Rationing At A Glance

Gasoline—In 17 east coast states. A 5 coupon are now good. In states outside the east coast areas A-5 coupons are now good. **Feed Oil**—Parted 1 coupons are good through January 5.

Shoes—Stamp No. 18 good for 1 pair. Validity has been extended indefinitely. Stamp No. 1 on the "Airplane" sheet in Book Three good for 1 pair. **Sugar**—Stamp No. 29 in Book Four is good for 5 pounds through January 15, 1944.

Meats, Fats—Brown stamps G and H good through December 4. Brown stamp J became good November 7 and remains good through December 4.

Free Seed Foods—Rice stamp X, Y, and Z good through Nov. 20. Green stamps A, B, and C in Book Four became good Nov. 1 and remain good through Dec. 20.

Plenty of Turkeys

The civilian turkey supply, just starting to come on the market, will be almost as large as last year, according to the Department of Agriculture. However, this year's demand will probably be much larger and shoppers will be wise to put in orders early. Men and women on duty in the American armed forces, at home and abroad, will be served a pound of turkey at dinner Thanksgiving Day and will have all the traditional "fixin's."

Ration-Free Children's Shoes

Some relief from the shortage of youngster's shoes will be provided about the first of the year by a new supply of children's non-leather shoes for general wear, to be sold ration free, OPA has announced. In general, children up to about eight years of age will benefit. The shoes will have canvas uppers and soles made from remnants and heavy woven fabric, reinforced with vulcanized rubber. Shoes of this type larger than misses' and youths' size three will be rationed.

Tire Situation Tightens

Operators of passenger cars may find it impossible to obtain used tires because commercial vehicles delivering essential goods are now eligible to receive used passenger and truck tires of size smaller than 7.50-20 to replace tires no longer serviceable. November quotes recently released by OPA for new passenger and truck tires show 80 percent fewer for trucks and 14 percent fewer for passenger cars.

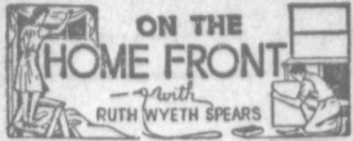

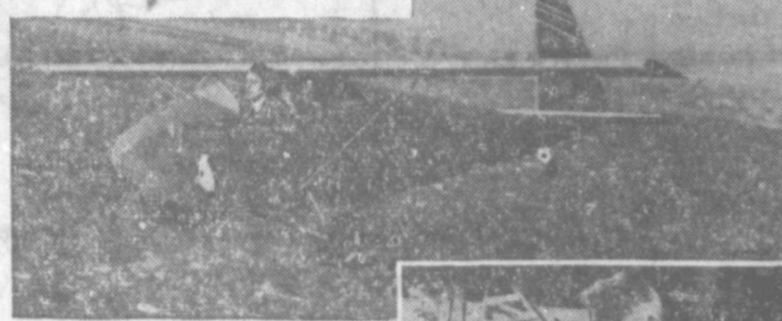

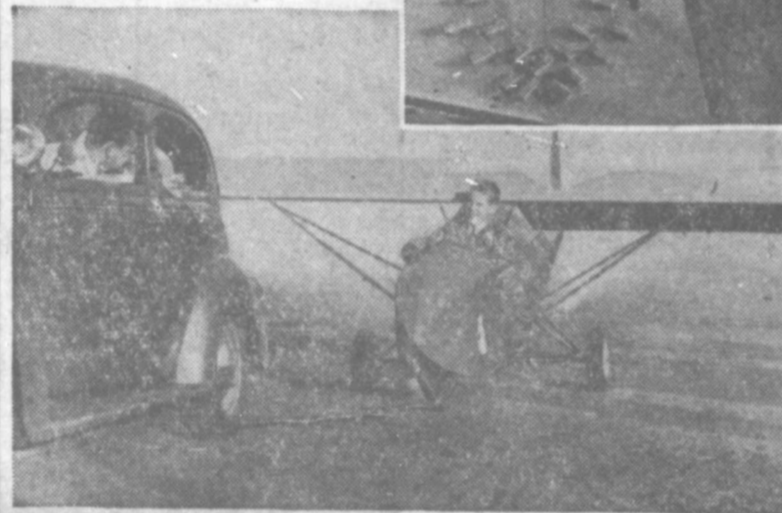
Juvenile Fliers Learn Tricks Of Air Currents on Ground

Schoolboys may be too young to fly real airplanes for their country, but they want to learn the principles of aviation in a manner which approaches the thrill of the real thing. A California glider company and Aeronautical Engineer Volmar Jensen have created a preflight glider which brings youngsters plenty of thrills and a basic flying technique without risking their necks. With the glider, schoolboys learn to keep a steady course through rushing air currents. They do it on the ground towed by an automobile traveling 30 miles an hour.

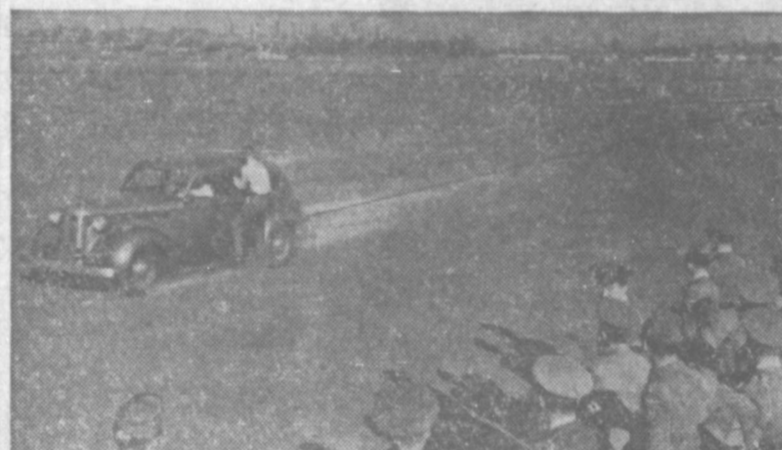


Breezing along behind the tow car, the cadet above tries to prevent the glider's wing tips from scraping the ground. Perfectly controlled, the glider will roll smoothly with tail up and wings level.

Right: Use of these jigs simplifies construction of the glider. Wood parts are fitted in, nailed and glued. The glider is made of non-priority materials and can be assembled by school manual training classes. A single control stick is connected to wings and tail.



Ready to match his technique against air currents, the student, above, informs the automobile driver that he is ready. Tow car pulls away and the 100 foot line is jerked taut.



The glider zooms past an assembly of fellow students. Despite rushing air, it is level. The operator is controlling its balance, something that any pilot must master before he takes to the air.

Below: Volmar Jensen attaches the rudder to the tail. He built several safety devices into the craft to eliminate the usual risks of preliminary glider instruction. Any ideas that the non-ascending gliders were "sissified" were soon dispelled. It was quite difficult to keep a level course at a speed of 30 miles an hour. But most of them soon mastered this technique and are on the way to becoming pilots later on.
