Election

Over 1700 votes were cast in Donley County in last Saturday's primary election, although most of the county officials were re-elected without opposition. There was a possibility of a runoff in the County Judge race, where incumbent R. Y. King lacked about 10 votes of a majority over Walker Lane and Harry Bramley. In the other contested county office Mrs. Margaret V. Thompson was re-elected County Treasurer over David Johnson. County officials with no opponents included County Attorney John Knorrp, County Clerk Helen Wiedman, Sheriff Guy Wright, Commissioner J. A. Tollett, Justice of Peace of Prec. 3, W. I. Kains was again elected Precinct chairman here.

State Representative Eunice Favore and District Attorney John Deaver had no opponents, and Congressman Eugene Worley was re-elected by a 10 to 1 vote over Lynn Miller.

Farmers to Save \$7,000.00

Farmers and ranchmen of this territory served by the Hedley National Farm Loan Association will save approximately \$7,000 during the next 2 years through continued low interest rates on Federal Land Bank and Land Bank Commissioner loans, Mr. O. E. Killough, Secretary Treasurer of the association, reported Monday.

The saving, Mr. Killough explained, results from legislation recently passed by Congress, which continues through June 30, 1944, the 8 1/2 percent interest rate on long term Federal Land Bank and Land Bank Commissioner loans.

The Hedley National Farm Loan Association has approximately \$255,000 in loans outstanding to 150 borrowers.

S. J. R. No. 20
A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the
Constitution of the State of
Texas by amending Section 33 of
Article 16, of the Constitution of
Texas so as to permit the account-
ing officers of this State to draw
and pay warrants for salaries to
officers of the United States
Army or Navy who are assigned
to duties in State Institutions of
higher education.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE
LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE
OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33 of
Article 16, of the Constitution
of the State of Texas, be amend-
ed so as to read as follows:

"Section 33. The accounting offi-
cers of this State shall neither
draw nor pay a warrant upon
the Treasury in favor of any per-
son for salary or compensation
as agent, officer or appointee,
who holds at the same time any
other office or position of honor,
trust or profit, under this State
or the United States, except as
prescribed in this Constitution.
Provided, that this restriction as
to the drawing and paying of
warrants upon the Treasury shall
not apply to officers of the Na-
tional Guard Reserve, the Na-
tional Guard Reserve, the Offi-
cers Reserve Corps of the United
States, nor to enlisted men of the
National Guard, the National
Guard Reserve, and the Offi-
cers Reserve of the United
States, nor to retired officers of
the United States Army, Navy,
and Marine Corps, and retired
warrant officers and retired en-
listed men of the United States
Army, Navy, and Marine Corps,
nor to officers of the United
States Army or Navy who are as-
signed to duties in State Institu-
tions of higher education."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitu-
tional amendment shall be sub-
mitted to a vote of the qualified
electors of this State at an elec-
tion to be held throughout the
State on the third day of Novem-
ber, 1929, at which all ballots
shall have indicated thereon:

"For the Constitutional amend-
ment proposing the appropriate
amendment of this State to draw and
pay warrants for salaries to offi-
cers of the United States Army or
Navy who are assigned to duties
in State Institutions of higher
education."

"Against the Constitutional
Amendment permitting the ac-
counting officers of this State to
draw and pay warrants for
salaries to officers of the United
States Army or Navy who are
assigned to duties in State Institu-
tions of higher education."

Each voter shall scratch out
one of said clauses on the bal-
lot, leaving the one expressing
his vote on the proposed amend-
ment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue
the necessary proclamation for
said election, and have the same
published as required by the
Constitution and laws of this
State, and the sum of Five
Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or
so much thereof as may be nec-
essary, is hereby appropriated,
from any funds in the State
Treasury, not otherwise appro-
priated to defray the expenses of
printing said proclamation and
of holding said election.

S. J. R. No. 21

A JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an amendment to the
Constitution of the State of
Texas authorizing the Legislature
to appropriate Seventy-five
Thousand (\$75,000) Dollars or
so much thereof as may be nec-
essary to pay claims incurred by
John Tarleton Agricultural Col-
lege for the construction of a
building on the campus of such
college pursuant to deficiency au-
thorization by the Governor of
Texas on August 21st 1927.

Section 1. That the Constitu-
tion of the State of Texas, be
amended by adding a new sec-
tion as follows:

"The Legislature is authorized
to appropriate so much money as
may be necessary, not to exceed
Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000)
Dollars to pay claims incurred by
John Tarleton Agricultural Col-
lege for the construction of a
building on the campus of such
college pursuant to deficiency au-
thorization by the Governor of
Texas on August 21, 1927."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitu-
tional amendment shall be sub-
mitted to a vote of the qualified
electors of this State at the next
General election to be held on
the first Monday after the first
Monday in November, 1929, at
which all ballots shall have
indicated thereon: "For the con-
stitutional amendment authoriz-
ing the Legislature to pay for
building constructed for John
Tarleton Agricultural College;"

"Against the constitutional
amendment authorizing the Leg-
islature to pay for building con-
structed for John Tarleton Agri-
cultural College."

Each voter shall scratch out
one of said clauses on the bal-
lot, leaving the one expressing
his vote on the proposed amend-
ment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue
the necessary proclamation for
said election, and have the same
published as required by the
Constitution and laws of this
State. The expenses of print-
ing and holding the election for
such amendment shall be paid out
of money appropriated made by
law.

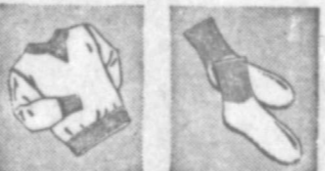

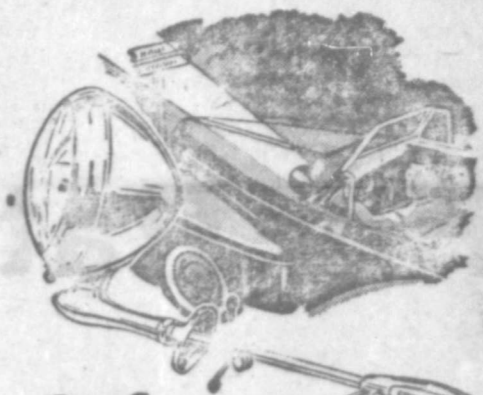

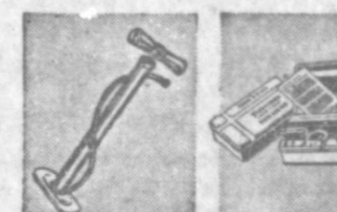

S. J. R. No. 20
A JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:
"Section 33. The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, nor to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the third day of November, 1942, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:
"For the Constitutional amendment permitting the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."
"Against the Constitutional Amendment permitting the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballots, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated from any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of printing said proclamation and of holding said election.
