AS USUAL, one of the biggest problems facing state lawmakers is the re-drawing of boundary lines for the state's senatorial and representative districts, as well as for the U.S. Congressional districts.

Inability of the legislature to agree on the new district boundaries will cause a special session of the Texas legislature this summer. The regular session ended Monday in Austin, with the state houses still debating the issue.

One thing is certain for residents of Parmer County, and that is the fact that we will have to share our state representative with more counties. This is due to the fact that Parmer County has shown nowhere near the population growth as is evident in the metropolitan areas downstate.

The number of state representatives and senators remains the same, so every time a census is taken, the legislature is faced with the job of redrawing district boundaries, so that elected representatives will be able to have (within reason), districts with approximately an equal number of people.

Since Parmer County and others in this area showed only modest population gains during the past decade, it was a foregone conclusion that our voice in the state legislature would be diluted, as our representative would be spread out over more territory.

For the past decade, Bill Clayton's 74th district has been composed of Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Deaf Smith, Lamb, Oldham and Parmer counties.

One of the plans submitted would place Castro and Lamb counties in with the district currently represented by Pete Laney of Hale Center. Laney's old district has been composed of Hale, Swisher and part of Lubbock county.

Deaf Smith and Oldham counties, previously in Clayton's district, would be shifted into a district to the north.

According to one plan advanced, Parmer County residents would be aligned in a district stretching from this county on the north, all the way to Andrews County on the south (all down the western edge of the state), plus Hockley (Levelland) and Terry (Brownfield) counties.

Frankly, we'd rather be grouped with the counties going into Laney's district, or to the north with Deaf Smith, if we had a choice in the matter. But in reality, we have little choice, and our fate will be decided by a vote of the entire Texas house of representatives.

According to one report concerning the boundary lines, every time a county is shifted downstate, it causes a "domino effect" for every county from the coast to the Panhandle, as the lines have to be re-made to try to conform to the population "norm."

Representative Clayton has stated that he will not seek another term in the legislature, so we will lose the Springlake lawmaker at the end of the current term anyway.

But we're hoping for some type of break when the state legislature reconvenes. It was probably lucky for us that the matter was not settled at the midnight hour this week.

IN THE STATE senate, it appears that we'll be able to keep Bill Sarpalus, who is doing a great job in his first session. But Sarpalus will have to add counties to his district, to come up with the needed population.

Also, we should be able to keep Congressman Kent Hance as "our man in Washington," but Hance's district lines also have to be changed. If the job isn't hard enough, legislators have to try to assure minority leaders that they are not discriminated against when the lines are drawn.

The court approved an agreement proposed by Judge Jack Young concerning personnel of the adult

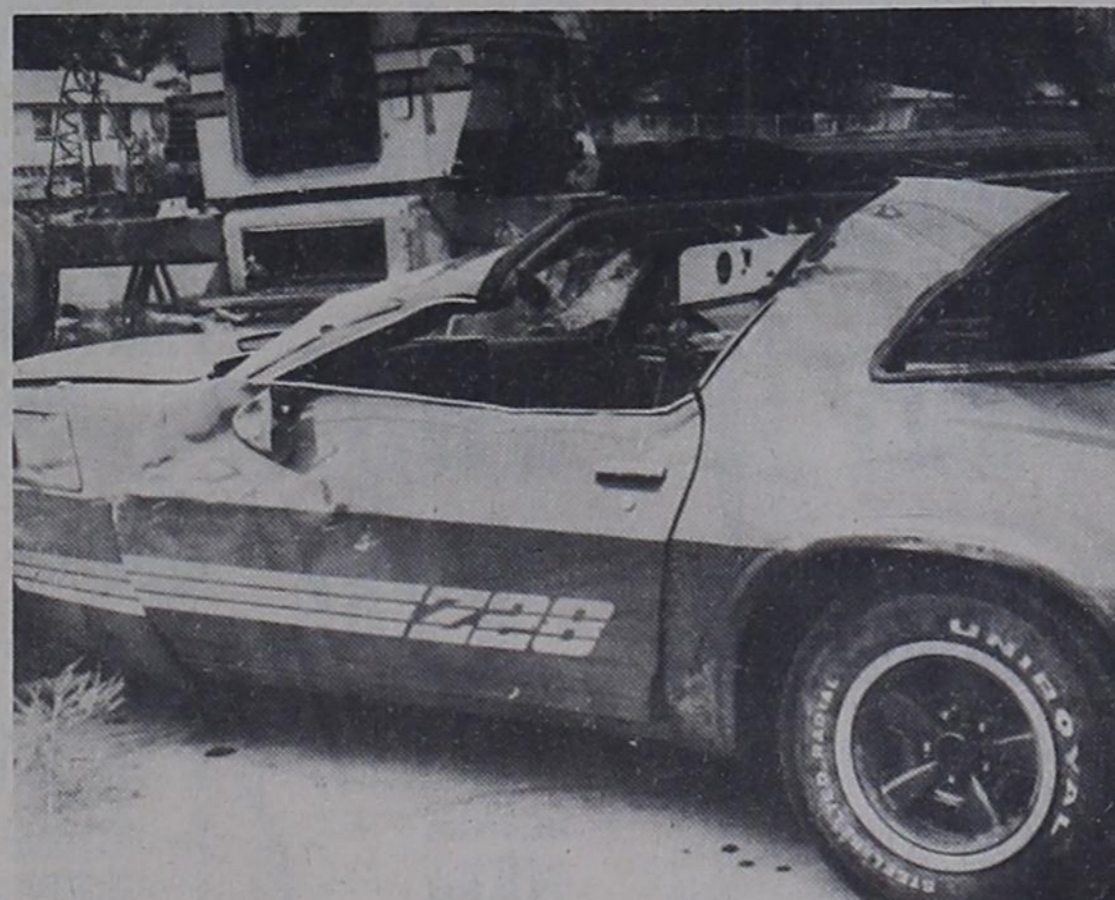
probation department, who had formerly been employed by the 154th judicial district, but due to the district split are now employees of the 287th district.

