WEATHER EXPERTS are predicting a hard winter for virtually the entire nation. Apparently such things go in 200-year cycles. There was one back in 1776-77, especially in the Valley Forge area.

But, seriously, folks, things are off and running in the direction being predicted by the experts.

Already, our area has had two nice snowfalls, totalling in the neighborhood of eight inches of the white stuff.

Once again, the "old wives tale" which predicts the number of snows we will receive as indicated by the date of the first snow, will get a good test.

This year, the first snow fell on the 28th of October, which would indicate 28 snows for the area for this winter. That's about four times the usual number of snowfalls we receive, but before you go scoffing at the method, or at the prospects of 28 snows, remember that this almost exact set of circumstances existed for the winter of 1969-70, and that winter, the cumulative total was over 30 inches. We're one-fourth there already, and according to the calendar, winter's start is still more than a month away.

Dick Jones, our new man on the news desk, can't figure out what all the fuss is about. In his native Connecticut, he points out that the average snowfall per year is around 45 inches.

We all thought that the last football game of the season was played in outlandish conditions, with the snow falling, field covered in snow, etc. We understand that in many parts of the nation, this would be standard fare, especially for late October and November.

HOW QUICKLY things can change in a football contest! A week or so ago, Bobby Drake had a three-point lead in the Blade's annual event, and no one had made a move within a month to make so much as a challenge to the leader, who was going along picking the favorites and staying ahead.

PICKS A TIE

Hromas Roars Into Grid Contest Lead

Greg Hromas won \$12.50 in the Bovina Blade's weekly football contest helped by an unorthodox pick, and used the strange combination of scores to sweep into first place in the race for grand prize, where he will be eligible for a cash prize of \$100.00.

Hromas was one of three contestants who earned special awards of \$5.00 by correctly picking a tie game during the week. Greg's gamble paid off, as he correctly picked 11 other contest games, and claimed the weekly first prize of \$7.50 plus the special prize.

And his weekly score of 12 shot him into the lead in the race for grand prize, with a score of 100 after 11 weeks. Bobby Drake of Friona, who had led the event for the past six weeks, managed only eight correct for the week, and stumbled to second place, three points in back of Hromas.

Hromas went into the weekend's slate of games a point behind Drake, 89-88. He now is the man on the spot, with a three-point lead and two weeks remaining in the contest.

"I had this feeling that either the Dimmitt-Littlefield game, or the Olton-Friona game would end in a tie, because teams in that district had been involved in several ties already. I finally decided on the

Friona-Olton game," Hromas explained.

It was a correct hunch, because the Chieftains and Mustangs fought to a scoreless draw in a game hampered by four inches of snow, which fell throughout the game.

Three contestants correctly picked ten games in the 14-game schedule, and two of them were awarded cash prizes, for second and third place in the weekly contest.

Tom Ware claimed second place, after predicting the Bovina-Hart score squarely on the head, 21-6. Jay Be Barrett won third place and \$3.00, missing the tie-breaker score by seven points. Mary Hernandez, who was the contest winner the week before, was the third contestant to correctly pick ten games, but her score was 13 points off.

Two other contestants were awarded special checks of \$5.00 each for correctly picking a tie game. They were Al Kerby, Jr. and Wendy Sherrill.

Going into the 12th week of the contest, the contestants are strung out in the standings in the race for grand prize.

Hromas heads the pack with a score of 100. Drake is next at 97. Then comes Joel Nelson at 96, Wayne Gilliland of Muleshoe at 95, and four contestants at 94: Emmett

Tabor, H.W. Roberts, Leon Grissom and L.F. Jacobs.

In all, 18 contestants have scores of 90 or better, so it's still anyone's ball game, with 28 points still to be earned. And, as contestants who have followed this year's games will tell you, anything is likely to happen when you match up two football teams.

For those contestants out of the running, or for those like Greg Hromas who are in the running and think they can do it, the Blade will still pay \$5 for anyone picking a tie, and will double the weekly first prize for the first person picking all 14 games correct.

Area Blanketed By Second '76 Snowfall

Last Friday and Saturday saw some four inches of snowfall and low temperatures in Bovina and the High Plains.

The storm was the second of the season, the first occurring on October 28, which left several inches of the white stuff, wet and slippery.

