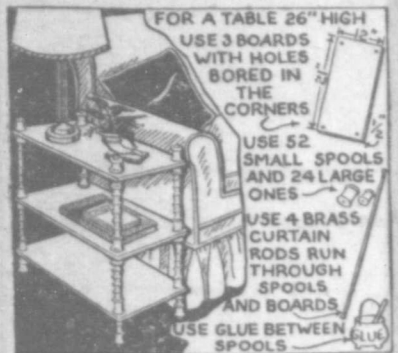

Handy End Table Made From Spools

DEAR MRS. SPEARS: I have made a pair of spool shelves like those you give directions for in your Sewing Book No. 3. They are painted watermelon pink to match the flowers in my bedroom curtains, and they are very pretty hanging at each side of the windows. I would like to make some end tables of spools for the living room, but I can't think of a way



to make them rigid. Have you any suggestions as to how this may be done? B. P.

Curtain rods are used through the spools to make the legs. Better take along a spool to try when you shop for the rods; and get the type that has one piece fitting inside the other. If the spools are a little loose on the rod, it won't make any difference for they must be glued between each spool, and also between the spools and the table shelves. I have shown in the sketch everything else you need to know to make this table. Good luck to you!

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS BY ROGER SHAW

German March Toward Paris Marked by Terrific Fighting; U. S. Maps New Defense Plans

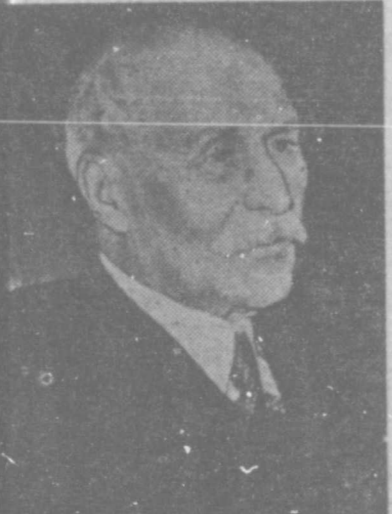
GERMAN WAR: Reich

Nothing succeeds like success. The latest Third Reich included Germany, Austria, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Norway, Denmark, Holland, Belgium, Luxembourg, Memel, and so on. Its friends and allies took in Russia, Italy, Japan, Spain, Hungary. Its sinister "list" seemed to include Switzerland, Yugoslavia, Rumania, and some said Sweden. It was more than Napoleon—Poland 18 days; Norway in 21; Holland 58. So what next? England by parachute? France by tank? There was serious talk of moving the French government out of Paris to a destination unknown. England landed up another 3,000 Germans and Austrians between the ages of 18 and 60: two-thirds of them refugees from the nasty Nazi terror at home. Some quarter-million English volunteers enrolled to sharpshooters, and Premier Winston Churchill nervously promised his new constituents blood, and sweat, and toil, and tears—always a clever psychological trick in dealing with dogged Englishmen.

German authorities indicated that the government of any of their "protectorates" depended on how much assistance the "protected" had put up. Thereby, Denmark was getting a "A" treatment, Norway perhaps a "B," and Poland a very low grade indeed. Holland was expected to get a rating similar to that of the Norse, though perhaps a trifle lower. For the Dutch had fought rather hard.

Belgian Bungie

Brussels, Namur, Liege, and Louvain fell as the Germans pushed ahead in Belgium. (The three big Belgian fortification sites were Namur, Liege, and Antwerp.) The Belgians, on the whole, fought better than the Dutch, but as the Belgian capital surrendered to Hitler, the German invaders were within 75

miles of that not so gay Páree. The Belgian government decamped to a safer spot, Ostend on the channel.