David Steelman Services Held

Funeral services for David Allen Steelman, 20, were conducted here last Friday. Steelman was killed in a one-car rollover south of Bovina early last Wednesday morning, May 27, and the wreck seriously injured his companion.

Steelman, a 1979 graduate of Bovina High School and a freshman at West Texas State University, was pronounced dead at the scene, about five miles south of Bovina on FM 1731, by justice of the peace Albert Smith of Farwell.

Kevin Dudley Hughes, 18, was taken to West Plains Hospital in Muleshoe, where it was thought he was in satisfactory condition with cuts and bruises, until it was learned on Thursday that he had suffered a broken back and was transferred to a Lubbock hospital.

Hughes had completed his senior year at Bovina High School, and was scheduled to have received his diploma at the graduation exercises there Friday evening.

The two young men were riding in a new car which was reportedly a graduation gift to Hughes when the accident occurred. DPS officers said that the car turned sideways and rolled into the ditch by the southbound lane. Both men were thrown from the vehicle. There was some confusion as to which was driving the car at the time of the accident.

Funeral services for Steelman were held Friday afternoon at the First Baptist Church in Bovina, with the Rev. Derrell Lewis of Amarillo, former pastor, and Rev. J.L. Bass,

recently named pastor, officiating. Burial was in Bovina Cemetery under the direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home.

Steelman was a member of the First Baptist Church of Bovina. While in high school, he had been active in football, basketball, and track. He was student council president as a junior and district FFA president as a senior.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Gayle Steelman, and grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. A.E. Steelman, all of Bovina, and grandmother, Mrs. Ruby Tucker of Plainview, and a brother, Joe, of Bovina.

Pallbearers were Randall Ritchie, James Ritchie, David Murphy, Terry Schilling, Pat Ware and Ronnie Cary. Honorary pallbearers were all friends of Steelman.

L.L. Draft On Saturday

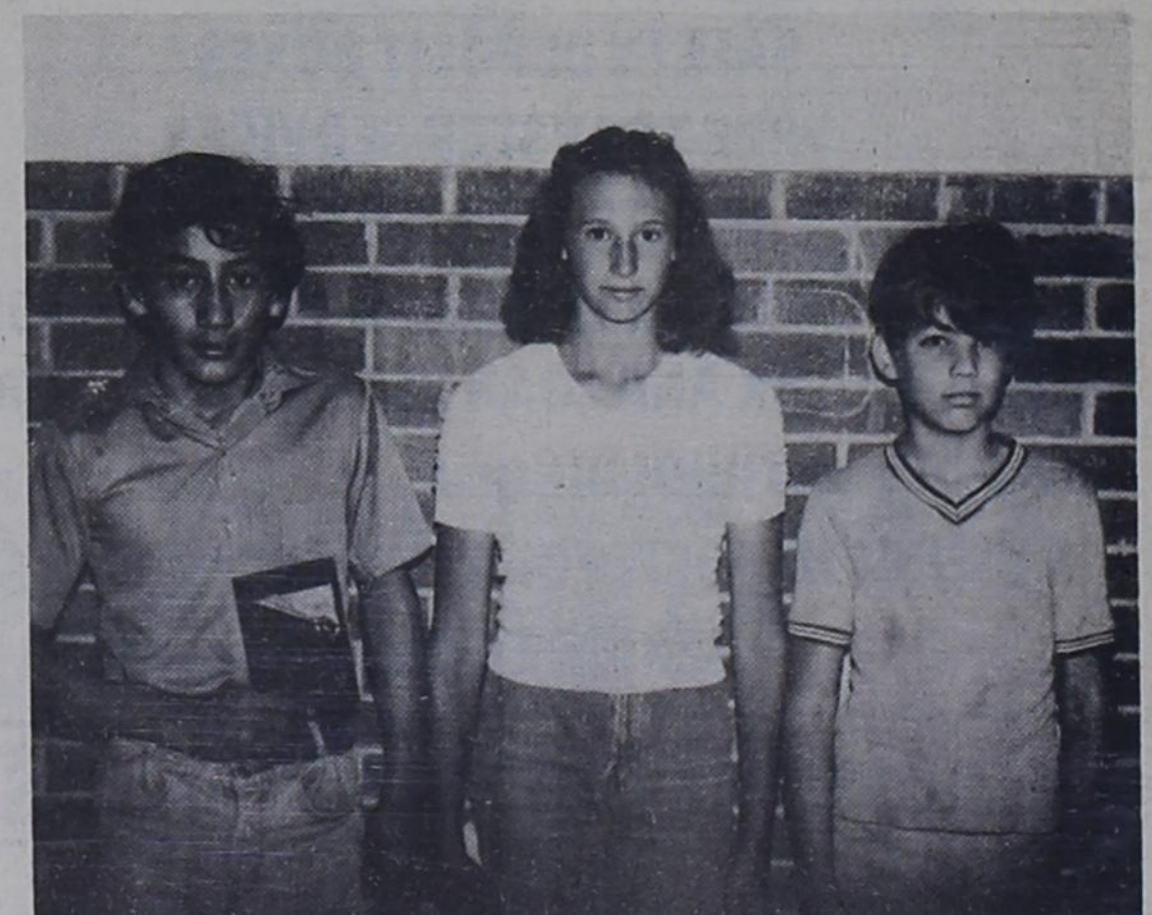
The Bovina Little League and Pee Wee League will hold their draft meeting on Saturday, June 6, at 1:30 p.m. at the Little League field.

