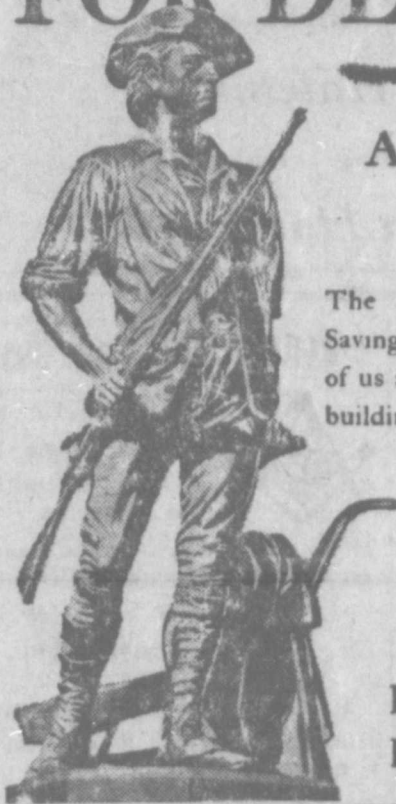

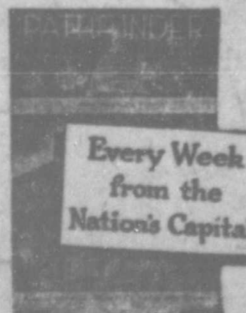

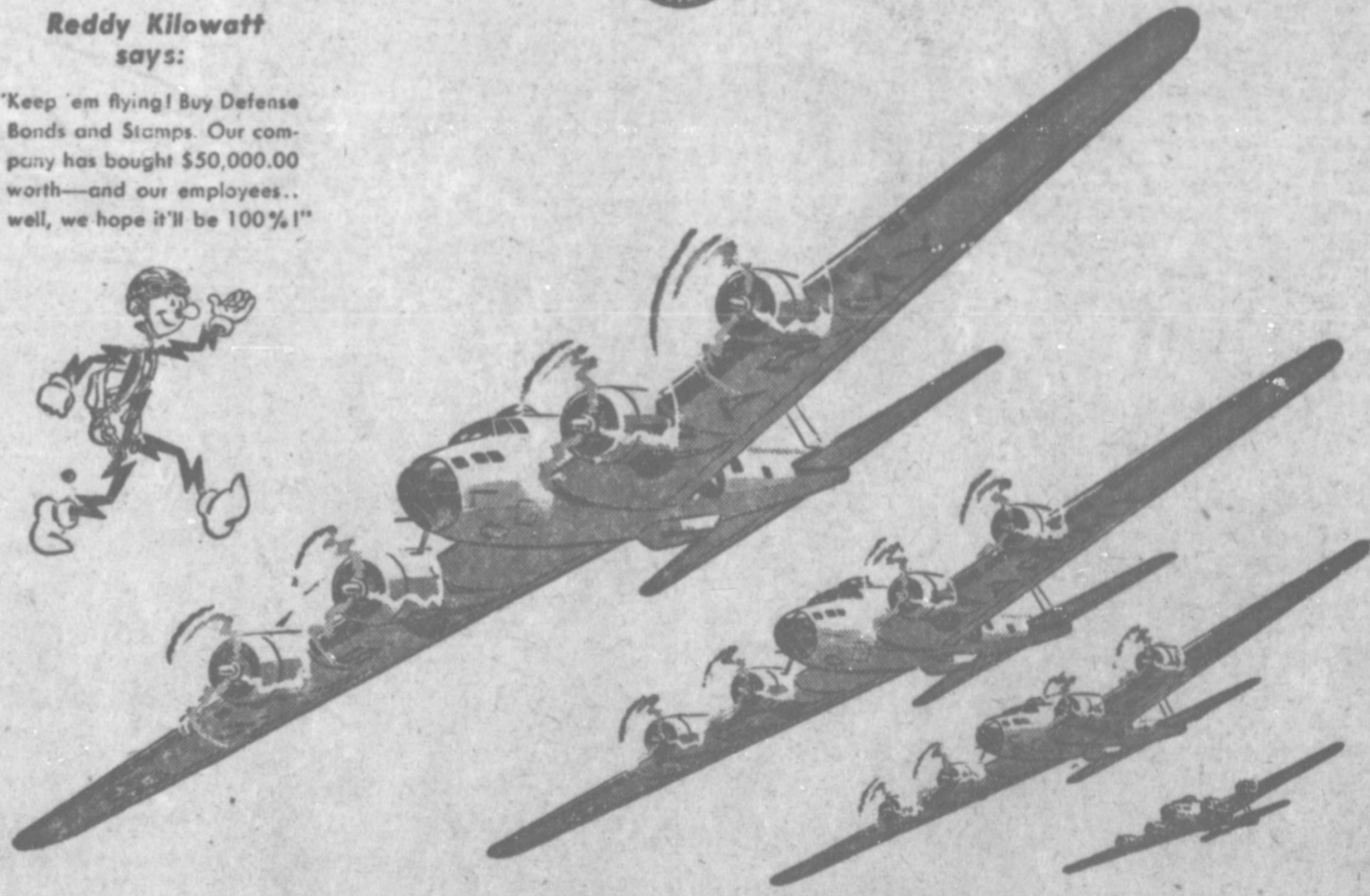

Highway Information

1 No passenger car can be registered under the present law as a farm vehicle. It must have a permanent bed or fixture designed for the transportation of property.

