

# Expect Capacity Crowd At Chamber's Banquet

## Reagan Brown Guest Speaker

Bovina's 11th annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Banquet, featuring charcoal broiled rib-eye steaks, will be held at 7:30 p.m. Thursday in Bovina Schools Cafeteria.

Reagan V. Brown of Texas A&M University will be the speaker for the event, which is expected to have a crowd in excess of 200.

Brown is one of Texas' most popular speakers. He holds three degrees from Texas A&M University, and has studied at Cornell, Colorado State and Utah State Universities. In addition, he has completed the

American Association of Land Grant Colleges and State Universities Communication Training Program held at Michigan State University, Sales and Business Management Course conducted by International Harvester Company, and the National Education Association's Laboratory for Group Development. He is a professional sociologist with

the Agricultural Extension Service and is a recognized authority on community development and human relations.

He is responsible for the Texas Community Improvement Program sponsored by the electric utility companies and conducted by Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Working with local county agents and home demonstration

agents, Brown has helped more than 1,000 communities in programs designed to make the communities more beautiful, prosperous and better places in which to live. He is often called "Mr. Community Improvement."

He has served as a county agent in three counties and is past president of various civic organizations. A veteran of the

69th Infantry Division, he was wounded in the Battle of the Bulge and discharged with the rank of captain.

Equally at home in academic circles or at rural community meetings, Brown's sparkling style and down to earth philosophy has made him a favorite speaker at numerous functions.

Among other honors, he was

chosen in 1968 as Texas Man of the Year in agriculture by the Progressive Farmer magazine, recently chosen by the Former Students Association of Texas A&M University for the Faculty Distinguished Achievement Award, and a recipient of the Superior Service Award by the University's Agricultural Extension Service.

Brown is a community builder, ambassador for Texas, Sunday School teacher, father, Aggie, and a champion for the development of a prosperous agriculture, and the acceleration (Continued on Page 6)

Tomorrow (Thursday) night is the time for the annual banquet of Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture and we'll go on record as giving one of those Cajun "gar-OON-tees" that the meal will be as good as you've ever stuck a fork in at a similar event --- unless it might have been a previous chamber banquet here.

The financial managers of the chamber's business do a tremendous job or else they wouldn't be able to provide a great banquet, complete with outstanding speaker and charcoal rib-eye steak, for \$3.50 per!

We reckon as how you can't get a deal like that anywhere else in the world.

We understand that Jerry McClarren's buddies are talking to him about the high cost of coyote hunting. They point out that the cost is especially high when pickups are damaged while taking part in the semi-popular sport.

We don't know anything about it. We've just been listening, that's all.

This week is an important one, too, because Saturday is the day for casting ballots in local political races --- school and city.

We've heard only a little more than a minimum of talk about either of the races, but maybe it isn't close enough to election-time yet. Each race has one more candidate than can be elected. That's a bare minimum of competition, but it's competition, nonetheless, and none of the candidates will get an unopposed ride into office.

The lack of candidates shouldn't keep voters away from the polls, however. Those elected will be put into office for the same length of time as the winners would be if there were a dozen candidates in each race.

They'll be spending your tax money and making policies concerning your school and city for months to come.

If you're qualified to do so, you need to express your opinion at the polls.

Voting is cheaper than it used to be, too. Up until a few years ago, there was a \$1.75 poll tax, remember. Time and progress got rid of that state rule, however, and now you can become a qualified voter simply by registering.

So, the price isn't too high, most people will agree. And voting gives you the right to belly-ache when things don't do to suit. Surely everyone needs to put himself in that position.

And while we're encouraging voters to go to the polls Saturday, the turnout here is expected to be light. This is especially true if the number of absentee votes cast can be used as a measuring stick.

But there's still some time left before voting day and interest could pick up between now and then.

Reckon these track meets they schedule on Saturdays is what makes the wind blow on those days?

# School, City Elections Here Saturday

## Voters Select 2 Councilmen

Voters will go to the polls Saturday to select two city councilmen when the annual election is held in American Legion Hall here.

Two positions on the six-member city council will become vacant when the expirations of the terms of Vernon Willard and Vernon Estes at the end of the next month.

