## Director Elected at Annual Stockholders Meeting of N. F. L. A.

Moore of Clarendon was elected to the board of directors of the Donley County National Farm Loan Association at the organization's annual meeting held in the Pastime Theatre at Clarendon Wednesday, October 3. Mr. Moore was re-elected after having served as a director for the past 9 years. Other directors of the association are Chas. H. Bugbee, J. B. Masterson, C. B. Morris and A. T. Simmons.

In his report, President Bugbee reviewed progress that farmers in this area have made in liquidating their loans as a result of recent good crops and prevailing good prices.

Secretary-Treasurer Rayburn L. Smith reported an increasing interest among farmers and ranchers in the type of loan the Federal Land Bank has to offer as evidenced by a number of loans now being closed by the Association. He asked that all members contact their friends who are interested in dependable, cooperative credit to buy or improve their farms.

## WHAT DOES OUR HOME TOWN NEED?

The week of October 22nd has been designated by Lions International as "What does our home town need week."

Thinking people generally are aware that we face a critical period in our history. Towns and cities make a nation, and if the towns and cities are progressive and prosperous.

We live in a community with the potential ability to better itself. Each person has his own basic needs, mental satisfaction and emotional desires. Some of these desires, satisfactions and needs can be met by his own efforts. Others can only be gratified by cooperative or public action.

This paper would like to hear from its readers. Just let us know of your ideas in regard to something that would be a benefit to the town and community and if possible a solution to the problem. We will be glad to keep this column open for the things our home town needs as long as you wish to send in your ideas.

Following is the first response to the query, "What does our home town need?"

The most important program that the citizens of this community could put over now is a program for the improvement of our soil. Within the last dozen years there has been a large percentage of our farms which in former years supported a family, that are now so run down and depleted that it is impossible for a family to make a living on them. Then too, others need better improvements and better care taken of the soil so that a substantial living can be made and the farmer can come to town and pay his obligations for his purchases.

Hedley needs better farms as we are dependent entirely on our farming interests, therefore, we should be very much interested in anything that will build up our farming territory. More livestock better improvements, and better farming equipment should be encouraged. This is one of many HEDLEY NEEDS.

The dairying industry seems to be on the upgrade in our community and should be encouraged. In order for the dairyman to prosper he must have better pasturage and more feed for his cows. To have better pasturage he must put more of his farm land into sudan or wheat and rye for pasture, this will improve the soil. More legumes should be raised, such as peas, sweet clover, lespedeza or other legumes that are adapted to this soil.

The better our farms can be made, with better improvements, the better our farmers will become and the acre yield will increase, thus giving our farmers more purchasing power and all this will help Hedley more than anything else that can be done at the present time.

The citizens of Hedley, every one of us, should be interested in helping to put over this kind of program.

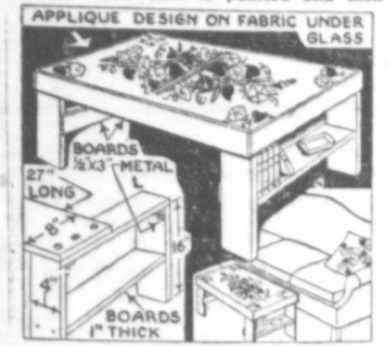

**WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS**

**Chart Economic Reform for Japs; Back Vets' Rights to Old Jobs; U.S. Acts to Settle Oil Strike**

**JAPAN: Economic Checkup**

To Gen. Douglas MacArthur went the task of supervising the economic reformation of Japan as a part of the U. S. program to destroy Nippon's war-making potential and promote widespread opportunity in a nation formerly dominated by four great business houses.

As MacArthur bent to the task, the prospects rose that the personal fortune of Emperor Hirohito would be divulged, revealing him as one of the world's wealthiest persons. Though the Mikado's assets are known to only a select few, the imperial family maintains a four-story concrete building complete with staff on the palace grounds to keep its accounts.

Indicative of the vastness of Hirohito's holdings, the emperor possesses stock in every Japanese enterprise, since a bloc of shares are allotted to the emperor by a corporation upon organizing. Of the 300,000 shares of the Bank of Japan, Hirohito reputedly owns 140,000.

Besides the Mikado, the great business houses of Mitsubishi, Sumitomo, Yasuda and Mitsu possess the greatest holdings in Japanese enterprise, with their share estimated at over half the total.

Under the U. S. program, steps will be favored for the dissolution of these politically influential institutions with their grip over banking, industry and commerce. Policies will be pushed for a wider distribution of income and ownership of productive and sales facilities, and encouragement given for the development of democratic labor and agricultural organizations.

In stripping Japan of its war-making potential, the U. S. will prohibit the operation of industries adaptable to war production. As in the case of Germany, manufacture of aircraft is to be prohibited and shipping is to be limited to immediate trade needs. U. S. authorities also will supervise Japanese industrial research.

As MacArthur's staff undertook an accounting of Japanese assets as the first step in the implementation of economic reform, the general ordered Premier Higashi-Kuni's government to institute immediate wage and price controls and ration commodities to head off extreme privation among the country's 80,000,000 people.

