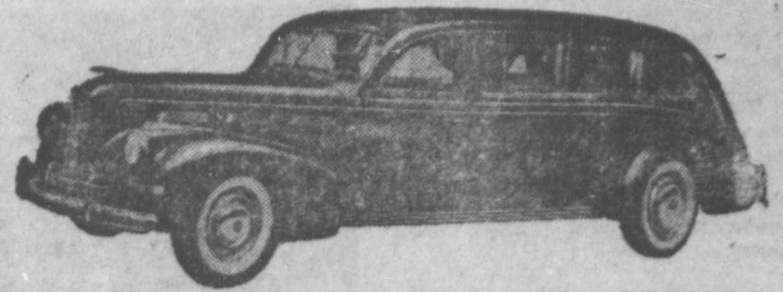

When preparing gelatin desserts, left-over fruit juice is used instead of water, the desserts will be much richer.

Bake apples with only a small amount of sugar so that the characteristic flavor is not disturbed.

A teaspoon of honey dropped into the heart of a cored apple when preparing apples for baking gives them a delicious flavor.

To remove a slight iron scorch mark from white clothes rub the scorched area lightly with peroxide. Then rinse it thoroughly in cold water. Peroxide removes the color from colored clothes, however.

Punches and fruit beverages improve upon standing. Place them in covered jars and store them in the refrigerator for at least 24 hours. A tart beverage is also more refreshing than a thick syrup one.

The flavor of apple pie is greatly improved by sprinkling a little lemon juice over the layers of sliced apples as they are placed in the pan.

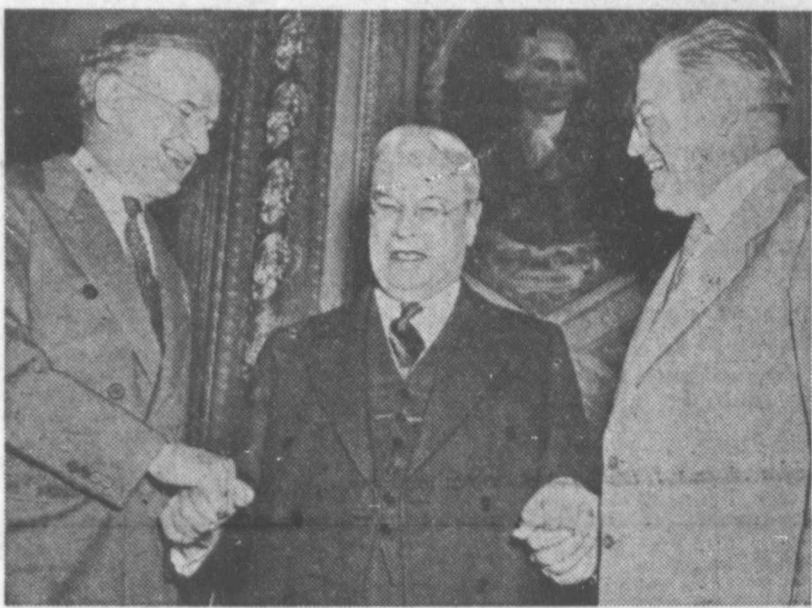

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS By Roger Shaw

Great Britain Gets 50 U. S. Destroyers In Exchange for Naval and Air Bases; U. S. Senator Lundeen of Minnesota Among 25 Killed in Airliner Crash.

U. S. DEFENSE: Boats for Bases

President Roosevelt notified congress that the United States had reached an agreement with Great Britain whereby this country would obtain leases on naval and air bases in British possessions in this hemisphere in exchange for the transfer of 50 over-age U. S. destroyers to England.

Expected to arouse a storm of debate, the act requires no ratification by congress, but was submitted to that body to advise the nation of the arrangements made.

The destroyers were built by the United States during the World war and had been out of service for some time until they were recently recommissioned.

Ninety-nine year leases on territory in Newfoundland, on the island of Bermuda, the Bahamas, Jamaica, St. Lucia, Trinidad, and Antigua in the Atlantic and in British Guiana in South America are granted by the agreement.

AVIATION: Worst Tragedy

In the worst commercial aviation tragedy in the country's history, and the first in more than 18 months, 25 persons lost their lives when a Pennsylvania-Central airliner crashed near Lovettsville, Va., during a violent thunderstorm.