In absentee balloting which ended Monday, Mrs. Mary Ruth Martin, city secretary, reports that no ballots were cast.

The polls will open at 8 a.m. Saturday morning and close at 6 p.m. J. E. Sherrill will serve as election judge.

Filing their names as candidates for re-election were the

two incumbents, Estes and Willard, both farmers.

Petitioned as a candidate was Roy Allen, manager of Cyanamide Farm Supply.

The two candidates who receive the highest vote totals will be named to two-year terms on the city council.

Other members of the council who have a year remaining on their present terms are Mayor Chas. W. Flynn, Johnnie Horn, B. L. Marshall and Dolph Moten.

Those casting ballots must be registered voters and reside within the city limits of Bovina.

Little interest has been shown in this year's election which saw the three candidates filing just prior to the filing deadline March 10.

## Car Clean-Up Plans Continue

In the continuing effort to rid the city of junked and abandoned automobiles, Mayor Chas. W. Flynn announces that arrangements have been made with a Hereford firm to move the vehicles from here.

Flynn says that Hereford Iron and Metal Works will pick up the cars here from a central location.

Billie Sudderth has been contracted to move the individual automobiles from their locations within the city limits to the central point.

People interested in having cars moved from their property are asked to contact Sudderth, the mayor says.

In an ordinance passed last summer by the city council, a "junk car" is considered to be any automotive vehicle which does not have a current license plate and safety inspection sticker.

The removal of the junk cars is a part of an overall clean-up plan for the city.

# City Gets First Sales Tax Money

A check for \$2,425.59, Bovina's first dividend from the city sales tax which went into effect October 1 of last year, was received from the state comptroller's office last week.

The amount received was for the city's portion of sales taxes collected in October, November and December of last year. The state returns the city's portion of the tax quarterly.

If the tax continues at approximately the same rate as it did in the final quarter of '70, the total for the city will be in the neighborhood of \$10,000 yearly.

Approved by voters in a June 6, 1970 election, the tax added an additional one per cent to the state tax of 3.25, making it 4.25.

Mayor Charles Flynn states the amount was pretty much what the city council had anticipated and perhaps a little more. "This sales tax money is sufficient to meet our obligations on our bond indebtedness and allows us to make some badly needed improvements in the city," Mayor Flynn says.

In the race are Mrs. Charles Corn, housewife and former math teacher in Bovina High School, and the three incumbents, Lawrence Jamerson, Leslie McCain and Leon Ware, all farmers.

Board members with one year remaining on their present

terms are Earl Whitten and Thomas Rhodes. Those with two years remaining to serve are Robert Read and Edwin Lide.

## Alfred Mills Rites Friday

Funeral services for Truett Alfred Mills, 39, a resident of Bovina since 1950, were held Friday afternoon in Bovina Church of Christ.

Officiating was Cecil Bunch, minister, assisted by Alfred White, minister of East Ama-

rillo Church of Christ and a former minister here. Burial was in Parmer County Memorial Park by Claborn Funeral Home of Friona.

Mr. Mills died Wednesday in High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo from complications suffered when he was struck by a truck February 21. The accident occurred as he was working with the Texas Highway Department in a blizzard near Summerfield. He was first taken to Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona, then transferred to Deaf Smith County Hospital in Hereford and finally transferred to Amarillo.

His condition was reported to be improved shortly before his death.

Born June 17, 1931, in Hackberry, he had worked 20 years for the Texas Highway Department here. He was a veteran of the Korean Conflict, past president of Texas Public Employees Association, District Five, a member of Bovina Volunteer Fire Department and a deacon in Bovina Church of Christ.

Mr. Mills married the former Miss Pauline (Polly) Webb December 24, 1953.

Survivors include his wife; four daughters, Patti, Deborah, Karla and Kara, all of the home; and three brothers, M. E. of Falls Church, Va., Willard B. of Austin and Wayne of Friona.

Palbearers were Wilfred Sikes, Herman Estes, Doyle Wasson, Weldon Moody, Bob Bradshaw and Don Stone, all employees of the Texas Highway Department here.