As the sun came out Saturday afternoon, Bovina residents began to dig out from under the blanket of snow. Traffic was hampered by slushy and icy roads and travel warnings were in effect Friday and Saturday.

The two storms (October 28 and November 12-13), combined have

dropped more snow so far than all of last winter, when there was a total fall of five inches.

Partial clearing began late Saturday and spread across the state Saturday night. Sunday was clear, but a cloud cover appeared again on Monday, although a warming trend was predicted.

Sources said the snow was quite wet and will be much more beneficial than harmful to the farmers. The snow will help the wheat farmers but will hurt those few who still have crops left in the fields.

For the most part, the corn and maize harvest is over, but those with cotton were just getting started on the harvest of that crop.

The four inches of snow contained .31 of an inch of moisture. The normal precipitation for November is 0.44 of an inch.

Bond Sales Released

August sales of \$3,651 for Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Parmer County were reported today by County Bond Chairman Frank A. Spring.

Texas sales during the month amounted to \$26,412,532, while sales for the first eight months of 1976 totaled \$188,888,470 with 69 per cent of the yearly sales goal of \$272.4 million achieved.

Sales for the eight-month period totaled \$70,634 for 71 per cent of the 1976 sales goal of \$100,000.

Saving 400 million dollars worth of cotton has been the result of a special program on the Texas Plains. For nearly 12 years the High Plains Boll Weevil Control Program has worked to promote mass spraying of weevil-infested crop areas. Estimating the 400 million dollar saving were members of the Entomology department at Texas A&M. In making the estimate they took into consideration reductions in quality losses, increases in yield and lowered control costs. Through last year, total cost of the program was estimated at 12 million dollars. Funds for the spraying (which involved the eastern edge of the cotton area) have been provided by cotton producers, the United States Department of Agriculture and the Texas Department of Agriculture. One of the outstanding things about the program has been the fact that all producer funding has been collected on a voluntary basis.

Miss Heflin feels the delegates passed some good legislation, which will go to the State Legislature during its next session.

