## WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS BY JOSEPH W. LAR... Welles Expedition Bears Fruit In Shower of Peace Rumors Russo-Finnish Truce Forecasts

### The Wars in Brief

**Finnish Front.** Soviet troops reached the suburbs of Viipuri, western stronghold of the Mannerheim line. The Finns claimed they had destroyed the thirty-fourth Red tank brigade, sent to relieve the badly shredded eighteenth division.

**Western Front.** Local patrol activity. Nazis reported building pontoon bridges to reach Luxembourg frontier. Aerial reconnaissance increased by both sides.

**At Sea.** War again invaded the western hemisphere. A British freighter was attacked 130 miles east of Puerto Rico, and a Nazi freighter burned in the West Indies.

**Oriental Front.** Chinese claimed one of their Yangtze river mines had downed a Jap destroyer.

Slovakia, Poland, Hungary and Austria; (2) return of former German colonies; and (3) destruction of Britain's control over world sea lanes.

But the Welles expedition was not without profit. Europe had suddenly become filled with peace plans, and all the powers were talking tough about the minimum terms they would accept. This indicated they were at least ready to talk peace.

### Welles Sideline

Aside from his announced mission, Sumner Welles was instrumental in two other developments. First, his visit apparently paved the way for a return to Washington of Dr. Hans Dieckhoff, German ambassador recalled in 1938. Second, and most important, he had evidently smoothed U. S.-Italian friendship by trying to settle Italy's coal problem. The trouble:

Britain, enforcing her blockade of German exports, had first tried to persuade Italy to buy coal from her instead of the Reich. Failing, she stopped German coal bound for Italy, drawing an angry protest from Rome. Whether by accident or not, Mr. Welles' arrival coincided with reports that Italy would seek a \$100,000,000 credit to buy coal from the U. S. Obviously this pleased the allies, for Italy would not only be freed from blockade pressure but would find her cooperation with Germany restricted.

### Finnish Loan

Passed by the senate in jig time were house amendments to a bill boosting by \$100,000 the Export-Import bank's capital. Purpose: To make loans for non-military purchases to nations whose war debts are not in default. Principal beneficiary was Finland, whose \$20,000,000 Federal Loan Administrator Jesse Jones allocated even before President Roosevelt signed the bill.

Unexpectedly, Mr. Jones also announced loans of \$15,000,000 to Sweden and \$10,000,000 to Norway, both funds to be used for financing U. S. exports. Happiest of all was Finland's Minister Hjalmar J. Procope, who immediately began buying gasoline, oil, grain and vital supplies. Said he: "When the war started, most people thought we would be beaten within two or three days. We've been fighting three months now and we'll fight on, confident that help will come."

### U. S. Mediation?

Even more persistent than rumors of an Allied-German peace were reports that Finland and Russia may soon reach a settlement, probably under U. S. sponsorship. European observers who watched Sumner Welles confer with Adolf Hitler also noticed that U. S. Ambassador Laurence Steinhardt broke bread in Moscow with Russian Premier Viacheslav Molotov.

Whether the initiative came from the U. S. or elsewhere, the Finns were indeed ready to talk peace. Sorely tired, they had a choice of accepting Russia's terms or calling for British-French aid (something, contrary to popular opinion, they have not yet done). Some observers thought the mysterious mediator might have unhappy consequences. Should Finland be made a sort of Russian Slovakia, Norway and Sweden would be even more firmly held under the Russian-German boot.

### CONGRESS: Politics, Front & Center

Tanned from his Caribbean trip, Franklin Roosevelt stepped back into the White House and began his eighth year as President. A Gallup poll showed 44 per cent of the nation supported his policies, yet only 46 per cent would vote for a third term. Another Gallup poll showed 55 per cent expect a Democrat, F. D. R. or somebody else, to be next President.

Politics, thus evident at the White House, also held sway in congress. As the senate looked favorably on Secretary of State Cordell Hull's reciprocal trade program, Candidate Hull's 1940 presidential stock took a precipitous boost. It jumped still higher when Republican Thomas W. Lamont, a Morgan partner, wrote in support of the trade program in *Collier's* weekly. Already passed by the house, a resolution to extend the Hull plan three more years seemed a cinch to get through the senate.

Meanwhile the senate jumped waist-deep into politics by arguing a bill to extend the Hatch act. The plan: Prohibit pernicious poll activity among a half million or so employees paid in whole or in part with federal funds (state highway departments, social security branches, etc.).

