotton belt are that ginners are stocking cotton bagging as well as jute, which has been used to wrap cotton since the days of Eli Whitney, and many farmers are pledging co-operation.

To many growers, it makes little difference whether their cotton is wrapped in jute or cotton bagging. Thus the choice often is left to the man who gins it. In every community, ginners are promising to use the newer wrapper when the decision is left to them.

EDITH BARBER SAYS

Liver Has Nutritional Value

Man seems to have known instinctively many facts about nutrition, which have taken centuries and centuries to prove scientifically. For instance, it was the custom to reserve for the chief and the young warriors the liver, the kidney and heart of a freshly killed animal which were believed to contribute to both physical strength and bravery of spirit.

Science has shown us that these organs play a most valuable part in nutrition. Liver has been studied meticulously and found not only to contribute essentials to daily nutrition, but also to be a specific remedy for pernicious anemia. Recent reports have shown the kidney apparently has specific influence upon blood pressure. A kidney extract has been used to lower blood pressure and at the same time to play a part in reducing weight caused by retention of water in the tissues. More research work will, of course, be necessary before kidney extracts will be used generally as a remedy for such conditions. In the meantime, however, it will be well to use this organ in its natural form occasionally. And nothing is more delicious than a good kidney stew.

Kidney Stew.

- 3 beef kidneys
3 tablespoons butter
1/4 cup flour
2 cups water
2 teaspoons minced onion
Salt and pepper
2 tablespoons sherry

Split kidneys, remove fat and sinews, and cut into sections. Cover with cold salted water and soak one hour; drain. Saute in butter for a few minutes. Add flour, stirring until it is browned. Add water, onion

and seasonings. Cover and simmer 15 minutes. Add sherry. Serve on toast.

- Broiled Kidneys.
6 veal kidneys
Cooking oil
Salt and pepper
Butter
Lemon
Parsley

Split kidneys, remove fat and sinews and soak in cold salted water for 30 minutes. Drain. Brush halves with oil. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Place on hot platter, dot with butter, and garnish with lemon slices and parsley.

Vitamin C in Flour Enlarges Bread Loaf

COPENHAGEN, DENMARK.—Larger loaves of bread can be baked from the same amount of flour heretofore used by first adding a small amount of vitamin C to the flour, according to a patent awarded to Holger Jorgensen, of Copenhagen, Denmark. Vitamin C has been identified as ascorbic acid and it is the latter that the inventor mixes into the dough before baking. Only infinitesimal amounts of the vitamin are used—five 100,000ths of a part of ascorbic acid for every part of flour. In experiments loaves of bread 12.5 per cent greater in volume were obtained from flour containing the vitamin than bread baked from the same amount of flour to which the vitamin had not been added.

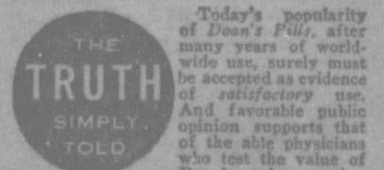

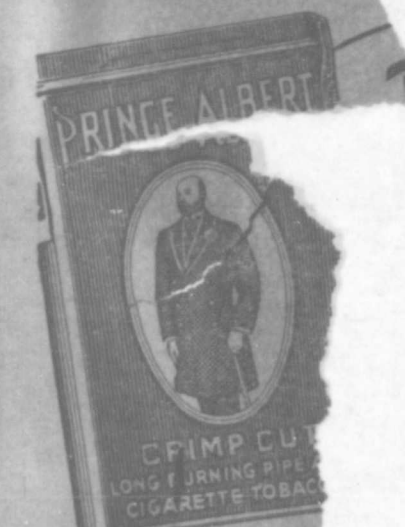
