## WHO'S NEWS THIS WEEK

**Military Force Is New Problem For Danish King**  
NEW YORK.—One bright, sunny day in July, 1920, King Christian X of Denmark, mounted on a beautiful white horse, led his troops across a boundary line to reclaim the northern part of Schleswig, lost to the Germans in 1864. Denmark had been crippled in the World War, suffering much more than Norway and Sweden, but somehow she had managed to save her little kingdom. The king, addressing a cheering throng, hailed the organization of international law and order, under which small nations could live in peace.

The king, who is six feet, six inches tall, the tallest man in his kingdom, recruited a guard of the tallest and handsomest young men he could find, but none so tall as he. They were gorgeously uniformed and the ceremony of the changing of the guard might have been read by Franz Lehár. But many times, the king reminded his people that all this was merely appropriate ceremonial, and that Denmark's safety lay in keeping in the vanguard of civilization, and not in armed forces.

Last summer, under great nervous tension, he seemed to feel that the pozers of darkness were closing in, and suffered a serious illness. Today, with the fate of Denmark resolved in far-ranging and desperate issues, the old king, nearing 70, yields to the inevitable. The New World structure of law and order has fallen and Denmark is one of many casualties.

At the age of 28, Christian married Alexandrine, princess of Mecklenburg-Schwerin. When he was crowned in May, 1912, the Danish populace was prepared to dislike him, descendant of an alien dynasty as he was, and there were some overt demonstrations against him. But he won his people with his furtherance of a liberal, constitutional government. Although he was trained as an army officer, and had a liking for military pomp, he frequently denounced militarism and opposed efforts to get his tiny country "goose-stepping and arming." While he was proud of having the tallest and most resplendent guard in Europe, he slipped away from his bodyguards at every opportunity and enjoyed tremendously bicycling around Copenhagen, unattended. Into the ruck with Denmark's gains of two decades goes what probably has been the world's most successful state-sponsored industrial and agricultural co-operation.

**EMIL HURJA**, big, Babe Ruthian political statistician and precisionist, who greatly aided the early New Deal by charting the public drift, is now an ally of the Garner forces. Familiarity with assaying in the gold fields inspired his system of getting the mill-run of public sentiment. He once told this reporter about his interesting career. Taking a start from the wilds of the Michigan peninsula, when he was 18, notes from his diary might be something like this:

Rode the rods on the way to Seattle. Found more comfort in the cattle car.

Landed in Yakima, died this and that, and finally got to Seattle. Since I had learned to set type at the age of nine, I convinced the Post-Intelligencer I was a newspaper man.

Managed to get by, but realized an education might help, so started grabbing one off the side at the University of Washington. Found Dr. Henry Suzallo, the president, was the greatest man I ever met.

Dr. Suzallo said Henry Ford wanted him to send somebody on his peace ship and it might as well be me.

Went on the peace ship; came home and rammed around the Texas oil fields and then got to Alaska. Fell in with Ben Smith, who had a real gold mine. Came back home and got into Wall Street and politics.

Began assaying political mother lodes; got so I could tell whether I would get a string of color, and found I was assistant to Mr. James Farley, chairman of the national Democratic committee. Like Mr. Garner.

EIGHTEEN years ago, Manuel Quezon, president of the Philippine commonwealth, said to a group of American business men, "I would rather live under a government run like hell by Filipinos than under a government run like heaven by Americans." Now, with the shadow of Nippon reaching out into the Pacific, he isn't so sure. Word from Washington is that while he still has 1946 may be all right for sitting off, but he is dickering for re-examination of the Philippine claim.

## British-Norse Forces Combine In Attempt to Drive Out Nazis; King Haakon Rallies His Army

**'NORDICS' VS. NORDICS: CONSPIRACY AND TREASON**  
Invasion of Norway by Nazi forces was effected by the highest type of conspiracy and treason, according to special information revealed by the Chicago Daily News. According to this source, Oslo and other important Norwegian seaports easily fell into the hands of the invaders because of a gigantic conspiracy that included bribery, extraordinary infiltration, and treason on the part of a few important Norwegian defense officials.

