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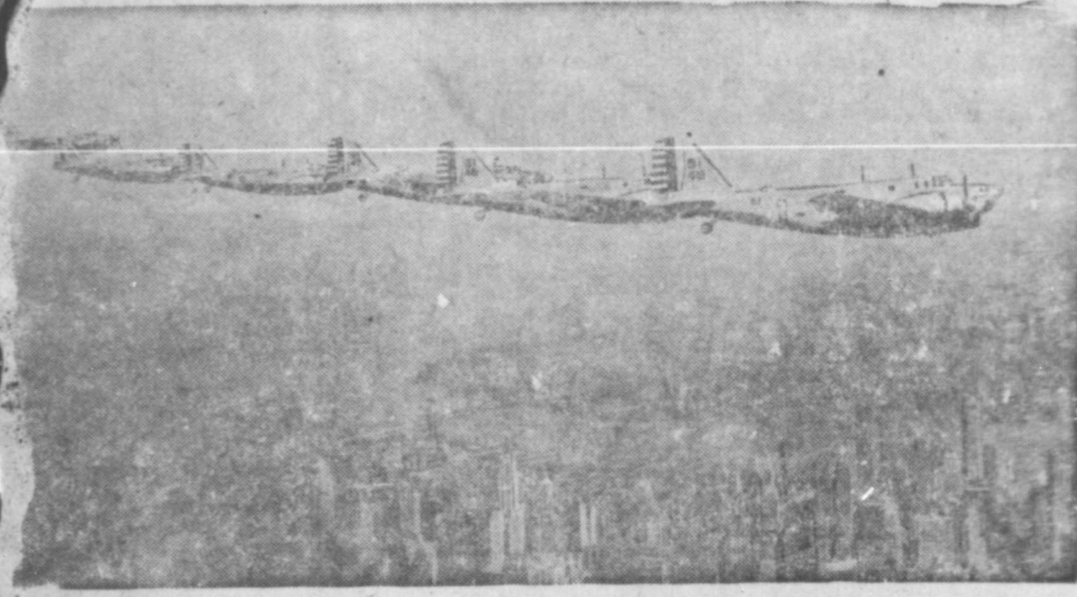

HOUSEHOLD QUESTIONS

To reheat cereal, place in double boiler and stir while cooking. This is better than adding water, which tends to make the cereal lumpy.

Egg stains on table linen should be soaked in cold water before laundering because hot water sets such stains.

Silverware will stay shiny and untarnished if it is used daily, washed thoroughly and stored carefully. Use hot soapy water for washing, hot clear water for rinsing. Wipe the silver carefully with a lintless soft cloth. Don't pile silverware; that is likely to scratch it. To remove tarnish from silver, use a polish that is very soft and is free from grit.

How to Cook Old News



COMMUNITY SUPPER (See Recipes Below)

So you're to manage the next community supper? And you're panicky about it! Of course you are. It's a job to feed a crowd of people and leave a clean kitchen in the process. But it's a job that can be made a lot easier if you plan ahead.

club suppers, study the next eight-point program for a multitude:

- (1) Pick a general plan for the evening. Appoint a responsible person in charge of each of the kitchen jobs.
- (2) Plan the menu. Have utensils and dishes ready at hand.
- (3) Get the correct waitress method of serving well ahead of time.
- (4) If the menu is a whole meal, plan the whole thing in advance. And there's no need of serving thrifty cuts.
- (5) Take meat loaf, ham loaf de luxe with good mustard-horseradish sauce, or any meal. Beef steaks can be thickened a little, ladeled in dripping pans, covered with brown sauce, and when baked it appears as if they were sautéed.
- (6) If you wish to make it more "de luxe," bake and serve in individual casseroles.

For something different, plan for meat balls with rice. You can serve buttered turnips, and a salad made of cabbage, celery, green peas and pimento which certainly appeals to the men this menu.

Now if pennies needn't be watched so closely and you want to do a fall or winter dinner, here's a "ringer": Bake ham, raisin and cider sauce, vegetable salad, cranberry muffin, pumpkin pie, coffee, or milk.

Ham Loaf de Luxe (Serves 50) 5 pounds smoked ham (round) 3 cups veal (ground) 3/4 cup green pepper (minced) 1/2 cup onion (chopped) 2 teaspoons salt 1/2 teaspoon pepper 8 eggs (beaten) 1 quart tomato soup (canned) 1 quart bread crumbs or uncooked cereal Combine the meat, green pepper, onion and seasonings. Add beaten eggs, tomato soup, and bread crumbs or uncooked cereal. Pack into bread loaf pans and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for 1 1/2 hours.

