## Miss Berry Writes

The response of the people Hedley to the testing of pressure cooker gauges was very gratifying are many other coosers there testing.
A word of warning regarding the safety valves on your cookers which has developed from my ex-
perience working with them the perience working with them the
past two weeks. Many of you have cookers used from ten to wenty years and they have never been tested oc had the safety valve cieaned. For the safety of the person using the cooker just unscrew the valve and scour
thoroughly so that the small steel bail will not stick. This will allow thr excess steam to pass of if the oes too high and wil you are cooking.
In testing the cookers 11 lbs . pressure was used instead of 10 lbs . This is because boiling point here is 209 degrees F. instead of 212 degrees 1. Therefore in Hediey with an altitude of about 2700 ft ., the recipe calls for.
