

> THE BIGGEST PROBLEM facing Americans today is the threat of double-digit inflation, which continues to eat up our constantlyshrinking dollars.

Inflation, which causes virtually everything that we need and use to increase in price, has been eating at our pocketbooks for the past 20 years. After each cycle, which sees the economy take brief dips and jumps, the nation's economy has been pushed to a higher basic price level.

Inflation does some funny things to the economy, and in recent years it actually spurred the longest business expansion in postwar history. Faced with the prospect of higher and higher prices, consumers changed their buying plans, spending money on items they had planned to buy later, hoping to avoid the inflationary depreciation of their dollars. This caused the nation's savings rate to hit a new low, and the consumer debt figure to hit an alltime high. Most families have been able to ride the tide of the new rise in inflation by virtue of both husbands and wives working, but even multiple-income families have seen their buying power lessened to a large extent. In the midst of these economic troubles, financial experts have been expecting President Carter to encourage Congress to cut spending, and to instigate tax cuts as a means of helping the situation. It seems that the liberals in Congress are bent on spending more tax money, for new or expanded federal programs. This would be popular with many voters, with an election year coming up, but it should not endear them to the working class. One threat, which we were discussing with a local businessman this week, is that government programs, including welfare and all of its spin-offs, will someday have more people getting the "dole" than there are those of us taxpayers who are working to provide their living as well as ours. When this happens, it will be virtually impossible--and it apparently isn't too far away--to oust the money-spenders in Congress in favor of more conservative-minded representation. There are pockets of the country already, where this might not be possible to achieve, even today. We may be somewhat more fortunate in this section of the country, pertaining to the economic situation, in that the price we pay for our energy resources is still somewhat below that of other sections. And, we are less likely to have the bitter cold winter weather that may cause residents in the north and east not only to pay substantial amounts of their paychecks for heating oil, but face the possibility of a fuel shortage.

Body Found Here Believed To Be Of Missing Man

The body of a dead man, presumed to be that of a Bovina man missing since last May was found late on the afternoon of September 25 by a group of Bovina youngsters near the Santa Fe railroad bridge east of town. The body was discovered in a ditch

The body was discovered in a ditch by three youngsters, notably Bobby Robledo, who reported it to his father who in turn notified Henry Minter.

## Welding Course Is Scheduled Locally

A Farm Arc Welding short course for adult farmers will be held October 22-25 under the sponsorship of the Bovina High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Bob Owen, Superintendent, Lawrence Widner and Butch Willoughby, teachers of vocational agriculture.

Royce Hart, Arc Welding Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency, and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Hart is a native of Upshur County, Texas, and was reared on an East Texas farm. He graduated from Union High School near Gilmer, Texas. He received his B.S. degree in Agricultural Engineering from Texas A&M University in 1960. He was owner-manager of a truck and tractor company in Gilmer for a number of years. For four years, Mr. Hart was involved in sales, planning and installation of feed handling and storage equipment. Prior to joining the Agricultural Education Adult Specialist Program on January 1, 1975, he participated in an intensive welding training program.

The short course at Bovina High School is scheduled to begin October 22-25 at 8 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Hart will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Lawrence Widner.

The 15th annual First Freeze Contest, sponsored by The Bovina Blade, is underway.



**QUESTIONS OFTEN ASKED ABOUT** YOUR EYES By B.W. Armistead & Steven D. Smith Optometrists-Littlefield

Q: Why should hunters have their vision checked annually?

A: A hunter's decision to squeeze the trigger is influenced primarily by what he "sees," or more specifically, "what he thinks he sees." The quality of his vision is a key factor. If his vision is inadequate, he increases his accident potential substantially-becoming a hazard to himself as well as to others. Many hunters are unaware that

their vision is defective. They think they see just fine, while others hesitate to admit they have a problem for fear they must give up their sport. Fortunately, most vision defects can be corrected and, generally, there is no need to give up hunting.

Q: Is defective vision really that dangerous?

A: Yes. A Minnesota Hunter Casualty study showed that 77 per cent of those who wounded fellow hunters had defective vision--and half of them were not aware of it. Also, it is estimated that as high as 8 per cent of our male population are colorblind and have particular trouble distinguishing between red and green. (Of approximately 17 million hunters, 850,000 cannot distinguish color properly, a dangerous threat to fellow huntsmen.)

Q: What vision skills are needed to be a safe and successful hunter?

A: Hunting is a sport that requires excellent hand-eye coordination. Reflexes must be fast, and the hunter's eye true if he is to hit his target with any degree of accuracy. A hunter must be able to:

1. Distinguish detail at considerable distance and against a variety of backgrounds:

2. Focus clearly on near and distant objects and switch focus within a fraction of a second;

3. Judge distance with speed and accuracy;

4. Detect objects and movements on either side of the target;

5. Identify colors;

6. See comfortably and perform under a variety of light and weather conditions.

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
