

## County Jr. Livestock Show next weekend

The Bailey County Junior Livestock Show is set for Jan. 18-20 in the Bailey County Coliseum in Muleshoe.

About a hundred 4-H and FFA members will be vying for awards and premiums in this year's show.

There are approximately seven heifers, 54 steers, 35-40 sheep, and 180-190 swine, with gilts and barrows showing separately, which have been validated for the show.

All animals, steers, heifers and swine should arrive on Thursday, Jan. 18 from 1 to 6 p.m. with weigh-ins and classifications at 6 p.m.

Judging of sheep will begin at 9 a.m. Friday, Jan. 19. The swine show will begin at 1 p.m., or one hour after the sheep show ends.

Judges for this year's show are Kenny Brdecko, sheep; Tadd Knight, swine; David Lust, cattle; and Brian Reynolds, classifier.

Announcer is Don Parker of Happy, formerly of Maple, and awards presenter is Miss Kimberly Griswold of the Muleshoe 4-H Club.

Special awards will be presented at the conclusion of each show.

All youngsters under age 8 are eligible and welcome to enter the pee wee swine show at the conclusion of the swine show awards presentations.

The cattle show will begin at 7:30 a.m. Saturday, Jan. 20, with a buyer's meal scheduled for 1 p.m.

A merchandise and products auction also will begin at 1 p.m. A variety of products and services for the home, farm and ranch have been donated by merchants and vendors. Proceeds benefit the premium sale. There will be a concession stand each day of the show.

The Fourth Annual Premium Sale will begin at 2:30 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 20 in the Bailey County Coliseum.

"We hope to see you—our neighbors, friends, business owners, merchants, civic clubs and anyone else who is interested in supporting our youth in Bailey County," said Extension agent Curtis Preston.

"Participating as a bidder allows supporters to financially reward those they support, and simply being there encourages and motivates those who have given so much of themselves to earn the right to participate."

Each 4-H and FFA member will be allowed to sell only two animals. Animals will be auctioned by dollars per animal. No "add-ons" will be accepted.

This is a premium sale, which means the buyer is paying a premium to the youth for exhibiting the animal. The

### Retired teacher wins \$150 prize

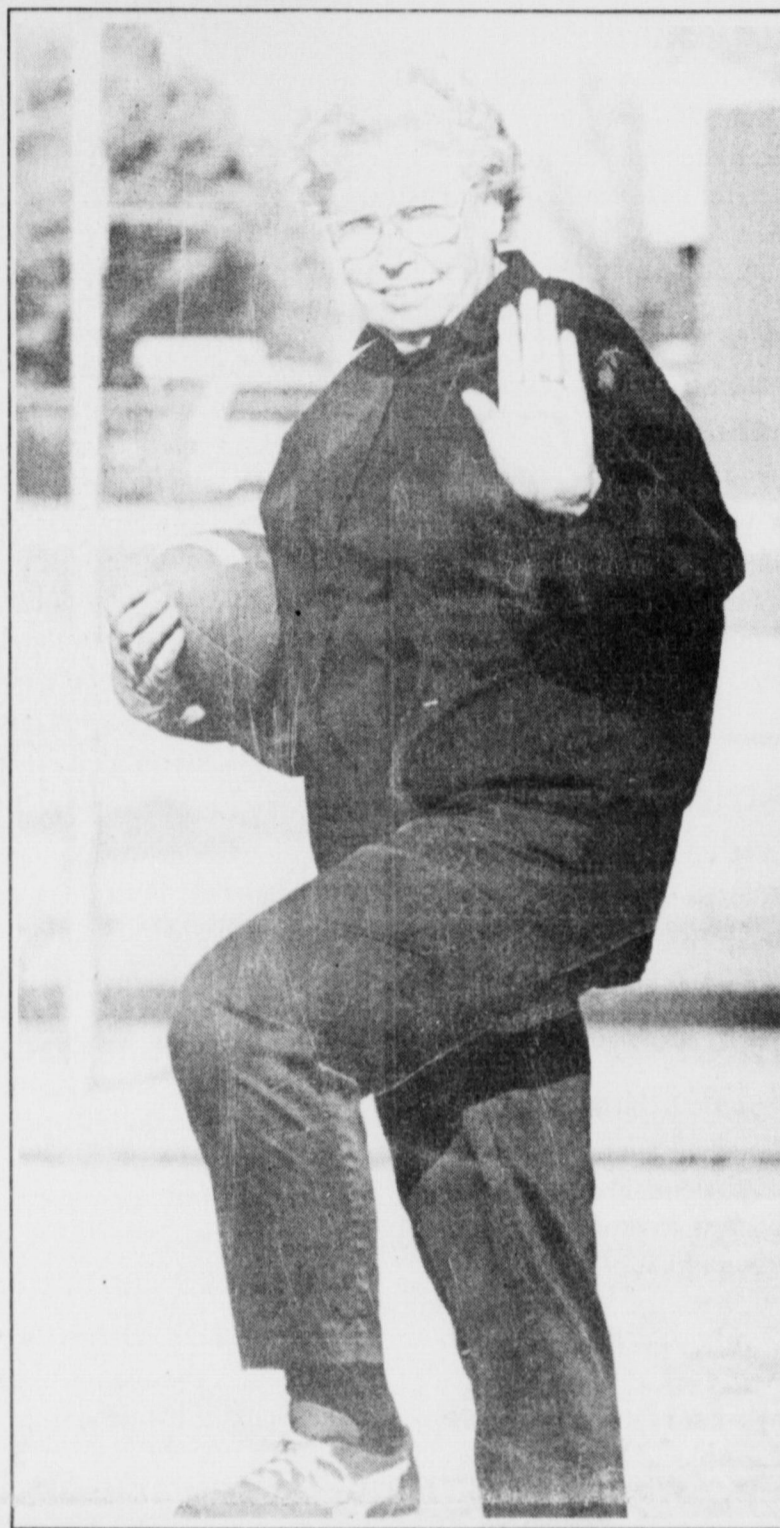
Bryant failed to win one of the weekly contests, finishing second twice.

