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Allied Winter Push Aims Heart of German Industry; Sets Food Goals for 1945

With President Roosevelt, Prime Minister Churchill, and Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek scheduled to meet soon, there are signs that the future disposition of Germany, the Reich might well be re-organized into three zones: (1) the Rhine, obtaining Bavaria; (2) Holland being ceded to the Russians and Poles dividing East Prussia and part of Silesia, and the Czechoslovakia.

EUROPE: Big Push

Using their superior forces to prevent the Germans from building up strength for next year, the Allies launched an all-out drive against the enemy's west wall, moving toward the vital industrial Rhineland despite winter weather. Although they had a general offensive, the Allies' superior military maneuvering from the front while their troops would have to rely on their spirit to stay in the fight.

As the Allied attack got underway, the British 2nd army striking in southeastern Holland stood only 37 miles from Duisberg; the U. S. 9th striking to the Tommies' south was 31 miles from Dusseldorf; the U. S. 3rd swinging below Aachen was 28 miles from Cologne; the U. S. 3rd king past Metz was 13 1/2 miles from the Saar, and the U. S. 7th marching east were 40 miles from Metz.

Local points of the attack centered in the U. S. 9th and 1st army units, where swarms of Allied heavy bombers supported by fighter-bombers dropped thousands of tons of bombs on the enemy's rear.

Heavy concentrations of artillery joined in the bombardment of German positions, then the Allies moved forward, with members of the infantry sloping along mud-caked tanks to capture Metz. Prior to the general offensive, the British in Holland, the U. S. in Metz and the mix of forces had improved their fighting.

The Yanks in some of the most critical fighting closer to the vital Ruhr for its coal and chemical production. In slashing forward, they ringed the formidable fortress city of Metz.

In writing of the Germans loudly broadcast at the bastion had largely served its purpose of holding up the Allies' drive to give them time to strengthen their fortifications farther rear.

The Allies came off in the midst of a wave of rumors that Heinrich Himmler had taken over absolute charge of the Reich from an ailing Adolf Hitler. Appointed commander of the Reich's home army by Hitler himself, Himmler busied himself trying to shove up German morale for the mighty blows that fell about that nation's unhappy head.

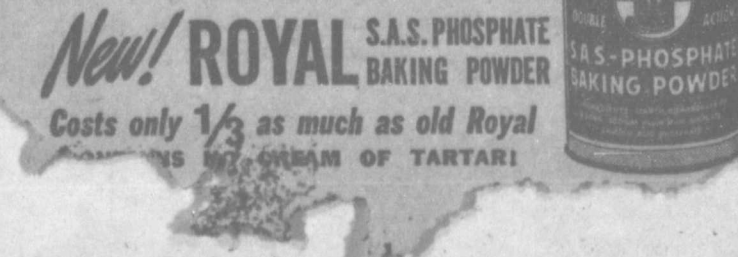

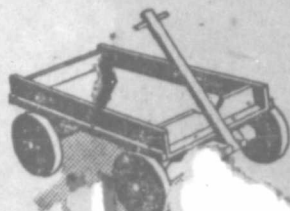

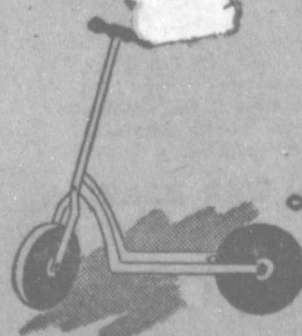

MOOS OF THE MOMENT

BY UNCLE BOB

Eight new pieces of heavy artillery are ready for delivery to the nation's dairymen for their 1945 battle of production. These are the recommendations in the new 8-point milk production program announced recently from Washington.

Stress in 1945 will be on efficiency in production, and every dairyman who wants to improve his methods will find these eight points invaluable as a guide in his operations.

Here they are:

1. Grow an abundance of high quality roughage.
2. Balance your herd with your feed supply.
3. Keep production records on each cow in your herd.
4. Practice disease control methods.
5. Produce milk and cream of the highest quality.
6. Adopt labor saving methods.
7. Take care of your land.
8. Develop a sound breeding program.

Avoid Late Rush By Ordering Seeds Now

I can remember a Christmas year back yonder when I shook my stocking and that jack-knife I was expecting didn't show up. It was an awful blow. It's going to be a shock to some folks next spring when planting time

comes 'round and they find their supply of fertilizer or seed or both has not arrived, because supply houses are swamped with late orders.

There was a rush late last spring when many orders came in at once and some farmers had to wait to get their supplies. But, like most problems, there's a simple way out.

You'll save yourself some possible grief if you'll order now and take delivery soon after the first of the year. Probably you already know how much lime or phosphate or nitrogen you'll need, how much corn or oats seed or something else you'll want.

It will help the suppliers and it will help the transportation situation if you'll get your orders in right away.

