## Canning Sugar

"The second period for issuance of home canning sugar was designated to run through November because of late fall fruits in many parts of this district." The original plan is to be continued to provide sugar for canning fall fruits, as is pointed out.

Many local boards have reported an influx of applications for home canning sugar following a recent report that October 31 was the application deadline in some districts in Texas.

Such a school must last 9 months. It cannot consider any day a school day unless more than 50 percent of the pupils are present. If the school is less than 9 months, high school credits are cut. In such a school teachers who do not have degrees must go to school each summer till a degree is obtained or take work by extension. The board has done all possible to the farmers. It would do more if possible. But to do more would cause Hedley to lose its and some of its credits.

**WAR PRODUCTION: V-E Cutbacks**

One-third of all war contracts will be terminated within three months after the defeat of Germany, a War Production board official announced with speedy settlements with manufacturers assuring smoother reversion.

To date, the government has 325 billion dollars in war contracts. It was revealed, with cancellations totaling 240 billion dollars. After cancellations, about 65 billion dollars of contracts are now outstanding, one-third, or about 20 billion dollars worth, of which would be terminated on V-E day.

Of 37,000 contracts valued at 1 billion dollars cancelled thus far, 28,000 have been settled for 3 billion dollars, W.P.B. said.

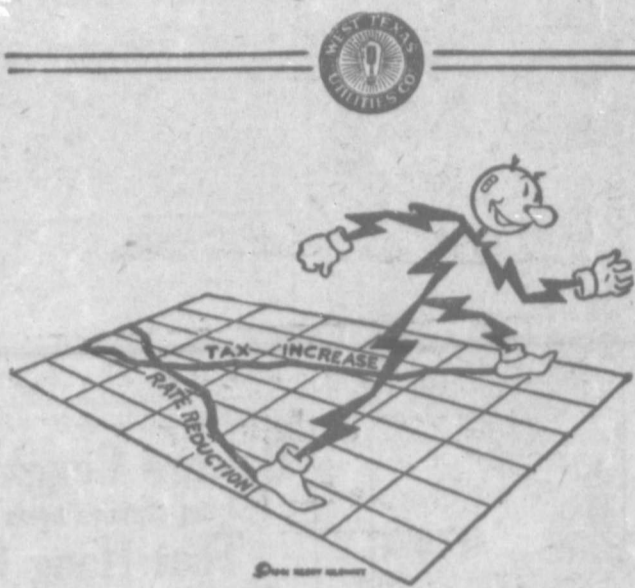

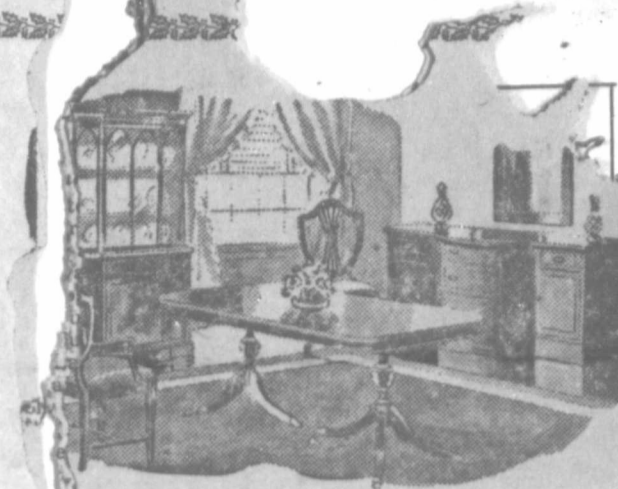

## MOOD OF THE MOMENT

Any of your calves showing up with circles under their eyes or turning in poor report cards? Chances are, if so, they are not getting enough Vitamin A, B complex or D.

All joking aside, calves do need vitamins, to keep them healthy, to build their bones properly and to help fight off certain diseases.

Vitamins are contained in the feed your calves get, but they may not be present in sufficient quantity. It's a very good idea and not too costly, to give them vitamins in capsules.

A circular called "Calves Need Vitamins" issued by the University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wis., recommends a double O size capsule of Vitamin A oil every other day, starting at birth and continuing until the calf is eating good quality hay.

B complex is recommended every other day for two or three weeks. These vitamins help clear up scours.

If your calves are getting plenty of sunshine, they may not need Vitamin D, but to prevent rickets add 1/4 to 1/2 pound of irradiated yeast to each 2,000 pounds of grain mixture.

The Wisconsin bulletin tells what vitamins do and why they should be added to your calves' diet. I suggest you write the extension service at Madison for a copy.

#### Winter Cooling of Milk Is Essential

Old Man Winter puts a stop to worrying about controlling most insects, but there seems to be a mistaken idea in some places that cold weather also stops the necessity for cooling milk rapidly.

Bacteria multiply as rapidly in winter as in summer, if the milk temperature is not brought down to 50 degrees or lower. Cold air circulating around a can of milk does not do the job. Even if it is sub-zero outside and down to 40 inside the milkhouse, you still should cool milk with circulating cold water, just as in summer.