With Japanese experts figuring it would take Nippon from two to five years to get back on its feet, they proposed that the U. S. sell the country 250 million pounds of cotton within the next year in addition to 60 million pounds of wool; 3 million tons of rice; 2 million tons of salt; 500 thousand tons of sugar; 3 million barrels of oil, and 3 million tons of steel.

**FOOD: To Curb Output**

Declaring commodity production goals should reflect consumer demand rather than maximum ability for output, Secretary of Agriculture Clinton Anderson indicated that the government's 1946 farm program may call for smaller harvests in view of decreased military and civilian needs.

**LETTERMEN:**

A survey by the American College Publicity association shows that only 4 per cent of college letter men were turned down as physical unfit for military service, thus debunking the impression of a high rate of rejections among athletes.

According to the survey, only 358 students out of a total of 9,635 students in 119 colleges and universities in 1941 were found unfit for service.

**VETS: Job Rights**

Clarifying the rehiring provision of the selective service act, draft officials declared that a returning veteran has an absolute right to his former position, or one of like status, even if it means the discharge of a worker with higher seniority.

At the same time, the officials stated that no veteran would be required to take union membership in regaining his old position, since the law makes no provision for such conditions as a basis for his re-employment.

In handing down its ruling on vet job rights, draft officials directly clashed with the unions, which have stood for the rehiring of soldiers on a seniority basis, but opposed their re-employment in preference to others with longer working records at affected plants.

**LABOR: Fuel Threat**

Secretary Lewis Schwellenbach's new streamlined labor department received its first real test as federal conciliators moved to bring about settlement of the CIO oil workers' demands for a 30 per cent wage increase before a growing strike threat imperiled the nation's fuel supply.

Early negotiations were snagged by the union's demand that discussions be held on an industry-wide basis and the companies' equal insistence that agreements be effected by individual refineries. In asking a 30 per cent wage increase, the oil workers reflected the general CIO aim of maintaining wartime "take-home" pay by bringing 40-hour-per-week wages up to the total of the former 52-hour week.

In other labor trouble, 60,000 northwest AFL lumber workers struck to press demands for a \$1.16 hourly minimum compared with the present scale ranging upward from 70 cents, while 15,000 AFL elevator operators and building service employees paralyzed service in over 2,000 New York skyscrapers by walking out in protest of a War Labor board grant of \$28.05 for a 44 hour week instead of the \$30.15 asked for 40 hours.

**Push Fight on Polio**

In the mounting drive against polio, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis allotted the unprecedented total of \$4,157,814.15 for research, education and the treatment in the year ending last May 31.

As yet no preventive or cure for polio has been found, although it is generally recognized as an infectious, communicable disease caused by a virus.

**Natives Found Corporal's Bite Worse Than His Bark**

A corporal in New Guinea proved that his bite was worse than his bark when he put his teeth into his dealings with natives.

When the natives refused to take their work for the army quartermaster corps seriously, the corporal released an angry tirade—with such vigor that his false teeth fell to the ground.

"The incident," the army grave reports, "caused great concern among the natives. The corporal was looked upon with respect and awe, and his orders were obeyed."

**POST-WAR FLYING IN YOUR HOME TOWN**

By C. C. CAMPBELL, Member, Aviation Writers' Association, Washington, D. C.

**On the Air Map**  
 America has become air conscious. Under the impetus of war, aviation has advanced further than it might in several decades in normal times. Realizing this, town officials and civic minded citizens everywhere wonder just how and where their communities will fit in the postwar air picture. First necessary step, it is generally understood, is to provide facilities

ties so that planes can land and take-off, be maintained and repaired. But airports are known to be costly to build and operate. Medium-sized and small communities feel that such installations are beyond their reach.

If the term "airport" is used in its usual significance as a terminus for commercial airlines this may well be true. It is because "airport"

is too general a term and does not allow for distinctions as to size and type of landing facility, that it has now become necessary to provide other designations.

Thus the Personal Aircraft Council of the Aircraft Industries Association of America has suggested that facilities suitable for small communities or for neighborhood landing areas in large cities be called airparks. Intermediate landing places between cities, probably spaced at intervals where distances are great, are to be termed flight-stops. Towns or communities that have adjacent bays, rivers or lakes upon which aerial watercraft or amphibian planes could land, may be interested in establishing air harbors.

Showing that towns may easily be linked to world airways and pointing out that "the airplane has come to Main Street," the Council has prepared an illustrated booklet entitled "Put Your Town on the Air Map," for free distribution to community officials and planning groups.

It explains why the community which has no provisions to accommodate personal aircraft will be passed by in the air age. Whereas rails, roads and docks have built successful communities in the past, landing facilities for private planes as well as for feeder or area type transport planes will pace the growth of communities in the future.

In the plans and diagrams included it is emphasized that no community is too small for an airpark or similar landing facility; that the size and cost can be regulated according to the needs of the community or its potentialities, and that airparks eventually may pay their way, both directly and indirectly.

This is the third of a series of articles on postwar flying and its effect on community life. The next article, "The Aviation Committee" will appear in an early issue.