All of the persons aboard the ship perished. Among the 21 passengers was Sen. Ernest Lundeen, Farmer-Laborite, of Minnesota.

ARKANSAS: Travelers

Aided by four trusty guards, two of them convicted murderers, 32 prisoners escaped from Cummins State prison farm near Pine Bluff, Ark., in a wild mass break.

NAMES ... in the news

- Mike Hogg of Texas organized a no-third-term Democratic party in his native empire down Mexico way.
Capt. George Price of the U. S. army air corps was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for a test flight at Buffalo, where he made a successful "crash" landing based on rare judgment and skill.
Dr. E. A. Maw, the premier of British-ruled Burma, between China and India, was jailed for a year. He was anti-British, and they called him "the dictator of the freedom bloc."
Norman Thomas, the socialist candidate for Yankee President, 1940 edition, started a 15,000-mile campaign trip through 28 states.

Ever since the last war, Hungary and Rumania have been quarrelling about the disputed province of Transylvania. It was Hungarian for 1,000 years—till 1919—and has been Rumanian since.

DICTATOR: Non-Dictatorial

Dictator Winston Churchill of England was in a big air raid on the coast of Kent. It was at a place called Ramsgate. The dictator entered an underground air-raid shelter, puffing on one of his favorite cigars—which he chews like Barney Oldfield.

Namesake

In London, Umbrella Chamberlain—Churchill's great rival—has a namesake, called plain George Chamberlain. He is 23. He is a soldier.

NEW YORK.—Producing "Gone With the Wind" turned David O. Selznick's hair gray. He worked 51 hours without sleep and stoked up on benzadine every now and then, in order to hang on to the finish.

Although he weighs 200 pounds, Mr. Selznick was always light on his feet. He is a second generation producer, but he started from scratch, after his father, L. J. Selznick, a Russian immigrant, had made and lost millions in the film business.

He saw possibilities in Luis Angel Firpo for a profitable quickie. He pencilled out a plot, borrowed \$2,000 from a friend, paid Firpo \$1,000, took a few shorts of the Wild Bull of the Pampas and within three days took a profit of \$875 on his film.

At the right you see how that space became an efficient linen closet after all—complete even



to a smart laundry bag for soiled napkins and table covers. The high compartment has a door of plywood. Below this are shelves with a curtain on a shade roller. The curtain runs up and down between the shelves and the scalloped board that frames the closet, as shown at the left. This board is 1/2 inch thick and four inches wide. The scallops were marked by drawing around a teacup and were cut out with a jig saw. I want to tell you how the laundry bag is made too. Watch for it, next week.

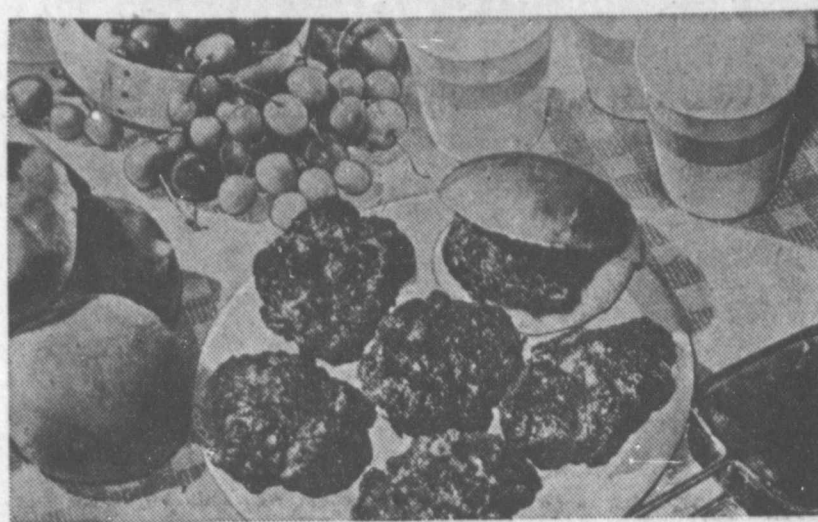

WHEN YOU PLAN A PICNIC FOR A CROWD

(Recipes Below.)

Community picnics are fun! They offer an opportunity for a carefree day under the open sky—carefree for even the chairman in charge of affairs, if she's planned her program well and chosen her helpers wisely.

If the crowd to be served is a really large one, it's a good idea to have one committee member responsible for each main dish such as meat, potatoes, salad, dessert, and beverage, and one responsible for extras such as buns, butter, relishes, etc. There'll be a serving committee and a clean-up committee, as well.