Idaho University says cold water is 21 times as efficient as cold air in cooling milk. In an experiment performed there, milk temperature stayed above 50 degrees when the cans were in 40-degree air three hours. When the cans were placed in 40-degree circulating water, the milk temperature dropped below 50 in slightly more than an hour.

The only sure way to check development of bacteria, summer or winter, is to cool your milk rapidly. Otherwise, some of it may show a test below usable standards, when it reaches the receiving plant.

Another important point is that milk will not freeze as long as it is in a cooling tank.

#### Protect Cows in Wintertime

About this time of year, a fellow starts to think about digging out the old red flannels, but you can't get them big enough to dress your cows in. Cows put on winter coats which do a pretty good job of protecting the animals against cold, but you need to do your part, too.

If your cows stay out in cold wind and rain, a lot of the feed you give them will be used to keep them warm, instead of producing milk. A cheap shed will do a great deal to prevent this waste of feed. Extra milk produced and manure saved will pay for the shed in a very little time.

If you house your cows in a barn, the extension services advise that it should be well ventilated, but free from drafts. The barn temperature should not go below freezing.

Farmers' Bulletin 2070 has some sound advice on protecting cows in winter. I suggest you ask your county agent for a copy.

#### Protein Needed in Winter

The extension service will tell you how much protein you need. Like any other feed, you should measure your protein. It is of great importance.

Protein quantities are determined, and recommended amounts are 1 1/2 to 2 pounds of grain for each 2 1/2 to 3 pounds of milk produced, plus two pounds of hay for every 100 pounds of live weight of the cow.

It's pretty difficult for an ordinary guy like me to figure out just by looking how much protein is in a feed ration, but there is an easy way to get the dope on it. All you need is a copy of the feeding booklet issued by the extension service in your state. It contains tables showing different protein contents of different rations and will tell you how to plan your rations properly.

Among these booklets are Circular 405, Extension Service, University of Missouri, Columbia, Mo., and Bulletin B-69, Extension Service, Texas A & M College, College Station, Texas.

\*NOTE: There usually is a 5c charge for pamphlets mailed to non-residents of a state, but possibly your own state has a free pamphlet on the same subject. Ask your county agent.

**RAIL TRAFFIC:**  
**To Stay Heavy**  
As government agencies resisted increases in railroad freight and passenger rates, army officials predicted continued high traffic after the end of the European war as the emphasis on movement will shift to the west for acceleration of the struggle against the Japs.  
In opposing the railroads' petitions for average freight rate increases of 6 per cent, and a retention of the 10 per cent boost in passenger fares, agricultural agencies declared heavy production assured the carriers of continued high tonnage.  
Not only will the rails have to handle longer hauls to western ports for the Pacific war after Germany's surrender, army officials said, but rolling stock also will be needed for shipments to Atlantic ports. Some troops also will be sent to fight the Japanese and they will have to be funneled through Europe.

**AIR TRAVEL:**  
**Super-Liners**  
As the Civil Aeronautics Board conducted hearings on the costs and volume of transatlantic air travel in deciding how many superliners should be allowed to open over ocean routes, plans were presented for elaborate facilities to be used in such transport.  
Listed for use by one airline was a new, and as yet undeveloped, combination passenger-cargo plane weighing 92 tons and capable of carrying 128 people by day and 119 by night 3,500 miles at a cruising speed of 288 miles per hour. Cargo capacity would be 2,082 cubic feet.  
Also listed for use was Lockheed's famed Constellation, now in production as an army transport plane, with a passenger capacity of 40 by day and 30 by night and a cruising speed of 322 miles per hour. The Constellation holds an unofficial speed record of 6 hours and 58 minutes from Los Angeles to Washington, D. C.

**May Ring Again**  
Repair of America's historic liberty bell so that it could ring out in full tone on the day was proposed by W. J. Conley of the Lincoln Electric company of Cleveland, Ohio.  
Housed in Independence Hall in Philadelphia where it was rung to summon citizens for a celebration of the Declaration of Independence, the bell cracked in 1835 while tolling out the death of Chief Justice John Marshall.  
Of copper and tin structure, the bell could be repaired by arc welding, Conley declared.

**HURRICANE**  
**Sweeps Coast**  
Leaving its principal roots, the hurricane moved northward at a rate of 15 miles per hour, with 6-hour gales shifting in from the thickly populated areas around Bradenton and Tampa inland, with some troops refuge in churches and schools. Residents of the low-lying coastal area on the Atlantic side of Florida were advised to retire to higher ground since abnormal tides were predicted.  
Besides taking a toll of two lives in Florida, the hurricane blew virtually all of the state's record crop of oranges and grapefruit to the ground, causing damage estimated at \$50,000,000.

**Planes Drop Rescue Ships**  
Equipped for 36 People  
When survivors of torpedoed ships and ditched planes cannot be rescued in other ways, a United States AAF plane now drops to them, by parachute, a boat called the Flying Dutchman, says Collier's. Weighing 3,000 pounds and holding about 36 people, this boat carries food, clothing, radio, water still, fishing tackle and blood plasma; also sails, two engines and a large supply of gasoline.  
When the Flying Dutchman hits the water, a mechanism sets off smokepots to mark its location and fires rockets which carry long buoy lines to assist survivors in reaching the boat.
