

U. S. Destroyer Kearny Makes Port Under Own Power After Torpedoing; 11 Crew Members Reported Missing; Japanese Form Militaristic Cabinet

KEARNY: Major Incident:

Impact of the torpedoing of the destroyer Kearny near Iceland had been terrific. First reports of the incident indicated no loss of life but when the ship made port (under its own power) 11 crew members were listed as "missing" and 10 more as

seriously injured. The full report of Commander Danis had been awaited with eagerness, particularly after Nazi sources called the entire story a "flat lie" and stated that the Kearny had probably run into an American mine.

The denial had been expected, and the senatorial and congressional comment had been along expected lines. Nye said it was just the sort of thing the country could have looked for, in following the administration's foreign policy.

Most members of congress, however, took an extremely serious view of the situation, many permitting themselves to be quoted that "this might well be the spark needed to explode us'into war.'

The incident occurred when the house was debating the ship-arming bill, but was not believed to have had any particular effect on the debate, and the passage of the measure had been a foregone conclusion.

Chief among reactions to the torpedoing of the Kearny had been sur-

prise in all quarters that the Nazis should want to provoke the country with an incident which might result in this nation becoming a more active and positive enemy.

RUSSIA:

A Defense

Though the defenders of Moscow had been putting up a brilliant and tenacious battle, it had become evident that only a military miracle could save the city.

Perhaps a weather miracle might, but though there was snow on the battlefields, and more was falling from time to time, there seemed no diminution in the ferocity of the German assault, or the man and machine power with which it had

Of special interest to men interested in military maneuvering was the Nazi method, aided by its marvelously mechanized forces, in shifting the pressure suddenly from one

front to another. Moscow was assailed from threefrom the northwest, along the road from Leningrad; from the west, along the historic "Napoleonic highway," and from the southwest, following the route from Orel.

Discounting wild rumors (there even had been one report that the Russians had recaptured Orel and Kalinin, two vital points lost at least a week before) it was apparent that the Germans had been able to make two lines out of the three-roughly called the right and left wings of the assault.

There could be little question that the cost to the invaders in men and material was heavy, but also there was little doubt that the retreat of the Red armies had of necessity been swift and a heavy drain on the Soviet material.

Grandiloquent Nazi claims of the smashing of Timoshenko's "eight armies" and the collapse of Russian resistance were perforce discounted as wishful thinking on the part of the Germans as daily gains dropped from a score of miles to a matter of hundreds of yards.

The Russian defenders on one day would be calling on their reserves to battle smashing assaults on the right, and then just as suddenly, be compelled to meet the same sort of action from the left.

Diplomats moved out of the city; the report was circulated that the government had moved to Kazan. Ivan Maisky, Soviet spokesman, asking for a complete pooling of British and Red resources, pledged

TOJO: A New Regime

Another blow of shocking impact had been the sudden resignation of the Prince Fumimaro Konoye cabinet in Tokyo, and the prince's replacement by General Tojo, thus forming a frankly militaristic gov-

It had been reliably reported that the Konoye resignation had been on a basis of "this government is unwilling to accept responsibility for a

severe breach between the United States and Japan."

Japan's terms admittedly had been received, studied in Washing-Washington admittedly had been discouraged at the prospects of agreement. It may or may not be that this attitude had been conveyed to Konoye through the Japanese ambassador.

At all events, it was plain that the prince must himself have believed that agreement on the Pacific with the United States was impossibleand hence his resignation.

His successor-General Tojo. And one of his first utterances had been that his cabinet would make early and final "decision" as to what measures to take to end the crisis.

Coupled with this had been a strong and unequivocal affirmation of Japan's complete loyalty to the Axis.

Most observers had been watching Nazi Germany whipping Tokyo into action in the Pacific, obviously to create a new front, to divide the U. S. fleet, to lessen our aid to Britain, and to involve in a near-at-hand struggle the powerful continent of Australia.

