## To My Friends and To All Others Who Still Believe In The Virtues of Integrity And Veracity

I take this means of clearing the record of some false statements.

I have not applied for a place in the Hedley school for many years, because my record as a teacher was here—nothing more was needed. I have been a teacher in the Hedley school for twenty-one years. I have never had but a one-year contract at a time. Thus my name has been balloted on favorably by twenty-one Hedley school boards; and during all these years, never have I solicited the support of any School Board Member.

This year I said, "I shall follow the same plan. I shall not solicit the support of any School Board Member. My record as a teacher is here, and it is still a good record. If the School Board votes me a place in Hedley School for another year, I shall feel happy over it; on the other hand, if they think they can get a better First Grade teacher than I am, it is their privilege to vote me out."

When the time came for the election of teachers for the Hedley school for the year 1946-1947 I expected my name to be voted on for a place in the school as per usual. I saw no reason then, neither do I see any reason now why I should not have been re-elected had my name been balloted on at that time.

These are some of the reasons why I expected to be re-elected.

First, because, as already stated, my record as a teacher in Hedley school is still a good record.

Second, I had a total enrollment this year of 58 children; 54 of whom were scholastics. The membership of the grade stayed around 40 children for the year. At the beginning of the ninth month, I had 40 children; during the ninth month three of the 40 moved away from Hedley; thus at the close of school I had 37 children. The scholastic enrollment of 54 and the membership around 40, justified the employing of two First Grade teachers for the Hedley School for the year 1945-1946. Thus, I consider that I, myself, did the work of two teachers in the Hedley School during the year 1945-1946.

Third, during the whole of the nine months, I did not miss a day from school, not even a class period; and I could always be found at my place of duty throughout the whole day of every school day.

I have the authentic information that at the time of the election of teachers for the Hedley School for the year 1946-1947, that my name was not balloted on for a place in the school. The reason, it was not balloted on was that it had been represented to the School Board that I did not want a place in the school, because I had decided to retire from teaching. It was further represented to the School Board that this matter had been discussed with me on three different occasions, and every time I said that I did not want the school—that I was going to retire.

All statements about my not wanting my name voted on, about my not wanting a place in the Hedley School for the year 1946-1947, and about my having decided to retire from teaching, I de-

## Quarterly Conference At Methodist Church

The Reverend Mr. E. D. Landreth, District Superintendent of the Clarendon District, visited in the church Monday evening July 22, and held the third Quarterly Conference, at which time he presented the renewed plans for the McMurry College endowment and building program. Brother Landreth presented Dr. Orion W. Carter, District Superintendent of the Abilene District, who spoke on "Building A New World." In his address he said, "If we are to build a new world, our material will come from the children and young people in our homes." There is a definite need today for young men and women who are equipped with the best education possible to meet the demands of the time. That is, both Christian and other wise, he said.

Forty-four room cottages are being constructed now on the campus of McMurry College for returned veterans with at least a hundred applications to occupy these cottages. Many of these men returned from battle fields saying they are called to preach the Gospel of Christ and many more will become ministers, Dr. Carter related.

The College now is making definite plans to construct a dormitory to house 140 men, of which most of the rooms will let for veterans who are looking to McMurry College for help. Cost of the building will be \$250,000 or more. This building will be raised as a memorial to those "Gold Star" heroes of the Methodist Church, whose blood was spilled for a just cause and high ideals for which the church stands. Each of their names will be placed on a bronze plaque to stand as a reminder for the cause which they gave themselves.

The Hedley Methodist Church set as a goal to be raised for this noble cause \$554, which is to be subscribed by cash and pledges which can be paid later ending January 31, 1948. Don't wait for us to see you, but see us about your gift, though it be small or great, give as God has prospered you.

If I had been voted in or if I had been voted out, I would have been satisfied. As it is, I feel that I have been very unjustly treated.

## In Reply To Smears Against Dr. Homer P. Rainey

In last weeks "The W. Lee O'Daniel News" there were various libelous statements that some citizen should answer. The criticism of Dr. Rainey's dissertation of the Oregon School System survey was so much chaff intended to prejudice voters. The references to Dr. Rainey's book on school finance are libelous. In this book it is assumed that the children are wards of the State and for that reason that the State should give all of them equal chances in education. Don't you believe that? If all the libel stopped here no damage would be done.

