





AIR MONSTERS:

Things to Come

Reading like a tale from the pen of Jules Verne, the story of two super-gigantic cargo planes was unfolded in Washington by aviation en-gineers. Senate committees heard

the stories. Details of a huge plywood plane were disclosed by Dr. W. W. Christmas, technical aviation engineer. The plywood carrier, weighing 1,120,000 pounds, would be both a cargo and battle plane. It would be a 60,000 horsepower, two hull plane with 400 foot wingspread and with wings 16 feet thick, with a speed of about 350 miles an hour. It would carry 3,000 men. It would carry a rack of torpedoes weighing 20,000 pounds. Dr. Christmas pointed out that the torpedoes would have a striking force of 19,000,000 pounds when dropped. "A battleship deck would be like wet paper when one of these bombs hit it," he said.

The second plane was a revolu-tionary type of amphibian flying cargo plane, which would be lifted and propelled by a combination of engines, helium gas and air tunnels. The engineers are Horace Chapman Young and Eric Langlands of the Aerodynamics Research corporation

A single wing combination cargofighter-carrier, the plane would have a flying deck of approximately 200 feet, from which 12 fighter planes could take off. It would carry enough helium gas to lift 36 tons and with its engines could lift 70 tons. Four tunnels would run through the wing. Engineers in these tunnels would create a semivacuum, whose suction would supply pulling power while the propellers gave it thrusting power. Its speed would be about 200 miles an hour.

While there appeared to be a preference for single girls, married women are not prohibited from volunteering. Unmarried women will have to agree not to marry while in training-a one-month period.

Soviet officials had other troubles, too. There were reports out of the Don valley that large rings of fifth columnists had been uncovered. Many of the spies in these groups were quickly executed as they were caught trying to co-operate with Nazi parachute troops who were dropping behind the Soviet main lines.

Meanwhile, through England and the United States the cry was get-ting louder for military officials to establish the much-discussed second front. From widely diversified groups and sections came the urging. There was considerable agitation for this move for many people feared the United Nations would suffer a most severe blow should Russia fail to last the year on the European side of the Ural mountains.

ALEUTIANS: 10,000 Japs

Breaking an official silence, a navy spokesman officially estimated that the Japanese have succeeded in putting "not more than 10,000" troops into the Aleutian island area and at the same time announced there was no evidence that the Pribilof island to the north had been occupied by the Nipponese.

The statement came in answer to a report made by the Alaskan delegate to congress, Anthony J. Dimond, that between 20,000 and 25,000 Jap troops were on the Aleutians and that the Pribilofs had been occupied.

Questioned about Dimond's reports, the spokesman said that "we believe that not more than 10,000 Japanese are in the Aleutians, probably one-half ashore and one-half afloat."

The Japs gained a foothold in the Aleutians on June 3. So far, the navy has confirmed the presence of Japs only on three of the islands: Attu, Agattu and Kiska, at the western end of the chain. The Pribilofs Otter and Waldrus. The latter two are small and uninhabited. PETRILLO SAYS 'NO':

President Roosevelt told his press conference there were three main reasons for the current meat shortage: (1) this is the off-season for beef; (2) people have more purchasing power now, with which to buy better cuts of meat; and (3) around 4,000,000 men under arms are now eating much more meat than they ever ate on their own dinner tables at home.

Meanwhile Agriculture Secretary Claude Wickard reported that there may be some relief in the temporary beef shortage this fall when more cattle are brought in off the range. But other sources looked with disfavor on what effect this would have on the normal spring beef market.

GIANT PLANES: From Shipyards

There was a new answer to the

shipping problems of the United Nations looming on the horizon. It was an unofficial agreement from the War Production board to give the "green light" to plans of Henry K. Kaiser, West Coast shipbuilder, to build giant cargo and troop transport planes in nine of the nation's shipyards.

First hitch to be overcome in the suggested set-up was the granting of authority by military officials to release engines and other parts needed in the building of aircraft for the army and navy.

Donald Nelson, WPB head, appeared to be willing to proceed with the plan if these materials could be obtained without hampering the war effort. This came as a surprise as WPB first voiced skepticism on the plan.

Kaiser's idea calls for the conversion of three shipyards on each coast to produce 5,000 flying boats a year. The ships would be of 100-ton de-sign fashioned after the 70-ton flying boat Mars, now in active use. Support of Glenn Martin, Baltimore bomber builder, Tom Girdler, steel edge of production problems of plane building would be sought, according to Kaiser.

8. J. R. No. 20

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of

higher education. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 33. The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor. trust of profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the Nat-ional Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organ-ized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy. and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps. nor to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the third day of November, 1942, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment permitting the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education.

"Against the Constitutional Amendment permitting the counting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who as assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballots, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this

U.S. AIR FOWER: Around the Globe

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

From widely scattered sections of the world's fighting front came reports of the increasing strength of America's hard-striking air power. Most dramatic was the announcement from London that for the first time the United States army air force had made an attack on Nazi occupied Europe. Six bombers, American made and American thing the Nazis had was blasted manned, took off and during a daylight raid smashed Nazi planes and The Red navy had to retire from it troops on the ground at three Hol- to less secure bases in the Black land airdromes. Later enemy ships were attacked off the Dutch coast.


