83 English Refugee Children Perish As Ship Is Torpedoed in Mid-Atlantic; Kidnaper of 3-Year-Old Lad Captured And Boy Returned, Unharmed, to Home

CRIME:

California Kidnaping

Three days after Marc de Tristan Jr.'s abductor seized him from the street near his home in Hillsborough, Calif., he was returned to his nobleman father, Count de Tristan, in

The child was rescued unharmed from the kidnaper, identified as Wilhelm Jakob Muhlenbroich, a 40-yearold German alien, by two woodsmen at Pine River, in the Sierra foothills 200 miles from Hillsborough.

For this elaborately plotted and boldly executed crime, the kidnaper, a German alien, received no \$100,000 as demanded in a beautifully phrased ransom note of 600 words, but he got a black eye, a

gashed head, a bruised body, and he faces almost certain imprison-ment for life. The lumbermen, Cecil Wetzel and Ellis Woods, violently manhandled him when they found him and the child in an automobile on a dead-end road.

THE WAR:

The British said it would take Hitout in 40 weeks.

For the first time, just the same, a funny thing happened. The British and Germans both admitted that the other side had outshot them. The British said they had lost at a ratio of 7 to 4. The Germans said they had lost at a ratio of 3 to 1. This was completely unprecedented, not only in the checkered annals of Anglo-German warfare in the clouds, but also in Sino-Japanese, Jap-Russian, and Spanish civil conflicts. Nobody could quite figure it out. It

The big question, which vexed the critics, was whether the Germans would actually try a land invasion of England this fall. There were all sorts of stories. The royal air force bombed alleged German troop concentrations along the channel coast, and in Norway. They damaged flat-boats and similar equipment. Whether this equipment was merely a blind, or not, remained to

There was a yarn that 200,000 Nazis were massed in Norway, for a drive across. Some critics declared that the light German tank had proved utterly vulnerable to the two-pounder British anti-tank gun. This, they added, had caused Hitler to delay his invasion, and might postpone it indefinitely. That, again, remained to be seen.

Westminster eathedral got into the news. A Nazi dive-bomber just missed the dome, 284 feet high. It dropped a 250-pound bomb in the asphalt playground, adjoining. Westminster eathedral is the Roman Catholic headquarters in England, a sort of rival to the Anglican (Episcopal) Westminster Abbey.

Just Kids

A very large number of the Nazi fliers up over England were young kids in their teens. They had been raised under the totalitarian system, and had the reckless fanaticism of utter youth. Their only enthusiasm was Hitler. They almost courted death. The Nazi regime seemed to be deliberately exploiting these amateur wild-men. Their bombs might almost be termed: gifts to the school-children of London, from the high school boys of Berlin (or Breslau, or Augsburg, or whatever). No regime in history, said one historian, had ever sacrificed youth in this completely cold-blooded mannerthat is, its own youth. The Goering flying circus might well be renamed the Goering suicide squad.

More Kids

The London press screamed "murder" at the announcement by the British government of the sinking of an English refugee ship with a toll of 293 persons, 83 of whom were children en route to Canada.

The ship, her name not disclosed, was torpedoed 600 miles west of England and sank in a stormy sea within 20 minutes after she was attacked.

Of 406 men, women, and children aboard, only 113 were brought back alive by a warship which reached the scene at dawn-almost eight hours after the torpedo struck. Stories of heroism and horror told by survivors of the disaster indicated that many lives were lost in the terrific explosion which ripped the vessel. Many others were swept from lifeboats or died of injuries and ex-

The children were from 5 to 15 years old, and were the first lost in the child evacuation movements which have been under way ever since the war began.

The attacking submarine was not identified, but the tragedy was described by government officials as another example of the barbarous methods associated with Nazi Ger-

RUMANIA:

Transylvania

Rumania was settling down, under the anti-Carol dictatorship of Gen. John Antonescu, who had been locked up in a monastery until recently. Antonescu helped to chase Carol out of the country, with his hated, red-headed girl-pal Lupescu. Then it turned out that Carol and Lupescu were married, and had been since perhaps 1929. This news cheered the Mrs. Grundy's of the entire world.