For eight years the Nazis have quarreled with nearly everyone, but they always stood up for the Nordic race, and for Nordic supremacy. But the Danes and Norwegians are much purer Nordics than the Nazis ever thought of being, and so are the eastern English, eastern Scotch, and eastern Irish. A strong Slavic admixture is evident in most of the Nazi leaders, and rank and file.

And so, the theoretical "Nordics" went to work on the actual Nordics, by land, and sea, and air. It was all very confusing. English planes would attack German warships in Norwegian ports, and German planes would attack English warships off the Norwegian ports. The losses in ships, and planes, and men, as reported by both thoroughly dishonest sides, were stupendous. Every Norwegian coastal town, up and down a long expanse, became a miniature "front"—at Narvik, Bergen, Trondheim, Oslo, the capital, and at several points elsewhere. The little German garrisons, in the Norwegian port towns, held on by their backteeth, pro tem.

According to latest reports from Stockholm, King Haakon of Norway was rallying his armed forces from a place of refuge in Norway's interior. A royal proclamation was issued calling upon the Norwegian people to "stand with me . . . and guard and fight for Norway's independence and freedom . . . The situation is such that I cannot tell you where myself, the crown prince, and the government are staying . . . God save Norway."

It appeared, currently, that German ship losses exceeded those of the English, and that hundreds, if not thousands, of German soldiers had been drowned as their troop-transports were sent to the bottom.

## NAMES in the news . . .

Prime Minister Mackenzie King, of Canada, left his "warlike" capital for a snug vacation in our own state of Virginia.

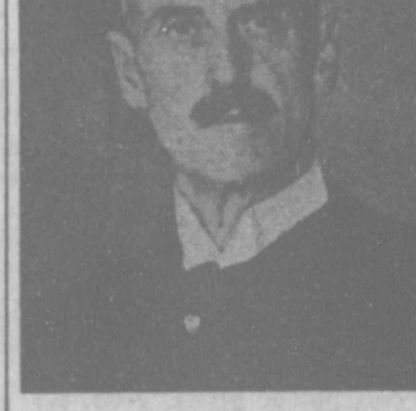
Dr. Paul Ehrlich's name stood extra-high. This human benefactor's chemical cure of syphilis apparently reduced its time-treatment from many uncertain months to a flat five days, and this was reported to be true in 85 per cent of cases tested. Dr. John L. Rice, New York city's health commissioner, seemed especially interested and called a great inter-state conference of public health specialists.

Miss, Eve Curie, so-confidant daughter of the French radium cure-alls, wondered why the Americans worry about the news of the war, and boasted about the grace of La Paree. She is half-Polish, and genuinely well liked. Also, stylists consider this brainy girl as a real something to write, sardonically, home about.

New York's Governor Lehman banned all fireworks in his state, except in experienced hands for public display. Sale, distribution, and possession were barred, to become effective August 1, 1940.

But neutral Swedish sources poured cold water on the red-hot news of spectacular German losses. Winston Churchill was subjected to considerable panning, in England and elsewhere, for his alleged "usual" mishandling of the English fleet, in the face of German tactical success. His political future did not look overly bright. People remembered his high praise of Hitler, in a famous Glasgow blurb of 1937. Home folks began to call him "Winnie the Pooh."

Unhappy Denmark, which did not resist like the Norwegians, began to be treated, by the allies, as a German province. The English seized

her Faeroe islands, and the Danish dominion of Iceland virtually declared its independence. In North America, misty Greenland is Danish, but it appeared that either the United States, or Canada, might take over that vast tract to the north. President Roosevelt talked about the Monroe Doctrine, and lesser lights defied the Germans to come and take Greenland, which they apparently had not thought of doing.

**PRESIDENT:**  
Our President, now in better shape physically, vetoed a bill to automatically deport alien spies, saboteurs, criminals, and dopes. This action aroused considerable annoyance among some native Americans, who are prone to purge the Augean stables at historically chronic intervals.

The President praised highly the Civilian Conservation corps, and wished it a long life, even though the CCC is a child of the depression. Just the same, most Americans, liberal or conservative, approve of the young Conservators, although some pacifists fear it is a first faltering step toward universal military training. Such people, and some others, allege that Roosevelt merges nationalism and socialism in a high-diluted National-Socialist form.