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

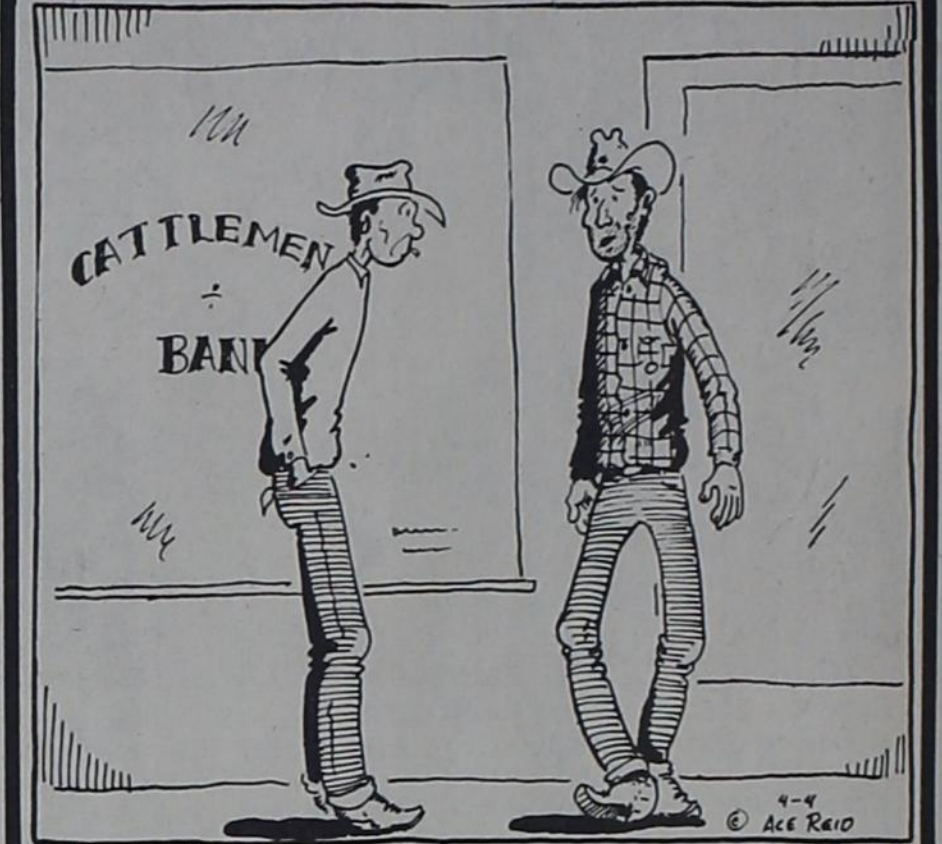
In the Thursday night service, Rev. Pelman will speak on the words of the Sixth Petition of the Lord's Prayer, "Lead us not into temptation." "Comparing our temptation with the suffering Savior's temptation in Gethsemane, we learn that He overcame by keeping his eye fixed on the goal and purpose of His life and by seeking in all things to do His Father's will," is a quote from Pelman's sermon.

Dwellers with limited lawn and garden areas must make every bit of space count for spring planting, reminds Everett Janne, Extension landscaping specialist at Texas A&M University.

Even a small yard can be adorned with a small tree, Janne says. He suggests crab-apple, redbud or evergreen yaupon, planted in the center of the patio area or at the edge of the garden.

Plant trees on the southern or western side of your lawn so they will provide some shade during the summer months, he adds.

For summer patio color, the specialist suggests bulbs, flowering annuals and perennials to provide a sequence of bloom from early spring until late fall. Daffodils, narcissi, tulips, forsythia, hyacinths and other spring blooming plants will give color in the early spring months.

Janne says that annuals, such as petunias, zinnias and marigolds, and perennials, such as gallardia, perennial alyssum and woody shrubs like rose bushes, will create mid-season color. For flowers late in the fall, plant chrysanthemums, dahlias, autumn crocus and tuberose. In South Texas, pansies and calendulas provide winter color.

If your lawn space is too small for any planting, add a few potted trees and shrubs, Janne suggests. Dwarf-type evergreens, for example, will grow well in almost any kind of container. Use vases, bowls or even wooden containers. For long life, some type of drainage, in the container is essential.