These seemed plain facts and watching the developments, those who wished to avoid war with Japan were becoming gloomy indeed.

SUPPLY RACE: In North Africa

British and German armies faced each other on the relatively quiet desert front, and military correspondents believed each was afraid to start a general attack unless the reserves of supplies guaranteed a fairly certain success.

Therefore, back of the front lines a race had developed, and trained watchers believed it might be weeks or months before one side or the other would gain a sufficient lead.

General Auchinleck commanded the British, while General Rommel was the German commander. It had been four months since the last real battle on the desert front, wrote one correspondent.

The British are receiving enormous quantities of goods via American ships calling at Suez. They were said to be arriving faster than they could be handled

The British now have, it was said, thousands of motor trucks, and enough light, fast tanks to make several motorized units. There are hundreds of new fighters and bombers of the latest types.

These developments, it was felt, would, within a few weeks, or a couple of months, be reflected in a terrific British drive in North Africa. But the Germans and Italians are

not idle, and the British Mediterranean fleet, harassed constantly from the air and by submarines, has been hard put to it to make a serious dent in the shipping lines from Europe to Africa, constantly laden with military supplies for Rommel's forces.

PANAMA: Takes Step

The expected aftermath of the abdication and overthrow of President Arnulfo Arias of Panama followed when the little country in which hundreds of American-owned ships are registered, decided to permit the arming of merchant vessels.

This putting of ships in Panamian registry was a device used by this country because of the neutrality act which forbids the vessels to enmount even in the highest circles. I ter belligerent ports.

Helping Hands



DES MOINES, IOWA. - Jim Harlan, Iowa state conservation commissioner, and Jane Wilson were on hand to see an egret begin its flight back to the South by means of artificial wings. The bird was fixed up with manmade "flappers" and sent from the Des Moines airport after its feathers failed to grow fast enough sollowing an injury. It was to be released at New Orleans and will be out of the northlands before winter sets in.

PRICES:

No Action Yet

While congress debated the setting of ceilings on wages and prices and rents, without taking any definite action, Canada stepped into the breach and moved to halt inflation.

Prime Minister King said "the government has decided to halt the rise in prices, to undertake the control of all prices, and where necessary, take any other steps to control civilian consumption in fair and equitable ways."

He said that ceilings would be set on prices. He admitted it was going to interfere with business, would impose irksome restrictions. Then he announced that all prices would be frozen after November 17 on the basis of prices charged for that merchandise during the four weeks from September 15 to October 11.

He followed this with a system of controlling wages. Wages also were to be "frozen" at the same level, but employers would be required to pay bonuses in amounts that would vary from time to time according to nation-wide conditions.

The first step in prevention of inflation had been thus taken by our neighbor to the north.

Again to Fore Though the isolationists and noninterventionists constantly were pointing to President Roosevelt as the "big, bad wolf" that was leading this nation into actual warfare, it was Wendell Willkie, former Republican candidate, who "beat the gun," and in an address urged the country

to "face war." A coincident reaction with Willkie's announcement was that congressional leaders began to think in terms not of passing the ship-arming bill, but of scrapping the entire Neutrality act.

"Let's kill the whole darned thing," many of them seemed to feel. Willkie told his listeners:

"Let us stop deluding ourselves. Berlin, Tokyo and Rome are irrevocably linked by the dangerous dream of world conquest. Victory for one is victory for all. Their aim is world domination, the destruction of liberty and the end of democracy

"Our ships will continue to be torpedoed and sunk if we don't arm them fast. Axis victories will not end unless we deliver the goods.

"But even this is not enough. We must remove the show and deception of hypocritical neutrality laws. We must abandon the hope of peace.

"We can no more negotiate a peace with the war lords of Tokyo than with the conquering dictator of Berlin. On any continent, in every ocean, we can only stop these part-

"They are winning now. Unless we act soon it will be too late,"




WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

Unrest in Nazi Dominated Nations Results in 'Front-Behind-Front'; Hitler's 'Victory' Speech Is Puzzle As Russia Claims Important Gains

He used the opportunity to tell the German people that his armies on the eastern front have scored great victories and that Russia is "already broken and will never rise again." He again predicted complete Nazi victory. In the seats of honor at the gathering were a number of wounded, seen at the left front in the above picture.

