News From Our Men In Service

Cpl. Emory C. Stone, son of Mr. and Mrs. Marshall Stone, celebrated V-J day at Iwo Jima where he has been stationed for some months aboard a 10,000 ton Army Air Force Aircraft Repair Ship, supporting the B-29 strikes against Japan. His organization helped ready the Saipan based B-29's for their first raid on the Japanese Homeland in November, 1944, and has been active in the VLR bombing program throughout the Pacific campaign.

The Unit provides fourth echelon repair facilities for B-29 and fighter aircraft during the critical two to six month period required by Aviation Engineers to set up maintenance depots on newly captured Pacific Islands. The Repair Ship, the first of the Army Air Forces Floating Depots, has propeller, sheet metal, woodworking, instrument, rubber repair, electrical, radio, radar, photo, welding, armament, fabric, paint, drafting, battery repair, oxygen manufacturing, plating, supercharger, carburetor, utility, bomb-sight, radiator, hydraulic, and machine shops reinforced by specialists in technical supply and administration. The organization is self-sufficient and has its own Headquarters, Finance, Medical, Dental, Intelligence, Special Service, Statistical Control, Post Office, Gun Crew (manned by both Army and Navy personnel), Quartermaster, Communications and Chaplains Sections. It also has its own "Air Force" of helicopters and a transportation section of small boats and dukws, and land vehicles which carry personnel and cargo to and from Air Service and Combat Groups. The Unit has received commendations from both the Army and Navy for its contribution to the air war against Japan.

Cpl. Stone is entitled to wear two bronze combat stars on the Asiatic-Pacific Theater Ribbon for the Unit's participation in Central and Western Pacific Campaigns. During these campaigns the ship went through twenty enemy air raids and received credit for shooting down two enemy bombers. He is assigned to the gun crew. He entered the service Jan. 29, 1943 and received his training at Sheppard Field.

Following is the citation given Edward Lee Usrey Ph. M. 1-c:

In the name of the President of the United States, the Commander Amphibious Forces, United States Pacific Fleet, takes pleasure in presenting the Bronze Star Medal to Edward Lee Usrey, Ph. M. 1-c, U. S. N. R. for service as set forth in the following citation:

"For heroic achievement in connection with operations against the enemy as a member of the crew of a United States landing craft on April 16, 1945, during the amphibious assault against Okinawa. When the ship was struck by an enemy suicide plane and raging fires ensued, he promptly and courageously proceeded to the scene of the damage. Despite the imminent danger of the flames and exploding ammunition, he bravely directed the removal and treatment of his wounded shipmates. Through his initiative, ability and devotion to duty, he contributed materially to the saving of many lives. His conduct throughout distinguished him among those

WHAT DOES OUR HOME TOWN NEED?

Following is the second response to the query, "What does our home town need?"

I agree with all the writer on soil conservation had to say in this column last week. Another thing that needs Hedley's attention is the matter of politics in its true sense, not its ordinary meaning. Speaking of it as a ball game we could say that we have played an all error game for the last 25 years. This neglect has caused us to not get paved streets, a hard surfaced road to McKnight, fewer contracted schools and no road to Lakeview.

This is to throw no stones at local officers who have done their best. Officers only demand what their constituents demand. But somebody has gone to sleep. If you don't believe it, go to towns with similar geographical environment in each of the counties around us and check up.

Within the last few months two good jobs have been thrown open to ex-service men of World Wars I and II. Both jobs went to Clarendon men, and personally I don't blame the Clarendon men. Towns prosper as their citizens pull together. When the highway was completed from Wellington to McKnight, the people across the line expected us to bring the road on to Hedley then. We don't have it yet. Why didn't we go to Austin instead of chasing ourselves around Amarillo. I contend that it's high time we get awake to the fact that we can no longer elect any man just because he can soft soap us and because he is Brother Smith's boy, or because some local would-be-politician gets forty or fifty dollars to work for him on election day and then the County loses thousands of dollars after he is elected because he doesn't know a habeas corpus from a corpus delicti. And it isn't worth a dime to elect someone just because we like him. All officers should be Christian gentlemen and more than qualified to hold any County office. Don't you think so? I do.

