## Rationing At A Glance

**Gasoline**—In states outside the east coast area A-9 coupons are good through January 31.

**Shoes**—Stamp No. 18 good for 1 pair. Validity has been extended indefinitely. Stamp No. 1 on the "Airplane" sheet in Book Three good for 1 pair.

**Sugar**—Stamp No. 29 in Book Four is good for 5 pounds through January 15, 1944.

**Meats, Fats**—Brown stamps B and S are good through January 29. Brown stamp T becomes good January 9.

**Processed Foods**—Green Stamps D, E and F in Book Four are good through January 30.

## More Tea For Civilians

About 75 million pounds of tea will be available to civilian consumers in 1944, wartime limitations on shipping space permitting. This is about 16 million pounds more than civilians got in 1943.

## Tighten Rationing Regulations

As a further move toward a "Black Market" in gasoline, OPA has ruled that any stock held or special privilege of access to a property bearing and holding that the tire or gasoline regulations have been violated, may not only revoke a gasoline ration but also may prohibit the use of gasoline in the violator's possession which was obtained as part of the ration.

## Opportunity For Veterans

Returning war veterans may enter virtually any of the 30,007 apprentice training programs in the United States. Age restrictions and other limitations have been especially lifted for veterans. Many apprenticeship standards as they obtain training for skilled work, according to the War Manpower Commission.

Because some people have used the wrong stamps in Book Three for shoes, OPA has issued the following statement: "War Ration Book Three has four pages of book, picture stamps showing guns, tanks, ships, and airplanes. The page of airplane stamps is next to the brown food stamps in the back of book three." The shoe stamp shows a miniature airplane in flight and is labeled "Ration Stamp 1." This stamp came into use on November 1, and it will remain valid indefinitely, along with stamp 18 in Ration Book One.

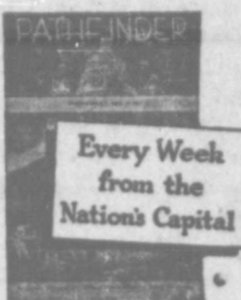

Big Wheat Carry-Over

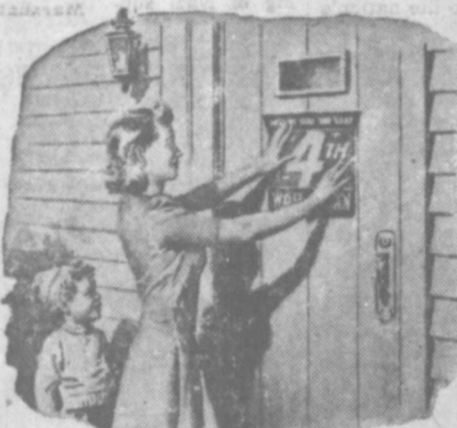
The wheat carry-over in the U.S. on July 1, 1943 was 618 million bushels and for July 1, 1944 is estimated at 800 million bushels, according to the Bureau of Agricultural Economics. This is in sharp contrast to the 40 million for 1918 and 85 million for 1919. Large supplies and reduced exports have made available record quantities for feed and industrial alcohol production in this war.

Extend Hog Price Support

Good and choice butcher hogs weighing from 270 to 300 pounds will be included in the Price Support Program, according to WFA. This temporary emergency measure became effective December 28 and is expected to encourage the more orderly marketing of hogs and to relieve the congested conditions existing in many of the principal markets.

Changes in Stove Rationing

Eligibility requirements for rationed stoves have been widened. A consumer who has a heating or cooking stove that cannot be used at all is now eligible for a stove rationing certificate. Ration certificates also may be issued for stoves to heat premises where essential community activities, such as volunteer Red Cross work, are carried on.

Sugar Ration Remains Same

Sugar rations for home use will remain the same for another two and one-half months, according to the Office of Price Administration. Sugar stamp number 20 in war ration book four becomes valid on January 16, and will be good for buying five pounds of sugar through the end of March. Sugar stamp 29, now in use, is good through January 15.

Getting the Most from your Victory Garden Illustration of a family in a garden

Thin the Garden Now

One of the best ways to thin the Victory Garden row is not to plant seeds too thickly! Sounds like a paradox, but it comes from experienced seedmen in the largest seed firm in the world. Carrot seeds are very small, and it is sometimes difficult to sow thinly enough so that the young plants do not crowd each other. In that case, according to Ferry-Morse Seed Co. specialists, it is best to thin them to stand about one inch apart when they are quite small. Grasp each plant near the base and pull gently so that the tops will not break off. Unless they come up extremely thick, young radishes and green onions can be thinned by using them. The shape of the roots will be better, however, if the plants stand about an inch apart while still very small. Each lumpy little pellet known as a "beet seed" is often two to four seeds, usually producing more than one plant. They should be sown at least 1 1/2 to 2 inches apart. When the plants are four to five inches tall, every other one can be pulled for greens. If this is done at intervals while tops and roots are small, space will gradually be left for some of the roots to reach good size. Sowing leaf lettuce seed sparsely helps to avoid the extra work of thinning the plants later. Even when fairly thick, some gardeners prefer to cut the larger, outer leaves instead of thinning, leaving the inner ones to grow. If you like to use each lettuce plant intact, thin to about two inches apart when small. Then, as they become big enough to use, pull up alternate plants leaving the others to grow. Bush beans should be planted two to four inches apart, and just enough seedlings removed from the row so that the remaining ones stand four to five inches apart. Beans usually produce more prolifically when the plants do not crowd each other. Early turnips do better and grow more speedily to table size if they are given three or four inches in which to spread. It is important to help turnips grow to eating size quickly. Of course the thinnings make delicious greens when young and tender.

Who's News This Week

NEW YORK.—For this new year of pell-mell war traffic the Interstate Commerce commission has elected to its chairmanship William J. Patterson, son, who knows the nation's transportation system and its problems in war or peace from the ground up.

Patterson became an ICC member in 1939, but he has been on its payroll for 30 years. He was hired as an inspector of appliances in 1914 when there was a considerable stir about safety. The job expanded until a score of years later it turned into the assistant directorship of the commission's bureau of safety.

Next Patterson went onto the mechanical advisory committee of the federal coordinator of transportation. Finally membership on the commission itself came from President Roosevelt. Patterson made his first connection with a railroad in Neenah, Wis. He was born there, where the Fox Indians used to hunt and do a lot of fighting, only seven years after the town was founded.

States Change Methods Of Capital Punishment

Since 1928, the states that impose a life sentence for murder have decreased from 8 to 6, while those that execute by hanging have decreased from 19 to 10, says Collier's.