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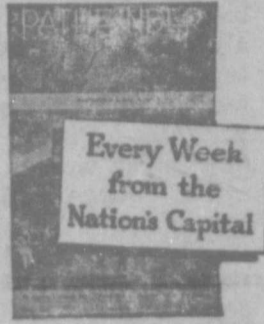

## WHO'S NEWS THIS WEEK

By LEMUEL F. PARTON  
(Consolidated Features—WNU Service.)

NEW YORK.—Old General Plutarco Elias Calles, Mexico's strong-man for 11 years, has repudiated force, on several occasions, but has stopped for just one more round. Just now a resident in southern California, the former president will be allowed to return to Mexico City, to try to recover his expropriated land, according to a dispatch from Mexico City.

The revolution against Porfirio Diaz in 1910 made much of breaking up the great land holdings and distributing them to the peasants. He made the land revolution as much as any man, but on June 15, 1930, he proposed to liquidate it—thus: "If we wish to be sincere, we must confess that agrarianism, as we have understood it and thus far practiced it, has been a failure." Five years later with the ascendancy of Cardenas, lean Indian Savonarola of communal doctrine, he was exiled, and his great estates at Santa Barbara were confiscated.

As a peasant youth in his native mountains he doubted in bar-keeping and school teaching. He led a savage strike against the Sonora Dodge copper interests, and in the turmoil of the revolution, joined Obregon and was president from 1924 to 1928. He was in Cardenas' cabinet and was supposedly pulling the strings, but suddenly hopped a plane for San Diego and took up golf.

He was an unyielding foe of the church during the years of his dictatorship, in the presidency and out. Muscular and vigorous, at 63, with high cheekbones and squinting mongoloid eyes, he is of the cut of the latter-day dictator; and several times there have been reports that he was planning a comeback. It is now indicated that he is up to nothing more important than trying to salvage something out of the agrarianism which he helped to start.

THIS writer had a letter from his old friend, Eddie Persons, of San Francisco, the other day in which Mr. Persons put Santa Barbara county, California, in a test-tube, as a clinical sample of what ruinous taxation can do to a minor commonwealth. It would appear that Santa Barbara county is carrying on just to save funeral expenses and Mr. Persons, one of the leaders of the San Francisco business community, is trying to do something about it.

It was a similar alarm, among many citizens, which started New York's unique tax march on Albany, in which thousands of citizens, representing 829 organizations, moved on the state capitol, "to apply the ax to the tax," as their banners and buttons had it. The new and seemingly unprecedented "economy front" is the state budget emergency committee, in which the various organizations converge. It was started by a man who was scratching gravel, literally and figuratively.

Henry M. Champion had a little sand and gravel pit on his 40-acre farm on the Chenango river, 20 miles north of Binghamton. He was doing nicely until taxes began to pull him down. He called a meeting of farmers in 1938 and formed the Chenango County Taxpayers' association, of which he was elected president. In their first year of ax work, they nicked \$75,000 from the county budget, and, moving on from there, found eager allies in similar organizations, culminating in the state committee, with Mr. Champion as chairman. They chalked up a reduction of \$26,500,000 in the state budget last year.

Mr. Champion was a punishing ax-man in his youth, working in logging camps in Arkansas and Wisconsin, the latter being his native state. His father is still a lumberman in northern Michigan. He came to New York state in 1914 and made his first visit to New York city last July, rallying the tax rebels.

He is a weather-beaten citizen, 44 years old, who doesn't look at all like the little man in the barrel—although his organization has this undemolished little chap, armed with a blunderbuss, on its badges. Many mystics regard upstate New York as the cradle of prophecy—many prophets having risen there. If it isn't a prophet this time, it would appear to be a Watt Tyler, and the capitol stands on Nottingham hill. The little man in the barrel has had an uphill climb for many years and ought to take this one easily.

## WEEKLY NEWS AND Scandinavian By Pressur Finn Defests Breaking Down

### EUROPE:

While Franklin Roosevelt was fishing south of the Panama canal, his two special peace emissaries were on the high seas en route to settle Europe's quarrels. Steelman Myron C. Taylor would work from the Vatican. Undersecretary of State Sumner Welles would travel to Italy, Germany, France and Britain seeking a basis for a post-war settlement. They had to work fast, because the European dogfight was fast getting out of hand.