In at least four places, the Germans had pierced the French Maginot line extension, back of the Belgian border. Dr. Robert Ley, the not very Nordic Nazi minister of labor, announced that the German army was performing a "God-given, natural mission." The Field Grays, he added, intended to make the world "happy and reasonable." But the French refused to be happy, and the English were certainly not being reasonable. In desperation, the English Churchill government began to woo Russia with a "new and more friendly approach"—Russia, the recent "red beast" that victimized brave little Finland. Meanwhile, the United States and the 20 Latin American states went on record with an official denunciation of Germany's invasion of Holland and Belgium. Harsh observers branded the joint resolve as a Uruguayan publicity stunt. And in France, a cabinet reshuffle found the hero of Verdun in the last World War, Henri Philippe Petain, named as vice premier to Premier Paul Reynaud.

Bull on Spot

John Bull, said critics, was on the spot. The state department warned 1,000 Americans to get out of Britain, and stay out, and ordered them to go to the peaceful, prosperous Irish Free State. It was indicated that a Yankee rescue ship would fish the U. S. refugees out of the emerald Eire. But many Americans refused to leave J. Bull.

Sweden Overmated

Sweden was nervous as bullying German troops, in Norway, were reported mated on the Swedish border—whence comes more than a fair of the German iron supply. But that was not all. The entire Swedish match industry, turning out 90,000,000 matches per year, was closing down because it could not export. "Sweden is or-has no match Hitler," exploded a wit. But Swedish iron continued to pour from Lappland.

POTOMAC POWER: FDR Wants Money

The President told congress, dramatically, in joint session, that he wanted a billion bucks and 50,000 warplanes to defend our country against 3,000-mile blitzkriegs. Two-thirds of the billion were to go to the U. S. army. Roosevelt hinted that it might be nice to raise the legal national debt limit—which is \$45,000,000,000. He asked that he be given \$100,000,000 in cash, to provide for "emergencies." But an answer, in part, came from presidential possibility Willie, in an Indianapolis speech. Willie said that adequate national defense depended on domestic recovery. Meanwhile, the continentalists rallied against the anglophiles and internationalists, in and out of congress. Senators Johnson, Norris and Wheeler—all of them, naturally, pro-ally—were

especially active against any "1917" wives. But old Pershing, a big man in 1917, spoke of the "possibility of war," while War Secretary Woodring spoke of our maintaining peace. It was all very confusing. There was even talk of lending some money to the no-pay French and English, but it was only talk.

Good Old Garner

There was a tale to the effect that Vice President Garner now admitted Roosevelt's nomination for the Third Term. He said, supposedly, that Roosevelt had absolute control of the Chicago convention, and that was that. But, Texas Jack continued (so they say) that he himself would not run again, because he was opposed to Third Terms for vice presidents, as well as for Presidents. Thereby, he established his consistency, and may have opened the door to a swarm of ambitiously would-be V. P.'s. Roosevelt had at least 431 convention delegates pledged or committed, and was expected soon to possess more than the necessary 548 majority.

U. S. CIVIL WAR: Down in Looseana

Down in Creole Looseana, there was an American civil war going on. It was being fought out between hard-working units of Uncle Sam's tried and true regular army. Some 30,000 blues were defending the state against 25,000 red invaders from Texas. Somehow (an unusual feature of this La-Tex struggle) the defenders were reported as employing blitzkrieg tactics, and seemed to be forging ahead. There even was a fifth column, to make things perfect. This fifth column (so-called) consisted of local bovines, who licked the insulation of army telephone lines, and thereby committed military sabotage in the first, second and third degrees. In Russia, they'd have fixed 'em! But these fifth-column cows of Dixie gained reprieve. As to the battleground itself, Looseana—its new governor, Sam Houston Jones, told 100,000 people at a barbecue that no more Huey Longs would run the state.

ON THE MOVE:

25,000 residents in the Dutch East Indies, definitely were off the move. These were suspects, both German and Dutch, rounded up by the watchful colonial authorities, only too conscious of fifth-column and Trojan Horse tactics. Simultaneously, in New York, great dissension arose when a popular native declared: "The fifth column in this country is headed by that fellow in the White House." At this, the pro-Roosevelts decidedly got a move on.