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

Settlement of Oil Workers' Pay May Set Reconversion Pattern; Ease Curbs on Consumer Credit

LABOR:

U. S. Acts

Acting energetically, Secretary of Labor Lewis Schwellenbach took the all-important oil workers' wage dispute virtually in his own hands by transferring negotiations to Washington, D. C., in an effort to effect a settlement that was expected to set a pattern for the reconversion period.

With the Oil Workers' union demand for a 30 per cent wage increase embodying the program of other powerful CIO organizations, and with the oil companies' offer of a 15 per cent boost representing the usual compromise, final disposition of the case would go far toward determining the amount of "take-home" pay for employees during the ensuing months.

Schwellenbach's decision to shift the parley to Washington, D. C., from Chicago, Ill., followed upon an early deadlock in the bargaining over the union's insistence that the dispute be settled on an industry-wide basis and the companies' stand that contracts should be signed by individual plants.

Meanwhile, over 1,500,000 persons were affected by the strike of AFL elevator operators and building service employees in New York, with business losses running over \$1,000,000 a day and production of winter and summer garments virtually stopped. Balking at a war labor board award of \$28.05 for a 44 hour week, the union asked \$30.15 for a 40 hour week.

JAPAN:

Historic Precedent

September 27, 1945, went down in history as the red-letter day on which a Japanese emperor, unbending himself in defeat, made a personal call upon a victorious U. S. commander to break all precedent.

God to his people, small, wiry Hirohito, in formal morning clothes and high silk top hat, was very much man to Gen. Douglas MacArthur, who, steeped in occupational duties, met him in informal military attire and without a tie.

Motoring to the American embassy in Tokyo for the visit, Hirohito made his call just as MacArthur set about shaping plans for the re-education of the Japanese people and stripping Nippon of all its war-making potentialities by an economic reformation.

In recasting the Japanese mind, MacArthur chose to pursue the present policy of working through native personnel. Japanese press, radio, movies, government information bureaus, schools and various social groups would be used as mediums for the dissemination of democratic principles and ideals for world co-operation.

In Japan's economic reformation, the U. S. will strive for the eradication of all potential war industry, confining the Japanese merely to civilian production. At the same time, efforts will be made to break up the business monopoly of the four great houses of Mitsubishi, Fuyo, Yuzasa, and Sumitomo, and promote widespread ownership and trade. Organization of labor and agricultural organizations also will be encouraged.

Meanwhile, Japanese economic experts called for a resumption of trade with the U. S. to speed Nippon's postwar recovery and stave off impending privation. In return for American cotton, wool, salt, oil, iron, sugar and leather the Japanese proposed exports of silk, gold, porcelain ware and lacquer goods.

TIRES:

Demand Mounts

While the production of new automobile tires is making fair progress, prospects for the elimination of tire rationing in the near future are not promising, according to the National Automobile Dealers association.

Although the tire industry is planning on the production of approximately 12 million tires between October and the end of the year, some will be reserved for new cars.

CREDIT:

Ease Controls

In a move hit by OPA because of inflationary possibilities, but rapped by finance companies because of its restricted scope, the government removed all credit controls over building renovation and eased regulations on loans for services or non-essential purchases.

Remaining unchanged in view of popular demand and limited supply was the 12 month credit repayment for washing machines, vacuum cleaners, bed linen, mattresses, boats, watches, cameras, automobiles, pianos and furniture.

Though OPA resisted the restricted easing of credit regulations for fear of a scaling of prices upward in face of heavy buying, certain financing groups declared that continuing restrictions placed low income classes at a disadvantage and price control and rationing assured market stabilization.

ARGENTINA:

Buck Change

Problem center of South America, Argentina was under another state of siege as the government of Pres. Edelmiro Farrell, controlled by Col. Juan Peron, rounded up economic, political and labor leaders following an ill-fated attempt to overthrow the present regime.

Colonel Peron

In extending military rule and suspending constitutional guarantees of speech, press and assembly, the government declared that it was forced to move to stem "a growing campaign aimed at alteration of the (existing) order and conducted by the oligarchy (powerful interests)." Liberty would be restored when the various groups would know how to use it, Farrell added.

