Officials Attend School Finance Meet

Leon Ware, board president, and L.F. Jacobs, school superintendent attended a school finance meeting called by Governor Briscoe in Austin last week.

About 2,500 lawmakers and educators from around the state

were in attendance to hear the governor's recommendations on school finance that he will present to the 65th legislature.

The governor released new market value figures for each school district in the state and will recommend the state's share for basic education costs increase from 75 per cent to 90 per cent.

The valuation figure from the governor's committee set the valuation figure for the Bovina School District at approximately \$84,000,000 compared to the local figures of approximately \$64,000,000 for this year.

The Bovina School District would gain an estimated \$68,000 in school funds from the state under the new program, if passed by the legislature. This would help make up the loss of \$82,000 that the local school district lost in state aid the last two years under the finance bill passed in 1975. This loss in state aid money of \$82,000 has been a major reason for the local tax increases along with the increased costs in utilities, maintenance, and supplies.

Naturally, before any planning can be done by school officials they will have to wait and see what the legislators do to the proposals by the governor when the legislature convenes in January. It will be late spring before results from any new finance program for schools will be known.

DRAKE STILL LEADS

Race Tightens In Football Contest

The race for grand prize in the Bovina Blade's annual football contest tightened last week as the leader, Bobby Drake of Friona, managed only a fifty per cent score.

There are three weeks remaining in the annual contest, including the current week's.

Drake scored only a seven for the week to go with his season score of 82, to give him 89 after ten weeks. L.F. Jacobs, who had been ten points back, could only gain one point on Drake, after posting a score of eight, but Greg Hromas came up with a score of 12, and is now tied with Jacobs with a score of 88, just a point behind Drake.

Bunched a point back of these two contestants in third place are Wayne Gilliland of Muleshoe, Joel Nelson and Lary Sides, all of whom have scores of 87.

In all, 29 contestants have scores of 80 or over. With 42 points still to be earned, it's anyone's ball game as far as the grand prize is concerned.

In the weekly contest, Mary Hernandez correctly picked 13 of the 14 contest games, and won the weekly first prize of \$7.50. Only a missed pick on the Plains-Seagraves game caused her to miss a special prize of \$15.00, offered to the first person to correctly pick all 14 games. Mrs. Hernandez' score of 13 is the tops for the contest thus far.

The weekly slate was only the third out of ten weeks that no tie games adorned the list of 14 games. In addition to weekly prizes totaling \$15.50, contestants are shooting for a season grand prize of \$100 in cash. Only one grand prize is offered. In case of a tie for the grand prize, tie-breaker scores for the involved contestants will be tallied for the season.

Here, Adlai Stevenson and Estes Kefauver, the Democratic nominees for the nation's two highest offices, took a clear-cut victory. It was not, however, an overwhelming one, and pre-election guesses had predicted the margin would be wider.

Bovina's \$25,000 city bond election Thursday was defeated. Final totals for the two propositions—one for water tax bonds and the other for sewer tax bonds—was 88-80 and 90-58.

Members of Bovina Cemetery Association met with the city commission Monday night in the city hall during a regular meeting of the commission. Purpose of the two groups getting their heads together was to discuss installing a two-inch city water line to the Bovina Cemetery, which is in southeast Bovina.

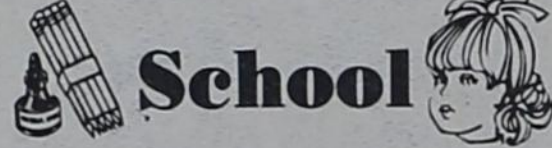

Ecofallow is the name of a relatively new practice which is gaining more supporters every season. Basically, the system involves letting wheat stubble stand after harvest. Spraying it with herbicide then planting the next crop with the straw still in the field. Purpose of the system is to utilize the ground cover for moisture retention and as a buffer against wind erosion. Using the herbicide application gets rid of weeds that could in as little as a month's time burn up 30 pounds of nitrogen an acre. Specific systems being used are generally of two rotations; winter wheat-corn-fallow and winter wheat-sorghum-fallow. With ecofallow being tried on about 20 thousand acres this year, some specifics on yield effects should be available next year. Major problem with the new system is reported to be using planters heavy enough to get through the straw.

