IN CASE YOU haven't noticed, the Bovina Mustangs are having a great season, and after four games have compiled a 3-1 season record, with their only loss (13-18, to Happy) being a game the team and fans felt they should have won.

Coach Larry Helton and his staff have done a great job of bringing the team along, striving for improvement each week of the season, and so far have achieved their goals.

They are pointing the team toward the district 3-AA opener against the Farwell Steers at Farwell October 8.

The Mustangs have been rated as the number one offensive team on the South Plains by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal the past few weeks. The rankings are based on total yards gained. The team didn't hurt their average against Dexter, N.M., in their Homecoming win and currently are averaging 367 yards per game.

The team's defensive average is not doing too badly, either, as they are giving up 230.75 yards per game.

Some of the individual players have also been ranked in the Lubbock paper's statistical program, including Jon Riddle and Greg McClaran in the pass receiving department. After four games, Wright has gained 373 yards.

Also doing well in the "stats" is quarterback Dale Gilbreath, who has completed 28 of 52 passes for 433 yards.

After last week's 44-8 win over Dexter, Bovina should move up in the scoring category, since the team has now scored 127 points (32.2 per game), and has given up 53 (11.7 per game).

"We have suffered some adversity, and each time we do, we seem to get stronger as a team," says Coach Helton. The team's most recent trial was the loss of starter Jon Riddle, who was burned seriously last Thursday at the bonfire.

So, there certainly is no football strike where the Mustangs are concerned. They are chomping at the bit to do a better job each time out.

The team is definitely worthy of all the support they can get, and Helton says he appreciates the good support they have been receiving from the community.

This week, the Mustangs play Lubbock Cooper, coached by none other than Paul Toppliff, the Bovina coach who left last spring for the south Lubbock school.

Naturally, the team would like to win this game, but they are trying to keep a "low key" attitude. They also want to be ready for their game the following week against Farwell, which is the district opener.

If you haven't made it out to see the Mustangs play, then you definitely need to include their games in your plans. Besides, until the NFL settles something, they have the "only game in town."

Flossie Rhinehart Is Contest Winner

In a week when scores of most contestants suffered somewhat, Flossie Rhinehart led a trio of contestants who correctly picked 11 of the 14 games.

Second place is held down by Brad Lance and Johnny Villarreal with scores of 38. Burry Thatcher is all alone in third place at 37.

The leading contestant at the close of the 13-week period will receive \$100 cash as the grand champion.

Due to the National Football League strike, the usual complement of pro games has been deferred, with only high school and college games on the slate, and this will be the policy until (and if) the strike is settled.

The Bovina Mustang game also has been re-instated as the tie-breaker game, rather than the Dallas Cowboy game, as has sometimes been the policy.

