AUSTIN - I had a good deal of fun this week asking my colleagues in the Senate if they had a state championship girls' basketball team from any division. Most of them just gave me a blank look. A couple who follow high school basketball responded to my question with a smile and the answer, "Heck no, Senator, you've got them all." They are right. In what I believe is a first in the history of high school basketball, all five divisional state championships were won by teams from Senate District 31. The team members and the coaches from Nazareth, Tulia, Abernathy, Levelland and Amarillo

lated for their achievements. In the 71st regular session, the following six special sessions and the first two months of the 72nd session, the debate over education has focused primarily on how we pay for it. I think this is due in large part to the fact that the system is working. Interscholastic athletics play a very valuable role in the education of those

who are fortunate enough to participate. I say fortunate because not everyone has the ability to make the team. (I never did.) But for those who do there are invaluable lessons to be learned.

Volumes have been written on teamwork, discipline and goal setting. But participating in a team sport gives the student a learning medium far more vivid than most textbooks. Every girl on every one of these state championship teams can tell you the value of hard work otherwise known as practice, practice; discipline otherwise known as training, training and more training; and goal setting otherwise known as staying focused on winning one game at a time. These lessons will likely be remembered unlike those of world history and Latin verb conjugation. They will serve these girls well for the rest of their lives.

I introduced and passed in the Senate a resolution commemorating the accomplishment of each of these teams. Such a resolution is a way for the Texas Senate to give a pat on the back to the girls, the coaches and the schools that made these state championships happen. Education means many things to many people. The meaning and content of public education has been debated endlessly in the Texas Legislature. In my book, the vitally important lessons of team work, training, discipline and goal setting are an integral part of a quality education.

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
