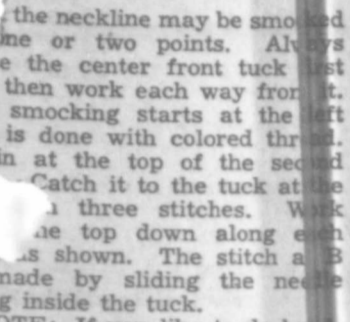

There is a trick that is useful in making honeycomb smocking without a special pattern. The fullness of any smocking is basted into tucks of equal length, as at A. E. is a fullness in the center front.



the neckline may be smocked at one or two points. Always smock the center front tuck first, then work each way from it. Smocking starts at the left and is done with colored thread. Catch it to the tuck at the top of the second and third stitches. Work the top down along each tuck as shown. The stitch at B is made by sliding the needle along inside the tuck.

**WHO'S NEWS THIS WEEK**

NEW YORK — Paul Reynaud, who was asked to form a new French cabinet, and successor to Premier Daladier, put through the French-British monetary and economic accord of last December, and, even before the start of the war was an advocate of a close financial union between the two countries as the first bulwark of their joint defense. For several years, he has been studying English finance and history, insisting that both nations must abandon their old plan of remaining apart in the matter of monetary and economic relationships.

He is a lawyer, financier and economist, minister of finance since October, 1938. In the chamber of deputies, he represents a "big business" section of Paris and has contended vigorously against "governmental meddling in business." In 1935 and 1936 he made a courageous fight for the devaluation of the franc, an issue which is always loaded in France and always sidestepped by more cautious politicians. His business sagacity was demonstrated in the summer of 1929, when he warned all and sundry that a big smash was coming, and withdrew all of his securities from the market.

He is as direct, decisive and fiery as Daladier is ponderous and meditative, and for many years has been making prophecies more gloomy than Cassandra's foreboding of Troy, as he urged France to prepare for the worst. He parts his hair in the middle, strings with the Alliance Democratique, a center group, and has never been classified as either right or left. He is said to be "too intelligent to be liked," and does not seem to mind. He is small and alert, only slightly gray at 60, carefully groomed and the master of a verbal short jab which seldom invites a return engagement for anyone inclined to mix with him.

He was a holdout on Laval's deal to give Mussolini a green light in Ethiopia and in this connection warned France that it had better be looking to its empire. In politics since 1919, in the chamber since 1920, he was previously minister of finance in Tardieu's cabinet. He comes of a family high in the mountains of Barcelonnette, of a clan which has extensive holdings in several foreign countries, including Mexico.

BUILDING more stately mansions for his soul, Fritz Mandl, the Austrian munitioneer, runner-up for Maharoff, was interrupted by Adolf Hitler. In a New York municipal court, an Austrian architect sues Mr. Mandl for payment for designs for a new wing on his Alpine castle, when he was married to Hedy Lamarr, the screen star, wife of Gene Markey, Hollywood producer. The castle and the plans were a war casualty, but Mr. Mandl is sitting pretty in Argentina, the Hidalgo of a great estate, and getting a fast running start with new steel and munitions plants in the land of the pampas.

He fooled Hitler. His great arms plants, including the Hirtzberg plant, were supposed to be worth about \$60,000,000. That was a nice, fat grouse for the Nazi nimrod, but when Der Fuehrer moved in, he found the great plants just a hollow shell, the securities long since liquidated and Mr. Mandl at a safe distance from Germany with his former fortune remaining more or less intact.

Now 40 years old, round-faced and merry, he was a playboy in his youth, but stayed on the job in his later years. The munitions works were a family holding, founded by his grandfather, Sigmund, and expanded by his father, Alexander. He was an associate of the fallen Prince Ernst Ruediger von Starbberg in the Vienna putsch of 1934, not at all interested in politics, ideologies, and smarter than the press in both making a get-away from Hitler and from Germany as well as being able to save his fortune.

Not a refugee fortune, but the makings of a new one appears in the operations of Arnold Bernstein, who also found a hole in the Nazi line. A freighter of the American Arnold Bernstein shipping line burns at Baltimore, but it was insured and his newly recruited ship are running cargos to Europe and his fleet is expanding. He came here last October, from a Nazi jail, where a tangle over the mysterious blood marks had landed him. At

**Documents' Creates Furore in Washington; Hull, Bullitt Deny Nazi Charge**

**HITLER SAY:**  
The Roosevelt administration indignantly denied spectacular charges by Germany. Herr Ribbentrop's aggressive Foreign Office charged that it had possession of 16 crucial documents, found in the Polish government archives at captured Warsaw. These documents had been turned in by Polish diplomats, so the accusation went, and concerned the activities of the American ambassadors to London and Paris. It seems that these ambassadors, Kennedy and Bullitt, had egged on England and France against Hitler, with the teeming promise that the United States would eventually come to the allies' help. It also was alleged that Bullitt held out false inspiration to the bellicose Poles. Unquestionably, these sensational charges were the news of the week.