A. Spring Graduates At Cottey

Alicia Gail Spring, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Don Spring, Bovina, received the Associate of Arts Degree from Cottey College, Nevada, Mo., during recent graduation exercises at the college.

Margaret Harper, founder of the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation, which produces the drama, "Texas," each summer in Palo Duro Canyon, was the commencement speaker.

Cottey College is a two-year liberal arts college for women owned and operated by the P.E.O. Sisterhood. P.E.O. is an organization of 210,000 women in the U.S. and Canada dedicated to providing educational opportunities for women.

Cottey College has a student body of 350 and maintains a student-faculty ratio of 10-1. The flexible liberal arts curriculum is designed for maximum ease of transfer to a four-year institution after two years at Cottey. The student body is made up of students from approximately 40 states, Canada and a number of foreign countries.

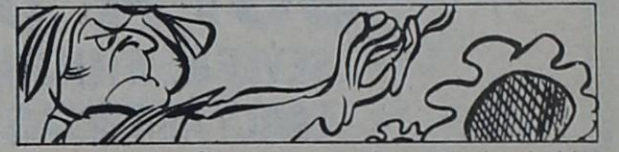
Historical Group Sets Meeting

CETA To Offer Job Programs

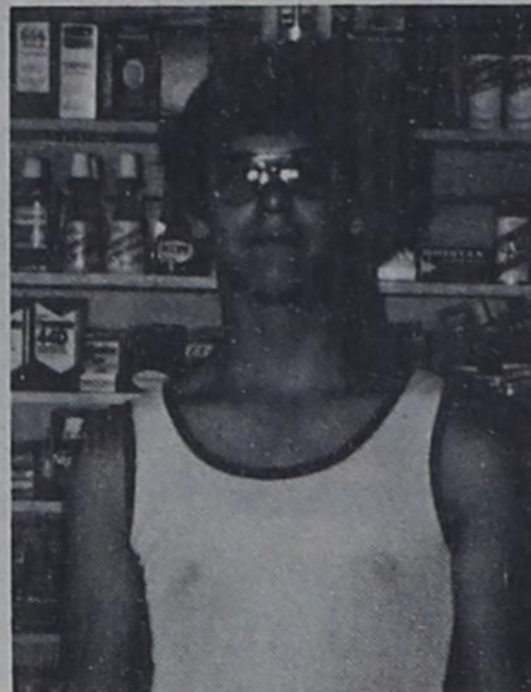
The Texas Panhandle Community Action Agency is now seeking eligible applicants for the 1981 Summer Youth Employment Programs.

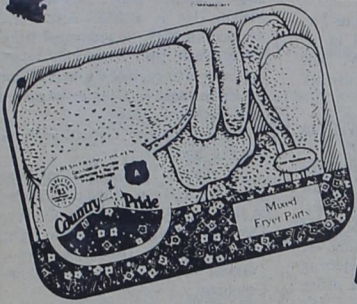

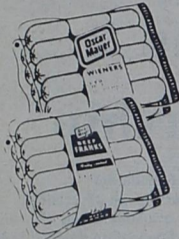

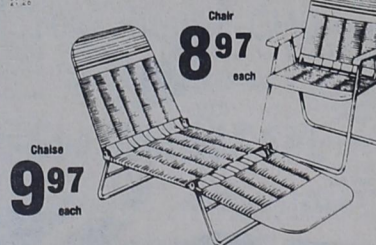