A favorite recipe of Mrs. Truman McKillip's is:

**CHERRY ROYAL TORTE**  
4 egg whites  
1/4 teaspoon salt

1/4 teas. cream of tartar  
1 cup sugar  
Beat whites until frothy, add salt and cream of tartar. Beat until soft peaks form. Add sugar slowly, continue beating for 10 or 15 minutes. Add vanilla extract. Pour in buttered pie pan (9 or 10 inch). Spread evenly over bottom and pile high on sides. Place in hot oven 450 degrees F. Close door and turn off heat and leave overnight or 5 hours.

**FILLING**  
1/2 cup sugar  
2 tablespoons cornstarch  
dash of salt  
cherry juice  
1 can cherries  
whipped cream  
1 tablespoon butter extract  
Combine sugar, cornstarch and salt. Add cherry juice and cook until thick. Add butter extract and cherries. Chill. Pour into torte shell. Top with whipped cream or Dream Whip.

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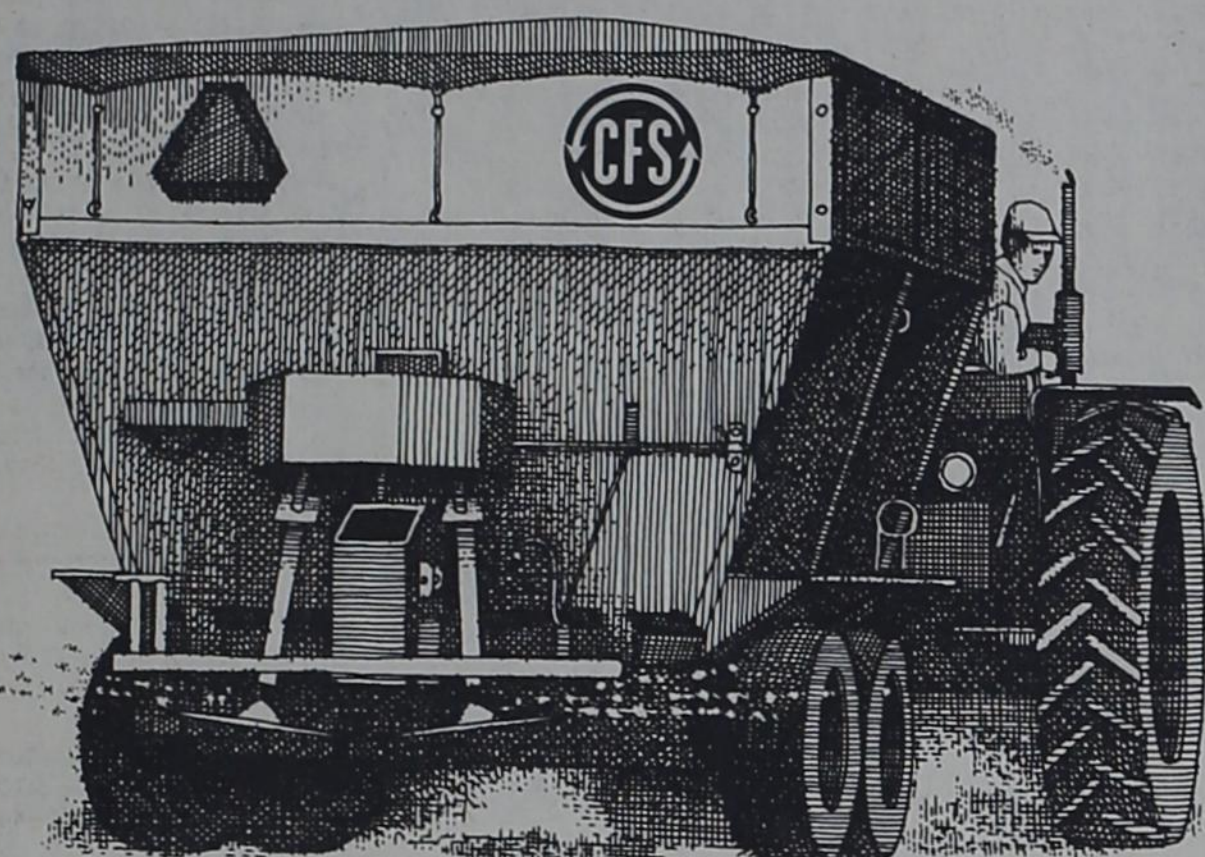
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**E. D. Ashcraft Dies In Colo.**

 Survivors include a brother, Clarence Ashcraft, of Friona.