The statement that Dr. Rainey is against representative government is libelous. His statement that "Our representatives do not, in all instances, represent the general welfare," is not disputed by any citizen who has read one book on American government. It is not even disputed by many of our representatives themselves. Mr. Rainey is for representative government.

The statement that Dr. Rainey was appearing before Congress in 1935 to undermine our government and weaken our defenses is so basely libelous that suit should be brought against the publisher before the election. Dr. Rainey has always urged young and old people to take more interest in government. Any thoughtful man knows that the greatest errors in our Democracy have been made because of ill advised voters. When people study issues for themselves, political bosses have much less chance to mislead.

The statement that Dr. Rainey opposes the "oath of allegiance" is libelous. I have stood near him many times when he repeated the solemn phrases of this oath with religious fervor. Then for me to read that he opposes the oath makes my blood boil. As a minister it is natural for him to look at some act of our government more seriously than we laymen do. He is not a member of my church. But any man with his ideas and ideals of religion and morals is my brother. To hear that our government has ALWAYS followed the exact path of Christian principles in all things would make most of us smile though we might keep our mouths shut.

The indirect statement that Dr. Rainey has called members of the American Legion "fascists" is libelous. He has always stood for the principles of the American Legion as stated in its preamble.

He did attend the Youth Congress in 1938 because thousands invited him. He was merely an observer. He is a friend of young people and they are his friends. That's why the bosses fear him so. I make this defense so that I won't be ashamed of myself. Vote as you please.

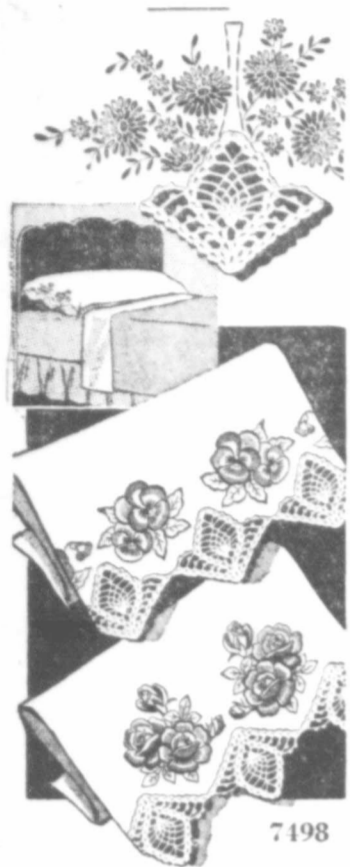

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS Excess Profits Tax Is Urged; Tourists' 'Victory Vacations' Are Crowding America's Parks

PROFITS TAX Urged by Eecl

Renewal of the excess profits tax as a means of counteracting excessive price advances should the OPA finally be scrapped is being urged by Farriner S. Eecl, chairman of the federal reserve board, and others.

Many believe that repeal of the profits levy provided a major impetus to union efforts to gain wage concessions worth all the savings to the big corporations.

Opponents of the excess profits tax believe that, regardless of the treasury and the White House, congress will not accept a proposal to tax excess profits as was done during the war.

VACATIONS Farther the Better

Travel-hungry Americans are taking their "Victory vacations" in record numbers, with "the farther away, the better" as their motto.

A count of visitors at Yellowstone from the beginning of the travel year on October 1, 1945, to June 30, this year, indicates that 199,390 persons have entered the park in this current period, compared with 143,716 in the 1940-41 period before the war.

Colorado, the Black Hills and other western tourist spots show record numbers of visitors. Next to the west are the northern states of Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota.

A noticeable trend this year is the enthusiasm for automobile touring, which was denied most people during the war years.

CHINA: And UNRRR Relief

Charges of misuse of UNRRR supplies by the Chinese government for political purposes brought about suspension of relief shipments to China except for emergency supplies.

A Chinese government spokesman conceded that there was some "petty pilfering" and that poor people sometimes sell the more expensive foods received from UNRRR and buy cheaper food.

