





British morale, strangely enough, was reported as excellent, but French morale did not appear in quite so favorable a light. The German general headquarters was strangely restrained in its moment of triumph. Even as these railbirds wondered, Hitler's warbirds came out of the skies and rained showers of bombs upon southern France and later upon Paris itself. The allies promised to repay Germany bomb for bomb in the new air offensive they were launching.

White Housings President Roosevelt made another

request for money. This time it was for more than a billion, for the army, navy and civilian training program, coupled with a fear that all continents may become involved in the II German war (he did not mention Germany by name). Roosevelt asked for specific authority to call up the national guard and army reservists-if and when needed to "safeguard" and "defend." And Roosevelt asked for a corps of dollar-a-year men, to expedite national defense preparations. Also, there came a request for a million dollars, to expand the navy department and munitions buildings in the capital. Talkative young Elliott Roosevelt assailed so-called fifth columns in Mexico. Elliott is a ra-

\$65,000,000:

The \$65,000.000 battleship, Washington, was launched at the Philadelphia navy yard. It is a 35,000tonner-1,600 tons bigger than any American battleship now in operation. The Washington is our first new capital ship in 19 years. It is 750 feet long. Fifteen-year-old Vir-ginia Marshall of Spokane, great-great-great-granddaughter of Chief Justice John Marshall, was the Washingtonian christener. The boat was named after her home state.






Glitter of Gadgets Often Districts Builder From Quality Where It's Needed Most

Are you building a house for the first time? Then chances are you in kind of a daze. There are so m things to decide, so many thing buy, so many more things you v and can't buy because there is just much money. Now there's not less glamorous than the concrete f ings and foundation. One doesn't s them off to one's friends. but if skimp on either, you'll be busy on years to come trying to cover cracked walls that all your friess will see.

Don't Skimp on Framework Lil:ewise the timber skeleton frame of your house is going to all covered up, but if you skimp it you'll have sagging floors squeak at every step.

And how about those great g

openings. You can buy windows and window frames to fill these holes pretty cheap. And you'll pay for them for years to come in heat lost, drafty floors and wet walls. Or, you can buy carefully designed, precision built and factory fitted windows and window frames complete with weatherstrip that will be a joy and a comfort every year that you live in your house. Yes. and you'll find that the extra cost was money well spent because of heat bills, repair bills and redecorating bills saved.

Can't Replace Windows

Good windows are a permanent part of your walls. They protect your investment in insulation and quality construction. Any home without weathertight windows is only one-half insulated. So when you build, get down to fundamentals. Always re-member-you can add the gadgets any time, but you can't replace footings or timbers or windows. They've got to be good right from the start.

These linemen are banging a pot on a 50-foot Black Diamond. They are using a gu! on the bot wires for pro-tection against high voltage juice.

A "pot" is a transformer, fixed high up on a creosote pole. It reduces voltage to 110 or 220 volts so that electric current can be safely used in your home. A "gut" is the rubber line hose placed around the wires to prevent shock.

Until a worker is experienced enough to perch atop the pole without fear and without holding on with one hand, he is known as a "clumb-some." The man working on the ground, sending up tools and handling paraphernalia is called a "Grunt." "Coon that pole" is the signal to climb a pole when not equipped with climbing hooks or spurs. "Suck on it" means to take up the slack in a new wire being strung. A "johnnie ball" is an insulator. A "niggerhead" is a porcelain fuse cutout around which wires are tied on cross-arms for insulation purposes. "The Bear" is che sobriquet sometimes given "the boss."







Slice thin, place on greased baking sheet and bake in moderately hot oven (375 degrees) for 12 to 15 minutes.