DPS Confiscates Haul Of 'Grass'

A pair of Highway Patrol officers based in Friona stopped a car east of town on Highway 60 Wednesday night on suspicion of driving while intoxicated, and discovered what is believed to be the biggest "haul" of marijuana ever confiscated in Parmer County.

Kenneth James Poe, 26, a native of Illinois, was arraigned Thursday in Farwell and charged with possession of over four ounces of marijuana, a felony crime. Justice of the Peace R.E. Mears set bond at \$15,000. Poe was still in custody at press time.

Officers Royce Keck and Andy Hernandez stopped Poe about two miles east of Friona Wednesday night when they noticed the car being driven erratically. While questioning the driver, the officers noticed some items that made them suspicious, and the DPS representatives eventually found out that Poe had a trunk full of the narcotic weed.

The investigating officers unloaded 142 packages, each package weighing approximately a kilo, or 2.2 pounds. This amounted to roughly 312 pounds of marijuana. It

was estimated that the street value of the haul might be around \$20,000 to \$30,000.

There was some confusion as to where Poe is from. He holds a temporary driver's license from Taos, N.M. The 1970 model Ford he was driving is registered in El Paso County, Texas.

There was also some evidence that the vehicle had been sold recently, and that perhaps Poe had borrowed it from an individual thought to live in Ruidoso, N.M.

The car was equipped with a CB radio and a radar detector. The officers felt they were lucky to have stopped Poe under these circumstances.

"If he had received a "Smokey report" on us, he could possibly have avoided us. It goes to show you that you never know who you may be talking to on the CB," Keck stated.

Parmer County authorities are holding the vehicle, hoping to run down further information on its owner.

Poe told officers he was on probation in Illinois for selling marijuana.

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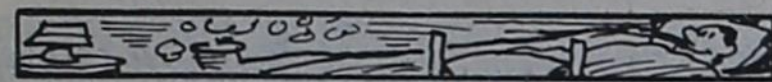

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At Home In Parmer County

IN THIS BICENTENNIAL year of American Heritage, a few interesting facts about "Turkey Day" may provide some extra meaning to the holiday.

Surprisingly, America was not the first country to celebrate some form of Thanksgiving. They also observed it in China, Greece, Russia, Norway, Poland and Lithuania.

When the Pilgrims first came to this country, they knew very little about farming, but an Indian named Squanto helped and they were able to harvest some corn and barley.

To celebrate their first success, Governor Bradford named a date in late 1621 as a day of thanks. Hunters scoured the woods and returned with turkeys, wood pigeons, partridges, geese and ducks, while the women prepared puddings and hockcakes. Because the Indians had been so helpful, the Pilgrims invited them to join their celebration—and it was a good thing, for the Indians contributed five deer.

It was also the Indians who first introduced eating oysters to the settlers. During the three-day feast,

they even set a precedent for our Thanksgiving holidays today—they participated in races, and athletic events. Just think of how many big athletic events are held in the U.S. that weekend.

Thanksgiving in 1621 was largely a social occasion, but the second Thanksgiving in 1623 was probably the real start of our present holiday, for it was religious as well as social.

During the next 200 years, Thanksgiving was not celebrated on any one special day, until September 1863, when President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed that Thanksgiving be celebrated on the last Thursday in November. The menu of that day was much like the one used widely today—cranberry juice, roast turkey with dressing, sweet potatoes, creamed onions, cranberry sauce, squash, pumpkin pie, plum pudding, mince pie, milk and coffee.

Like Christmas, Thanksgiving brings out the altruism and generosity in people. For 200 years, Americans have helped the less fortunate by providing them with food, clothing, and other necessary items. For many, it is also a time families reserve for being together. In a country where families are so geographically separated, it may be a hard thing to manage. But since traditions die hard, this is one family unifier well worth keeping alive.