Antonescu's new Rumania was pro-Nazi and anti-Jewish. It had lost about two-thirds of its territory: Bessarabia and Bukovina to Russia, Transylvania to Hungary, and the southern part of the Dubruja province to little Bulgaria. Antonescu didn't care for all this. The Rumanians accused the Hungarians of committing all sorts of atrocities in Transylvania province as they The Hungarianmarched in. Rumanian tension seemed scheduled to go on forever.

The Germans and Italians had forced Rumania to cede territory to Hungary and the Bulgarians. Now, the Rumanians began to talk about Germany and Italy forcing the Hungarians, etc., etc., to cede territory back to them. Meanwhile, Rumanian oil exports to Germany were soaring. The best high-test airplane gas comes from the Rumanian wells and today one can consider Rumania as General Goering's "kept" filling

CHALLENGE:

Duello

General Goering, flying chief of the Third Reich, was up over London in his own Junkers 88 bomber. Goering was the former commander of the Richthofen flying circus in the first world war, and an ace of great renown. Like many an old war horse, in the second world war he couldn't keep his hands off the controls. It was the first time, in a very long time, that a general led his own troops into battle.

Goering may be the black eagle of Germany. But Harlem—New York city's Negro section—has a black eagle, too. His august name is Col. Hubert Fauntleroy Julian. Julian had just finished reading Hitler's book, "Mein Kampf." Julian's blood boiled over, at Hitler's remarks on the colored race. This is what happened:

Colonel Julian issued a challenge to General Goering, to meet him in single, solitary combat. The place was to be up over the English channel. The weapons were to be Messerschmitt planes. Colonel Julian inferred that General Goering was a "lousy 0 divided by 0." Goering was to have 30 days in which to accept the Julian challenge. The challenge itself read as follows:

"I therefore challenge and defy you, Herman Goering, as head of the Nazi air force, to meet me at 10,000 feet, to fight an aerial duel to avenge the cowardly insult to my race. Neutral correspondents must be the referees." Colonel Julian added that he would buy a Messerschmitt from the British government, which had two captured ones up for sale. Colonel Julian overoked one detail. General Goering is probably too fat to get into a Messerschmitt.

Julian was Haile Selassie's only flier in the Ethiopian war.

BRITISH TROUBLE:

Egypt .

The Italians came out of Tripoli-Libya, and started to invade Egypt, up the long coastline. Already, they had conquered British Somaliland down in East Africa. The British in Egypt were slowly retreating along the coast before Mussolini's Marshal Graziani.

The object of the Italian high command was to cut the Suez canal. This would sever the imperial life-line of England to India.



16,500,000 Expected to Register for Draft On October 16, as President Signs Bill; U. S. Political Campaign Is Warming Up; Nazis Continue 'Hammering' of London

CONSCRIPTION: Ready, Set—!

Congress passed and sent to the President the Burke-Wadsworth military conscription bill, which provides that all male citizens between the ages of 21 and 36 will be required to register for possible service with the armed forces. Two days later the President signed the bill

Under present plans, such registration will take place on October 16, 1940, with 400,000 trainees scheduled to be dressed in khaki by the end of the year. Seventy-five thousand will probably enter service about the middle of November with subsequent quotas of 100,000 or 125,-

000 until the 400,000 marks is reached. The much-debated Fish amendment to the measure, which provided for a 60-day volunteer plan before the draft would be invoked, was dropped before the law was finally passed. The Russell amendment which provides for the "drafting" of industry was modified somewhat in the final act but under its terms the nation will have power to "take over" (lease) manufacturing plants if the owners fail to co-operate properly in the scheme of national de-

Draft boards will be set up in each community to handle the regis-

the same accident. Sixty-six years old, William Bankhead had served as speaker since 1936. He was the third to die in that office during the Roosevelt administration. He had been a house member since 1917.

Dr. Frank was 52 years old at the time of his death. He had been a Republican party adviser, educator and author. He was chairman of his party's policy committee and was seeking senatorial nomination on the Republican ticket.

