LONDON:

England London, it was noted, is the veritable nerve-center of England. This is not true of Washington or Berlin or Moscow or Rome. It's true, however, that Paris is the nerve-center of France.

London City contains nearly 25 per cent of the total population of Great Britain. It contains more than 20 per cent of the British industrial workers. It contains about a quarter of all British industry, as well as the British financial, banking, and commercial structure.

London also contains most of the big British oil storage tanks. It contains the Wellington and Spitfire airplane factories, the houses of parliament, and Buckingham palace, as well as the bank of England. It contains a third of the British dockage, and about a third of all British imports come in through London.

In the east end of London, among the squalid slums, is a vast alien population. These people are Italian, Jewish, Lascar, Malay, Indian, shanty Irish, and none too patriotic. They are no fifth column-they are plentifully anti-Nazi. But they are not desirable people to have around in a time of siege. They are much

Most spectacular of all marsupials is the kangaroo.

Tudor Architecture

The first empress of Germany was a princess of Weimar named Augusta, and Augusta Victoria, first wife of Wilhelm II, was the last empress of Germany.

Hevea Tree, Rubber Producer Most of the world's supply of raw rubber comes from the milky juice of the hevea tree that grows wild in the jungles of Brazil. Although many vines and trees contain rubber, none equals the quality or quantity of the juice of the hevea tree. Unfortunately, it has not proved profitable to cultivate these trees anywhere except in this and other restricted regions.

Old Welsh Bridal Custom

Many wedding couples in Wales are not content with a reception lasting only an hour or two, but must have an all-night feast. The "neithior," or wedding feast, and the "ystafell" are the two popular postnuptial ceremonies. The former is held to give the couple a good start in life; the latter consists mainly of carrying the newlyweds' furniture to their new home.

Antilles on Map

The Antilles, as the West Indies were called on maps showing an extension 1,000 miles west of the Azores, were listed long before Columbus set out on his famous voyage. The name Antilles is a corruption of Antilla, or Antiglia, a mythical land shown on ancient charts to the north of the present West Indies.

An Indian Superstition

The Indians hung a bow or a powder horn on the moon whenever they planned to go on the warpath, or on a long hunting trip. If the moon tilted so that the bow slipped off, they departed on their expedition-being assured of fine weather. This is only one of many legends.



Swarms of French aviators peppered British Gibraltar from the air, and the Japs moved increasingly into French Indo-China. Hull wisely embargoed scrapiron destined for Japan, and the general muddle grew apace.

Berlin, too, has a vast foreign population. But it is less volatile than that of London. Most of Berlin's aliens are Slavic, and phlegmatic. The real British are calmer than the real Germans, and steadier, but the Berlin aliens can "take it" better than the east-end London aliens, according to war correspondents, neurologists, and social-minded critics.

No Mean Town

Mexico City, which is located in a federal district like Washington, D. C., is a wonderful place, with a wonderful climate. It is high up in altitude, and you need blankets at night, and many of us wish we were there.

The population of Mexico City has sprouted like wildfire. Just announced-it's now up to 1,750,000 plus. That's a lot of people for a nation of only about 15,000,390. Rio de Janeiro, the capital of vast Brazil (bigger than the United States), is just a wee bit behind Mexico City. Buenos Aires, capital of the white man's Argentine republic, totals the whopping brand-new figure of 2,300,000 souls. This means something. It means

that Buenos Aires is now the biggest Latin city in the whole world. It means that Mexico City is second, Rio de Janeiro is third, and that Paris-that so-gay Paree-is way down in fourth place. After Paris, tag along Italy's Milan and Rome, Spain's Madrid and Barcelona and Canada's Montreal.

The three big German towns are Berlin, Vienna and Hamburg. The three big Anglo-Saxon towns are New York, London, and Sydney, in far Australia, plus Chicago, Glas-gow and Philadelphia. Japanese Tokyo is now the world's third city.

Mayan Indians Get Culture From Youth

ENID, Okla. - A one-man cultural revolution is being staged among the 50,000 Maya Indians of Central America, and its spearhead, guiding genius, director and sole motive force is 27-yearold William Bentley, a college graduate.

Bentley entered the tropical regions of Maya country as a missionary two years ago, with an ambition to translate the Bible into the Maya language.

Since then his difficulties have become almost as numerous as the people he has sought to befriend.

The Mayas have no alphabet and Bentley has set out to create one. His preliminary work, however, has been con-cerned mainly with learning the Maya language, a labori-ous task itself because the use of Spanish is required and interpreters who speak both Spanish and Mayan are rare.

When he first arrived, the language difficulties threat-ened to destroy his whole project. The natives were hos-tile and unfriendly because they were unable to converse with the missionary.

Bentley studied a long time to find a method of breaking down the barriers and finally hit upon a simple scheme, in the best movie explorer fashion, to arouse friendliness among the Indians.

He attracted a large crowd and taking a can of popcorn which he had remembered to bring along, popped it for the benefit of the Indians. They were fascinated by the process and the impasse was ended.

ended. Bentley, a graduate of Phil-lips university at Enid, first planned to become a surgeon until he decided that field was overcrowded and chose in-stead the career of a mis-

sionary. He has been on a leave of absence from his mission post for several months, studying languages in the United States. He plans to return some time this summer.


show you my method of fastening booklets in ring binders.

I use ¾-inch wide gummed tape. Pieces 21/2-inches long are folded in half. The fold end is stuck to-gether and punched. Frequently we cover binders with fabrics or interesting papers so they look attractive on the shelves in any room.