The abortive revolutionary attempt by two top Argentine generals followed close upon the heels of widespread demonstrations of democratic elements against the pro-military Farrell-Peron regime, maintaining the present economic and social setup in the face of persistent demands for its liberalization.

JOBLESS BENEFITS:

Shelve Bill

Declaring that the current wave of strikes has confused the question of whether a real need exists for the lengthening of unemployment compensation payments up to 28 weeks, the powerful house ways and means committee held up a senate bill providing federal aid for extension of benefits.

By its action, the house group dealt a body blow to President Truman's program for jobless aid, since the senate in passing a modified bill previously had refused to boost unemployment compensation up to a maximum of \$25 weekly. The senate measure would have permitted the federal government to advance sufficient sums to the states to spread jobless payments over 28 weeks.

House committee rejection of the bill stirred labor's wrath, AFL Pres. William Green accusing the congressmen of "callous disregard of human needs," and CIO Chief Philip Murray calling upon the CIO and its Political Action committee for an all-out drive to "secure reversal of this shameful act."

ARMY SEEKS MISSING

Army "search teams" are combing the battlefields of Europe and the Pacific for personnel now listed as missing.

Consisting of five soldiers, one of whom speaks the language of the locality, search teams are assigned a certain area of approximately one and one-half square miles. Information on missing personnel is consolidated to speed investigation.

Apple Picker

Watch the experienced apple picker at work and you will see that he sets his ladder properly and keeps balanced on it so he works as freely as he does on the ground.

Picker's Clothes

One of the first things the apple picker should do is to see that he has clothes for the job that protect the skin and help prevent accidents. They should be fitted for bending, be snug at the neck, ankles and wrists, and have usable pockets.

Household Hints

Wash burners on gas stove once a week in a solution made of one gallon water, two tablespoons washing soda and soap flakes. Rinse and dry well.

Don't throw away lemon and orange skins. Bake them in a moderate oven until very crisp. When cold grate or grind them and store in a well corked bottle. A pinch in a pudding or cake makes a great improvement.

Moderate heat should be used to preserve the life of your porcelain enameled utensils. When the contents have reached the boiling point, the flame may be lowered even more. This is a fuel saving tip also.

Keep cooked meat covered. Chopped and sliced cooked meats spoil more quickly than meat in the piece. Cut or chop just before using. Keep meat sandwiches and salads cold right up to time of serving.

Dustless Duster To make a "dustless" duster, immerse a large square of cheesecloth in a basin of strong, hot soapsuds. Let it soak for a while, then wring out and dry. When the cloth becomes soiled, it can be washed and retreated.

Cleaning Diamonds To clean diamond rings, cover them with wood alcohol and let stand for five minutes. Remove and polish with white tissue paper.

Fattening Lambs One help in putting weight on lambs is to keep sheep and lambs free from parasites, especially nodular worms and stomach worms. Infestation with parasites holds back growth and increases feed costs. Serious losses from parasites can be prevented by providing clean pasture, by the use of phenothiazine, and by taking other precautions.

Bike Passenger You invite disaster when you carry another person on your bike.

Egg Eating Egg eating by chickens is a habit usually developed by young pullets. This costly habit can be prevented by providing plenty of nests—one nest for each six birds—so eggs will not be broken by nest-crowding at laying time. All nest bottoms can be kept well padded with litter such as hay, straw, cottonseed, shavings, so eggs will not be broken as they are laid. If the egg-eating habit has gone so far that some of the birds break the eggs themselves, it may be necessary to remove those birds from the flock for a few days or dispose of them entirely.

Heating Safety One of the most notable innovations in safe heating is the wet base boiler in which water circulates under the ash pit. The fact that the boiler can be placed on a combustible floor is of interest in connection with the trend toward the basement house. In such houses it is often desirable to install the boiler on a wooden floor in a utility room or kitchen. Other safety features of modern boilers are foot-treadle door openers, ball-shaped, air-cooled handles and side shakers, making it easier to open and close doors.

Whip Soap Flakes Whip your soap flakes in a little hot water with an egg beater and you will need fewer flakes and get better results.

POST-WAR FLYING IN YOUR HOME TOWN

By C. C. CAMPBELL, Member, Aviation Writers Association, Washington, D. C.