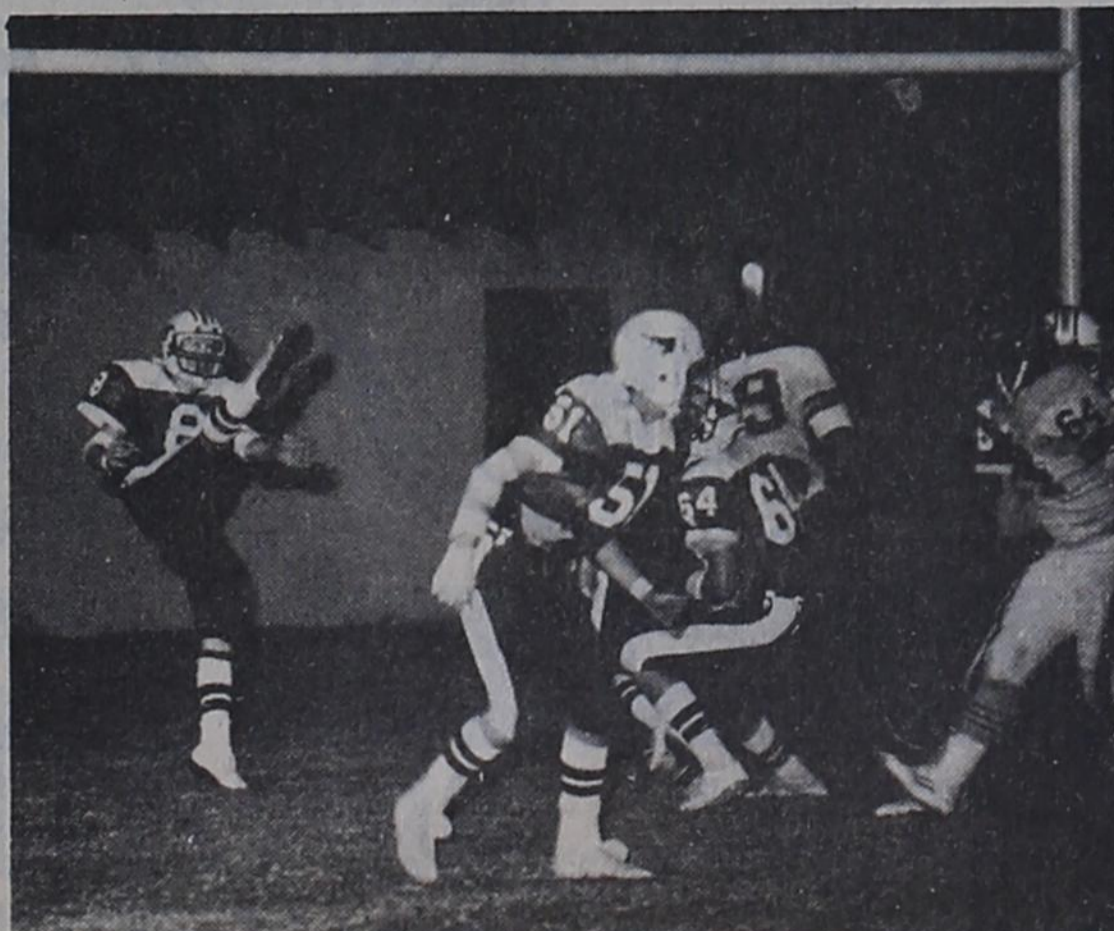
J. Riddle Is Victim Of Burns

Jon went to light the bonfire when the substance on the pile exploded, burning him and also causing injuries to another young man and to one of the coaches.

Jon is a patient at High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo, where his progress has been reported as good. It was not necessary to do skin grafting, as it was first thought it might be.

A senior at Bovina High School, Jon is expected to be hospitalized for a time yet.

SCS Sets Election On October 5

An election for a director to serve in Zone 4 on the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for October 5 at the Oklahoma Lane Farm Store, announced M.C. Osborn, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 10 a.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the subdivision where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district.

Zone 4 of the district takes in all land in the Oklahoma Lane and the Farwell School Districts. (See map.)

Current members of the board of directors of the Parmer County S.W.C.D. are M.C. Osborn of Friona, chairman; Leon Grissom of Bovina, vice chairman; Phillip Johnson of Hub, secretary-treasurer; Dan Smith of Lazbuddie, member and Raymond Schueler of Rhea, member.

The purpose of the Parmer County S.W.C.D., with headquarters at 1306 West Ninth in Friona is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The district board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