FRONT:

(Behind Front)

The old cliche that "there is nothing new under the sun" was fairly routed by the oddest of all wars when the unrest which had been boiling for months in countries occupied by Nazi Germany had begun to flare into strange and more open warfare.

And it was a queer warfare, with ultimatums flying back and forth, and nations in exile passing decrees on conquered peoples with the threat of "death if we ever get back in our countries again."

It was no laughing matter, either, for the era of mass executions had been reached, with the possibility in some quarters that Germans would be slaughtered wholesale, just as the Nazis were slaughtering victims in other quarters.

In Jugoslavia

Guerilla bands operating in the Serbian mountain districts, swooping down by night, had been capturing small detachments of Nazi soldiers, spiriting them away as captives, until they had amassed somewhere between 600 and 1,000 men. whom they were reported holding prisoners

Came an ultimatum from gueril- O. K. las to the Nazi occupational officers to this effect: "Continue to shoot Jugoslav hostages, and we shall execute our prisoners."

The German answer (requiring the use of a considerable force which presumably had been taken from the Russian front) was the reported sending of a panzer division of 12,000 men and to head it toward Belgrade, the former capital of former Jugoslavia to deal summarily with these guerilla bands.

In Norway

King Haakon (in exile in London) signed a decree providing the death penalty for crimes against the Norwegian state.

A counter-attack against this move had come from Josef Terboven, the Reich's commissar in Norway, who said: "Accept Germany's new order and regard Germany's enemies as yours, or face obliteration as a national state, and perhaps starvation."

This ultimatum was backed up, it had been reported, by the fact that more than 2,000 Norwegians were in concentration camps, many of them held as hostages.

The "new order" was the Quisling government, against which an underground and sometimes open revolt had been going on for two months or more.

And against this stood Haakon's decree, held a warning to any "tools" of the Nazis who might exert themselves to help the German authorities that if Norway regains its freedom they will face the death penalty.

In Bulgaria

While not occupied formally or as a result of warfare, Bulgaria was officially considered to be an Axis partner, and reports had emanated from Sofia, in the form of a victory dispatch, that Greek forces which had swooped over the borders into Bulgaria with rifles and machine guns seeking to organize a revolt among the Greek citi-

BRIEFS:

Berlin: (by radio heard in New York) The world famous broadcast er "Lord Haw-Haw, Nazi-minded Englishman, had been banned from

the air." Capetown, S. A.: Gen. Jan Christian Smuts again had called for America's entry into the war "hands and feet," to insure a quicker victory and save the world from exzens of the country, had been "an-nihilated."

In Belgium

A bomb explosion, it had been reported, in Brussels, had killed Jean Oederkerke, secretary of the Rexist (Fascist) forces.

In Czecho Slovakia

The wholesale executions in Bonemia and Moravia (home of the Czechs) followed revelations that there had been operating there schools for saboteurs and for learning improved methods of slowing down factory production.

And these evidences of the widespread revolt were in addition to similar events which had resulted in executions in occupied and unoccupied France and in Holland.

NEUTRALITY:

Change Expected

Although it was recognized that President Roosevelt's request for changes in or repeal of the neutrality act would meet with determined opposition in senate and house, a poll of the chambers showed definitely that some modifi-cation, notably that of permitting arming of American merchant ships, would receive a congressional

This poll had been taken as Secretary of State Hull warned the Axis powers that American-owned ships (presumably wearing the Panamanian or other flag, were armed and had orders to defend themselves.

This statement itself had closely followed the sinking of a former American tanker 450 miles east of Recife, Brazil, with the loss of several American lives.

The tanker had originally been American, had been transferred to the British service, and was operating under the Panamanian flag with a crew largely composed of American citizens.

