# Farwell Entrant **Claims** 1st Place


The other contestants getting ten games right were Darrell Collier, L. F. Jacobs, Donna Malcom, Mona Smith and Haden Walling.

A George Mahon Re-election committee for Parmer County has been appointed, it was announced this week by Hollis Horton, county coordinator.

Members of the committee are Wesley Barnett, A.L. Black, Jack Kassahn, Jerry Don Glover, Wendol Christian, Charles Aycock and Larry Potts.

"The committee has begun its active campaign to work for the re-election of Congressman Mahon," Horton says.

Mahon, one of the senior members of the House of Representatives, and chairman of the powerful Appropriations Committee, has his first opponent in this campaign in 30 years.

"We are attempting to stress how important it is for our area to keep such an influential representative for our area as George Mahon in the nation's capital," Horton says.

He pointed out that Mahon has long worked to help the farmers of this region, and that he will be a vital influence in shaping the new farm bill to be written by congress next year.

"It would take a new congressman at least 40 years to get to the point that Mahon occupies today," Horton said, in arguing for the Lubbock resident's re-election.

Texas Monthly recently rated Mahon number one in effectiveness among the state's congressmen.

## Swine Flu Shots **Ready At Friona**

Swine flu shots will be administered at Parmer County Community Hospital three days a week beginning Saturday, October 9, it was announced this week by Dr. Paul L. Spring, county health officer.

Dr. Spring said that the vaccine will be given Saturday mornings, Monday afternoons and Wednesday afternoons until everyone has had an opportunity to have a shot, or the vaccine is exhausted. There will be no charge for the immunizations. Shots will be given from 9-12 on Saturdays and from 1:30-5 p.m. Mondays and Wednesdays.

"We had intended to hold clinics at various locations in Parmer County, but the supply of vaccine will not permit it at this time," Dr. Spring said. He indicated that the first supply of vaccine received this week gave the hospital enough for about 1600 shots.

The county health officer said that if a large supply of vaccine is received later, then clinics would be set up in other locations, such as Bovina and Lazbuddie. The doctor at Farwell has a supply of the vaccine," he said.

Dr. Spring said that there was two

types of swine flu vaccine available. The Bivalent type is for peole 65 years of age and over, or those with chronic illnesses, such as heart, lung or liver diseases.

The other type is the Monovalent type vaccine, for people 18 through 65. The Bivalent type will immunize a person against either type of flu, but the Monovalent type will only guard against the swine flu strain. For those under 18 years of age.

the only ones recommended to have the shots are children with chronic diseases--otherwise, it is not recommended.

"We are recommending that area residents go ahead and get the shots. It may be December before we get enough vaccine for all Parmer County residents, but we should eventually get enough," Dr. Spring said.

The hospital auxiliary plans to assist the doctors in administering the shots.

As is the case with other types of flu shots, it is not recommended that you take the shots if you have an infection, fever, a cold, or have a sensitivity to eggs.



We don't encourage those in the running for grand prize to attempt to pick a tie, because in most cases it turns out to be a wasted effort.



**Ponies To Visit** 

The Bovina Mustangs will take on the unbeaten Farwell Steers Friday night at Farwell as both teams begin district play.

Bovina holds a 3-2 record while cross-county rival Farwell holds a 5-0 record after their big win over Boys Ranch last week. Farwell bested the Ranchers in a battle of the unbeatens, 18-14.

"We played a poor first half, but came out the second half and got after them," said Steer head coach Van Tom Whatley.

"We drove the ball about 60 yards in the last four minutes to run out the clock, and I thought that was one of the key factors of the game. I think our kids really wanted it a little worse," he concluded.

The win moved the Steers to 5-0 and dropped Boys Ranch to 4-1.

The Steers have size, speed and experience off their 2-8 team of last year, so far they have utilized all these factors.

Farwell had trouble keeping teams from scoring against them last year, but they have improved upon their defense and have held opponents to only 44 points this season, the best record in District 3-A.

Last year, the Steers' opponents scored an average of 26.6 points per game against them. This year they have cut the margin to 8.8.

The offense is also much improved, scoring 185 points so far this season, for an average of 37 points per game.

Some of the reasons for the Steers' potent offense this year are 6-4 quarterback Russ Jones, who was outstanding as a sophomore last year, and fullback Mike Goettsch, who is considered one of the league's best. "Mike probably has more raw football talent than anyone we have," says head coach Whatley. One of the Steers' reasons for optimism up front is 6-1, 175 pound guard-tackle Steve Meeks.