President Roosevelt, Secretary Hull, and Bill Bullitt hastened to deny the accusations, as storm clouds gathered over America. Roosevelt talked about taking it all with "three" grains of salt. Hull made a flat denial. Bullitt and Potocki, Polish ambassador to the United States, both said no-no in

union. But Congressman Hamilton Fish and the hardshell isolationists were infuriated, asserting that where there is smoke, there is a fire or two. Fish demanded a thorough investigation, and others defied the President to laugh it off, salt or no salt. It was a bad thing to have happen in a presidential, maybe a third-term, year.

**ANGLO-FRANCE:**  
The allied war council met, somewhat bewildered by it all, in London. The French and English reaffirmed their unity, barred any separate peace by either, and announced that their financial, economic and imperialistic co-operation would continue after the present war was over. They intended, they

Congressman Hamilton Fish, who wanted Roosevelt's foreign activities investigated, himself led colored N. Y. troops in the last war. He fought with the French army, in the only American unit officially attached to the Gallic high command. Fish also was Harvard football captain, and a member of the Harvard crew. He is Roosevelt's unwilling fellow-townsmen in Hyde Park, N. Y.

Dr. Thomas Parran, surgeon-general of the U. S. public health service, declared that cancer, which caused more than 140,000 deaths last year, is on the increase and ranks as second leading cause of death.

The Irish Republican army of wild men demonstrated against tall, calm Eamon De Valera, premier of Eire. "Val" was born in New York, with a Spanish father, and an Irish mother and sympathies. His American origin saved him from an English firing squad in 1916.

William Horlick Jr., 65, whose father started the multi-million dollar Horlick malted milk fortune, died at Racine, Wis.

William F. Buckley, who began serving a two-year term for mail fraud in the Philippine railway bonds scandal, was revealed to be the husband of Adela Moffet, night club singer and heiress to Standard Oil millions.

Henry Ford II, grandson of the great Henry, is preparing to become a Roman Catholic. His grandfather

let it be known, to take a more active part in pushing the war, and there was a lot of gossip about Chamberlain going the way of Daladier—into the prime-ministerial discard. Due to British naval losses, there was also talk of the axe for Winston Churchill, first lord of the admiralty.  
It appeared that the neutrals would suffer, as the result of an increased war endeavor by the allies. Germany must be shut off from oil and iron, and if Norwegian, or Rumanian, or Russian neutrality suffered in consequence, that could not be helped. The special threat was aimed at iron-carrying ships, from Narvik, Norway, to Stettin, Germany, which have the habit of plodding safely along in Norwegian territorial waters, free from the frustrated allied blockade. The allied reasoning ran something like this: No Swedish iron; no German steel; no Nazi mailed fist; no Hitler.

But the neutrals were not too afraid of the allies. The Dutch shot down a British bomber that had violated their neutrality, and Rumania appeared to be turning more and more to the German camp. The Russian ambassador to France expressed rude opinions in a telegram to Moscow, and the French kicked him out on a variety of charges. France appeared to want war with the Soviets; England, most emphatically, did not, as a number of significant organizational elections across the channel showed.

Meanwhile, the Germans and Norwegians scored off one another 1 to 1. A German U-boat wormed its sinister way into Kirkwall, British base in the faraway Orkney islands north of Scotland, and "sing'd Churchill's whiskers, if any" by sinking a Norwegian freighter, which was "safely" held there by the British navy. This was considered another maritime coup; but the Norwegians countered by interning a stranded U-boat in Norwegian waters, which aroused the customary amount of furor Teutonicus. There was sensational talk of a U-boat base on the Pacific, at Whale Bay, southwest of Vladivostok, in the Siberian maritime province.

**FORDS & FORENDS:**  
Tokyo, capital of the Japanese empire of Nippon, claimed a population of 7,000,000. This is said to make the Jap-cap the world's second city, with New York first, and London third. London, formerly first in population, has been reduced by wholesale evacuations, blackouts, and utter boredom, so the story goes. Berlin is still fourth, and verminous Warsaw has doubled its population since the war began.