### In Scandinavia

Not only Finland, but Norway and Sweden as well were being drawn into other peoples' wars. Undoubtedly sympathizing with the Finns, Stockholm and Oslo governments had to stay on their good behavior, or risk reprisals from Germany. That was why Per Albin Hansson,

Swedish premier, had to refuse Finland's plea for direct military aid. The Finns, meanwhile, were sagging badly, surrendering key posts on the Mannerheim line before Russia's relentless attack.

(But Mannerheim losses were partially equalized by gains elsewhere. Northeast of Lake Ladoga, the high command announced, 10,000 Red soldiers have been killed or captured, wiping out the entire nineteenth division.)

Oslo had an even hotter potato in its hands. Attacking Germany's prison ship *Altmark* within Norwegian territorial waters, a British destroyer had rescued the prisoners and scooped for home while Nazi crewmen fled to the interior. Angry notes were exchanged, Norway finally calling its parliament to decide on a course of action. Why, asked London, had *Altmark* been allowed within Norwegian territorial waters? Why, asked Berlin, had Norway failed to protect *Altmark* from the British?

Talking back boldly for a small power, brave Norway bluntly told the British that the *Altmark* case would probably be protested to the League of Nations "or some other tribunal." Nor was there much doubt that Norway was within her rights.

### In the West

There was no action between the Maginot and Siegfried lines, but the *Altmark* incident stirred up reprisals at sea. Britain seized two Nazi merchant ships carrying manganese from Spain. Down to Davey Jones' locker went Britain's destroyer *Daring* with a loss of 137 lives. This was the sixth destroyer Britain has lost thus far, and brought her total fleet losses to 25 vessels.

### In the Near East

Little more was heard of the 100,000 British colonial troops landed recently at Suez and dispersed throughout the troubled Near East.

## TREND

How the wind is blowing...

LABOR—New York's Sen. Robert Wagner has urged creation of a federal mediation board to settle all types of strikes.

CAPITAL—Seeking a "voice for the employer in national labor legislation," the successful Associated Employers of Oregon will sponsor a meeting in Spokane on March 26 pointing the way for a national organization.

BANKING—After 80 years of private banking, the venerable New York house of Morgan will become a public corporation April 1.

RAILROADS—Effective March 24, eastern U. S. railroads will lower basic passenger coach fares to 2 cents per mile. Present fare is 2 1/2 cents.

FINANCE—Britain's treasury has requisitioned private British holdings of 60 U. S. securities, seeking funds for purchase of war materials in the U. S.

INDUSTRY—A federal reserve board report indicated that volume of U. S. industrial production dropped from 128 last December to 120 in January, its sixth consecutive faltering in industry's...

But Russian frontiers of Turkey, India, Afghanistan and Persia were still guarded closely as a possible Red thrust. Biggest surprise came from Turkey, where the government suddenly applied the national defense law and assumed virtual dictatorial powers. Meanwhile the Ankara press warned civilians that, as non-belligerent allies of Britain and France, Turks must be ready for a "supreme effort this spring."

### CONGRESS:

### Trade Pacts

Foreign policy held congressional attention as the house ways and means committee reported favorably a resolution to extend for three years the administration's reciprocal trade program. The program itself was no issue, for Glenn Frank's G. O. P. planning committee okayed the low tariff idea in principle one day before the house took up the resolution (See *POLITICS*). Instead, G. O. P. lined against Democrat on an amendment which would force senate ratification of each trade pact. At present the administration can make pacts without congressional approval.

Meanwhile congressional economy advocates cheered house passage of the \$965,779,000 naval appropriations bill, which was \$111,700,000 below President Roosevelt's budget estimate. In all, this meant house and senate had cut out \$270,000,000 from budget estimates, leading Kentucky's Sen. Alben Barkley to remark that he thought new taxes could be avoided. (President Roosevelt had asked a \$460,000,000 "emergency" defense costs.) Biggest problem before the senate was the agriculture appropriation bill, from which the house had slashed \$66,000,000. The farm bloc wanted this cut restored, also wanted \$225,000,000 for parity payments. If this program goes through, the economies thus far would be nullified.