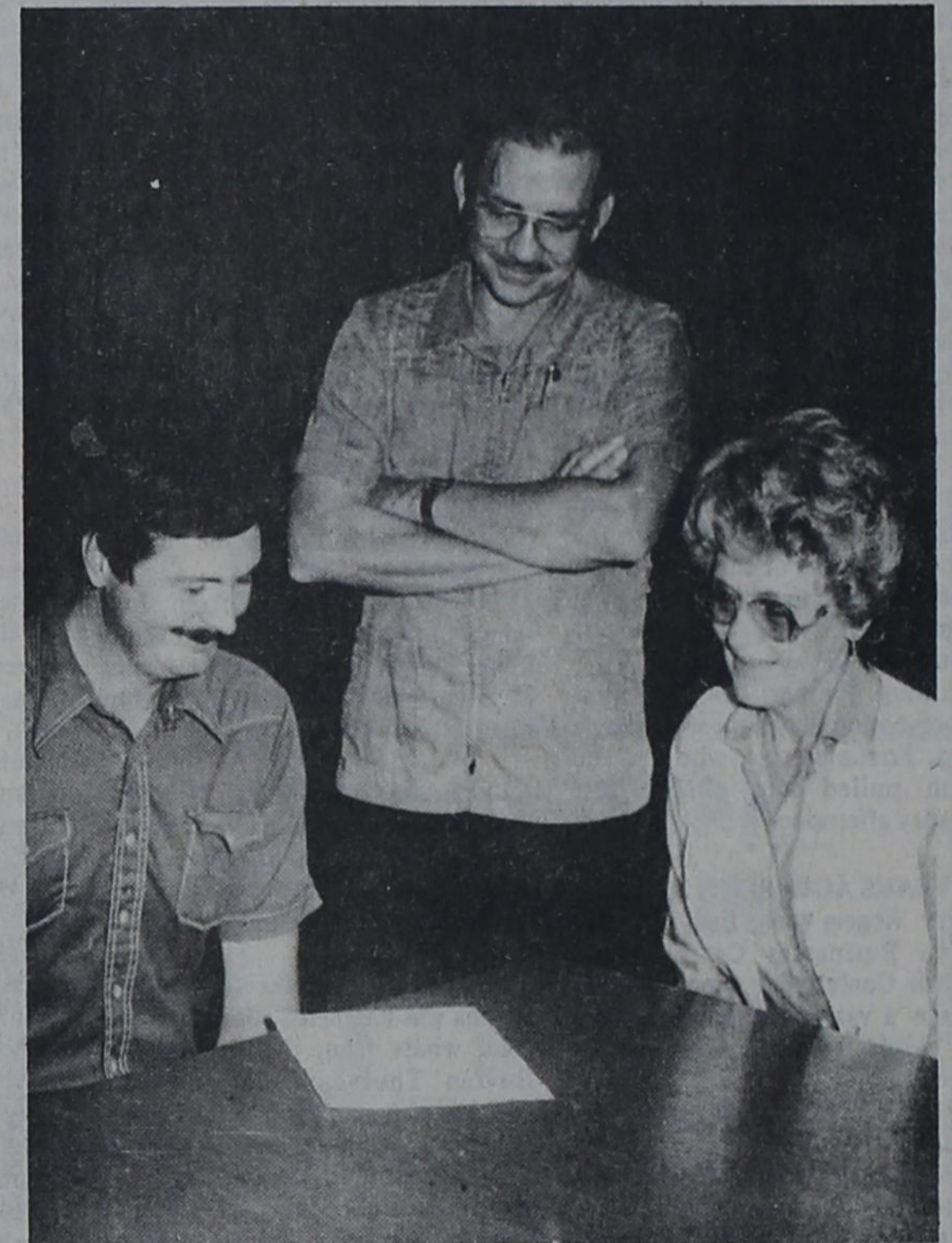

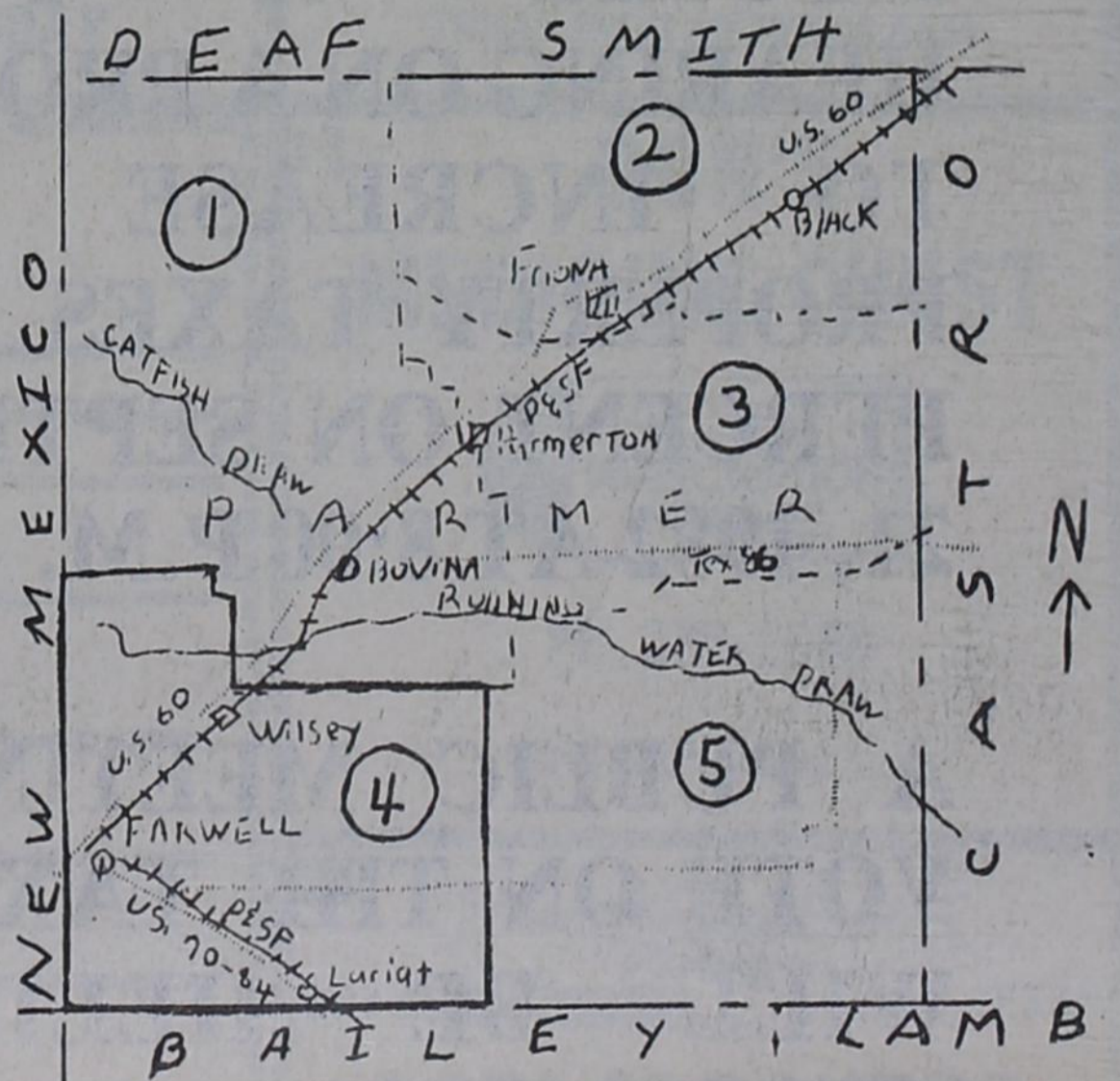
also had a hip injury, but is expected to play. The team got Eloy Flores back this week. Flores was injured in a recent game.

