ENERGY HAS BEEN much in the news during the past couple of weeks. First, there was the accident, described as the worst commercial nuclear accident in U.S. history, at the Three Mile Island power plant

near Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. After several days when the residents of that area felt as though they might be sitting on a time bomb, the critical period passed with a minimum of trouble, and no casualties were recorded.

Energy leaders fear that the accident at the Pennsylvania plant may cause a growth of public objection to nuclear power, and damage the growth of this potential source of energy.

It was pointed out that during the past five years, utility companies have cancelled more than 30 contracts for nuclear plants, have postponed plans to build dozens more and brought new orders for reactors nearly to a standstill.

And, although the Three Mile Island episode definitely provided nuclear energy with a bad publicity blast, the safety record for nuclear energy has been extraordinarily good. In the 20 years since the first commercial plant was started, not a single death has been recorded as the result of a nuclear accident, which is an outstanding industrial record. Few other industries can match this record.

The residents and voters of Austin are to be commended on their courage this past Saturday. The voters at the state capitol "bit the bullet" and went ahead and approved bonds for construction of a nuclear plant on the Texas coast, in which their city would have a share

THE OTHER ITEM which has sparked comment recently was the president's announcement of deregulation of crude oil prices, which is seen by many as the impetus for higher gas prices, which now may approach the \$1.00 per gallon range which has been the prediction for the last several months.

The trouble with Carter's proposal is that it did not leave an incentive for the major oil companies to produce more oil. The companies could have been forced to plow their excess profits back into a fund for exploration and production of oil.

Instead, it appears that the Federal Government plans to "skim off" the excess profits for their treasury. In this light, it would appear that our leaders have little regard for what the price of gas and oil will be to the average consumer.

Most consumers have had a wary opinion of the "gas shortage" of recent vintage, expecting that as soon as the price ceiling was lifted, we would see an end of the shortage, such as happened in 1973-74.

Well, the major companies have been given "open season" on the consumers, so we will know very shortly what they will do.

WE LIKE THE IDEA behind SB 983 and HB 941 bills which would refund the sales taxes to cities on the basis of their population, instead of the actual amounts they collect and send in.

inis would repay smaller cities for the dollars spent by shoppers in the larger, metropolitan area, which now collect sales tax money for their cities when out-of-town shoppers come calling.

If you like this idea, why not write to Senator Bob Price, and to representative Bill Clayton, urging their support.

AAM Leaders Lobby For Farm Compact

Possibly some of the most significant state agriculture legislation in the past decade was lobbied for in Austin last week by farmers from all sections of the state.

Probably the most significant was the lobbying effort for the multi-state grain compact. This compact if enacted would form a compact between most of the grain producing states for the formation of an investigative body to study the trade policies of the multi-national grain dealers.

There has to be at least five states passing similar bills in their respective states to initiate this compact. Each state will put up \$50,000 to start the program. At present time there are 14 states with pending legislation on the grain compact.

The compact has been passed in both houses in Kansas and Oklahoma and has passed one or the other house in other states.

This compact if enacted, contrary to many local grain dealers and

grain processors' opinion would not pertain to them. The problem is not with our local grain dealers--the problem is with the multi-national grain dealers and the Chicago Board of Trade. The compact is an out-growth of the famous Russian wheat deal, where primarily one grain company with a source of information from the USDA made fabulous profits.

The compact is in the process of becoming a reality because of the failure of the federal government to take any action.

Other legislative matters that the farmers were working on in Austin this past week were two bills on gasahol, one on foreign investments in Texas, and a bill dealing with a state guaranteed loans for young farmers trying to get started in farming.

The gasahol bills met with very favorable attention and most likely will become law. There is already planned construction of one major gasahol plant in the lower Rio Grande Valley where they will use sugar cane waste for their substance.

There is also an addition to be made to the starch plant at Dimmitt, Texas for the production of alcohol from corn. This plant will probably be the least costly as it will require only an addition to the facility that already exists. The beauty part about the making of gasahol from corn or grain is that there is no food value lost, all the protein and carbohydrates are retained.

Some interesting figures were presented at the hearings on the multi-state grain compact. The state of Texas puts 600 million bushels of feed grains on the market each year. If the farmers could get one cent per bushel more for their product it would mean \$6 million additional revenue in the state.

Through the responsible efforts in the state of Texas on the grain compact and the gasahol plants the feed grain prices should be aided somewhat and making more markets for our crops.

An award in the PPA contests is especially gratifying, since all sizes of newspapers, from the smallest weekly papers, to the dailies, c mpete against each other in the various contests.



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


Burial was in Friona Cemetery under the direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home.

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On The Farm In Parmer County

A robust weed population in dormant bermudagrass or St. Augustinegrass lawns is not only unsightly but can delay recovery of turfgrasses for several months.

Clover, chickweed, henbit and dandelions are common weed problems in lawns during winter and early spring months.

According to the specialist, homeowners can take several steps to control winter weeds in lawns. Application of a preemergence

herbicide such as Dacthal or Balan in October will prevent many winter weed problems. However, if you missed that opportunity, there are other methods to keep winter weeds in check.

Close mowing following periods of mild temperatures in February and March will greatly improve the appearance of a weedy lawn and will promote early recovery of turfgrasses. However, mowing will not eliminate the weeds. Systemic herbicides (chemical weed killers) such as Wipeout (Greenlight), Weed-B-Gon (Ortho) and Systemic Weed Control (Ferti-lome) will successfully control most broadleaf weed problems if used according to label instructions. Two applications of these materials about 14 days apart may be required for complete control of broadleaf weeds.

These chemicals will not control grassy weeds such as annual bluegrass and rescuegrass. Preemerge herbicide treatments in the fall are required to control these weedy grasses.

Systemic herbicides can be applied with a two-gallon pressure sprayer or a hose-end sprayer. Use care to apply materials uniformly at the recommended dosage when temperatures are above 60 degrees

If herbicides are applied properly, broadleaf weeds will begin to shrivel a few days after the first treatment and will turn brown after the second treatment. Close mowing several weeks after the second treatment should remove all traces of the broadleaf weeds and should promote recovery of desirable grasses.

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
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
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
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