Since the stuffed turkey is traditional in most homes on "Turkey Day" I thought you might like a new twist to that old favorite—Stuffing. Here are 3 recipes from one of our Extension Bulletins—"All Time Favorites—Chick-

en & Turkey" which can be obtained through our office for 30 cents.

RICE STUFFING
2 cups cooked rice
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
2-3 cup chopped celery
½ cup chopped onion
½ cup chopped green pepper
2 chicken livers, diced
1 No. 2 can tomatoes
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon monosodium glutamate
¼ teaspoon curry powder
¼ teaspoon pepper
1 egg, well beaten

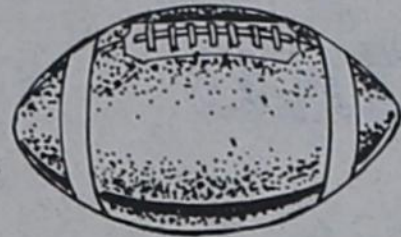
Mix rice lightly with butter or margarine; add celery, onion, green pepper, chicken livers and tomato broken into pieces with a fork. Combine seasonings; add to mixture. Mix in eggs, lightly. Spoon stuffing lightly into chicken. Makes enough for 5 pound chicken.

CRANBERRY STUFFING
3 cups fresh cranberries, ¾ Lb.
¾ cup sugar
¾ cup butter or margarine, melted
3 quarts small bread cubes
1½ cups raisins
1 tablespoon salt
¾ teaspoon cinnamon
grated rind of 2 lemons
¾ cup broth or water

Chop cranberries and blend in the sugar. Blend butter or margarine and bread cubes. Combine the two mixtures with the remaining ingredients. Mix well. Makes enough for a 10 to 12 pound turkey. Note: 1½ cans of whole cranberry sauce and 1-3 cup sugar may be substituted for the fresh cranberries and ¾ cup of sugar. Break up cranberry sauce with fork, add sugar and proceed as above.

SHRIMP STUFFING
½ pound shrimp fresh or frozen
¼ cup chopped onion
2 tablespoons chopped parsley
3 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted
1 egg, beaten
2 tablespoons milk
½ teaspoon thyme
1 teaspoon salt
dash pepper
3 cups soft bread cubes

Peel shrimp and remove sand veins. Wash and cut into small pieces. Cook onion, parsley and shrimp in butter or margarine until tender. Combine egg, milk and seasonings. Mix all ingredients together including bread crumbs until well moistened. Makes enough for a 4 pound bird.

The Board of Directors of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District has asked the Soil Conservation Service to inform the public about cost share assistance on tailwater return systems.

There is cost share assistance for underground irrigation pipeline from a tailwater pit up to an existing irrigation distribution system. This assistance is available under the ACP and GPCP programs. There is assistance for digging tailwater pits under the GP program.

Under both programs all the land draining into a tailwater system and the land to which the return water is pumped, must meet a conservation irrigation system.

Under the GPCP program an application for assistance for just irrigation practices is considered law priority.

No funding has been provided for law priority contracts.

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Mustangs Overtake Vega 'Horns, 26-21

The Bovina Mustangs slipped by a big Vega Longhorn team last Friday night to capture their first big district win by a narrow 26-21 margin. The win caused the Mustangs to move up a notch in the standings with a 1-3 district record, while the Longhorns dropped into last place with a 0-4.

The Mustangs were excited with the win after three straight weeks of losses. "We were tickled to death with the boys' performance," stated a pleased head coach Joe Christian. "We stayed with them the whole game."

"It was one of the best games our defense has had," Christian continued. "We've been pleased all year by the boys' performance. The team has never given up in a game this whole season."

The game started out in Bovina's favor as Vega fumbled the opening kickoff and halfback David Murphy pounced on it, giving the Mustang's excellent field position on the Longhorn 32. It only took Bovina four downs to hit paydirt as Ruben Salazar dived over the goal from the four yard line. The point was good and the Mustangs led it 7-0 with 10:21 left in the first quarter.