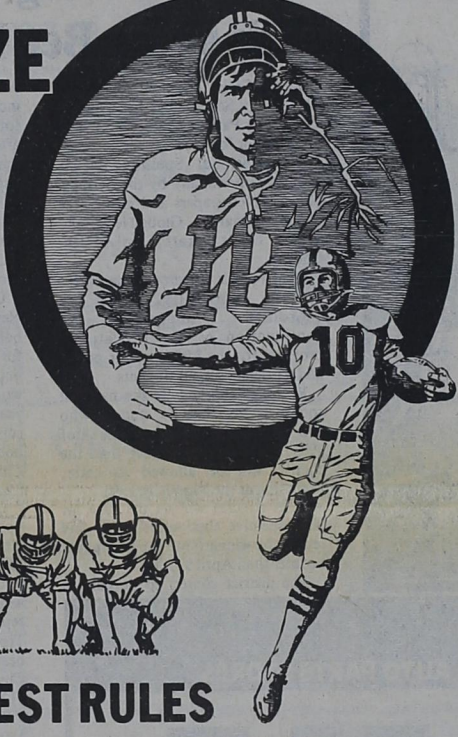

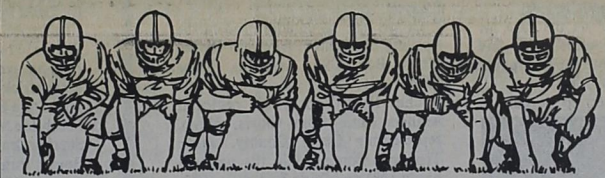

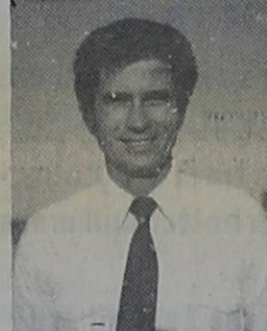

Strake Talk

CRIME: IT'S THE VICTIMS WHO ARE LOCKED UP

I want to talk to you this week about an issue that troubles me greatly and which I know is of great concern to Texans. It seems that whenever I have spoken about crime in the past 12 months I have gotten a strong and troubled response. No matter where I am—Jewett, Roma or Dalhart—people tell me they are angry and afraid about crime in our state.

This anger and fear concerns me for two reasons. First, because this kind of anger and fear serves as a sort of "jail" for innocent people. They are the ones locked in their homes at night while criminals go free. The second reason I am concerned is because unless something is done to stop the crime epidemic, people will be ripe for the kind of politician who will play on citizens' fears. The result could be that Texans lose their liberty in return for their "safety". In that sense, the crime problem is like a cancer gnawing at democracy.

The incumbent Lt. Governor's response to the crime issue has been shameful. While he has been in office the crime rate has risen 131%. He has done nothing to attack crime in a substantial way. In fact, he has fought stronger anti-crime measures. He openly opposed the new wiretapping law designed to catch drug dealers. He openly opposed the Governor's anti-crime package by putting it in a legislative committee run by a hostile Senator, who promptly bottled it up. Much of the package passed anyway and now Mr. Hobby has the gall to go around the state taking credit for it!

His sympathies in the fight against crime are evident. Not long ago he allowed the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) to hold a fundraiser in his Houston mansion and he proudly defends it. The ACLU has consistently opposed laws that would make it easier to deal with the crime problem.

I think such two-faced maneuvering is disgraceful. It is obvious that if we are going to attack the crime problem, if we are ever going to give law officers, judges and prison guards the tools they need to make us safer, Bill Hobby will have to go.

Bovina Mustangs Roll Over Homecoming Opponent 44-8

It took the first half for the Mustangs to get the thoughts of an injured teammate out of their minds last week, but once they did, they rebounded with a fury, pounding visiting Dexter, N.M., 44-8 for a Homecoming win.

The team had dedicated the game to Jon Riddle, the starting flanker and outside linebacker who was seriously burned while lighting the Homecoming bonfire the night before.

"We had some other things on our minds that first half—one of our bunch had been hospitalized. But we made up our minds to play ball in the second half, and began executing a lot better, and things began to fall into place," said Coach Larry Helton this week.

The Mustangs found themselves trailing the visiting New Mexico team, 8-7 at the end of the first quarter, and then holding a tenuous 13-8 halftime lead, before getting everything together. Bovina outscored the visitors, 31-0 in the second half.

Richard Shepherd got the scoring underway by returning the opening kickoff 90 yards for a touchdown. Jose Gomez' kick made the score 7-0.

But Dexter came back with a TD pass, and a two-point conversion, to take an 8-7 lead.

In the second quarter, Shepherd took a Dale Gilbreath pass and scampered 60 yards for his second TD of the game and a 13-8 Bovina lead as the PAT try failed.

That was all the scoring in the first half.

In the third quarter, Joe Pat Wright capped a Mustang drive by scoring on a 20-yard run. Quarterback Gilbreath ran for the two-point conversion.