At Odessa, by the Black sea, Russia has a parachuting doctor, who balls out in a big hurry, to get to urgent cases. He delivered two babies from the air. It was suggested that, next December, German parachute men might be disguised as Santa Clauses. New York hosiery counters reported a hectic rush for nylon, at \$1.35. And, alas, the feminine rush was followed by nylon runs. Or so they said. Macy reported 20 fast-moving women at the nylon counter in the first minute, but there was little or no intra-female carnage.

Russ-German-Italian Coalition Arises to Plague Democracies; Welles Given 'Peace' Proposal

The Wars in Brief
Western Front. Severe localized fighting. Item: French artillery destroyed Nazi propaganda signs across no-man's land.
Northern Front. Finn troops evacuated land ceded to Russia (see below).
In the Air. Nazi planes bombed Scapa Flow, hitting one ship and inflicting first British civilian casualties. In a counterblow, R. A. F. planes bombed Nazi patrol boats off Heligoland light.
In Asia. Russian and Jap troops clashed on Sakhalin, jointly owned island. Both nations were reported reinforcing their Outer Mongolian-Manchukuoan frontiers.

the world waited expectantly, high Nazis in Berlin nodded knowingly and dropped strong hints that Italy was about to reaffirm emphatically her allegiance to the Rome-Berlin axis. Observers expected some announcement of German-Italian-Russian collaboration in the Balkans and elsewhere.

For Mr. Welles
 Better informed on this skullduggery than any allied or neutral chancellor was Sumner Welles, U. S. undersecretary of state whom President Roosevelt sent to Europe in search of a meeting ground for peace. Far from gullible, Mr. Welles was nevertheless being played by the dictators for all he was worth. Observers recalled that he had no sooner ended his first visits to Rome and Berlin than Nazi Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop scurried down to Italy, scurried back to Berlin, then scurried to Brennero with Adolf Hitler just as Mr. Welles was ending his visits in Paris and London. This indicated that the dictators were hastening to patch up a peace plan which Mr. Welles could file in his brief case. Since the allies had refused to talk peace, a gesture from the dictators might woo the U. S.
 But if Mr. Welles got any such plan after Brennero, observers were pretty sure it featured a definitely victorious peace for the dictators. Probable alternative: A Moscow-Rome-Berlin triangle.

INTERNATIONAL: Holy Week

Europe was filled with shenanigans on St. Patrick's day. As Holy Week got underway the dictators sheathed their swords and tried to look righteous. The imaginary axis running from Berlin southward through the Brenner pass to Rome became a well-trodden highway as

bigwigs of Nazism and Fascism hastened hither and yon. There was mystery in the air, and it made the allies shiver.

The last Finnish bullet had hardly thudded into a Russian breast when Moscow, Berlin and Rome began concentrating their diplomacy in the Balkans, lately an allied stronghold. To Germany fell the task of mediating between two friends who are themselves enemies, for both Italy and Russia have interests in the Balkans. Probable outcome would be a three-cornered deal with Hungary and Rumania in the middle. Both Russia and Hungary would agree to conclude non-aggression pacts with Rumania, then the Soviet would come to terms with Italy. Their peace (if not their independence) guaranteed, the Balkans would thus keep producing oil and foodstuffs for Germany. The allies would be frozen out.

Iron Guardists

At Bucharest, Rumania's King Carol suddenly received a pledge of loyalty from 250 leaders of the suppressed Nazi Iron Guard, many of whose members had either been imprisoned or had fled to Germany. Only possible explanation for such an about-face was that Carol had begun co-operating with the Reich.

At Brennero

Without warning Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini sped to a rendezvous at Brennero, a tiny town on the Italo-German frontier. While

United States Housing authority now has a loan power of \$600,000,000, of which \$265,536 has been advanced for USHA's major activities, slum clearance and urban low rent housing projects. six states. (Location of projects shown on map). The plan: Owner-operators, tenants, sharecroppers and farm hands will be eligible, leasing new homes through a county housing authority. (The Wagner-Steagall act would let them buy the homes, paying like rent.) Average cost: \$1,682, including wiring, kitchen sink, outside sealed well and sanitary privy. Average size: Living room, dining space, kitchen and from three to five bedrooms.