Picnics for four or five families are usually co-operative affairs. Each family may supply its own lunch, but more often each one provides one item in large enough quantities to serve the crowd. One family might provide the salad, one the meat, and still another family the dessert, which might be watermelon, a luscious chocolate cake, or a freezer full of old fashioned ice cream. With a little planning, the cost can be fairly equally distributed.

When an outing is in the offing and it's up to you to plan the menu for a crowd, you'll find these picnic pointers helpful.

1. If lunch is being prepared at home, choose foods that permit beforehand preparation, and that are not too difficult to carry or to serve.
2. Provide a fairly simple meal, with plenty of everything but not so much variety that it will cause confusion and lots of extra work.
3. Unless you are sure of a good water supply, it's better to carry the water from home.

4. Carry fruit juices, tomato juice or milk in thermos bottles.
5. The main dish for the picnic—which might be chili, baked beans, or escalloped potatoes, can be cooked the day before, then in the morning brought to the boiling point, and the dutch oven or casserole wrapped in several thicknesses of newspaper to retain the heat.

6. Don't overlook the possibilities in frozen foods for picnic use. Quick-frozen meats can be carried, without ice, even on a warm day. They thaw out on the way to the picnic ground and will be ready to use.

You'll find other picnic pointers in my cook book, "Easy Entertaining." There are menus and tested recipes for beach parties, hikes and a "Colorado beefsteak fry."

When you write to me, won't you tell me something about the "community meals" your group has served? Do you serve dinners for the church, for business men's organizations or for the farm bureau, perhaps? How many people do you serve at meals like this, and what are your favorite menus? I'll be waiting to hear from you!

Grandmother's Ginger Cookies.

- (Makes about 6 dozen)
- 1 1/4 cups shortening
 - 2 1/2 cups sugar
 - 3 eggs (separated)
 - 1 1/4 cups molasses
 - 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1 teaspoon ginger
 - 1 teaspoon nutmeg
 - 1 teaspoon cloves
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 3 teaspoons soda
 - 1/2 cup cold water
 - 9 cups flour

Cream shortening and add sugar gradually, creaming until smooth. Beat egg yolks until light, and add to the creamed mixture, with the molasses, and spices, and salt. Dissolve soda in cold water, and add to the first mixture; blend well. Beat egg whites until stiff, and fold into batter. Add flour, and mix until smooth. Roll out to 1/4-inch thickness on a lightly floured board. Cut

with 3/4-inch cookie cutter, and press a raisin into the center of each. Sprinkle with sugar. Bake on a greased cookie sheet in a moderately hot oven (400 degrees) for about 10 minutes.

Barbecue Sandwiches.

- (Filling for 3 1/2 to 4 dozen buns)
- 2 pounds beef
 - 2 pounds pork
 - 1 tablespoon chili powder
 - 1 teaspoon white pepper
 - 1/4 teaspoon red pepper
 - 1 teaspoon dry mustard
 - 1 1/2 tablespoons salt
 - 1/2 cup flour
 - 1 1/2 cups tomato puree or condensed tomato soup
 - 1 1/2 quarts meat stock
 - 3 large onions (sliced)

Cook the meat until tender in enough water to cover. Drain, and grind coarsely. Combine seasonings and flour. Add tomato puree and the meat stock, and cook for 5 minutes. Brown the onions lightly in butter or bacon fat, and add to the sauce with the coarsely ground meat. Serve hot on large, round buns.

Chocolate Fudge Cake.

- (Serves 25)
- 1 cup shortening
 - 3 cups light brown sugar
 - 3 eggs (slightly beaten)
 - 3/4 cups cake flour
 - 2 teaspoons baking powder
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1 1/4 teaspoons soda
 - 3/4 cup sour milk
 - 1/2 cup cocoa
 - 1 cup boiling water
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla

Cream shortening and add sugar gradually, blending well after each addition. Add slightly beaten eggs and mix well. Sift together the flour, baking powder, salt, and soda. Add to the creamed mixture alternately with the milk. Blend cocoa and boiling water. Add to the cake batter with the vanilla, and mix just until the batter is smooth. Pour into 3 8-inch square pans, which have been greased and lined with wax paper. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for about 30 minutes.

Meat Loaf.