Bovina broke the game open in the final quarter as Wright ran in from 11 yards, Jay Judd recovered a fumble in the end zone, Henderson Griggs scored on a 20-yard pass from Gilbreath, and Gomez kicked a 16-yard field goal, as scoring came from virtually every possible means.

The Mustangs had another good game, both offensively and defensively. Bovina gained 377 yards on offense, 221 rushing and 156 passing. Wright was the rushing leader with 104 yards. Gilbreath completed eight of 14 passes, including the two for touchdowns.

The win left the Mustangs with a 3-1 season record, going into the Lubbock Cooper game, which is the last non-district game.

Bovina will undoubtedly hold onto its ranking as the top offensive team on the South Plains, with their good showing last Friday.

"We don't think about statistics during the game. We just try to run the play we think will work best at the time and for the particular situation," Helton said.

The Mustang coach complimented the visiting Dexter team for their play last week. "They were well-coached and disciplined. They took the fight to us in the first half."

"Riddle's injury just had taken all the steam out of us to start with, and we had to get over that," Helton said.

Coming in to play in Riddle's place were Andy Alexander at flanker and Tommy Hutto on defense, and Helton praised their play. "It's good to have guys you can move around like that and they will do a good job," he said.

On the defensive side of the coin last Friday, Bovina recovered four fumbles, recorded nine sacks, and held Dexter to 161 net yards. Bovina led in first downs, 21-10.

Saturday morning following the game, the team took the game ball to give to Riddle in the hospital, and it was a meaningful experience.

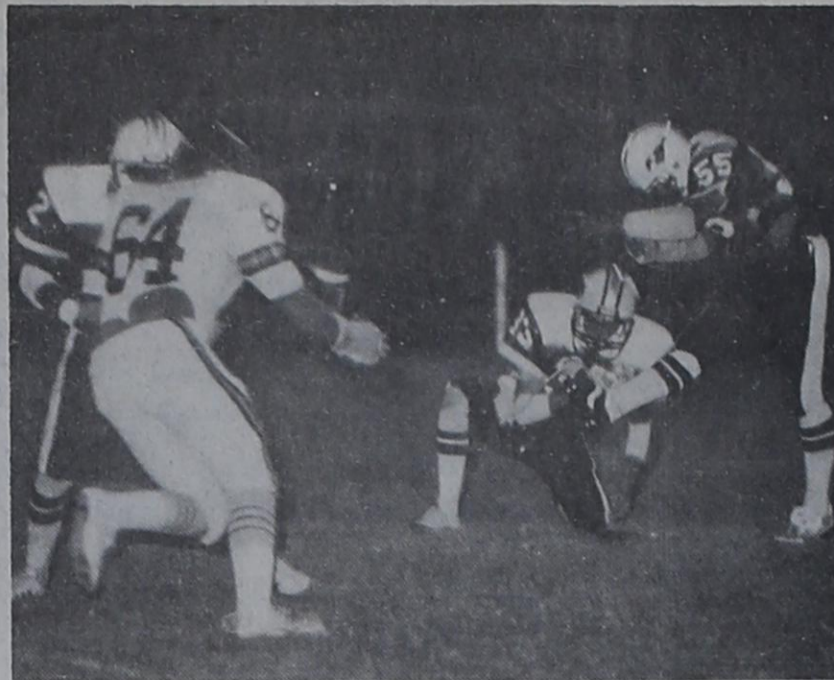
Member Fete

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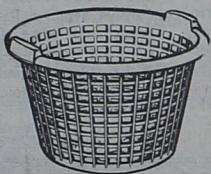


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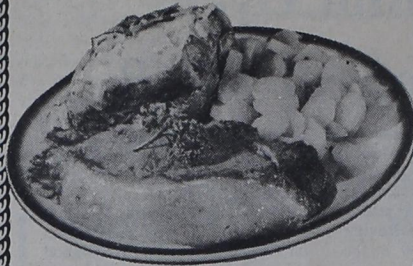
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