Amy Ethridge led the Bobbies (12-14 overall, 2-1 in district) with 14 points. Posts Amber Matthews and Jacy Buckley added 12 points each. Matthews scored four points in overtime.

Dimmitt was 17 of 30 from the free throw line.

"We missed our free throws at crucial times," Muleshoe coach Jim Gruhlkey said. "We had our chances."

"I told the girls it's okay to make mistakes. We just can't allow them to be fatal."

Brandi Harrison added nine points for Muleshoe (16-6, 2-1).

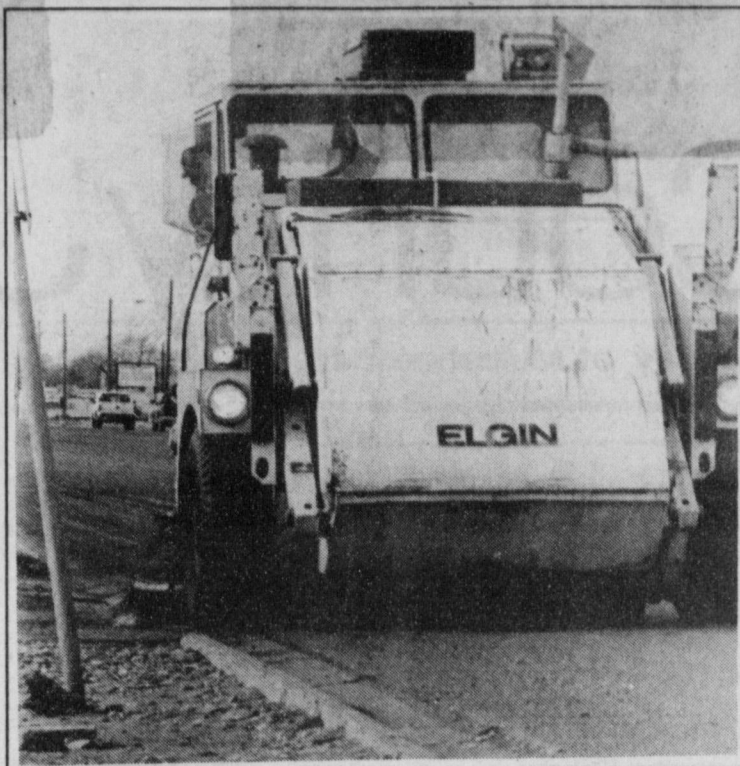

Mr. Maddox thinks the girls at the Agency are lovely. They're very good to him and are the reason he is still here. He appreciates them very much.

