On the first floor we saw the sacks coming out of the shoot and taken to a freight car. The hundred pound sacks of flour that we saw were to be shipped to New York. When we came out we had to brush ourselves off, because we were covered with flour dust.

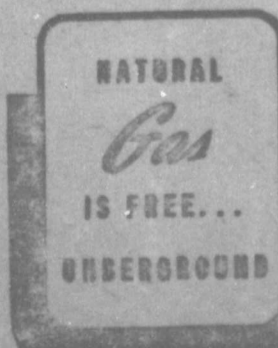
