WHILE AMERICA TRIES to cope with the energy problem, and other such vital issues as a water and food supply, the problem which may be the biggest one for the nation during the 1980s may well be that of illegal aliens.

It is more than ironic, when you consider the fact that experts pleaded with Americans during the 1960s and 1970s, asking for them to plan their families with "zero population growth" as a goal. In other words, they could have two children, eventually replacing themselves, but no more.

And for the most part, this has been accomplished. "America would be close to zero growth if it weren't for the influx of outsiders. The irony is that most of these newcomers have high birthrate patterns. One must assume that they are prepared to repeat here the conditions that caused them to flee (their native lands)," said Jenkin Lloyd Jones in a recent column on this problem.

Congress is expected to pass a new immigration law this year for the first time in 68 years, and it could be one of the most important pieces of legislation it passes.

Father Theodore Hesburgh, president of Notre Dame University, served as chairman of the congressional committee on Immigration and Refugee policy. He quotes a public opinion poll to the effect that more than half of the population of Latin America would like to come to the United States.

In his recent comment, columnist Jones pointed out that the problem of having too many immigrants seems to be almost uniquely American. We have had to contend with the boat people from Vietnam, the refugees from Haiti, and the Jews escaping from Russia.

This is to say nothing of the Mexicans for whom President Lopez Portillo would like to have free access across the Texas-Mexican border.

All of these people, Jones correctly points out, make a bee-line for the U.S. of A.

Father Hesburgh points out that there are now more people in the world officially classified as refugees than there were at the end of World War II. The United States has accepted more than all the other nations combined.

Yet, Jones says, there remains in this country a peculiar guilt complex that surfaces every time new ways of controlling immigration are suggested. It springs from national tradition in which we had a big, empty country, with not only plenty of room for new farmers, miners, railroad builders and factory hands, but a solid economic need for them.

But, things have changed considerably since Emma Lazarus penned these words, mounted on the Statue of Liberty: "Give me your tired, your poor, Your huddled masses, yearning to breathe free."

The Tulsa columnist points out that if we feel guilty by curtailing immigration, we should consider other countries' policies. "Try to get Japanese citizenship. Israel accepts only Jews. Australia and New Zealand exclude Orientals. No African state welcomes migration, and Canada chooses without apology only those whom they feel will prove useful," he states.

Back in the 1800s, we may have had a need for all the warm bodies we could get—but times, and conditions have changed considerably.

Crops Sustain Hail Damage

Area farmers are taking a long look at, for some, what is left of their crops, and many of these are trying to make decisions about what to do since the heavy rains and hail in the Bovina area last week.

The Blade called area farmers to find out how they had fared against the rain and hail, and unfortunately, most of our reports were not good.

It was reported that Mike Beauchamp's farm was hit pretty hard, and when we got in touch with the Lawrence Jamerson family, Mrs. Jamerson said that they had lost 175 to 180 acres of cotton and they weren't sure how their corn would come out. They had extensive hail damage to their corn and she also said that they got about 2 1/2 inches of rain.

We were unable to reach James Clayton, but talked instead to his mother, Mrs. Jack Clayton, and she said they got no rain and therefore no hail, but on James' place, there was very little left, except for a small patch of cotton, which might be salvagable. She also said that the

guide wires on the antenna at James' home were torn loose from the high winds which struck the area.

A source at the Leon Schilling home indicated to the Blade that Leon had had his cotton hailed out, and might lose part of his corn crop, but were not sure at the time we called.

On the Kregg Wilson place, it was reported that Kregg and the hired hand were both out sandfighting, in hopes to save the cotton crop, and they reported two inches of rain.

Probably around 3,000 acres of cotton were damaged altogether, according to an estimate by Harry Johnson of Sherley Grain.

The garden is planted and if hail, drought, and insects don't ruin it, you'll be putting the fruits and vegetables of your labor up for the winter.

Since the dawn of history, homemakers have searched for ways to preserve the families food supply to eat at a later date when the elements made food scarce.

Today's homemaker needs to simply follow the directions to be assured high quality home preserved food. Novice or pro, we have help for you at the Extension office. Call (481-3619) or come by--I'd be glad to help you!

Proper equipment for home canning is an absolute necessity. One of the major reasons for spoilage of home-canned foods is faulty or improper equipment. Check your equipment now, so when the time comes for using it, you'll be ready.

Thrifty homemakers sometimes use mayonnaise, peanut butter or other commercial jars in an effort to save money. NEVER do this! These jars are not tempered to withstand the heat treatment and may not seal properly in home canning. Check standard canning jars for cracks, chips and dents. Discard those with defects that would prevent an airtight seal. A two-piece, self-seal lid is used for home canning. It has a metal disc and a metal ring and is self-sealing as the jar cools after processing. The disc can only be used once, but the ring may be used again if it is not rusted or dented.