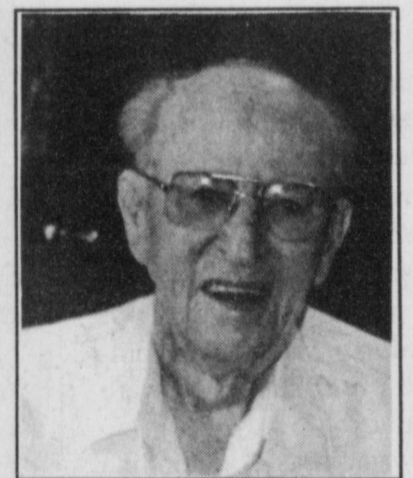

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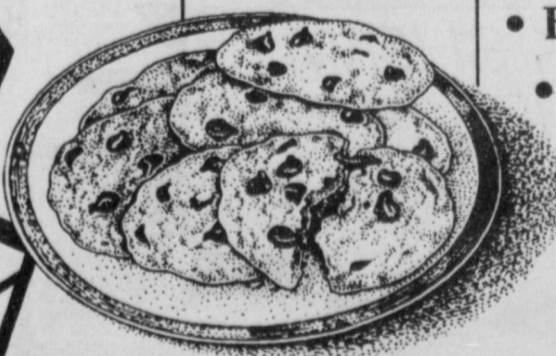

## Lazbuddie takes Cougars to limit

Klondike coach Jim Kinnear called looking for some competition to get his team ready for a run at the state playoffs.

Lazbuddie coach Gary Grahn gladly accepted the challenge, and nearly knocked off a veteran Klondike team that starts five seniors.

Lazbuddie cut a 10-point fourth-quarter deficit to 58-56 with two minutes to go, but Klondike held on for a 66-58 win in a Class 1A non-district game Friday at WJHS gym.

Tanner Etheredge made five free throws in the last 37 seconds to seal the win and keep Klondike undefeated at 10-0.

"We were lucky to get out of here with a win," Kinnear said. "Lazbuddie outplayed us. Lady Luck was on our side."

Plus a balanced scoring attack led by Etheredge with 20 points, Michael Arismendez had 17 points and four 3-pointers, including one at that beat the third-quarter buzzer, giving Klondike a 53-45 lead.

"They've played together since they were freshmen," Kinnear said. "They been in the playoffs. If we have an edge, I think it's experience."

That was the difference in the finals of the Sundown Tournament and tonight. Experience."

The Cougars beat Lazbuddie, 66-61, in a similar game two weeks ago in which Lazbuddie.

"I'm very pleased with the way we played," Grahn said. "But I'm frustrated because we had some breakdowns down the stretch. But this is where we want to be. They're one of the premier teams in the region."

Lazbuddie (15-6) took a 39-35 halftime as Justin St. Clair, Jason Thomas and Guy Nickels combined for 31 points inside.

"They're the first team to do that to us all year," Kinnear said. "We tried man-to-man and then switched to zone, but we couldn't stop them from getting the ball inside."

St. Clair led Lazbuddie with 16 points, Thomas and Nickels finished with 15 and 13 points respectively, and Israel Lopez added another six points inside off the bench.

Arismendez tied the score at 39 one minute into the second half when he converted a rare four-point play — a 3-

The Lady Cougars scored early and often, either with steals off the press or on fast breaks.