THE WAR:

Hammers

The war had taken this turn. It was the hammer of Thor, wielded by Hitler, beating down on the more or less solid English anvil. The whole struggle had boiled down into an anvil chorus. Its reverberations shook the world.

When a hammer hits an anvil, one of several things can happen. Either the anvil eventually cracks, or the hammer finally shivers in the hands of the blacksmith. Never does

While the constant bombing raids naturally up-set the daily routine, the English (according to British news sources) are attempting to adjust their lives accordingly and still hew as closely as possible to the "normal" way of doing things.

movable object. Hitler might hammer England, until his air force began to weaken. That was perfectly possible. But, if Hitler turned himself into an anvil, how could the English anvil turn itself into a hammer? The hammer may not be able to crack the anvil. But the anvil can seldom, if ever, hammer the hammer. That was what puzzled the critics. England might very possibly defend itself, but how could it strike back, to defeat Germany? If Germany could not cross 20 miles of water to invade a small island, how could little England counter-invade, to conquer a whole continent? What would Churchill's striking force be?

The British blockade is one force. How much it can accomplish in revolt in Germany would be another. But there were no signs of revolt in Germany, and the iron grip of whippet tanks precluded revolt in the seven subject states and na-tions. Would Russia act as the English hammer? Otherwise it might drag on as a deadlock between two anvils, neither of which was equipped with a heavy-enough hammer. In the meantime London was being bombarded mercilessly and invasion threatened from day to day. Buckingham palace was no more immune from Nazi bombs than London's "east end."

PARADOX:

What a Shame

The British aviators, over Berlin, gutted the famous local Jewish Home for the Aged. Luckily, no-body was hurt. The same day, the royal air force just missed the luxurious home of Joseph Goebbels, German propaganda minister, one of Nazidom's most unsavory figures. The R. A. F. had hit Jewish property, and it missed that of the No. 1 Jew-baiter. What a paradox, and what a shame. Modern air warfare is, indeed, hit-and-run war in the dark.

HORRORS: In Jersey

Thirty buildings were left in ruins at Kenvil, N. J. The FBI was called in with a quick rush. Some \$2,000,-000 worth of U. S. government work was disrupted. Close to 50 were dead, and 200 were injured. It was all caused by a series of hideous explosions at the Hercules Power company, where 66,000 tons of smokeless powder "detonated" with a series of dull thuds.

Nazi sympathizers were blamed for it, and members of the Dies committee were sent to the scene of carnage. There was open talk of sabotage. The Nazi bund has a camp at Andover, about 12 miles from Kenvil. Later this camp was raided by authorities. Whatever the truth, it was a bad business all round, and more than equalled the contemporary air raids over London and Berlin. III REICH: World's Fair

The long arm of the III reich reached out to Long Island, where the World's fair aquabellies out over many acres. The German "protecfor Bohemia-Moravia-what used to be Czechoslovakia, in partordered the Czechoslovak pavilion at the fair to send "home" the products of some 35 Czech firms. The Czech commissioner-general is named George Janacek. Mr. Janacek refused to comply with Baron Von Neurath's command. Said Janacek: "To obey would actually be taking recognition of the German occupation of Czechoslovakia, will sell as many of the exhibits as I can," added the Patriotic Mr. Janacek, whose joy it is (and no wonder) to defy Mr. Hitler.

have one in Dr. Samuel Might Be Our Colville Lind, Greatest Need who offers what appears to this department to be the first soundly conservative sanction for the possible availability

of atomic power-power in our time. At the Detroit meeting of the American Chemical society, starting its national defense inventory of chemical skills and resources, Dr. Lind reports a startling advance toward the power riches of the metal uranium 235. Hit a few atoms of U-235 with 50 electron volts and you draw off 200,000,000 electron volts. It looks like a power millenium, which this country could use just now. Dr. Lind says there is plenty of uranium and that the seizure of its power is

a practical possibility, not nullified by high costs of the process. Cutting the power atom out of the herd of slightly different atoms is the one great remaining Dr. Lind has been an ace atom-

nucleus bomber for many years. His field of radioactivity has been a zone of wizardry in chemistry and he has turned in much basic research, including his ionization theory of the chemical effect of radium rays. He has written extensively on subjects in his field.