BUSINESS: Tax Time Indices

In mid-March John Q. Public could procrastinate no longer. To meet the first quarter U. S. income tax deadline he filed some 8,000,000 individual and corporation returns, mostly at the last minute. Though treasury officials could only guess, they figured March collections from this source would be \$605,000,000 compared with \$605,000,000 last year. Watched even closer, however, were results from three changes in the law:

- (1) State and local government employees are paying this year for the first time. Early estimates placed this "take" at \$16,000,000 from 2,600,000 persons; the treasury expects much more.
 - (2) For the first time since 1936 corporations are free of the controversial undistributed profits tax, but—
 - (3) Large corporations, formerly assessed 16 1/2 to 19 per cent, depending on amount of profits distributed to stockholders, are paying a flat 18 per cent this year.
- Though bigger income taxes looked like business was improving, Cleveland's Col. Leonard P. Ayres picked this time to wonder if the opposite weren't true. Said he, in his monthly business review: There are two reasons for thinking another depression may be on the way. First: We have never had a decline like the present, following peak production, that did not continue downward to depression. Second: "Perhaps the soundest reason for arguing that this decline will go a good deal further is the fact that it has already gone so far

HOUSEHOLD QUESTIONS

Keep brass articles from tarnishing by covering them with a thin coat of clear varnish. The varnish will form a lacquer which will not wear off unless the brass is handled frequently.
 Serve waffles as soon as they are baked. If they are allowed to stand they are apt to become tough. Never stack them, since stacking makes them soggy.
 To clean gas stove burners boil them in a strong solution of washing soda and water for about half an hour. This will remove all the grease. Rinse thoroughly, dry and put back into the stove.

Hotbeds are coldframes with heat added. This may be from animal manure, hot water or electricity. The difference between the two is the presence of the heating unit.

The juice in apple and berry pies runs over because the oven is too hot. Turn down the gas and let the pies cook slowly after the crust has begun to brown.

Before washing a dark dress, baste around the edges of the stains with white cotton. In this way one is sure of removing all the soiled parts which otherwise are difficult to detect when the garment is wet.

Household News

WHEN YOU'RE PLANNING A MENU ESPECIALLY FOR MEN

(See Recipes Below)

Just between us women, we'll have to admit that, if left to his own devices, many a man would enjoy living on a straight diet of meat, potatoes and pie. It requires a little judicious scheming on Mother's part to supply Father with his favorite foods and provide for him a wholesome, well-balanced meal in the bargain.

Whether she's planning a menu to please the men folk in her family, or is chairman of the refreshment committee for the May meeting of the business men's club, it's a wise woman who remembers—and caters to—these masculine foibles in food.

Just how do a man's food preferences differ from those of women? Well, for one thing; a man wants plainer, more substantial food. He likes a meal to be composed of only a few dishes, but he wants those few to be tasty, full of flavor and cooked to a turn.

And he likes to know just what he's eating—he wants none of the "masked identity dishes" that defy him to find what they're composed of. In a word, fancy cooking is wasted on the average man, but he appreciates good cooking to the limit.

Remember that for most men, meat makes the meal; that hot breads are a masculine weakness that they themselves acknowledge; and that for dessert men have a special fondness for pie, or chocolate cake.

You'll find more suggestions for planning masculine menus in my booklet, "Feeding Father." There are tested recipes, too, for over 125 of father's favorite foods.

Hot Muffins.

2 cups general purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons sugar
1 egg
1 cup milk or water
2 tablespoons shortening, melted

Mix and sift dry ingredients, add unbeaten egg, milk or water and melted shortening. Mix quickly. Pour into well-greased muffin tins, and bake in hot oven (450 degrees) 20 minutes.

Deep South Ham Sandwich With Hot Mushroom Sauce.