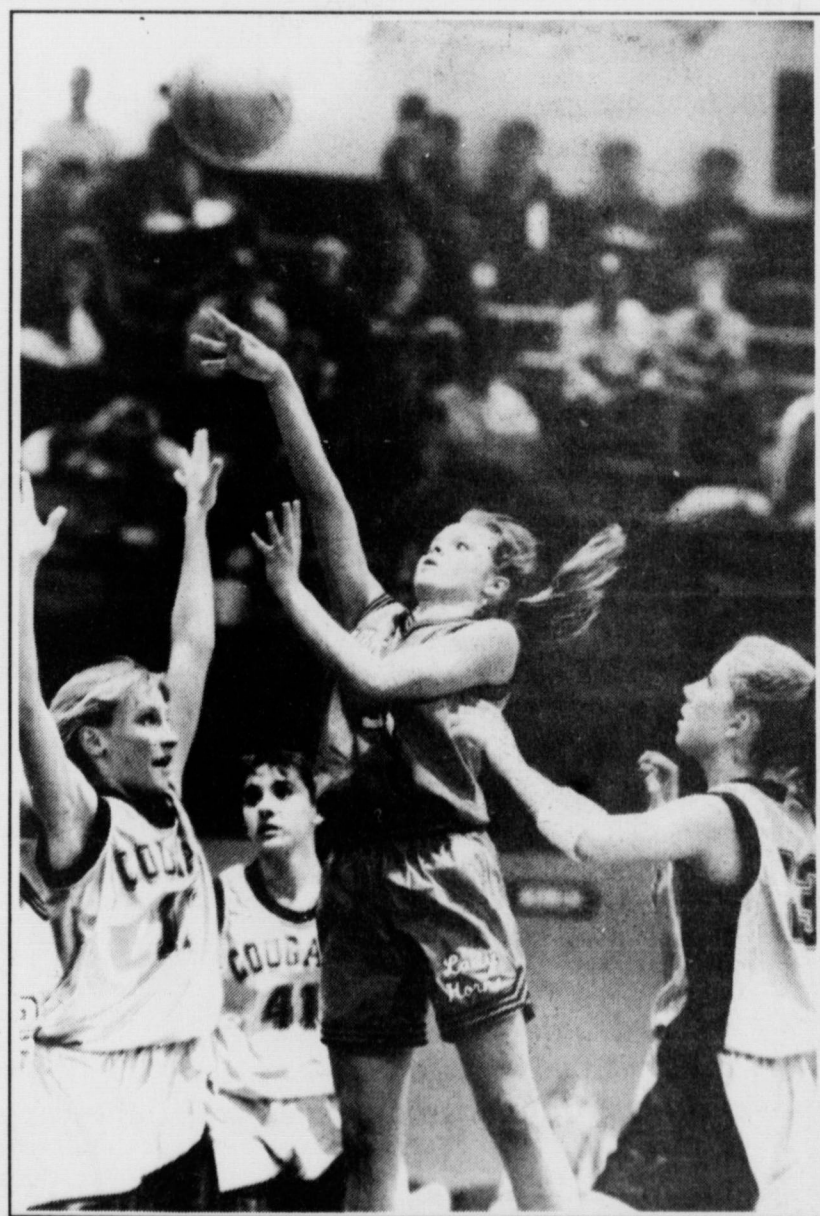

# USDA issues sheep referendum procedures

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced procedures for a referendum on a proposed Sheep and Wool Promotion, Research, Education and Information Order. The referendum will be conducted Feb. 6, 1996.

USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, an agency in the marketing and regulatory programs mission area, has oversight responsibility for federal research and promotion programs. AMS administrator Lon Hatamiya said all producers, feeders and importers who certify they were engaged in the production, feeding or importation of sheep or sheep products (except importers of raw wool only) between Jan. 1 and Dec. 31, 1994, are eligible to vote.

Voters may register and vote in person or request absentee ballots at County office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Absentee ballots must be requested from the county Extension office serving the county of voter residence, for individuals, or the county where the business headquarters is located, for corporations. Absentee ballot requests, filed in person or by mail, may be received in county Extension offices by close of business Feb. 2.

The Farm Service Agency, formerly the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, will count ballots, determine eligibility of voters and tabulate results.

For the order to go into effect, the proposal must be approved either by a simple ma-

majority of voters or by voters who account for two-thirds of the sheep and wool production represented in the referendum.

If approved, the program would be funded by mandatory assessments. Domestic producers and feeders would be assessed one cent per pound on sales of live sheep and two cents per pound on sales of greasy wool. Importers would be assessed one cent per pound or the equivalent on imported degreased wool and wool products.

Details of the voting procedures are published in the Dec. 15 Federal Register. Copies of the final referendum rules, the proposed order and additional information will be available at Bailey County office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