The Aviation Committee
When it comes to consideration of the establishment of an airpark or other aviation landing facility, each community finds itself faced with its individual needs and problems. A landing facility for each of two communities only a few miles apart may have to meet quite different requirements.

Before construction can start, even before a bond issue can be listed, pertinent information should be tabulated and plans made accordingly. Such matters as location of the airpark, size, prospective use, cost, potential income, related business enterprise and many other sub-

jects must be studied, at least in a preliminary way, if the venture is to be a success.

had an intimate connection with any phase of aviation, such as having a part in the Civil Air Patrol program, or experience as commercial air operators, they would by all means be urged to participate.

In addition to representatives of the community's officialdom, there should be a cross section of local business and social enterprise. The components of this will differ according to the area, but generally speaking, may include merchants, professional men, labor leaders, farmers and school principals and teachers.

jects must be studied, at least in a preliminary way, if the venture is to be a success.

An airpark is usually considered a public utility, much the same as streets, highways and parks. The chief difference is that an airpark may ultimately provide self-supporting revenue if correctly planned, whereas other community utilities generally do not.

Based upon experience, aviation authorities advise that the first step taken by a community should be the organization of an air landing facility committee. All members preferably should be local people who know the community's history, its relation to other communities and to the state, and its plans for the future.

It is suggested that committee members might include representatives of the city or town council, chamber of commerce, civic clubs, and newspapers. If there are any persons in the community who have

succeeded must cater to all local interests. It will probably surprise many people to discover how many varied activities in even a small community will be influenced in one way or another by the coming era of flight.

The appointed committee, after obtaining and classifying the necessary local data, will then be in a position to take up its preliminary plans with aviation authorities and profit by their experienced advice and criticism. Forty-four states now have aviation boards or commissions ready to help and Washington authorities such as the Civil Aeronautics Administration of the Department of Commerce, the Personal Aircraft Council of the Aircraft Industries Association of America and the National Aeronautic Association, will also aid the local planning group.

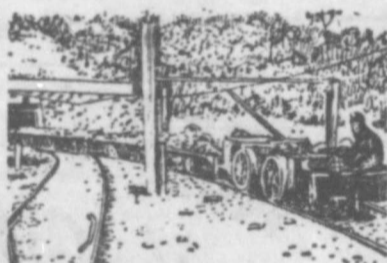

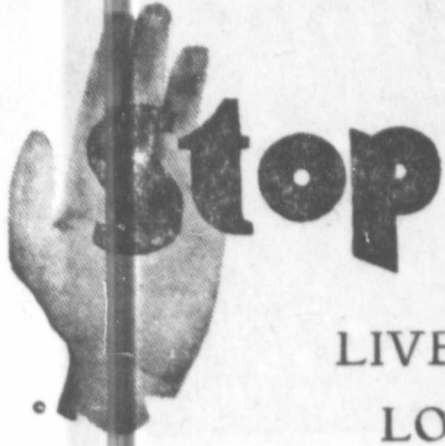

OIL:

U. S.-British Pact

Virtual monopolists in oil, the U. S. and Britain came to an understanding for the orderly development of petroleum trade in the post-war world in a pact fashioned in London by Secretary of the Interior Ickes and British officials and subject to senate ratification.

Removing vigorous opposition to any control over domestic production as envisaged in a previous agreement later repudiated by the U. S., the new pact only provides for advisory regulation of American and British operations overseas. Both countries have extensive oil holdings in foreign lands, notably in the middle east, where deposits are reportedly as great as in the U. S. In drawing up the agreement, Ickes and British Fuel Administrator Shinwell provided for mutual respect of all concessions and rights obtained by either country, and also pledged non-interference with operations.

MEAT:

More Available

Because of the seasonal increase in the marketings of range fed cattle, OPA removed point requirements for lower grades of beef, veal and lamb through most of October, and also made hamburger, lamb and veal patties, short ribs and brisket of beef, breast and flank of lamb and shank of veal ration-free.

In addition, points were lifted from such low-grade meat products as sausage, frankfurters, luncheon variety and canned meats.