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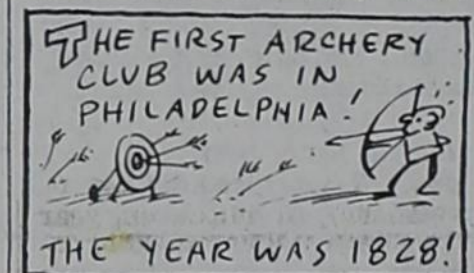

the Booster Club, welcomed the guests before a ham dinner was served.

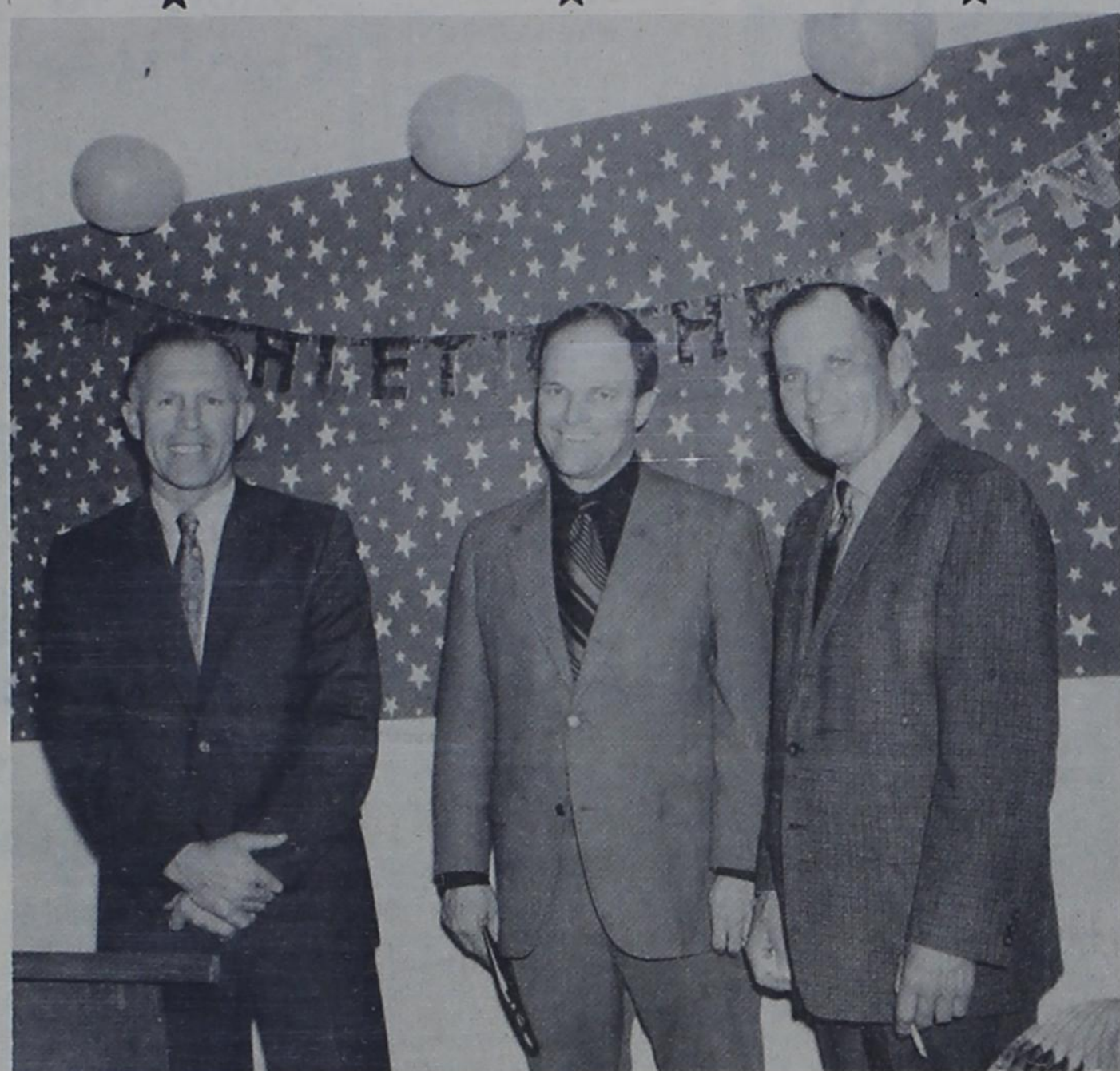
Athletic Director Gib Hough introduced the speaker as a man who had compiled an impres-

