

## COOPERS COMMENTS

Cynical Economists are predicting for the coming months a rising market for red ink. They say there will be a lot of use for it in entering items in the Deficiency columns in our budget books. (Did you use it on your last bank statement?) But I'm away off the track. What I intended to say was, "Be sure to keep some red ink handy and use it to write up the Red-Letter events that may get by you if you don't mark them with a festival illumination."

One man who made good use of red ink in writing up his voluminous Journals was Bronson Alcott. He was a complete flop at making a living, but a complete success at making a life. He wrote up the important events in RED INK - the birth of his daughters - his first reading of Plato - the first robin in the spring - the color of the concord trees in the fall - The Big Things.

We have too few extra-illustrated pages in our book of life. Take a leaf out of Alcott's journals and write a few more exclamation points of your own. It will make your days more like the unfolding of an exciting mystery story and less like a Sears-Roebuck catalogue.

One Economist was really cynical and had printed quite a bit of stuff. One day his telephone rang. When he answered, a voice informed him, "You're all wet about the cost of living reaching a new high! My wife and I live sumptuously - eating everything we like - on sixty-eight cents a week."

"Sixty-eight cents a week!" echoed the Economist. "I can't believe it! Will you tell me how? And to be sure I get the story straight, please speak a little louder." "I can't speak louder," came the answer, "I'm a Goldfish."

The possible harvest of the mind and eye deserves red ink more often than we use it. It was a wise man who said that the last judgment he feared was standing before a great white throne and hearing a voice ask, "Well, what did you think of My world?" and his having to answer, "I really didn't see it. I was busy, telephoning - and watching Television."

Every new mechanical gadget deepens the necessity for training ourselves and our children to experience the joys and excitements of the visible world around us. Otherwise, we shall be, as the headmaster of Harrow predicted like Plato's company of people, sitting in a dark cave, looking at shadows, and never seeing the real world. Come to think of it, a company of people sitting in a room gazing at a television set may come pretty close to Plato's prisoners in a cave watching flickering shadows.

Here is a man writing up Red Letter experiences. "The heaven declare the Glory of God and the Firmament sheweth His handiwork." And a later entry, "Consider the Lillie of the field, how they grow."

Red Ink is called for when we first collide with a new idea. Once there was a man who died at twenty-eight after having been "broke" all his life. But he had a grand collision in his mind, of which he wrote a report in red ink:

Then felt I like some watcher in the skies  
When a new planet swims into his ken.

## LONE STAR GAS ASKS RATE INCREASE IN CITY OF CLYDE

CLYDE - Lone Star Gas today asked the city of Clyde to increase local residential and commercial natural gas rates to enable the company to earn a reasonable rate of return on the fair value of properties used in rendering public service.

The application for rate increase, the first major request since 1953 based on an income deficiency in the Clyde distribution system, listed increased cost of gas, higher property

and equipment costs, increased wages and salaries, higher interest rates on borrowed money and increased taxes as primary reasons for the deficiency.

The company indicated that it had used every means available to avoid a request for rate increase, but inflationary pressures not under the company's control necessitated the application.

"Obviously our wish to keep gas rates low must be balanced with the economic pressures we face," R. W. McKennon, manager of the Clyde distribution office said. "These pressures can no longer be offset in any other way."

Approval of the company's application would increase the average monthly residential gas bill by approximately \$1.53.

Lone Star Gas serves approximately 700 customers in Clyde.

Mayor Lynn Ault said Councilmen tabled the request for further study.

## County Agent Urges Farmers, Ranchers to Cooperate on Survey

BAIRD - The annual survey, the basis for the official crop production estimates for Texas and each of its counties, will soon be underway.

County Agent Gregory H. Gerngross explains that this is an important survey since the information gathered is used for many purposes. Certain farmers and ranchers in Callahan County will be among the 35,000 in Texas receiving the questionnaire, he adds.

Those who receive the questionnaire are urged to complete it as soon as possible and return

it to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Box 70, Austin, Texas 78767. Accuracy in completing the questionnaire is stressed.

The survey is a joint responsibility of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Statistical Reporting Service. Cary D. Palmer is the state statistician and his office will be mailing the questionnaire.

The county agent noted that county data bulletins for 1968 are now available from state statistician or from the Texas Department of Agriculture.

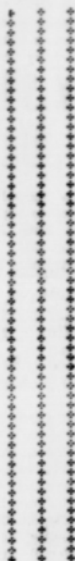