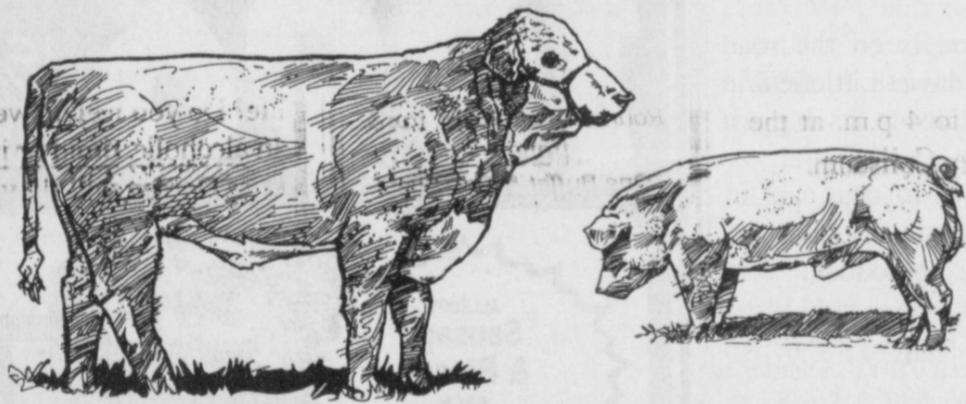

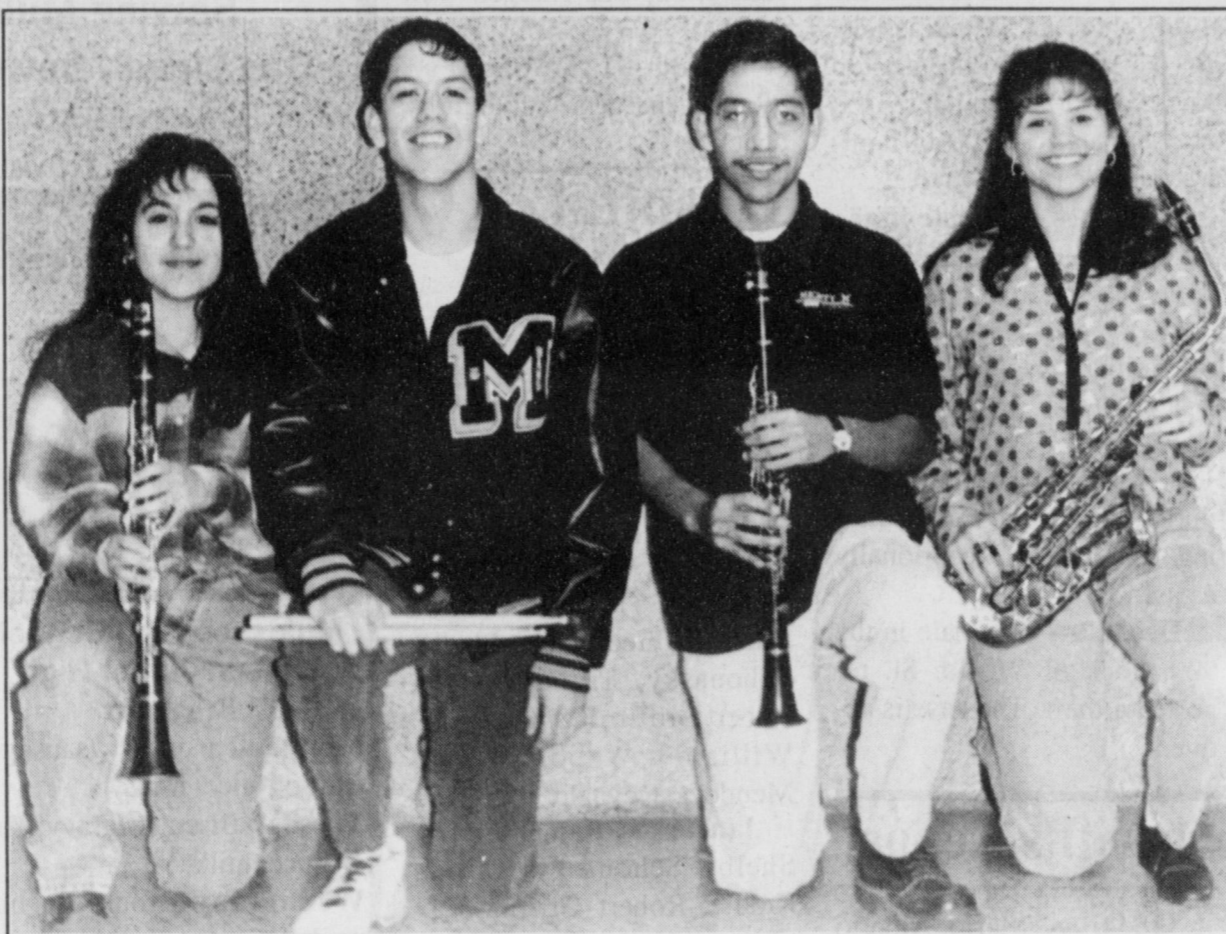

The funds MISD receives from the purchase must be spent on summer school and instructional technology.