### POLITICS:

### G. O. P. in the Saddle

By late February enthusiastic Republicans had taken the political ball completely away from the Democrats, who rested insecurely on their laurels. At Washington, the G. O. P. national committee heard Chairman John D. M. Hamilton announce he would welcome a chance to whip Franklin Roosevelt in the 1940 campaign. Then the committee decided to hold its convention in Philadelphia on June 24. Next day, at Miami, Democratic Chairman Jim Farley hurriedly set July 15 as date for his Democratic convention.

Republicanism had more enthusiasm than originally. Col. Robert R. McCormick, publisher of the *Chicago Tribune*, (which hates the New Deal to death), dragged out the moth-eaten red herring in a speech at Jackson, Mich., birthplace of the

Republican party. Colonel McCormick saw Communism in everything he looked at, censorship in the U. S. mails and an open conspiracy between the White House and the Kremlin.

More sanity characterized the G. O. P. program committee's 116-page report, prepared by a 200-man strategy body under Dr. Glenn Frank, former president of the University of Wisconsin. Criticized were (1) pump priming; (2) emergency monetary powers; (3) legislative control over wages and hours; (4) the U. S. housing program; (5) government competition with business; and (6) the New Deal power program.

The committee's proposals embodied quite a few Democratic tenets, indicating how far the G. O. P. has swung away from rock-bound conservatism. Proposals: (1) return of gold standard; (2) 20 per cent cut in federal expenses; and a balanced budget by 1942; (3) amendments to the Wagner act; (4) a reciprocal trade program to safeguard agriculture; (5) improvements and expansion of social security; (6) "protection" of "restrictive" U. S. regulations; (7) "refused to do"...