- (Serves 25)
- 4 1/2 pounds beef (ground)
 - 1 1/2 pounds pork (ground)
 - 3/4 cup quick cooking tapioca
 - 3 eggs (beaten)
 - 1/2 cup onion (minced)
 - 2 tablespoons salt
 - 3/4 teaspoon pepper
 - 3/4 teaspoon sage or poultry seasoning

1 No. 2 1/2 can tomatoes
Combine ingredients in the order given, reserving about half of the tomatoes. Pack into 2 long, narrow loaf pans and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for about 1 1/2 hours. At the end of the first 45 minutes, pour the tomatoes which were reserved for this over the top of the meat loaf, and continue baking.

Tomato French Dressing.

- (Makes 1 quart)
- 1 can condensed tomato soup
 - 3/4 cup vinegar
 - 1 1/2 cups oil
 - 1/4 cup sugar
 - 3 tablespoons lemon juice
 - 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
 - 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
 - 2 teaspoons dry mustard
 - 1 teaspoon paprika

Place all of the ingredients in a mixing bowl and beat until blended. Store in refrigerator in a quart jar. (Released by Western Newspaper Union.)

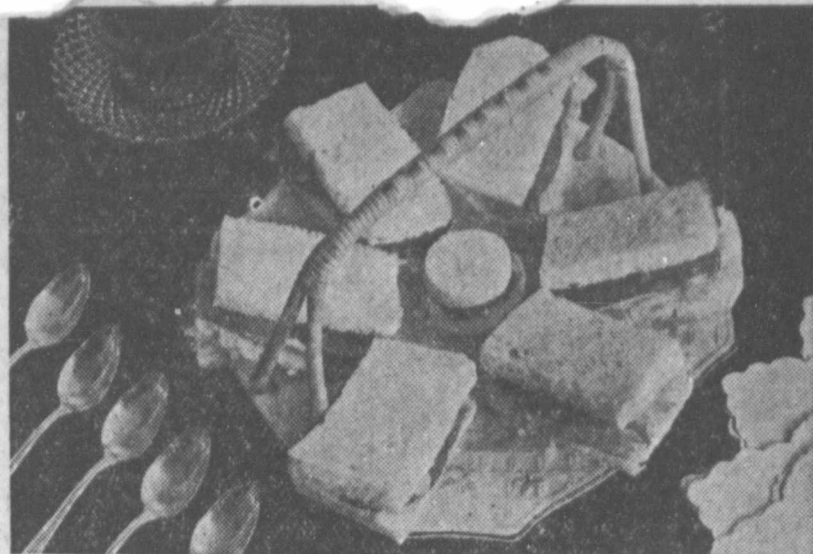

Is the tea party the thing of the past? I sincerely hope not because there is nothing quite so comfy and relaxing as a good cup of tea. And you can make it even more delightful by sharing it with a few of your friends.

The tea hour may be the time to become utterly feminine, with lazy discussions on the fashions of the day, the latest movie, and even tales of cute sayings of Johnnie and Mary Jane. Or it may be enlarged with masculinity, with the trend of the conversation leaning more toward current events, politics, books and even the arts.

A tea party is one of the simplest methods of entertaining, because even though your resources may be limited, you can ask a few friends to drop in for tea.

I have a friend who quite often gives tea on Sunday afternoons. They are highly successful, not because of her lovely silverware or china, (because here I must confess that most of her china does not even match); they are successful rather, because her friends gather for the pleasure of chatting with one another. Conversation flies fast and furiously—but the group is held together by one common bond, the tea cup.

The most meager necessities would include a tea tray, on which the tea set and napkins are placed, a table from which to serve the tea, glistening china, and well-polished silver.

If the party is small you may, as hostess, pour the tea, asking the guests to help themselves to cream or lemon and sugar. If it is a larger party and it is necessary for you to constantly greet your guests as they arrive, ask one of your friends to preside at the tea table for you.

The tea that is served must be good. It not only must be fresh, but must be hot to be palatable and soothing. If the weather is warm you may like to serve both hot and iced tea. Serve the iced tea in tall glasses which have been chilled prior to serving. Sliced lemon and powdered sugar are necessary accessories for iced tea. Place the ice cubes in an attractive ice bucket with the ice tongs near by. As an added bit of color and flavor, garnish the completed beverage with sprigs of fresh, cool mint.