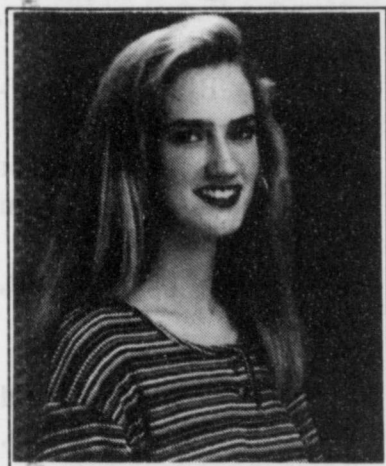

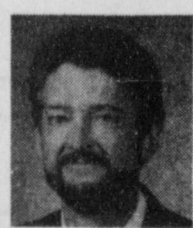
In the painting, five blind men are dutifully following their blind leader straight toward a chasm. He's already fallen into the hole, but the others don't know it.

One of the most dangerous pitfalls faced by individuals or churches is the temptation to read Romans 12:2, "Be ye transformed," and apply it to everyone but ourselves.

Churches are never more in danger of becoming positively proud of the logs obscuring their vision than when they become eye clinics specializing in speck removal from the eyes of others. If we radiate arrogance instead of love, nobody will listen to what we're saying, even if it happens to be true. Whether they are inscribed with religious traditions or adorned with pet scriptures nicely carved in rosewood, logs are still pretty much impossible to see through.

he might have seen the hurt etched in his neighbor's face. He might have seen the real need in the man's life. And he might have been able to see the deeper need in his own. But the log was simply too large.

Sometimes I am uncomfortably familiar with this little man. I find it very easy to be so concerned with "helping" God transform some of the folks around me that I overlook the deeper change that needs to occur in my own life. The words of 15th-century wise man Thomas a Kempis are so true. "How seldom," he wrote, "we weigh our neighbor in the same balance with ourselves."

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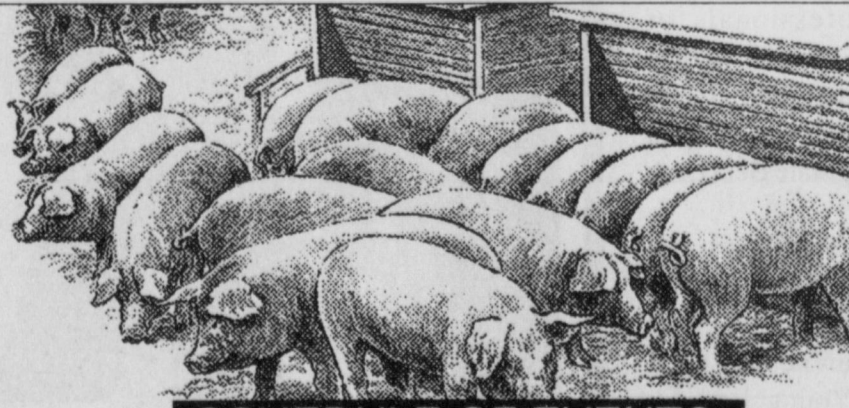

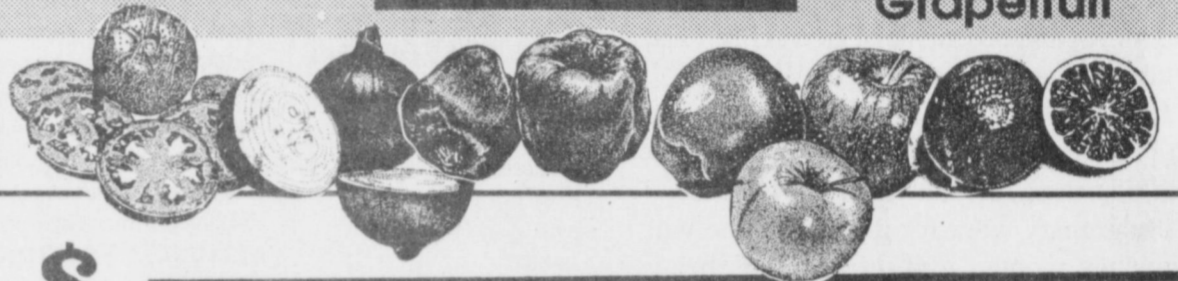