Late Pasturing May Damage Cover Crops

You remember the story about the goose which laid the golden eggs and how its owner cooked his own goose. Cover crops may not be actual gold mines but they put money in the dairyman's pocket.

However, you can overwork them and right now is the proper time to pull your cows off these fall pastures, to prevent damaging them and cutting down the "golden egg" production which you are expecting next spring.

Cover crops have done a fine job of keeping up milk production. Now they need a rest, particularly if there have not been any good recent rains and if a freeze may be expected in the near future.

Dairy specialists and the experts on pastures at the colleges tell me that the First of December is a cut-off time for cover crop pasturing. In the spring, they'll come back and you can start pasturing again. Past December 1, continued pasturing may cause severe damage.

If you still need cover crop bulletins, write the Extension Service, Mississippi State College, State College, Miss., for Leaflet No. 54, or the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, Tenn., for Leaflet No. 6.

NOTE: There usually is a 5c charge for pamphlets mailed to non-residents of a state; but possibly your own state has a free pamphlet on the same subject. Ask your county agent.

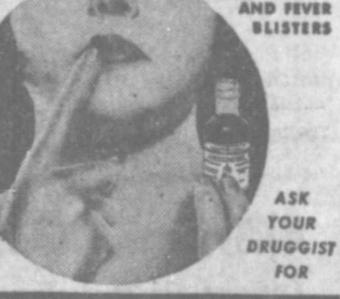

Crew Returns From the Dead in Miracle Fortress
Crippled, Two Engines Missing, Left Alone to Fight Nazi Air Hordes

By Ernie Pyle

(Editor's Note: This article retells some of his experiences while he was with the Doughboys during the North Africa campaign. He is now taking a long-needed rest in New Mexico.)

A FORWARD AIRDROME IN FRENCH NORTH AFRICA.—You read the official communiques a few days ago about a devastating raid by our Flying Fortress on a huge German bomber airdrome near Tripoli. What you didn't read, at least in any detail, is the story contained in these next two columns.

It was late afternoon at our desert airdrome. The sun was lazy, the air was warm, and a faint haze of propeller exhaust hung over the field, giving it softness.

It was time for the planes to start coming in from their home bases. The first one did fly in and

landed. The last of the sunset died, and the sky turned into blackness, which would help the Germans if they came on schedule with their bombs. But nobody cared. Our 10 dead men were miraculously back from the grave.

BRINGING THUNDERBIRD HOME
The 10 men who brought their Flying Fortress home from a raid on Tripoli, after they had been given up for lost, undoubtedly will get decorations. Nothing quite like it happened before in this war.

The airdrome was heavily defended by both fighter planes and anti-aircraft guns. Flying into the airdrome, as one pilot said, was like attacking a dozen

Thunderbirds. For that was the name of the Fortress—that was first hit and dropped its bomb load.

When both engines go out on the same side it is usually fatal. And therein lies the difference of this feat from other instances of bringing damaged bombers home.

The Thunderbird was forced to drop below the other Fortresses. And the moment a Fortress drops down or lags behind, German fighters are on it like vultures.

Everybody knew the pilot. He was so young, a couple of hours ago. The war came inside us then, and we felt it deeply.

As we stood on the tower looking down over this powerful scene, the day began folding itself up. Fighter planes, which patrol the field all day, were coming in. All the soldiers in the tent camps had finished supper. That noiseless peace that sometimes comes just before dusk hung over the airdrome. Men talked in low tones about the dead pilot and the lost Fortress.

We thought we would wait a few minutes more to see if the Germans were coming tonight.

MISSING FORTRESS RETURNS
And then an electric thing happened.

Far off in the dusk a red flare shot into the sky. It made an arc against the dark background of the mountains and fell to the earth. It couldn't be anything else. It had to be. The 10 dead men were coming home!

"Where's the flare gun? Gimme a green flare!" yelled an officer. He ran to the edge of the field and shouted "Look out below!" and a green rocket into the air.

Then we saw the plane—a tiny black speck. It was almost on the ground, it was low, and in the first glow of dawn could sense that it was moving, barely staying in the air. Crippled and dragging itself home.

I am a layman, and not a member of the fraternity that flies, but I can feel. And at that moment I felt something close to human love for that faithful battered machine, that far dark speck struggling toward us with such pathetic slowness.

All of us stood tense, hardly remembering anyone else was there. With our nervous systems we seemed to pull the plane toward us. I suspect a photograph would have shown us all leaning slightly to the left.

Not one of us thought the plane would ever make the field, but on it came—so slowly that it was cruel to watch.

It reached the far end of the airdrome, still holding its pathetic little altitude. It skimmed over the tops of parked planes, and kept on accurately reaching out—it seemed to us—for the runway. A few hundred

yards more now. Could it? Would it? Was it truly possible.

They cleared the last plane, and they were over the runway. They settled slowly. The wheels touched softly. And as the plane rolled on down the runway the thousands of men around that vast field suddenly realized that they were weak and that they could hear their hearts pounding.