Dainty sandwiches, hot buttered toast, thin slivers of cinnamon toast and small English muffins are appropriate to serve with tea. Popular accompaniments to tea are sandwiches made from nut bread, sliced very thin, and buttered.

You may like to use some of the suggested accompaniments for your next tea party, to give you that much sought-after distinction as a discriminating hostess.

Hot Tea. Rinse teapot with boiling water. Allow 1 teaspoon of tea for each cup and "one for the pot." Place tea in teapot, and pour freshly boiling water over tea leaves. Cover and allow tea to steep 3 to 5 minutes, as desired. Remove ball or bag containing the leaves, and serve at once.

Chicken Sandwiches With Cranberry Sauce.

Right here and now we put in our plea for revolt against chicken sandwiches that are bone dry! Have you tried putting a thin slice of canned cranberry sauce in with the chicken? We eat cranberry sauce with chicken when it's served on a plate. Why not in a sandwich? Try a slice of canned cranberry sauce in your chicken sandwiches the very next time you make them and see if you don't agree there's a vast improvement.

Cream Cheese Sandwiches.

1 green pepper (chopped fine)
3 ounces cream cheese
1/2 cup walnut meats (cut fine)
1/2 teaspoon lemon juice
Dash of Worcestershire sauce
Salt and pepper
Remove seeds from green pepper and chop fine. Add cheese, walnut meats and lemon juice. Cream well together. Add a dash of Worcester-

shire sauce and salt and pepper to taste. Spread between slices of thinly sliced white bread.

Maids of Honor. (Serves 12)

1 recipe of plain pastry
1/2 cup sugar
3/4 cup almonds (ground)
2 egg yolks
2 tablespoons heavy cream
1 tablespoon flour
1/2 teaspoon almond extract

Line 12 very small tea cake tins or muffin tins with the pastry. Combine remaining ingredients in order given and fill pastry shells with this mixture. Bake in a hot oven (425 degrees) for 10 minutes, then reduce temperature to 350 degrees and bake for 20 minutes longer. Cool, and remove from the pans.

Butterfly Tea Cakes. (Makes 8-10 tea cakes)

1 cup cake flour
1 cup sugar
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 egg
1/2 cup coffee cream
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/2 pint whipping cream

Mix and sift all dry ingredients. Place unbeaten egg and coffee cream in a bowl and beat thoroughly. Add vanilla extract and pour liquid ingredients into the dry ingredients and beat until smooth. Bake in well-greased cupcake or muffin tins in a moderately hot oven (375 degrees) for 30-35 minutes. Cool. Then cut tops from cakes, and cut each top in half. Scoop a spoonful of cake from each one. Whip the cream and fill cavity with whipped cream. Arrange tops to form butterfly and serve at once.

Date Nut Squares. (Makes 3 dozen 1 1/2-inch squares)

3 eggs
3 tablespoons water
1 cup sugar
1 cup flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup walnut meats (cut fine)
2 cups dates (cut fine)

Beat the eggs. Add water and gradually beat in the sugar. Sift together the flour, baking powder and salt and blend with the first mixture. Fold in the nuts and dates. Spread in a shallow greased pan (about 10 by 12 inches). Bake in a moderately hot oven (375 degrees) for about 20 minutes. Cool, cut in squares and roll in confectioner's sugar.

Danish Vanilla Fingers. (Makes about 5 dozen)

3/4 cup shortening
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 pound almonds (1 cup blanched and ground fine)

Cream shortening and add sugar gradually. Beat in the egg and vanilla. Blend well. Sift flour and salt together, and add to the first mixture. Stir in the ground almonds. Turn dough onto a lightly floured board and knead until the mixture is smooth and no longer clings to the hands. Cut off small pieces of dough and shape in rolls about 2 1/4 inches long and a scant half inch thick. Place on greased cookie sheet and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for about 15 minutes.

When he got out of the hospital it was to enter law school that year. He turned again to radio, got onto a sustaining program, and made a recording which Jack Benny's agent heard.

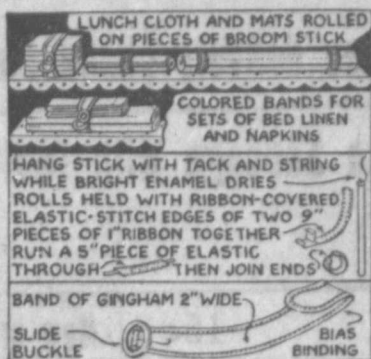
