The locomotive struck the car on the right side of the motor, throwing Mrs. Stotts beneath the train.

Her husband, S. H. Stotts, and their 3 year old son, Richard, escaped serious injury.

Funeral services were held Wednesday from the First Baptist Church at Memphis by Rev. S. F. Martin. Pallbearers were Dixie Vallance, Marshall Maxwell, Gay Hogue, Murry Dodson, Tom McDougal and Chas. Bell.

Interment was in Memphis cemetery with Womack Funeral Home in charge.

Besides her husband and son, she is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. G. Abernathy, and a sister, Colleen, all of Memphis.

Class III. Zinnias—Most artistic arrangement, container to count. Prizes: 1st, half dozen bulbs; 2nd, red ribbon; 3rd, yellow ribbon.

Class IV. Marigolds—Most artistic arrangement, container to count. Prizes: 1st, half dozen bulbs; 2nd, red ribbon; 3rd, yellow ribbon.

Class V. Garden Flowers—Most artistic arrangement of mixed flowers of one variety, any color, container to count. Prizes: 1st, half dozen bulbs; 2nd, red ribbon; 3rd, yellow ribbon.

Class VI. Table Arrangement—Most artistic arrangement of flowers or fruit. Prizes: 1st, half dozen bulbs; 2nd, red ribbon; 3rd, yellow ribbon.

Class VII. Shadow Boxes—1st, half dozen bulbs; 2nd, red ribbon; 3rd, yellow ribbon.

**Aurora Borealis**

Many citizens of Hedley had the unusual opportunity of seeing the famed Northern Lights last Thursday night about 10. This phenomenon is correctly called the Aurora Borealis. It is comparatively rare within 45 degrees of the equator, but it becomes more frequent at 60 degrees where it sometimes becomes almost a nightly occurrence. Since Hedley is about 35 degrees of the equator it is a very rare thing indeed for it to be seen this far south. Up in the great white north the nights are very still but at times there comes through that intense quiet low crackling sound that makes the ignorant watchers quiver with fear. Then a great light shoots across the sky. At times brilliant rays of light spread upward in the shape of a fan; at other times they flash here and there like giant searchlights. According to scientific measurements, this discharge of lights takes place from 50 to 100

miles above the earth. What causes these wonderful lights? No one knows. It is believed however that the rays are due to discharge of electricity in the rare upper atmosphere. This Aurora Borealis is one of nature's most beautiful and mysterious phenomena.

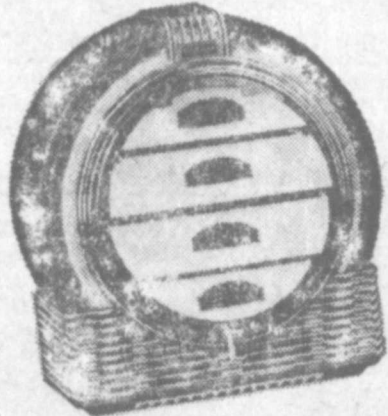

House Bill No. 76, recently passed by the Legislature, releases all penalty and interest on City Ad Valorem Taxes, both real and personal, that were delinquent before July 1, 1940. If you have any such delinquent City Taxes, you may take advantage of this complete interest and penalty remission NOW by paying

**ALL TAXES DUE**

If a lien holder wants to pay all the delinquent taxes on the property on which he holds a lien, it will be necessary for him to pay a penalty of 6 per cent, unless all the taxes on all other property owned by the taxpayer, both real and personal, are paid at the same time. The above rule also applies to the owner of the property.

**This Law Expires November 1, 1941**

(This law does not affect 1940 taxes, on which the usual penalty will be collected.)

Under the Penalty Remission Bill, all penalty and interest are released provided all delinquent taxes are paid. Your 1941 City Taxes may be paid after October 1, 1941, with a Discount of 3% during the month of October, 2% during November and 1% during December. No Discounts allowed during January, 1942.