The President conferred with New York Governor Lehman at the Hyde Park hideaway, and did not ask Vice President Garner to a White House legislative conference. This was unusual, and appeared to be a slap at Texas Jack, who is an anti-Third Termite, and a rival of Roosevelt in avowed terms. Texas Jack, however, is singularly nonsensitive to such digs, and went his own sweet, "poker-playing" way.

**LABORITIS:**  
John L. Lewis, czar of C. I. O., took a beating on the Jersey front. There, the laborite Non-partisan League took a vote and plumped for Third Termism, even though the big chief is against it.

The Utility Workers Organizing committee in New York city demanded that Mrs. Elinore M. Herick be fired by the much-beaten National Labor Relations board. The NLRB, however, refused the urge, did not send her to St. Helena, where her opponents thought she belonged.

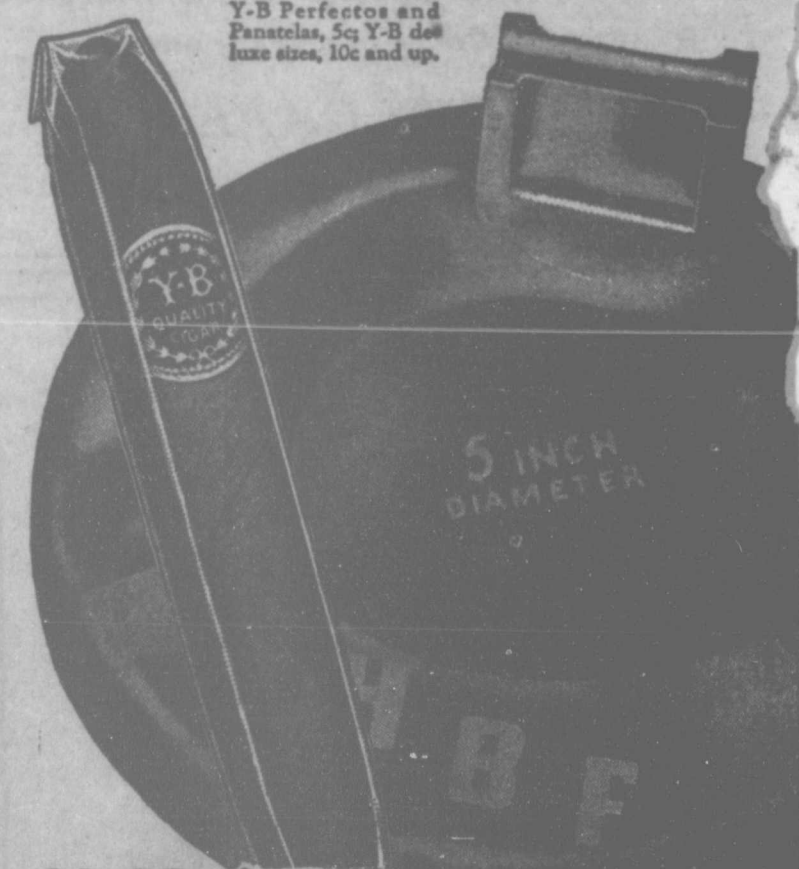

# CURTIS DOUGLASS GIVES PLATFORM



Curtis Douglass, popular Panhandle attorney and former District Judge, is a candidate for the state senate. Yesterday he announced his platform would be based on a fair deal in attempting to "better the welfare of Texas with action instead of promises."

"It is the duty of the Legislature to cooperate with the administration in power," he said. "If there is a failure on the part of the administration to chart the proper course, then the Legislature should lead the way. The mandate of the people should never be ignored. Legislators should live up to their campaign promises. A do nothing policy leads to ruin."

Douglass ran second to senator Small and was eliminated by a few hundred votes in 1936.

The candidate said, "I still believe no state lawmaker should represent corporations, interests and clients whose interests are contrary to the general welfare and still pretend to serve the people who elected him. I am a firm believer that every lawmaker should be required to file his inventory of property, under oath, when he is elected and another inventory at the end of each succeeding year, showing his people all sources of revenue obtained and from whom received. This would give the voter a check on all incomes of their public servants."

