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

NEW YORK.-Old General Plutarco Elias Calles, Mexico's strong-man for 11 years, has repudiated force, on several occasions, Calles Returns but has stopped for just one more To Mexico on round. Just now a resident in Salvage Trip southern Califor-

nia, the former president will be allowed to return to Mexico City, to try to recover his expropriated land, according to a dispatch from Mexico

The revolution against Porfirio Diaz in 1910 made much of breaking up the great land holdings and distributing them to the peasants. He made the land revolution as much as any man, but on June 15, 1930, he proposed to liquidate it-thus: "If we wish to be sincere, we must confess that agrarianism, as we have understood it and thus far practiced it, has been a failure." Five years later with the ascendancy of Cardenas, lean Indian Savonarola of communal doctrine, he was exiled, and his great estates at Santa Barbara were confiscated.

As a peasant youth in his native mountains he doubled in bar-keeping and school teaching. He led a savage strike against the Sonora Dodge copper interests, and in the turmoil of the revolution, joined Obregon and was president from 1924 to 1928. He was in Cardenas' cabinet and was supposedly pulling the strings, but suddenly hopped a plane for San Diego and took up

He was an unyielding foe of the church during the years of his dictatorship, in the presidency and out. Muscular and vigorous, at 63, with high cheekbones and squinting mongoloid eyes, he is of the cut of the latter-day dictator; and several times there have been reports that he was planning a comeback. It is now indicated that he is up to nothing more important than trying to salvage something out of the agrarianism which he helped to start.

It was a similar alarm, among many citizens, which started New York's unique tax march on Albany, in which thousands of citizens, representing 829 organizations, moved on the state capitol, "to apply the ax to the tax," as their banners and buttons had it. The new and seemingly unprecedented "economy front" is the state budget emergency committee, in which the various organizations converge. was started by a man who was scratching gravel, literally and figuratively.

Henry M. Champion had a little sand and gravel pit on his 40-acre farm on the Chenango river, 20 miles north of Binghampton. He was doing nicely until taxes began to pull him down. He called a meeting of farmers in 1938 and formed the Chenango County Taxpayers' association, of which he was elected president. In their first year of ax work, they nicked \$75,000 from the county budget, and, moving on from there, found eager allies in similar organizations, culminating in the state committee, with Mr. Champion as chairman. They chalked up a reduction of \$26,-500,000 in the state budget last

year. Mr. Champion was a punishing axman in his youth, working in logging camps in Arkansas and Wisconsin, the latter being his native state. His father is still a lumberman in northern Michigan. He came to New York state in 1914 and made his first visit to New York city last July, rallying the tax rebels.

He is a weather-beaten citizen, 44 years old, who doesn't look at all like the little man in the barrelalthough his organization has this undernourished little chap, armed with a blunderbuss, on its badges. EUROPE:

While Franklin Roosevelt was fishing south of the Panama canal, his two special peace emissaries were on the high seas en route to settle Europe's quarrels. Steelman Myron C. Taylor would work from the Vatican. Undersecretary of State Sumner Welles would travel to Italy, Germany, France and Britain seeking a basis for a post-war settle-ment. They had to work fast, be-cause the European dogfight was fast getting out of hand:

In Scandinavia

Not only Finland, but Norway and Sweden as well were being drawn into other peoples' wars. Undoubtedly sympathizing with the Finns, Stockholm and Oslo governments had to stay on their good behavior or risk reprisals from Germany. That was why Per Albin Hansson,

Swedish premier, had to refuse Finland's plea for direct military aid. The Finns, meanwhile, were sagging badly, surrendering key posts on the Mannerheim line before Russia's relentless attack.

(But Mannerheim losses were partially equalized by gains elsewhere. Northeast of Lake Ladoga, the high command announced, 18,000 Red soldiers have been killed or captured, wiping out the entire eighteenth division.)

Oslo had an even hotter potato in its hands. Attacking Germany's prison ship Altmark within Norwegian territorial waters, a British de-stroyer had rescued the prisoners nounce he would welcome a chance nen fled to the interior. Angry notes were exchanged, Norway finally calling its parliament to decide on a course of action. Why, asked London, had Altmark been allowed within Norwegian territorial waters? Why, asked Berlin, had Norway failed to protect Altmark from the British?

Talking back boldly for a small power, brave Norway bluntly told the British that the Altmark case would probably be protested to the League of Nations "or some other tribunal." Nor was there much doubt that Norway was within her rights.

In the West

There was no action between the Maginot and Siegfried lines, but the Altmark incident stirred up reprisals at sea. Britain seized two Nazi merchant ships carrying manganese from Spain. Down to Davey Jones' locker went Britain's destroyer Daring with a loss of 157 lives. This was the sixth destroyer Britain has lost thus far, and brought her total fleet losses to 25 vessels.

In the Near East

Little more was heard of the 100,000 British colonial troops landed recently at Suez and dispersed throughout the troubled Near East.