2 A bonafide farm trailer is exempt from registration as long as it is used for hauling farm products to the market or supplies to the farm. The weight of the above type load and the trailer must not exceed 4000 lbs to be exempt.

3 Every car, truck, and bus is required to have two burning white lights to the front, and one burning red light to the rear and in addition if the total outside width is over 70 inches it must have clearance lights. Every motorcycle and bicycle must have one burning headlight and one burning red light to the rear and in addition every trailer must have one burning tail light and if such trailer be over 70 inches in width it shall be equipped with two clearance lights.

4 The total width of any vehicle (car, bus, truck or trailer) including the load shall not be more than 98 inches. Except a farm tractor which shall not exceed 9 feet. Implements of husbandry such as hay rakes, combines, etc are exempt from width restriction only when moved temporarily upon the highway.

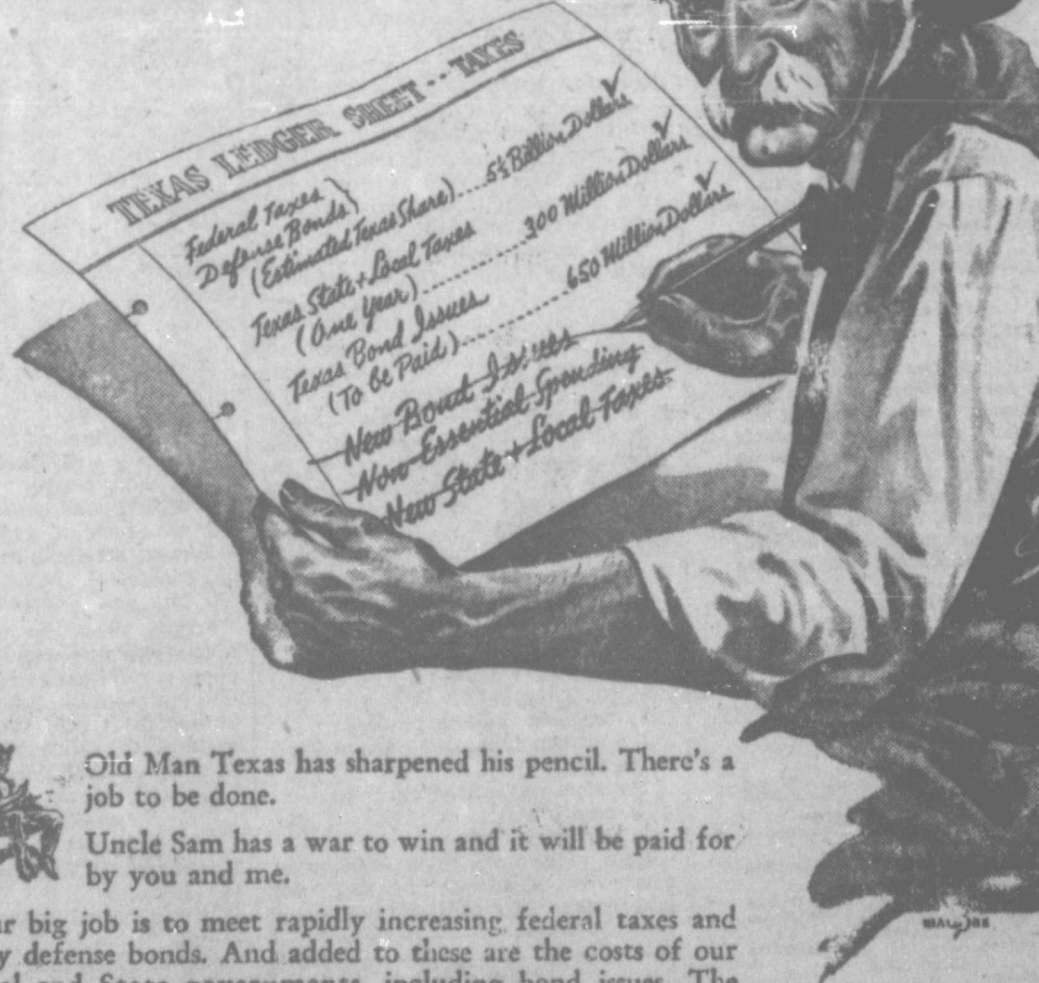