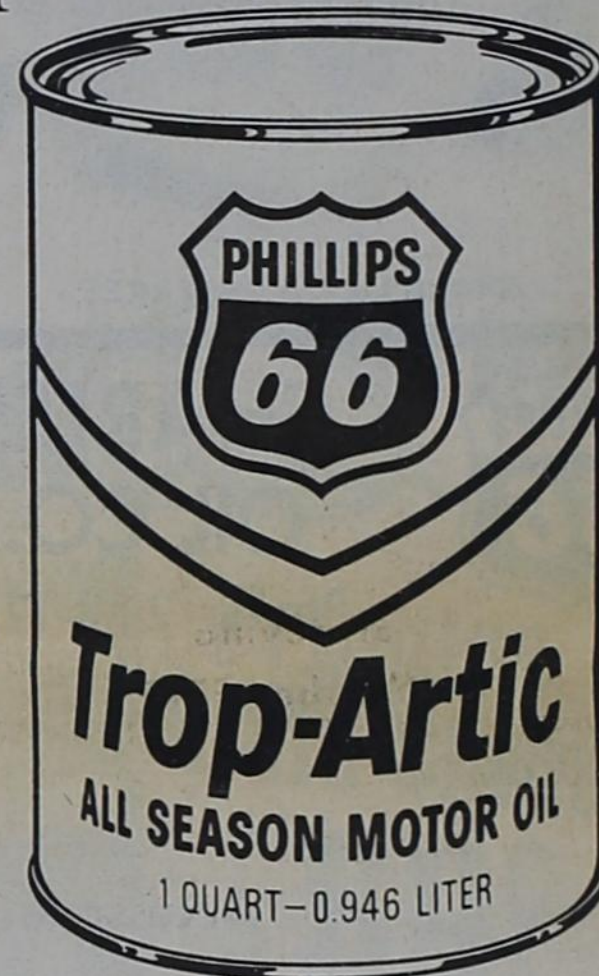

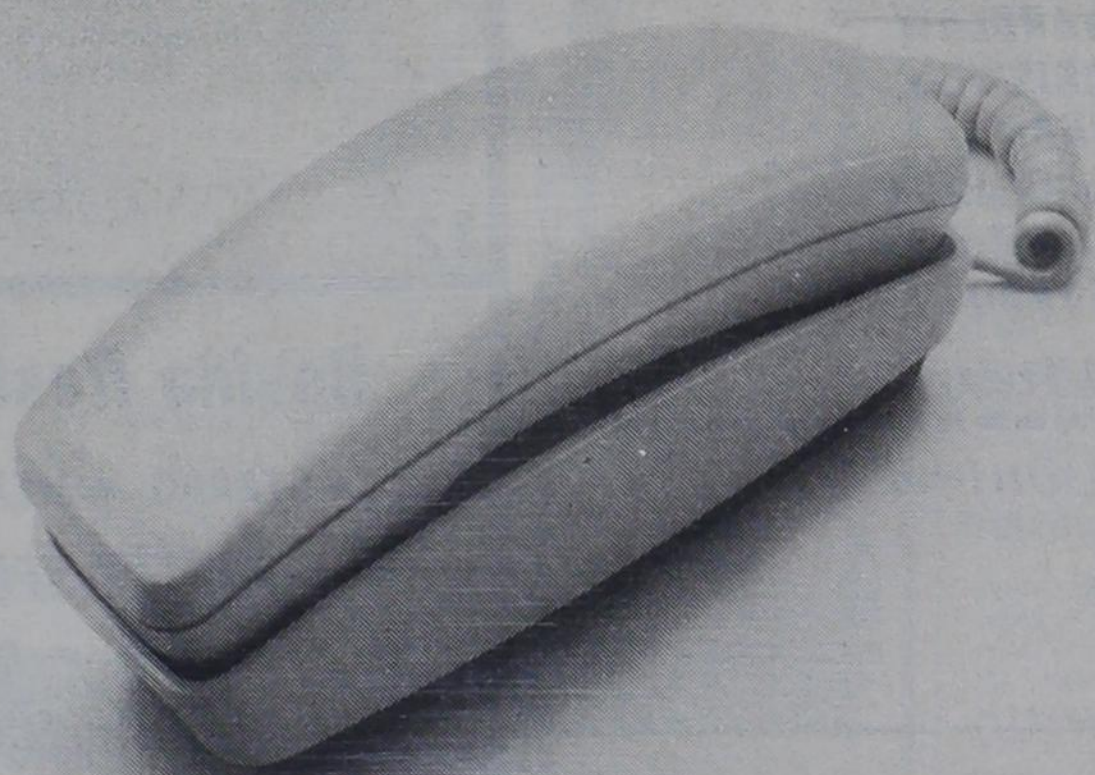

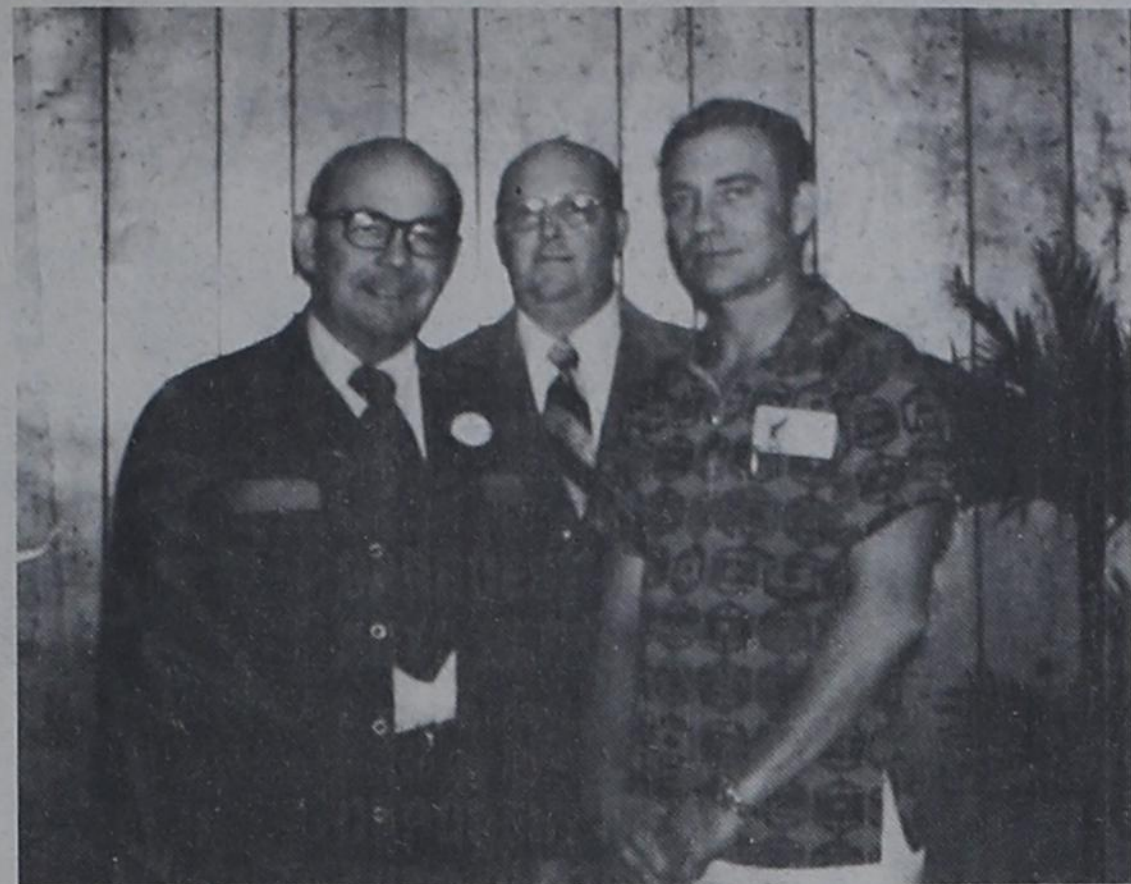

**Hart Thumps Ponies
 In '76 Grid Finale**

The Bovina Mustangs played their final football game of the 1976 season last Friday, losing the match to a powerful Hart Longhorn team. The Longhorns already had District 3-AA sewn up before the game and will meet Petersburg at 7:30 p.m. Friday in Plainview.

The Mustangs ended up with a 4-6 season record, fourth best in the loop, and a 1-4 district record. They had a good season considering the overall youth and inexperience of the team, and Mustang fans should be proud of the way the team played this season.

"We've been pleased all year by the boy's attitudes," Mustang head coach Joe Christian said in an earlier interview. "The team has never given up in a game this whole season."

The Mustang attack was balanced with 54 total yards on the ground and 67 yards in the air, for a total of 121 net yards. Quarterback Ronnie Cary completed five of 13 passes in the losing effort.

Hart also had a fairly balanced attack with 129 yards rushing and 91 on the ground. Hart quarterback Elizar Castillo went two-for-four in the passing statistics, for a 50 per cent average.

Bovina scored first as halfback Ruben Salazar broke through on a 19 yard scramble for the six points with 9:12 left in the first half. The point after attempt was blocked and the Mustangs led by a narrow 6-0.

It took Hart the remainder of the quarter to get warmed up. The Longhorns finally managed to pull out a score with a spectacular 73-yard pass play from quarterback Castillo to end Bryan Irons with 43 seconds left in the first period. Bobby Allensworth added the extra point for the Longhorns and the score stood at 7-6 at the beginning of the second stanza.