From his native McMinnville Tenn., where he was born in 1879, he went to Washington and Lee university and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, with an educa-tional chaser at the University of Leipzig and later at the University of Paris. He taught at the University of Michigan, served as chief chemist of the U.S. bureau of mines and is now dean of the institute of technology of the University of Min-



Bake in a hot oven (450 degrees) 15 minutes, then decrease heat to moderate (350 degrees) and bake 30 minutes longer.

Rich Drop Doughnuts. (Makes 11/2 dozen)

6 tablespoons sugar 2 tablespoons shortening (melted) 2 cups flour 1/4 teaspoon salt

2 teaspoons baking powder

1/4 teaspoon nutmeg 6 tablespoons milk Beat eggs until very light, and gradually beat in the sugar. Add melted shortening. Sift together the flour, salt, baking powder and nut-meg, and add to the first mixture alternately with the milk. Drop from a teaspoon into deep fat heated to 375 degrees, and fry until well browned. Drain on unglazed paper. Sprinkle with confectioner's or pow-

3/4 cup sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla 34 cup cake flour 1 cup jelly

Break the eggs into a bowl and allow them to warm to room temperature. Then combine eggs with baking powder and salt. bowl of eggs in a

smaller bowl in which you have poured hot water. With a dover beater, beat the eggs, baking powder, and salt mixture until it is thick and light. Gradu-

ally beat in the sugar and continue beating until very light and fluffy. Remove the bowl from the hot water and, with a spoon or spatula, fold in the vanilla and the flour which has been sifted several times. Line a 10 by 15 inch jelly roll pan with buttered wax paper, and pour the batter into the pan. Bake for about 12 minutes in a moderate oven (350 degrees). Remove cake from pan and turn onto a towel which has been dusted with confectioner's sugar. Pull off paper and trim edges from the cake. Roll, and cool. When the cake has cooled, unroll it and spread with jelly which has been whipped to make it spread more

Date Nut Cake.

2 cups dates (cut fine) 1 cup pecan nut meats (cut fine) 1 teaspoon soda

1 cup boiling water Put fruit and nuts into bowl; dissolve soda in boiling water and pour over the fruit. Let stand while preparing the following batter mixture: 34 cup butter

1 cup sugar 1 egg 2% cups cake flour 1 teaspoon baking powder 1/4 teaspoon salt 1 cup milk

1 teaspoon vanilla extract Cream butter and add sugar gradually. Add egg and mix well. Add fruit mixture. Mix and sift all dry ingredients and add alternately with the milk and vanilla extract. Place batter in three well-greased layercake pans. Bake in a moderate oven (365 degrees) for approximately 35 minutes. When cool, put layers together with boiled icing to which chopped dates and raisins have been added. Then ice with the plain boiled icing.

Chocolate Nut Gingerbread. % cup butter 1 cup brown sugar ounces chocolate (melted)

2 eggs 1% cups cake flour 1½ teaspoons baking powder 2 teaspoons ginger

1/4 teaspoon cloves ¼ teaspoon salt

3/2 cup milk

½ cup nut meats (chopped fine) Cream butter thoroughly and add the sugar slowly. Add melted chocolate and eggs, one at a time,

beating well. Sift ingredients dry and add alternately with the milk, beating be-

tween each addition. Add nut meats. Bake as a loaf cake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for approximately 45 minutes. Serve with whipped cream, sprinkled with cinnamon, or with chocolate fudge icing.

Magic Fruited Macaroons. (Makes about 30) % cup sweetened condensed milk 2 cups coconut (shredded)

1 cup dates (chopped fine) Mix together the sweetened condensed milk and coconut. Add finely chopped dates. Drop by spoonfuls on greased baking sheet, about 1 inch apart. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) 10 minutes, or until a delicate brown. Remove