Beef Stew With Biscuits. (Serves 50) 9 pounds beef round (cut into 1-inch cubes) 2 cups flour 1 cup hot beef drippings 3 quarts boiling water 1/2 teaspoon peppercorns 2 bay leaves 1 quart turnips (diced) 1 quart carrots (diced) 1 cup onions (sliced) Salt and pepper to taste Cut beef into 1-inch cubes. Dredge in the flour and brown in hot beef drippings. Place in kettle and add boiling water. Cook slowly for 2 to 3 hours. Add peppercorns and bay leaves. Add carrots and turnips 1 hour before serving. Add salt and pepper. If necessary, thicken with flour paste. Serve hot with baking powder biscuits on top.

Meat Balls With Rice. (Serves 40 to 45) 4 pounds beef (ground) 3 pounds pork (ground) 2 onions (minced) 2 cups rice (uncooked) 2 cups cracker crumbs 4 eggs (beaten) 4 tablespoons salt 1 teaspoon pepper 2 cups milk Combine ingredients and mix well. Form into balls. Place in shallow roasting pans. Pour over 2 quarts tomato sauce or tomato soup. Cover pans. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for 1 1/2 to 2 hours.

HOUSEHOLD HELPS

Add finely cut mint leaves to orange juice and chill. Just before serving add 1 1/2 cups pale dry ginger ale to each two cups of orange juice.

For variety sprinkle some grated cheese over the top of raisin, apple or mince pie and heat for five minutes in a moderate oven. Serve at once.

ORDER OF ROAD BOND ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS, County of Donley.

On this the 21st day of November, 1940, the Commissioners' Court of Donley County, Texas, convened in special session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the courthouse at Clarendon, Texas, the following members of said Court, to-wit:

R. Y. King, county judge, presiding; and J. H. Hermesmeier, commissioner, Precinct No. 1; G. G. Reeves, commissioner, Precinct No. 2; Claud Nash, commissioner, Precinct No. 3; Marvin Hall, commissioner, Precinct No. 4;

being present and participating, came on to be considered the petition of J. W. Noel and 69 other persons, for an election to be held in Donley County, Texas, to determine whether or not bonds of said County shall be issued in the total principal sum of \$565,000.00, for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, in said County, and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon all taxable property in said County for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on said bonds at maturity; and,

It appearing to this Court that said petition is signed by more than fifty (50) qualified resident property taxpayers voters of Donley County, Texas; and,

It further appearing that the amount of bonds to be issued will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said Donley County, Texas;

IT IS, THEREFORE, CONSIDERED AND ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF DONLEY COUNTY, TEXAS:

1. That, pursuant to the aforesaid petition, an election shall be held in said County on the 28th day of December, 1940, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, to determine whether or not bonds shall be issued on the faith and credit of said County, in the total principal sum of \$565,000.00, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, in said County, and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied, annually, on all taxable property in said County for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on said bonds at maturity, under authority of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 52, of Article 3, of the Constitution, and Chapter 10, Acts 1926, First Called Session, as amended; such bonds, if issued, will bear interest at a rate not to exceed 6 per cent per annum, and shall mature at such times as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court of said County, serially, or otherwise, not to exceed twenty-five (25) years from their date.

2. In event said bonds are authorized by the necessary favorable vote of the qualified electors of said County, voting at such election, the proceeds from the sale thereof shall be applied to the construction, maintenance and operation of the following roads in said County, to-wit:

(a) Road running from Hedley east to the Colingworth County line; amount of bond money to be expended therefor not to exceed \$140,000.00;

(b) Road running from Gray County line south through Clarendon to the Hall County line; amount of bond money to be expended therefor not to exceed \$225,000.00; and,

(c) Road running from Hedley north to the Gray County line; amount of bond money to be expended therefor not to exceed \$200,000.00.

3. As stipulated in the aforesaid petition, if the proposition for the issuance of the proposed bonds is approved by the necessary vote of the qualified electors of said County, voting at such election, the bonds will be issued and sold and the tax levied in payment thereof when and only when the County receives from the State Highway Commission and the Board of County and District Road Indebtedness definite assurance that the roads hereinabove described will be taken over, acquired or purchased by the State of Texas, and that the principal of and interest on said bonds will be paid out of funds lawfully appropriated or set aside for that purpose by the proper State Agency; provided, however, that nothing herein shall be construed as releasing the Commissioners' Court, or any other county officials, from discharging and performing any and all duties devolved upon them by law in respect of the assessment and collection of the tax to be levied in payment of said bonds, in event the State of Texas should at any time in the future withdraw its aid to the County in payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds.

4. All persons who are legally qualified voters of said Donley County, Texas, who are resident property taxpayers of said County and who have duly rendered their

property for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

5. All voters qualified to support the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots, the words:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVY OF AD VALOREM TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

And, those opposed to the proposition, shall have written or printed upon their ballots, the words:

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVY OF AD VALOREM TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

8. A copy of this order, signed by the County Judge of Donley County, Texas, and certified to by the County Clerk of said County, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The above order having been read in full, it was moved by Commissioner Reeves and seconded by Commissioner Hermesmeier that the same be passed and adopted. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of said Court voted "AYE": Commissioners Hermesmeier, Reeves, Nash and Hall; and the following voted "NO": None.