With the Spanish civil war a year over, the grandees (noble families of rank No. 1) took stock. Dictator Franco recently restored them their estates, confiscated by the late lamented republic, but still they had paid a heavy toll. Records of the

Council of Grandees indicated that 40 ermine-clad ducal ones had been killed in the civil war, and that no less than 116 more of them had been "assassinated." It was further reported that Spain was slowly gathering momentum in reconstruction; that her people and her leaders were pro-German; but that her economic life now was closely integrated with the fortunes of the allies. It is typically Spanish, that the Hispanic heart does NOT follow the dollar.

Pope Pius XII called for more Christianity in all nations, and for a rebirth of human decency in the face of hell on earth, ill will to men. He deplored the bombing of civilians, the violation of treaties, and the whole conception of power, politics and super-thought Realpolitik. The Mohammedans, in India, usually the fast friends of John Bull as against Gandhi and his predominantly Hindu Congress party, denounced British treatment of the Mohammedan Arabs in Palestine, thus complicating both the Indian and Minor Asian toothaches.

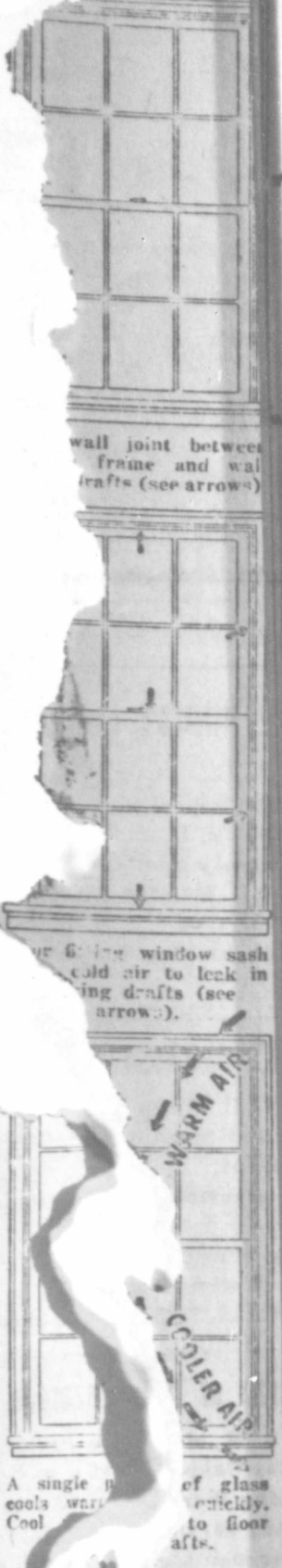

**BEST TIME TO CURE DRAFT IS WHEN YOU BUILD!**



**WATCH THESE THREE PLACES IF YOU WOULD STOP THEM**

There is just no excuse for drafts in your new home, because drafts are definitely curable if you will watch just three places—and all three places are around your windows.

First and foremost offender in the making of drafts in your new home is the window frame. Now you've never bought window frames so you don't know anything about them and that is one reason why so many home builders have drafty windows, because they were careless about the window frame that went into their homes. Now, we aren't going to go into detail about window frames. We just want you to remember that the most important thing about a window frame is how it joins the wall. If it makes a permanent leakproof weather-tight joint with the wall—fine and dandy. If it doesn't, you'll have drafts, no end of drafts. How can you make sure about a weather-tight joint? Just specify that the window frames used in your new home have wide blind stop construction. This special construction should be familiar to your contractor.

**Proper Fitting Necessary**  
Next in importance to window frame is the window sash (the part of the window that moves within the frame). Many home builders buy window frames in one place and sash in another with the result that the sash and frame never fit properly in spite of trimming and cutting on the job. And sash that don't fit properly cause drafts, and more drafts. The modern trend is towards what is known as complete window units that are delivered with frame and sash precision fitted to each other at the factory. Many of these window units are even complete with weatherstrip. In any event be sure that the window sash are fitted properly to the window frame and you'll eliminate another big source of drafts.

**Glass Coals Air**  
Now here is the third cause of drafts. It's warm air being quickly cooled against a single pane of glass. The cold air then drops to the floor. This flow of air causes drafts. What's the cure? A double pane of glass. Some windows are made so that this double pane of glass fits on the inside of the window, while the most common is the ordinary storm windows which are hung on the outside. Whether your double glass is inside or outside, the result is the same. The glass that is within the heated room is kept warmer by the dead air space between the double panes. Result: Warm air is not cooled so fast; no cool air—no drafts.