Between 12 and 20 such ships had already been armed, Mr. Hull said, and he characterized the sinkings of these vessels or of those of this type as a German effort at "frightfulness designed to drive us out of the Atlantic."

The senate poll showed 29 in favor of repeal or change; 20 opposed to any change, and most of the rest undecided, wanting more time to study, or out of the city and unavailable for comment.

HITLER:

Puzzle

The first formal address by Hitler in 103 days of warfare with Russia rather left the world puzzledfor he claimed a total victory over the Reds at a time when Moscow was claiming the Leningrad push stopped, and continued advances in the center.

Also, the favorable report of the chancellor on the war situation came at a time when unrest behind the lines was assuming the proportions of a front, and at least one whole division had to be sidetracked to take care of one small sector of conquered territory.

Even more puzzling was his statement that he had ordered production of war materials restricted, because the Russians were no longer able to be a menace and that the war was, in effect "in the bag."

This was followed up by a warning in the Berlin Press to British and American mission members in Moscow to get out of the Russian capital because a head-on attack upon Moscow was planned.

It came at a time when Moscow itself was informing the British and Americans that there no longer was doubt that Russia could hold out through the winter, but that quantities of munitions and the machinery of war would be needed next spring. It was hard to reconcile facts with speech or speech with facts.

It's All Over



Here is George Hopkins, with his parachute, in which he landed from an airplane atop Devil's Tower in Wyoming. DEATH:

To a Liberal

Louis Dembitz Brandeis, noted liberal jurist, and former Supreme court justice, died in his Washington home just on the night before a new Supreme court was meeting for its first 1941-42 session. He was 84 and had retired from the Supreme court on February 13, 1939, because of ill health. It was suffering from a heart ailment that led him to retire and a severe attack of this trouble that resulted in his death. Named to the high bench by President Wilson in 1916, Brandeis had no experience as a judge before that time but he was widely knows for his activity as a lawyer on behalf of labor unions and against "high finance."

SPENDING:

Will Triple

During the first World war, American spending at the height of the struggle reached something like \$50,000,000 a day. Great Britain is way past that point now, and the expectation in Washington had been that within this fiscal year America's spending will come to about two billions a month, or about \$70,-000,000 a day.

That was the figure which U.S. Budget Director Smith estimated, and the bill would be 24 billions in the year, with an income of close to 12 billions from taxes and a deficit of about the same amount.

In this amount was included the lend-lease aid, but not the direct purchases by Britain, Russia, China or other sources.

The difference between the American and British rate of spending, Smith pointed out, was this-that two billions a month is about \$135 a year for all the citizens of the nation, whereas Britain's spending constitutes about 40 per cent of the national income.

Smith went on to state that considering better employment conditions and the busy state of the nation, probably more dollars would be left for civilian use than in predefense years.

CHURCH:

And the Reds

President Roosevelt had rammed imself into a hornet's nest with his discussion of Article 124 of the Russian constitution, which gave religious freedom guarantees to the people.

Churchmen of several faiths and congressmen took the President to task and later the President qualified his statement or explained it in the light of a hope that movements now on foot would bring religious freedom, under the constitution of Russia to her people.

This put a somewhat new light on the controversy, and the head of the Russian Orthodox church came forward to give the President support and to reveal his opinion that the days of church repression and antagonism in Russia were num-

bered. The people were "turning to God" he said, and the government was not planning to prevent this uprising of the spirit in the face of the danger of death in war.

Myron Taylor was back from his visit to the Pope, and more light on the subject of religious freedom was expected from this source.

RUSSIA:

Has 'Dunquerque'

Moscow had published the dramatic report that a large Red army unit reported trapped by the Finns or the shores of Lake Ladoga north of Leningrad had been saved by s "Dunquerque" retreat engineered

by lake vessels. The hero of the escape from the trap was Colonel Bondarev, who with his men, had been battling for 45 days.



