

IT IS NOW beginning to look as though the state of Texas may have two teams in the NFL playoffs, which would be a first.

That Earl Campbell of the Houston Oilers is really something. Can you believe the season he's having, and he's only a rookie? He has brought the Oilers from the ranks of a threat to a contender, and has helped lure sellout crowds to the team's last 14 home games.

Houston's professional football program was needing a shot in the arm, and that's exactly what it got, with the Heisman Trophy winner from Texas U.

**OUR OLD ALMA MATER, Texas** Tech, meanwhile, failed to be impressed by the number five national rating by the University of Houston, and sent the Cougars packing in their game at Lubbock last Saturday, whipping UH, 22-21, and stalling the Houston team's bid for a trip to the Cotton Bowl.

The Houston coach, Bill Yeoman, didn't seem to be shaken. He knows that all the Coogs have to do is whip crosstown rival Rice this week, to take the Southwest Conference

It would be funny if the Owls would nip the Cougars, and Tech could edge Arkansas this week, since that would put the Red Raiders in the Cotton Bowl, and send Houston back to "Cougar High" without a bowl ticket. Of course, that's a lot of "ifs," but stranger things have happened this football season.

Just ask the contestants in the Blade's football contest, who have suffered through a year filled with the most upsets in memory. Showing the ups and downs of the season is the fact that this year's winning score will be from seven to ten points below that posted in 1977 by champ

Bonds operated the business as a Gulf Oil distributorship for a number of years, and sold it early in 1977 to outside interests, and the distributorship was changed to Shamrock products.

"We would like to thank the people for their business and support. Also, we thank the many fine employees we have had while we were in business," Bonds said.

During the past month, the company has been having a quitting business sale, with its inventory being offered for sale at the company's cost.



## Water Dist. Calls Election

The Board of Directors of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 officially called for an election to be held on January 20, 1979, to elect two members to the Board of Directors from Director's Precincts Three and Four, and to elect two county committeemen each from the counties of Armstrong, Bailey, Castro, Deaf Smith, Parmer, Potter and Randall. Director's Precinct Three covers Bailey, Castro and Parmer Counties with Precinct Four composed of Armstrong, Deaf Smith, Potter and Randall Counties.

In calling for the election the Directors said that polling places in each of the counties would be announced at a later date along with

the list of candidates for each position and the election judges.

Candidates who wish for their name to appear on the election legal notice must have their petition turned in to the Water District office by close-of-business on December 11 because the District Directors will meet on December 12 to approve the legal notice. Persons wishing to be a candidate for any of the positions have until midnight, December 31, 1978, to file their petition.