6 pieces corn bread, about 3 inches square
6 slices ham, boiled or baked
Mushroom Sauce:
1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup
½ cup milk

Stir the ½ cup of milk into the condensed cream of mushroom soup. Heat, but do not boil. While the sauce is heating, split the pieces of corn bread and toast them. Then place the ham between the toasted slices of corn bread and pour the hot mushroom sauce over the top.

Note: This is an excellent way to utilize left-over corn bread. If hot corn bread is used, we suggest the pieces be split and buttered, but not toasted.

My Best Chocolate Cake.

2 ounces bitter chocolate
¼ cup butter
1½ cups sugar
3 eggs
2½ cups cake flour
¼ teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Melt chocolate carefully over warm water. Cream butter thoroughly and add sugar slowly. Separate eggs, beat egg yolks, add to butter and sugar mixture. Add the melted chocolate. Mix and sift together the flour, salt, and baking powder and add alternately with the milk and vanilla extract. Beat egg

whites until stiff and fold into the cake mixture. Layer in 2 well-greased, 8-inch layer cake pans. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for approximately 30 to 35 minutes.

Corn Bread.

(Serves 6-8)
1½ cups yellow (or white) corn meal (uncooked)
½ cup general purpose flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup milk
2 eggs (beaten)
2 tablespoons fat (melted)

Sift the corn meal with the flour, baking powder and salt. Combine the milk, eggs, and shortening and add to the dry ingredients. Bake in a well-greased 8-inch square baking pan, in a moderately hot oven (400 degrees) for 40 to 50 minutes.

Garden Salad Bowl.

1 head lettuce
1 cucumber, peeled and sliced
1 green pepper, cut in thin rings
3 fresh tomatoes, cut in wedge-shaped pieces
1 bunch radishes, sliced
 Roquefort cheese dressing

Prepare and chill vegetables thoroughly. Line salad bowl with large crisp leaves of lettuce and shred remaining lettuce rather coarsely. Place all vegetables in salad bowl and toss together with a well-seasoned dressing. Serve at once.

Welsh Rarebit.

1 pound sharp American cheese
2 tablespoons butter
1 cup cream
2 eggs
2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
½ teaspoon paprika
Salt and pepper to taste
½ teaspoon dry mustard

Cut cheese in small pieces and place it together with the butter in the top of a double boiler. Melt slowly. Then add cream, eggs (well beaten) and seasonings. Cook, stirring constantly, until mixture has thickened. Serve on hot buttered toast.

Noodle and Tuna Fish Casserole.

(Serves 8)
1 8-ounce package noodles
1 tablespoon salt
1½ quarts boiling water
1 7-ounce can tuna fish (drained and flaked)
1 1-pound can cream of mushroom soup (not condensed)
2 tablespoons catsup
1 tablespoon prepared mustard
½ cup American cheese (grated)

Cook noodles in boiling water to which salt has been added, until tender. Drain and rinse thoroughly. Place one-half of the noodles in buttered casserole, add tuna fish and top with remaining noodles. Combine mushroom soup, catsup and mustard and heat to boiling point. Then pour sauce over noodles in casserole and top with grated cheese. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for approximately 35 minutes. Garnish with wedges of hard-cooked egg.

AROUND the HOUSE

Items of Interest to the Housewife

Fasten a large paper sack over the end of the food grinder when grinding bread or crackers. The sack will catch all of the crumbs.

Black shoe polish stains may be removed by rubbing them with warm water and soap. Rub brown stains with alcohol.

Always wash rice before cooking. Put the rice in a strainer and wash it in cold water, placing the strainer over a bowl of water. Change the water and repeat three times or until the water is clear.

Flour sifters and kitchen strainers should be dried thoroughly before storing.

A pinch of cinnamon or sugar burned in a tin can will remove objectionable food odors in the house.

Always melt marshmallows in the top of a double boiler over hot water.

Use adhesive tape to mend worn window shades. Use it, too, to patch together broken pieces of bric-a-brac.