**Discusses Pensions**  
On pension matters, Douglass stated: "It is the mandate of the people that the pensions be paid, that the school teacher's retirement fund be paid, the blind be cared for and all other social security obligations be met. The voters decided all of this in no uncertain terms. I shall favor any reasonable tax bill to procure these funds as long as it does not incur hardships on any particular group or upon those we wish to aid. I do not think it proper for me to announce a cure-all law for any problem, for, after all, I would only be one of 37 senators that would have a voice in the matter."

"I do believe such a problem can be worked out satisfactorily by both the legislative and executive branches of the government to fulfill the mandate of the people, and I will certainly fight for the solution of these problems."

Douglass said he believed that all types and sizes of business should be considered on the passage of any law that there should be no discriminating laws.

He said he believed that labor should have the rights of bargaining.

He strongly favors that school monotonies be based on the number of students rather than population of districts, he said.

Douglass said he is an advocate of consolidation, equalization boards tax assessing and collecting agencies into one, thereby saving thousands of dollars in costs of administrative government and also equalizing school, county and state tax rates. He cited three examples of counties in the Panhandle that employ a gas and oil expert each year to assess taxes for the county. "Then the school employs this expert to set their taxes," Douglass said, "and when this expert has finished duplicating his first list, he has received thousands of dollars in salary for doing the same work."

### Save Economy Ahead

Douglass said he believed in practicing economy, stating: "You can't tell me that we cannot economize, and by that I don't mean to quit spending where the spending is doing good. We are living in a progressive age, and our advanced and modern views demand better schools, bet-