Trade Pacts

Foreign policy held congressional attention as the house ways and means committee reported favorably a resolution to extend for three years the administration's reciprocal trade program. The program itself was no issue, for Glenn Frank's G. O. P. planning committee okayed the low tariff idea in principle one day before the house took up the resolution (See POLITICS). Instead, G. O. P. lined against Democrat on an amendment which would force senate ratification of each trade pact. At present the administration can make pacts without congressional approval.

Meanwhile congressional economy advocates cheered house passage of the \$965,779,000 naval appropriations bill, which was \$111,700,000 below President Roosevelt's budget estimate. In all, this meant house and senate had cut about \$270,000,000 from budget estimates, leading Kentucky's Sen. Alben Barkley to remark that he thought new taxes could be avoided. (President Roosevelt had asked a \$460,000,000 for 'emergency' defense costs.)

Biggest problem before the senate was the agriculture appropriation bill, from which the house had slashed \$66,000,000. The farm bloc wanted this cut restored, also wanted \$225,000,000 for parity payments. If this program goes through, the economies thus far would be nulli-

By late February enthusiastic Republicans had taken the political ball completely away from the Democrats, who rested insecurely on their laurels. At Washington, the G. O. P. national committee heard and scooted for home while Nazi to whip Franklin Roosevelt in the tee decided to hold its convention in Philadelphia on June 24. 

One way of postponing a crisis is to run away from it, though the eventual consequences are usually worse. After five weeks of wrestling with Franklin Roosevelt's budget, it looked dangerously like con gress would try this very strategy to avoid raising new taxes or in-

creasing the national debt limit. The trouble was, economy had bogged down. Independent offices appropriations, slashed in the house, were raised to \$1,138,675,000 in the senate, making the total bill \$56,-029,000 under budget estimates but still \$22,000,000 more than last year. The President's \$788,929,000 farm bill, from which the house appropri ations committee cut \$154,000,000, went to the senate minus only \$66,

928,000 of the original figure. To save even this much, Virginia's Rep. Clifton Woodrum had to fight a score of dragons. When President Roosevelt commented from Hyde Park that he didn't like this sort of indiscriminate economizing, Mr. Woodrum dug into the Presi-

The gist: Officers and crew were absolved of "serious blame," the sinking having been caused by mechanical failure of the air intake valve leading to the yessel's engine.

EUROPE:

No Harm at Belgrade For a short and unimportant week-

end, Europe's spotlight shifted to Belgrade. There met envoys of the Little Entente-Turkey, Rumania, Yugoslavia and Greece-seeking a way to keep war out of their back yard. In their midst were two malcontents who had territorial claims against Rumania, namely, Hungary and Bulgaria. Others, Germany and Russia, also looked covetously at Rumania, whose diseases thus became so numerous that she was virtually untouchable. To support her against these many foes would be suicide for other Entente members.

But Rumanian Foreign Minister Grigore Gafencu brought two trump cards to Belgrade. First was the threat that Rumania would seek security with Russia and Germany unless the Entente played ball. Second was the promise of a small territorial concession to Bulgaria, which meant the Entente could now woo and win that aloof little nation.

When the conference ended nothing was announced more concrete than a mutual "promise" (but not guarantee) to "watch . . . over the safeguarding of the rights of each ." AGRICULTURE:

Southern Freeze

Damaging enough to tourist trade was the cold wave that struck southern states in late January. When it was over, farmers found even more damage had been done to their crops. Florida clamped down a oneweek embargo against citrus shipments while inspectors determined how much damage was done. "Spies" from California were on hand to observe the damage. The agriculture department's marketing service surveyed damage in both Texas and Florida, making a preliminary report that indicated severe crop damage but little injury to trees themselves.

One important announcement came from the U.S. Sugar corporation, which reported to stockholders that cold weather had "totally destroyed" the mature cane standing on 25 per cent of the planted acreage.

When Britain went to war and asked India's aid, Mahatma Gandhi countered by asking when India might expect dominion status. Answered Viceroy Marquess of Linlith-gow: After the war. Complained Gandhi: This was unacceptable.

In Tokyo, 70-year-old Takao Saito created a storm in the diet by charging Japan has lost 100,000 killed and several hundred thousand wounded in China. Sore at everyone (including the U.S., for abrogating its trade treaty), Nippon promptly stuck its foot in the mud again by bombing the French-operated Kunming - Hanoi Allied-German. AVIATION:

Foreign Business

Already burdened with airplane orders from Europe's belligerents, U. S. manufacturers have a new customer-Sweden. Just placed is an order for 150 Vultee attack planes costing about \$8,000,000. What this order meant was anybody's guess. Congress buzzed with rumors that the planes were really destined for Finland, but military experts argued that Sweden, next in line for aggression should the Soviet capture Finland, was bolstering her own defenses.

Meanwhile Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau gave the first accurate picture of just how big America's foreign airplane business really is. Since mid-1938, when France