Neither team could move the ball the rest of the first quarter. Finally, on Vega's first possession of the second stanza, the Longhorns took control and moved from their 35 to the Mustang one yard line. From there it took quarterback Mike Yell two tries before he finally slipped through for the six-pointer. The PAT was good and the game was deadlocked at 7-7.

Bovina was forced to punt on their next possession and quarterback-punter Ronnie Cary boomed a 45 yarder into the Longhorn endzone.

Vega took over on their own 20 and immediately began moving the ball as the clock ran down to the half. Seventeen plays later, fullback David Doshier scrambled into the end zone for the TD. The point after

kick was good and the Vega Longhorns took a 14-7 lead with them into the locker room at the half.

The second half began as a defensive battle, with neither team getting the upper edge until Bovina's third possession. The Mustangs took over on their own 48 with a little over five minutes left in the third period. They hung on to the ball and drove the remaining 68 yards for a touchdown, with Salazar taking it in on a one yard end run. The PAT failed and the score stood 14-13, Vega.

The Longhorns stunned Bovina as they kicked off by running the ball right back to the Bovina three yard line. From there it only took two plays for quarterback Mike Yell to score Vega's third TD over the hapless Mustangs. The PAT was good and Vega led 21-13 with 3:18 left in the third quarter.

The night was over for the Longhorn offense, but Bovina had not given up. Early in the fourth stanza, quarterback Ronnie Cary took the snap and scrambled for 20 yards to set the offense up on the Longhorn 35. Three plays later it was Ruben Salazar around the end for paydirt, putting the Mustangs within striking distance, 21-19.

Vega drove all the way from their 44 to the Mustang nine on their next possession, when an illegal motion penalty set them back to the 14. The Mustang defense held tough and sacked the Vega quarterback for an 11 yard loss on the next play and forced the Longhorns to give the ball up on downs.

Bovina took over and Cary immediately began an aerial attack that covered 65 yards in two plays. His first pass went to end Danny Harris for 30 yards. Cary quickly followed up with a 35 yard scoring strike to Ruben Salazar and the Mustangs were in the lead. The PAT was good and it was all over for the Vega Longhorns as the Mustangs took the lead and held on until the

final gun, capturing their fourth game of the season.

The Mustangs last game will be Friday night against the Hart Longhorns. The game will begin at 7:30 at Hart.

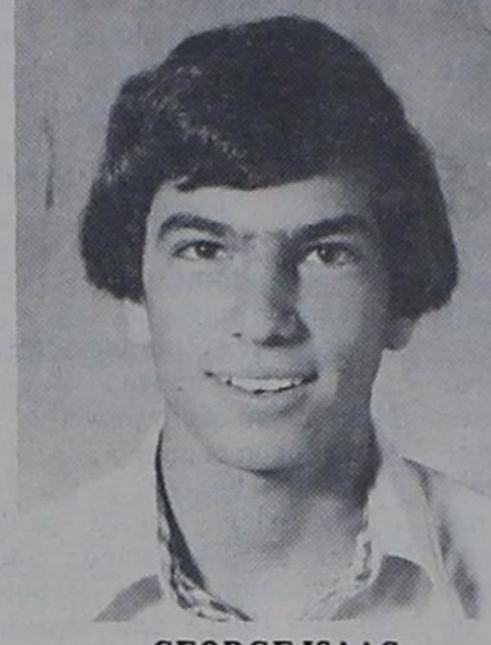

Ponies Close Out At Hart Friday

The Bovina Mustangs will meet the Hart Longhorns next Friday night in their final game of the 1976 season.

Both teams have come off a win with Bovina defeating Vega, 26-21, and Hart smothering Farwell 27-0. By virtue of their win over the Steers, Hart has captured their third straight play-off berth. They will meet Petersburg, a 32-0 victor over District 4 opponent Lorenzo.