One interesting sidelight of the raid was that its principal hero, Capt. Charles C. Kegelman of El Reno, Okla., was awarded the Distinguished Service cross by Maj. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, commander in chief of U.S. forces in the European theater, and Kegelman thus became the first member of the 1942 AEF to be decorated for gallantry in action against the enemy in Europe.

His feat was described as a demonstration of "superior airmanship and extraordinary coolness in the saving of the lives of his crew" after the plane he was piloting was struck hard by anti-aircraft fire over the bombing target."

Chinese Front

Meanwhile, the newly installed U. S. army air force in China started things off in good fashion by shooting down five Japanese planes in a battle which came as the result of a direct challenge by the U.S. forces to the enemy.

Background to the battle was a Jap radio report that their forces in the Hengyang area would "blast the new U. S. air forces out of China" and a reply by Brig. Gen. Claire L.



Caucasus.

But before the Nazis had a chance to rest and to realign themselves, cagey Russian Marshal Semeon Timoshenko struck savagely at them and regained several villages. The Nazis in turn had their eye on the Don river and would not be stopped until this objective was won. Although another front was opening to the northwest of Moscow, the battle of Kursk-Kharkov was viewed generally as the scene of Hitler's allout 1942 offensive. For this was what he needed most of all-oil. And the winning of the Kharkov engagement meant that his goal would be much closer.

Three United Nations planes were reported missing. In addition to the Jap planes destroyed, the report added that direct hits were scored on enemy airdromes, striking runways and build-

Shortly after the FBI announced its arrest of the eight Nazi sabo-teurs who reached the U.S. via a submarine route, U. S. army headquarters in the Panama Canal Zone came through with the seizure of 20 alleged Nazi spies. It was claimed that these persons were engaged in a plot which included fueling of Nazi submarines and spotting of Allied shipping targets in the Caribbean.

Arrests were made from Panama to British Honduras, and business men, night club hostesses, trusted Canal Zone workers and shipping employees were involved.

SUBMARINES: Pacific Too?

While Washington officials had an-

nounced that convoys were being used to protect shipping in America's Atlantic coastal areas, a threat appeared in a new sector. This came in the form of dispatch

from Santiago, Chile, which dis-closed that the Chilean ministry of the navy and the Pan-American Grace airways were checking reports that submarines had been observed in the Pacific.

ALEUTIAN FOG: Lifts a Bit

Navy censorship and the dense fug that hangs over the far tip of the Jap-invaded Aleutian island chain, lifted alike to disclose that the U.S.

naval air forces had been busy. A navy communique reported that 'our aircraft returned safely" after five new raids on Kiska and Agattu. A Jap force of three transports and their escorting vessels were inflicted with undetermined damage off Agattu and four attacks were made on the Japs at Kiska.

But the best news from that area was the announcement that on Independence day U. S. submarines sent three Jap destroyers to the bottom and left a fourth severely damaged. The communique reporting these sinkings said that three destroyers were fired upon near the Jap-occupied island of Kiska and the other one near Agattu island.

EGYPT:

Rommel's Romp

While the German high command withheld any actual forecast as to the number of days it would take them to reach and capture Suez, British forces were letting nothing stand in their way of giving the Nazis the very fiercest resistance possible in the battle of Egypt. Reports from Britain's Eighth army in this sector told of a weakening of German power under the leadership of Field Marshal Erwin These reports said that Rommel. many German soldiers had advanced to the British lines in surrender because they described themselves as "too tired" to fight. His mechanized forces had ad-

vanced to a line 65 miles west of Alexandria before the British could present even a show of strength to deter him. This stand by the British, as re-

ported from Cairo, came in the form of the greatest aerial onslaught ever unleashed in the Middle East. The site of the battle was El Alamein and its pace was terrific. The British were fighting for a knockout to Rommel's already far advanced desert army. Rommel wanted to save what he had gained and push forward, of course.

Egyptian government sources said that raids had been made on the Suez canal and Premier Mustapha Nahas Pasha announced a complete blackout of Cairo.

WARNING:

From an Expert

Recognized as an expert in aviation, Maj. Alexander P. de Seversky, airplane designer and military analyst, has given the United Nations a stern warning on the importance of gaining air superiority before attempting the opening of a second land front to relieve Nazi pressure on the Russians.

On a nation-wide radio hookup, which had as its forum topic the possibility of a land and sea invasion of Europe, the former Russian army official declared that it was opinion that a costly mass invasion would not get the desired results unless the German's mastery of the air was first disposed of.

"We have no alternative but to concentrate upon an all-out aerial offensive against Germany proper In that way we offer true relief

to Russia because we help to disarm Germany by smashing its industry, transport and fuel supplies, disorganizing and demoralizing the enemy," said the major.

Aligned with Seversky was William B. Ziff, military expert, who pointed out that failure of the British to invade Norway and the recent blasting the Japs took at Midway were examples of what Britain and America would face if they tried an invasion without first getting control of the air.

On the other side of the debate were Brig. Gen. Henry J. Reilly and Wythe Williams, author and radio commentator. Their point of view was that while planes were vitally important in any invasion attempt, the invasion of Germany by land would most surely have to be made if the Nazi war machine was to be broken up.

ERSATZ RUBBER:

At Less Cost While cost of production is the least of worries in the government's projects for making synthetic rubber, officials are now learning that it costs less than at first estimated.

Two major plants are now in production and Arthur B. Newhall, rubber co-ordinator, has issued a statement to the effect that the 800,000 ton-a-year program will not use up all the \$650,000,000 which congress had allocated to it.