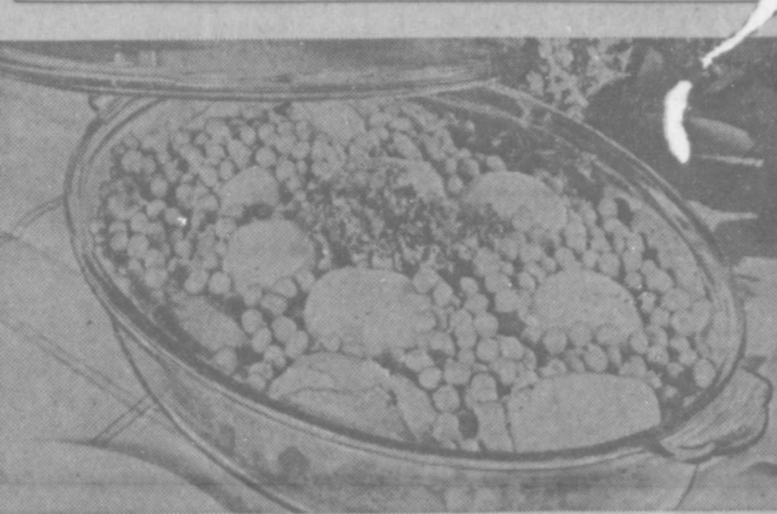

**LAMB CHOPS EN CASSEROLE MAKE A "BUSY-DAY DINNER"** (See Recipes Below)

### Busy-Day Meals

There's something about the first warm, sunny days of spring that makes a woman don her working clothes, roll up her sleeves and get started on house cleaning.

In spite of all the work involved, spring cleaning does give your spirits a lift. And it's very apt to spur you on to such heights that unless you've planned your cleaning campaign with all the finesse of an army general, the end of house cleaning is likely to find you with a shining, immaculate house, but an exceedingly weary body and a very disturbed family! But with a definite plan of action to guide you, even your meals can be served on schedule, and they can be good meals; a simple meal with a hot main dish that can be partly prepared the day before, is one solution to the problem of how to keep your family well fed and happy even at house cleaning time.

Plan a meal that requires little watching, one that is easy to serve and one that won't be spoiled if it isn't eaten on the stroke of 12:00. Serve the meal "help-yourself-style," using paper plates and napkins, because these are the things that make hot meals practical even in the thick clean-up by flying brooms and dust mops.

You'll find worthwhile suggestions for busy-day meals, below.

#### Spanish Roll.

Round steak, 2½ inches thick  
1 No. 2 can tomatoes  
1 small can mushrooms  
1 medium onion (cut fine)  
1 green pepper (cut fine)  
¼ teaspoon cayenne pepper  
4 whole cloves  
Dash of allspice  
½ teaspoon salt  
Noodles

Dredge steak with flour and sear on both sides. Place in casserole, and add tomatoes, mushrooms, onion, green peppers and seasoning. Cover and bake about 2½ hours in a slow oven (300 degrees). Half an hour before serving, boil some noodles in salted water. Drain.

Place steak on large platter, surround with noodles, and cover with the sauce.

#### Busy-Day Cake.

(Makes one 8-inch cake)  
¼ cup butter  
1 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
½ cup milk  
1 teaspoon flavoring extract  
1½ cups flour (cake flour preferred)  
1½ teaspoons baking powder  
¼ teaspoon salt

Soften the butter by creaming. Then add sugar, unbeaten eggs, milk, flavoring extract, and the dry ingredients which have been sifted together. With a rotary beater or electric mixer, beat for 2 or 3 minutes, or until the batter is light and very smooth. Pour into greased pan 8 by 8 by 2 inches deep, and cover evenly with the following mixture:

½ cup sweet chocolate (grated)  
½ cup nut meats (cut fine)

Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for 35 to 40 minutes.

#### Lamb Chops en Casserole.

(Serves 6)  
8 lamb chops  
¼ teaspoon salt  
Few grains pepper  
15 small new potatoes  
2 lbs. fresh peas, (2 cups shelled)  
¼ cup water  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 tablespoon butter

Cut fat from the chops, sprinkle them with ¼ teaspoon salt and few grains pepper and brown slightly on both sides. Arrange the chops

around the sides of a shallow casserole, 2 quart size. In the center, place the scraped new potatoes and shelled peas. Add water, sprinkle with salt and put bits of butter over the top. Cover the dish and bake in a moderately hot oven (375 degrees) about 1½ hours, or until the vegetables are tender.