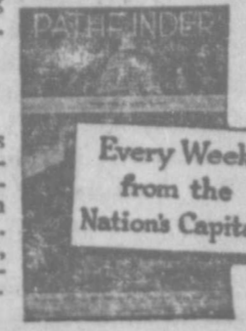

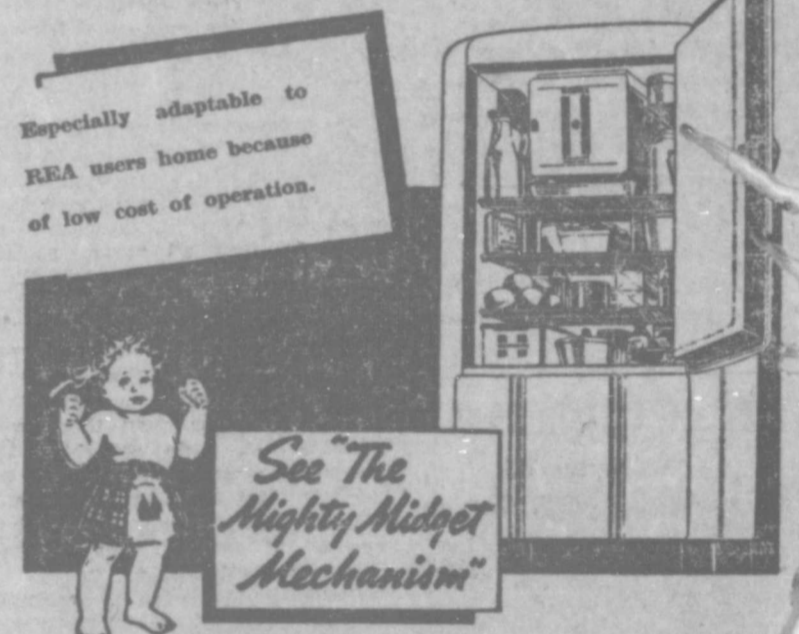

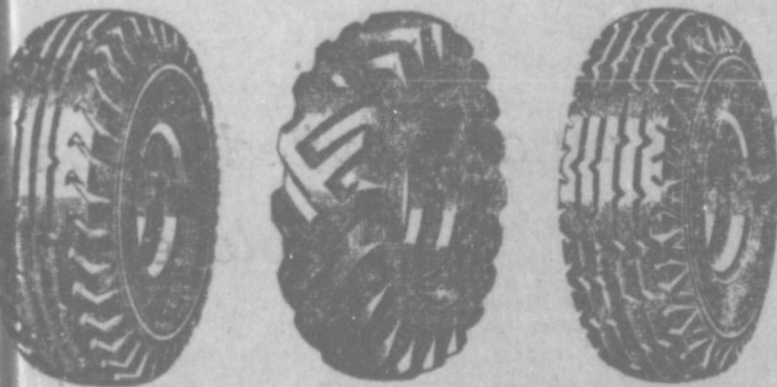

## Items of Interest to the Housewife

When washing or ironing, put a thick rug under your feet and you will find you do not tire so easily.

Before polishing furniture, first go over it with a piece of cheesecloth wrung out of hot water, then apply polish. This gives excellent results.

Geraniums like a fairly heavy soil and must be potbound to flower well. They will invariably refuse to bloom if kept in a large pot.

When spreading sandwiches, leave about a quarter-inch around the edges unspread. Then, when you put the second slice of bread in position, press it down firmly. The filling will spread to the edges, but is less likely to ooze out.

Red and white or yellow and white checked dish toweling makes very attractive and economical curtains for the kitchen. When they fade they can be used for towels and replaced with new ones.

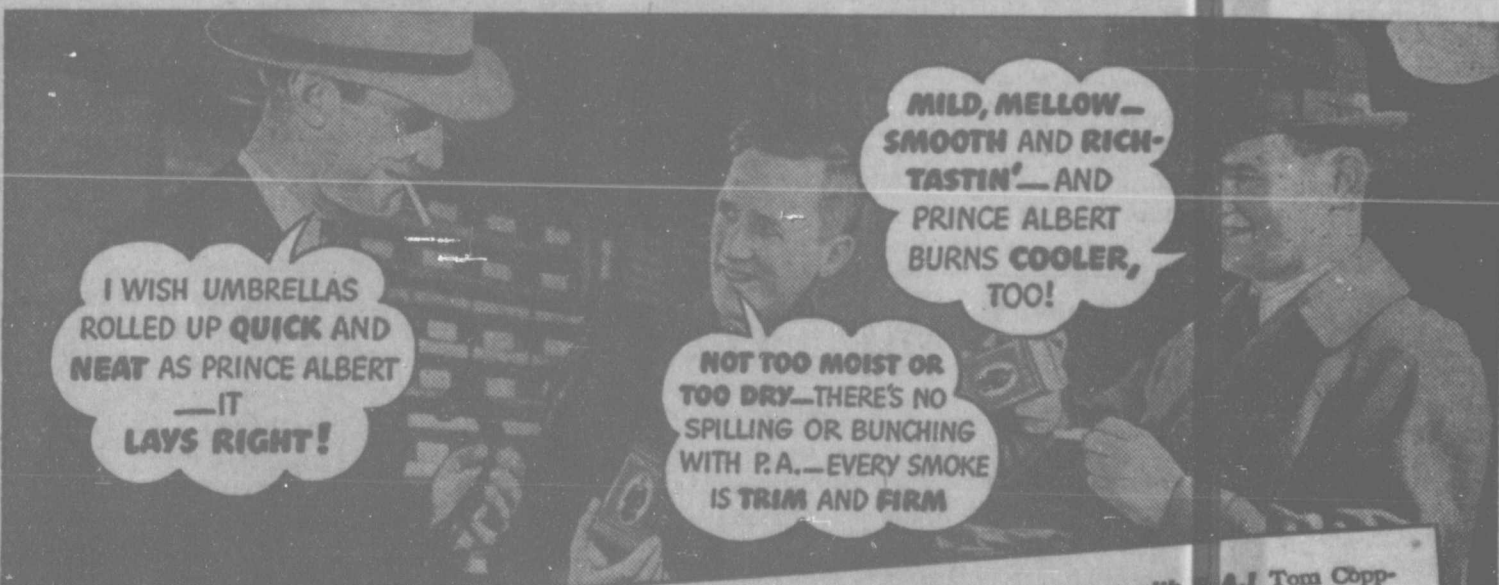