The Mustangs were able to dig in and hold Hart, allowing them only one more TD in the first half. The Longhorns' second touchdown came on a one-yard plunge by back Kerry George to make it 13-6, Hart.

Neither team could get on the

scoreboard the rest of the first half and the Longhorns took their 13-6 lead with them into the locker room at the half.

When the second half began, it looked as though the Mustangs might have a chance as the defense held the Longhorns scoreless. The Mustangs were also unable to score and the third quarter ended with the same 13-6 score it began with.

It wasn't until the final five minutes of the game that the Longhorns actually put it out of the Mustang's reach. With 5:11 left in the fourth quarter, Castillo let fly with an 18 yard pass run play to end Johnny Newsom to cap off the scoring by both teams. Castillo carried the ball over for the two point conversion and the Hart Longhorns captured their ninth win

of the season. The win boosted the Longhorns season record to 9-1, and their loop tally to 5-0.

Mustang fans should be pleased with their team in spite of an average season record. They have a lot to look forward to next year with the experience the team has gained from the 1976 season. They have improved with every game and should be a team of the future.

The Postal Service on November 10 advanced by one week its suggested mailing deadlines of Christmas mail because of higher mail volume resulting from the strike against United Parcel Service.

The suggested deadlines were moved up to December 3 for domestic parcels and December 10 for letters and Christmas cards.