#### Old Fashioned Rice Pudding.

¾ cup rice  
1 cup sugar  
1 quart milk  
¼ teaspoon salt

Wash rice and mix with 1 cup sugar, 1 quart milk and salt. Place in hot oven (425 degrees). Stir into pudding frequently the brown crust that forms. As it thickens pour in ½ cup milk. Bake for about 1½ hours and serve hot or cold.

#### All in One Dinner.

(Serves 5-6)  
3 cups raw potatoes (sliced)  
2 teaspoons salt  
¾ teaspoon pepper  
6 loin pork chops  
3 cups spanish onions (sliced)  
1 tablespoon butter  
1 can condensed tomato soup  
1½ cups sweet milk

In a greased casserole arrange a layer of the sliced potatoes. Season with salt and pepper. Then add a layer of pork chops and season these with salt and pepper. Cover with a layer of onions. Dot with butter and season. Add additional layers of potatoes, chops and onions, as needed. Combine the tomato soup and the milk and pour into the casserole. Cover, and bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees) for about 1½ hours.

#### Spring Salads for Spring Tonics.

No sulphur and molasses needed for a spring tonic, when you serve spring salads! Next week Eleanor Howe will give you some of her own favorite, tested recipes for simple and delicious salads, fruit salads, vegetable salads and molded salads, too. Be sure to read this column next week.

#### Apple Crisp

(Serves 6)  
6 tart apples (peeled and sliced)  
½ cup brown sugar  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
¼ cup water  
½ cup general purpose flour  
½ cup white sugar  
3 tablespoons butter

Pare, core, and slice apples. Put in a greased baking dish. Mix together the brown sugar and the cinnamon, and sprinkle over apples. Pour water over all. Mix together the flour and the sugar, and cut in the butter. Sprinkle this crumbly mixture over the apples. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 50 to 55 minutes, or until apples are tender and top brown.

**Pa's Lima Beans and Sausage.**  
1 pound country sausage  
2 medium sized onions (sliced)  
1 can lima beans  
2 cups canned tomatoes  
1 teaspoon salt  
½ teaspoon chili powder

Shape sausage into flat cakes and pan fry, with the onions, until the sausage is done. Drain off all but ½ cup of the fat, add remaining ingredients and simmer for 30 minutes.

Never run the vacuum cleaner over loose tacks or other metal objects on the floor. They may puncture or cut the dust bag.

Try this fruit sauce on your favorite ice cream. Melt a cupful of jam or jelly in a double boiler. Add a fourth of a cup of orange juice. Serve the sauce warm.

After cooking carrots until tender put them through the ricer, and season and beat as one does mashed potatoes. Even those who refuse to like carrots cannot resist them thus prepared.

When preparing oranges for a dessert, pour boiling water over them and let them stand five minutes. This will make them much easier to peel.

Do not soak flannels; it hardens them. Don't boil them; it shrinks them. Wash and dry quickly. Shake before washing, shake after washing and before hanging on the line.

To remove brown marks from china put the articles in a saucepan with cold water and a lump of soda. Put the pan on the stove and let it boil for 15 minutes. Then rinse the china well and you will find that the marks have disappeared.

To prevent windows sticking two or three days after the frames are painted, each window should be opened and run up and down two or three times a day. Unless this is done, the windows are almost certain to stick.

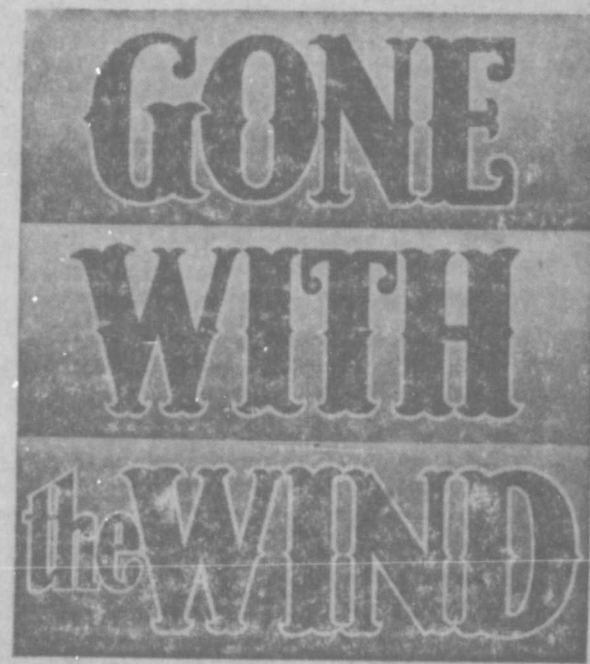