You've been hearing lots about vitamins, so check yourself on them: Vitamin A is for resistance to infection, for growth and general wellbeing. You'll need it for your eyes, too, for poor vision and night blindness are common symptoms of the body's lack of this vitamin. You'll find it aplenty in milk, butter, vegetables green and yellow, fruits and

which you can store in the body. Vitamin B1, sometimes called thiamin, is for appetite and good diges-

It's also the one vitamin

tion. This vitamin's for good morale. If you're lazy, grouchy or nervous look into the matter. The chances are that you've been neglecting pork, liver, meat, en-

riched cereals and enriched bread and bread flour, nuts, and peas.

Vitamin B2 is sometimes called vitamin G also and also goes under the name riboflavin. If your nails have been brittle and grow slowly and break off easily or your hair and skin are generally in poor condition, add some of these good sources of vitamin B2 to your diet: milk, liver, eggs, cheese, lean meats and leafy vegetables.

Gums bleeding? Teeth decay easily? Perhaps you're missing out on vitamin C, for this is the vitamin that goes right into your system and helps you have good teeth and bones. If your diet contains plenty of citrus fruits (lemons, oranges, grapefruit), tomatoes, fresh fruits and vegetables, you won't have trouble with teeth, bones, or wounds not healing.

Vitamin D boosts vitamin C and utilize the other vitamins and minerals. Vitamin D isn't easy to find in foods, although eggs, salmon, sardines and herring contain some of it. Milk can be fortified with this vitamin and then it is called "irradiated." Most common way of getting the vitamin is either through milk of this type or by taking cod liver oil in winter, sunbaths in the summer, for it is formed in the skin

LYNN SAYS:

Here's your guide for meal planning for health: Milk: 34 to 1 quart a day for

each child and nursing mothers. pint a day for everyone else. Vegetables: I or more servings a day of the leafy green or yellow vegetables; 1 serving of potatoes or sweet potatoes.

Fruits: 1 serving of tomatoes, grapefruit, or oranges a day; 1 serving of another fruit. Eggs: 1 a day or 4 to 5 a week.

Lean meat, fish, poultry: 1 or more servings a day. About ¾ of a pound of meat or fish is the day's quota.

Cereals: 1 serving daily of enriched cereal Bread and Butter: At every meal.

Sweets: some sweets occasionally to satisfy the appetite. This may be included in the dessert or an occasional piece of candy.

You need lots of iron so don't miss a day on iron foods. That means you'll be eating plenty of liver, molasses, oatmeal, dried apricots, eggs, whole wheat, lean beef, cabbage, oysters and raisins from now

Iron by itself is apt to be a bit lazy. It needs copper to make it get to work, so be sure to have prunes often, whole-grain cereals, oatmeal, dried fruits, liver and oysters at some one of your three meals.

Iodine spells power. It is released to your system by the thyroid gland which is near the Adam's apple. Sluggishness, mental and physical, are the result of lack of iodine or thyroid deficiency.

Seafood contains iodine as well as garden vegetables. Salt has been iodized to help out general deficiency, and cranberries if raised in lowcalcium into action, makes them lying lands near the sea are a popular source of iodine.

Magnesium balances calcium, and as you're getting your milk you'll be getting magnesium, too. Other sources are green leafy vegetables. That's the line-up. You'll notice that many foods contain both or several kinds of essential minerals and vitamins. Of course that should make the job you have to do easier. *Liver and Vegetable Pie.

(Serves 6 to 8) ¼ pound salt pork 1¾ cups cooked pork liver, cut in pieces

Cover casserole with the following: Mix 1 cup sifted flour with 1 teaspoon double-acting baking powder and ¼ teaspoon salt. Cut in 3 tablespoons shortening, add milk (about 6 tablespoons) and mix until soft dough is formed. Pat to 1/4inch thickness, cut several slits on top. Fit over casserole. Bake in a hot (450 degrees) oven, 20 minutes. (Released by Western Newspaper Union.)
