





#### EUROPE:

See Zero Hour

As the Axis radio dinned that the invasion of Europe could be expected at any day, huge fleets of heavy U. S. and British bombers escorted by fighter planes continued to pour fire and destruction on the enemy's

industry and defense installations, with Berlin the No. 1 target. Expecting the grandest amphibious assault in military history, the Nazi high command continued to boast of its steel and concrete coastal fortifications equipped with long and short range rocket guns, and, declaring the impending hostilities were to determine the future fate of Germany, insisted that they must fight it out in their deep defenses rather than make a wholesale retreat.

In Italy, strong armored German forces jabbed at stubborn U. S. and British lines on the Anzio beachhead below Rome, while heavy slush and snowfall slowed Allied advances on the bloody Cassino front, where bit-ter house to house fighting again was resumed after a long lull.

the South Pacific, Rabaul, had become increasingly untenable for the enemy under the heavy fire of U.S. bombers and fighter planes. Formerly a beehive of activity

with Jap cargo ships carrying material into the port for transfer to smaller barges used to supply troops in the battle zones, U. S. fliers returning from raids over the New Britain base reported that big ships no longer could be seen.

Further demonstrating U. S. superiority in the area, American troops battling in the Admiralty islands to the north of Rabaul were supplied by cargo vessels sailing right into the fighting zone under protection of warships which encountered no resistance.

U.S. Interests

As high U. S. officials prepared or conferences with British leaders in London on America's postwar role in the Pacific, congress moved to appoint a 21-man committee to look into this country's military and economic interests in that part of the world in peacetime.

The whole question of America's future position of the Pacific was drawn into sharp focus with Australia's and New Zealand's declaration that these two countries are to be defensive centers for islands to their east and west, and use of any terri

All you need ruler to tell whether the price feed is too high, "O.K.," or a

But all the reasons why it can't be done look very small compared to just one reason why it must be done. That reason is that your country needs the milk and the products made from it, and a good share of it is needed for your sons and relatives in the service.

It has been estimated that cattle grubs are a \$50,000,000 pest. If your cows are afflicted with them, you're paying part of this bill. The Extension Service of our state coilege has te a bulletin that gives specific instructions on how to get rid of these pests. Your Uncle Bob suggests that you write right away for Bulletin E-562, Agriculture and Mechanical College of Texas, College Station, Texas. It would also be a good idea to write Mississippi State College, State College, Mississippi,\* for Circular 123 on this same subject. In this circular, Mississippi also points out that it is time to rid your cattle of internal parasites and gives suggestions for treatment.



Norway Was His Safety in Norway and Big Chance and He maybe they Made Most of It will. But their very escape will bring them closer to the day when they must scramble out of Norway, too, and when their Polizeifuehrer Wilhelm Redeiss must end his dark, savage rule there, he and the renegade Jonas Lie.

The story of Redeiss is hard to get at. Revealed details are few and most of them from sources which, to be mild, are unfriendly to all Nazis. But when the bias is winnowed out, the scanty record is cheap when it is not ugly.

He was born in 1900 at Heinsberg, close by the Dutch border and raised in a decent, church-going family. Dull in school, he was worse when apprenticed to an electrical engineer. Fellow workers in the shop rounded on him quickly for habits which were later alleged against the murdered Ernest Rohm. These habits, however, did not slow up promo-tion after he joined the Nazis.

First he was in the Hitler-Youth movement. Then he drummed up rookies for the labor camps. Then he swung a blackjack in the Nazi militia. At last he hit the jackpot, he was accepted in the S.S., Hitler's own Elite Guard. This corps of maulers gave him work right up his alley. He got to be a regional group leader, and then was rewarded first with membership in the Prussian parliament and then with a seat in the Charlie McCarthy Reichstag.

In Norway, at 43, he holds the rank of police general. And there, according to Underground reports, his Gestapo command includes a select inner circle of troopers having records and habits like his own.

Jonas Lie, Kin of trymen call him Judas. The Poet, Labeled His is one of Judas of Norway the classical names in Norway, worn once by one of the country's fine poets. It is a grand-son of the poet who has sold out to the Nazis. Of his rule, and of Redeiss' super-rule the Swedish newspaper Arbetaren said:

"One feels ashamed to belong to the human race when one hears of such horrors. No beast would be as bloodthirsty as these men who revel in torture." And the Svenska Dagbladet, sometimes sympathetic to the Nazi cause, added: "Only a categori-