Mustang head coach Joe Christian is pleased with his team even though they are slightly below a .550 season. "They have never given up," he said. "The boys have played out every game this season and we're very proud of them."

"Hart has a very tough team," Christian continued. "They haven't played anyone close since they beat Friona earlier in the season. We just hope to sneak up on them and play it as close as we can."

The Longhorns beat a scrappy Farwell team by simply outlasting them with a balanced effort by both the defense and the offense which finally wore the Steers down. It was Farwell's second loss in district.

Farwell fought off the potent Longhorn offense, keeping the game within reach at 6-0 until late in the third quarter.

With 3:18 remaining in the quarter, Farwell faced a fourth and two situation at the Hart four. The Steers tried for a quick pass but it was overthrown and the Longhorns took over on their own four.

The Steer's defense held the Longhorns forcing them to accept only two yards in their next two tries, but on third-and-eight, Hart tailback Kerry George slipped past the Steers' defense and took off on a 54 yard romp before Steer Chip Craft knocked him out of bounds.

Hart took over on Farwell's 40, and five plays later, George took the ball in for a 12-0 lead.

The fourth quarter was all Hart as the Longhorns scored on runs by George and Lester Aven.

Bovina will have to contain such runners as George, who rushed for 198 yards on 10 carries. Also deadly are tailback Lester Aven and fullback Glen Black. Aven rushed 29 times for 167 yards and one touchdown, while Black "turned in a solid blocking performance."

The defense will be another

problem the Mustangs must worry about. Hart has allowed only one touchdown in the last four games. Their strong defense is sparked by linebackers Cary McLain and Bryan Irons, lineman Johnny Newsom, and end Glen Black and cornerback Bobby Allensworth.

"I think our defense kept us in the ball game until our offense could get going," said Hart head coach Bill Taylor in an Amarillo Daily News interview. "I think the difference in the game was our quickness and we put so much pressure on their quarterback."

Hart's offense is not to be trifled with either as they accumulated 408 yards total offense against Farwell, with 394 of their yards on the ground.

Bovina will have to find a way to get past the strong Hart defense and stop their powerful running game if they want to break even for the season.

The game will be in Hart at 7:30 p.m. Friday.

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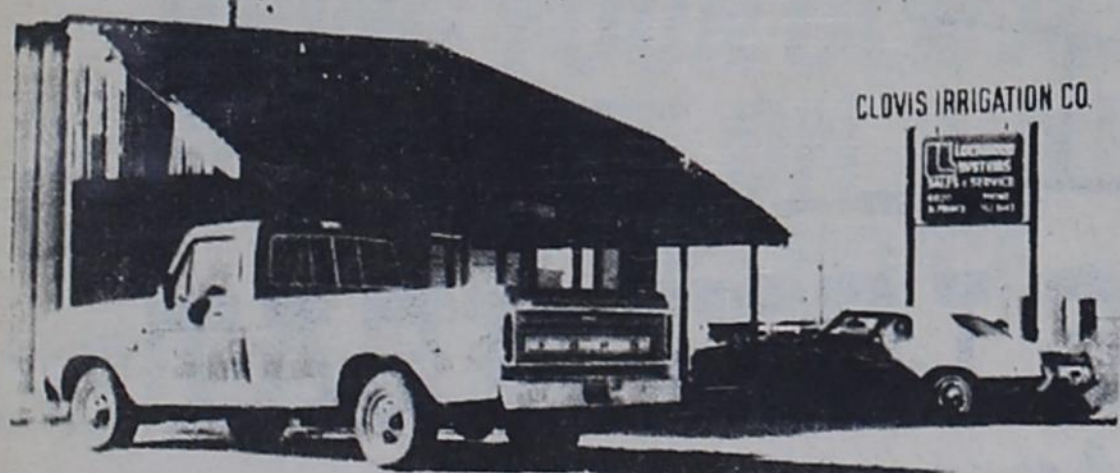
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