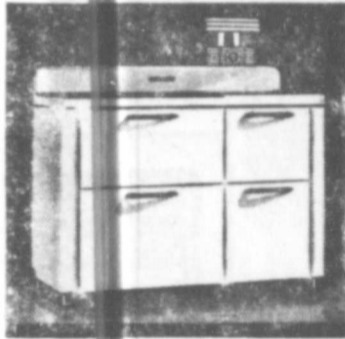

**HOUSEHOLD MEMOS... by Lynn Chambers**



Good to Bake—That's Devil's Food Cake (See Recipe Below)

**Cake Tempters**  
Family hungry for cake? As a general rule, families take it easy on cakes during the spring and summer because there's a wealth of fruits and berries to solve the dessert problem.

But, comes the first whiff of fall in the air, when the kitchen will stay cool enough even for baking, and there's the family on mother's heels begging for a cake.

Then, too, husbands and sons will soon be returning, and they will want a big taste of mother's good homemade cake. Be ready for the call when it comes, homemakers, with a brand new line-up of recipes that are bound to win the family.

We're still aware of the strategic situation in regard to sugar, so the following recipes don't go all-out for sugar. They're taste-tempting and delicious in spite of it all, and there's a grand variety from which to choose. Take your pick:

**\*Bran Devil's Food Cake.**  
(Makes 16 cupcakes.)  
1 1/4 cups sifted cake flour  
1 1/4 cups sugar  
1/2 cup cocoa  
2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon soda  
1 teaspoon salt  
3/4 cup shortening  
1/2 cup whole bran  
1 cup milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
2 eggs

Sift flour once, measure then sift again with sugar, cocoa, baking powder, soda and salt into mixing bowl. Add shortening and whole bran. Add about 3/4 of the milk, then vanilla; beat until perfectly smooth, about 100 strokes. Scrape bowl and spoon and mix well. Add remaining milk and beat until well blended. Add the well-beaten eggs. Fill greased muffin tins 3/4 full. Bake in a moderate (350-degree) oven about 25 or 30 minutes.

Do you like a cake served warm, in squares, with the tangy flavor of a citrus marmalade? This, then, is made-to-order:

**Marmalade Tea Cake.**  
2 tablespoons melted butter or substitute  
1/2 cup brown sugar  
1 1/4 cups corn flakes  
1 1/2 cups sifted flour  
3 teaspoons baking powder  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
4 tablespoons shortening  
1 egg  
3/4 cup milk  
1/2 cup marmalade

Blend together butter, brown sugar and 1/2 cup corn flakes. Set this aside for the topping. Sift together flour, baking powder, sugar and salt. Cut in shortening. Beat egg and add milk. Add to dry ingredients, stirring until combined. Add remaining 1 cup of cornflakes. Turn into greased 8-inch square pan. Dot

**Gingerbread Upside-Down Cake.**  
1/2 cup shortening  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 egg  
1/2 cup molasses  
1 1/2 cups sifted flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon baking soda  
3/4 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 cup sour milk

Bottom of pan:  
2 tablespoons butter or substitute  
1/2 cup light corn syrup  
1/2 cup nuts  
2 sliced apples or oranges

Cream sugar and shortening. Add egg, beat well. Add molasses, blend. Sift dry ingredients and add alternately with the milk to the creamed mixture. To prepare pan, melt butter and add corn syrup. Arrange fruit and nuts. Pour batter over fruit and bake for 35 minutes in a 375-degree oven. Turn cake out of pan immediately after removing from oven.

For those of you who like your whipped cream and can't get it, here is an excellent way of making it:

**Whipped Cream.**  
1 1/2 teaspoons plain, unflavored gelatin  
1/2 cup cold milk or water  
1 cup well-chilled light cream

Soften gelatin in cold liquid. Set over hot water and stir until thoroughly dissolved. Pour cream into fairly deep, narrow bowl, making sure it is deep enough so cream covers at least 3/4 of the beaters. Stir in softened gelatin gradually. Set bowl in a pan of ice and let stand 5 minutes, stirring around edges several times. Leaving bowl in ice and water, beat with rotary beater 5 minutes. Cream will be light and fluffy but will not stand stiff enough to peak. Let stand 1 or 2 minutes more in ice water, stirring gently. Cream will thicken and become stiff enough to peak. This may be sweetened and flavored to taste. It may be served immediately or kept in refrigerator or cold place until ready to serve. Texture improves on standing in refrigerator for 1/2 hour. Stir until smooth and serve.

**Lynn Says:**  
Make Dishwashing Easier: Stunt fishy odors on dishes by washing them in soapy water to which some vinegar has been added. Rinse dishes in hot vinegar water, also.

Hot, soapy water is indicated for greasy dishes; cold water for egg, starchy and milky dishes.

Scrape dishes before starting to wash and have a strainer in the sink to collect all leftovers. It's much easier than scooping them up out of the water.

Stack dishes carefully before washing. It won't seem like you have so many, and there's less chance of their breaking.

China can be allowed to dry by itself on a dish rack, but glasses, silver and cutlery should be wiped immediately after washing.

Make sure you have plenty of good absorbent dish towels handy. Use paper toweling for hands to save cloth towels.