In contrast, however, the continued tight supply of hogs and finished cattle necessitated the retention of current point values on pork cuts, bacon and other cured meats, and choice selections of beef, veal and lamb. Though fats and oils were kept on the rationing list, point removal on cheaper meat will furnish additional stamps for these items.

Henry II Takes Over

To husky, 28-year-old Henry Ford II, who in college displayed more of a penchant for sociology than engineering, went the presidency of the huge Ford Motor company, following the retirement of his famed grandfather from active service with the firm.

Upon assuming his post, Henry II declared his ambition was to return Ford to leadership in sales again, the company having trailed Chevrolet throughout most of the decade preceding the war. On his toes, young Ford had chosen the new 1946 model last July, only two days after government authorization for resuming civilian production, and the firm was well off to postwar output when impeded by strikes.

Retiring at 82 after having resumed the presidency of his famed company in June of 1943 upon the death of his son, Edsel, Ford declared that he would devote most of his energies to his outside interests, chief of which have been utilization of farm products in industry.

EUROPE:

Occupation Problem

In war or in peace, old General Patton, with a mind of his own continued to make news, the latest occasion being his clash with General Eisenhower over the use of competent former Nazi civil servants for a restoration of German economy to head off threatened chaos this winter.

Besides being asked for an immediate report on the number of former Nazis still holding office in 3rd army territory, Patton also was directed to give Eisenhower a personal accounting of his control over the Bavarian region. For a hard peace, Eisenhower favors a ruthless denazification of Germany's political, educational and economic life, and an early establishment of a Reich living standard no higher than surrounding countries.

Though the first to be called on the carpet, Patton's attitude is known to be shared by other U. S. officers seeking to avert starvation, frost suffering and epidemics this winter in the shattered nation.

FAR EAST:

Native Uprising

Even as Chinese and British forces took over Indo-China, native Annamites rose in rebellion at the prospect of a return of French rule, terrorizing the European population of the state, which normally exports much rice, rubber, high-grade coal, spices and tin.

Frenchmen were the principal targets of native wrath, since many, under protection of Chinese and British troops, have displaced Annamites holding public offices preliminary to re-establishment of French colonial rule.

Strangely enough, the Japanese, who promised Indo-Chinese independence during their military occupation of the country and still remain in force prior to their complete demobilization, have been called upon to help assist undermanned Allied units re-establish peace.

GOOD NEIGHBOR:

Aids Health

Remote, disease-plagued regions of the Amazon systems of Peru and Bolivia have been equipped by modern health measures to progress in human welfare.

The menace of malaria and other tropical diseases has been considerably lessened in the two countries by inauguration of hospitals and medical services by the U. S. and South American nations through the Institute of Inter-American affairs.

Fires Costly

Every day in the U. S. there are 1,500 fires, 28 deaths caused by fire in 1,000 homes, 130 stores, 100 factories, 7 churches, 7 schools and 3 hospitals.

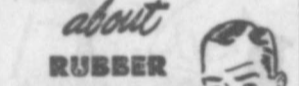

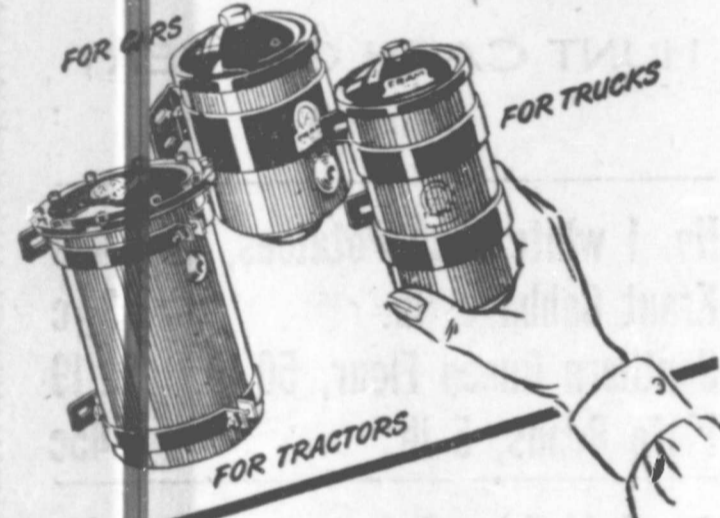