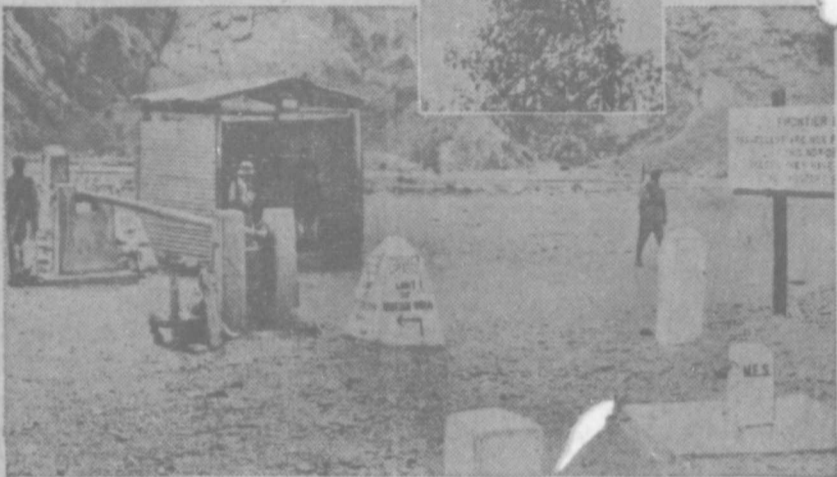

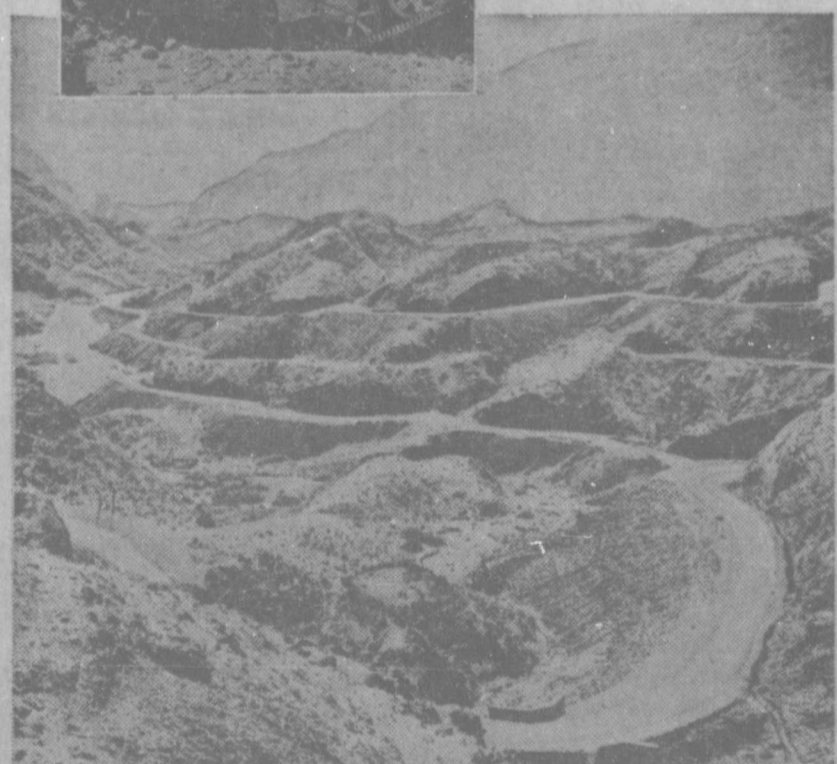

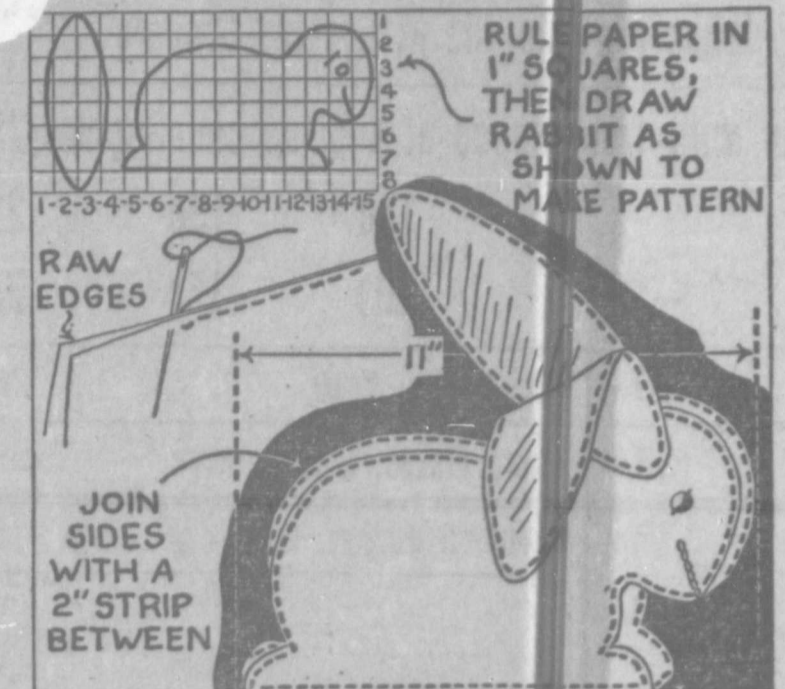

The Easter bunny shown here is 11 inches long. He is white, hand-stitched in heavy pink thread and has pink bead or button eyes. Make your own pattern for him by following the diagram. Rule paper into 1-inch squares; number them; then draw the pattern outlines. Cut two body pieces; four ear pieces and a 2-inch strip to be used between the two sides of the body. Interline the ears to make them stand up. Join all raw edges, as shown, leaving an

opening in the body for stuffing tightly with cotton or bits of soft cloth; then finish sewing.

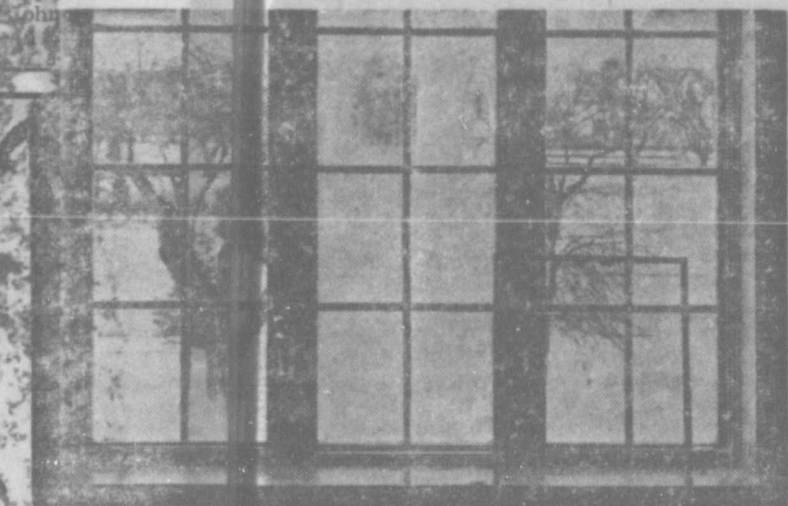