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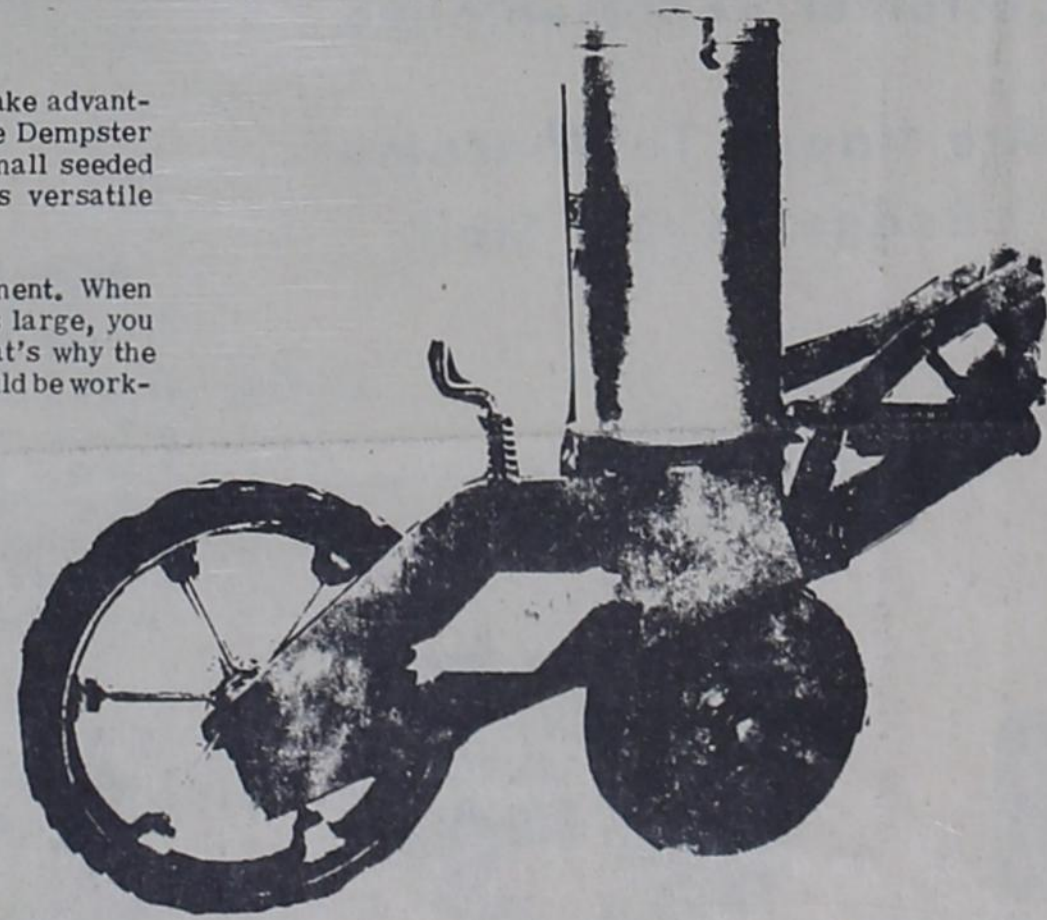
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