Members of the senate appropriations committee in Washington immediately called upon Fiorella H. LaGuardia, director general of UNRRR, to explain why he cut off relief and rehabilitation supplies to China.

BRITISH LOAN: Passage Predicted

The proposed \$3,750,000 British loan will be approved, although by a narrow margin, congressional leaders of both the Democratic and Republican parties have predicted for weeks.

Most of the opposition to the British loan has come from the Middle West. Supporters of the credit, therefore, greeted the defeat of Senator Shipstead of Minnesota, one of the loan's implacable foes, with great satisfaction.

Harold E. Stassen, whose candidate defeated Shipstead, has announced that he will take the stump for candidates in other states to build "a progressive Republican party."

MINNESOTA: Stassen and Thy

Gov. Edward J. Thy, hand-picked candidate of Harold E. Stassen, piled up an impressive margin over Sen. Henrik Shipstead for the republican senatorial nomination and started all over the argument about Stassen's political power and chance to become the GOP candidate for President of the U. S. in 1948.

Stassen, more than Thy, was made the issue of the campaign by Senator Shipstead who openly boasted of his vote against United Nations and the loan to Britain. Stassen, considered a liberal and an internationalist, had approved the U. N. and the loan.

Friends of Stassen predicted that a Thy victory would put Stassen back on the presidential trail and regain the prestige he lost in some quarters when Governor Griswold, whom Stassen supported in the June primary in Nebraska, was defeated by Senator Butler for the GOP senatorial nomination.

WIND: On Capitol Hill

"Demosthenes earned his stature by speaking against the sea, but I hate to speak against the wind."

Thus spoke Representative Eaton of New Jersey to the house of representatives when he tried to speak on the proposed loan to Britain in a noisy house. He continued, saying that of "arguing against empty seats. I used to do it in church, but I'm not going to do it here."

VETS WORK: 10 of 12 on Job

Ten out of every 12 veterans discharged by June 1 are at work or in school, according to the U. S. unemployment service.

"For the third straight month the backlog of World War II veterans not at work has been reduced, notwithstanding continued discharges of servicemen from the armed forces," said Robert C. Goodwin, USES director.

In sharp contrast was the American Veterans' committee announcement of the formation of 550 employment committees because "job opportunities are becoming tougher to find."

SECURITY PREVAILS Ships Regrouped for Second Atomic Test

HONOLULU, OPERATIONS CROSSROADS—With much attendant secrecy the target fleet in Bikini lagoon has been regrouped for the second atom bomb test scheduled for July 25. Although most of the correspondents have returned to the States, several made application to remain in Bikini during the interim so they could cover the arrangements being made for the second test.

In the meantime the Appalachian made a leisurely trip to Pearl Harbor where she underwent some minor repairs, and now is proceeding back to Bikini, where she is scheduled to arrive on B-Day minus 1, or July 24.

It has been announced that ships nearest the bulls-eye of the second test will include the battleship Arkansas, the heavy cruiser Pensacola, the Jap battleship Nagato, the aircraft carrier Saratoga, the destroyer Mayrant, the submarine Pilotfish, the transport Falow and a tank landing ship.

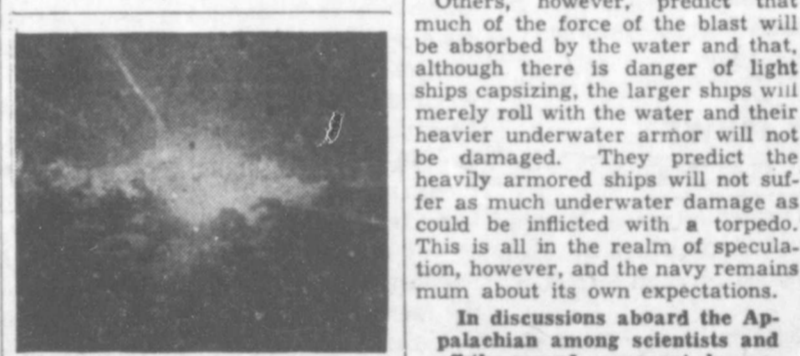
It may be that the Pilotfish will be nearest the bomb burst, which, as has been announced, will be an underwater detonation. Other ships of the target fleet have been placed in various positions ranging up to 1,800 yards away from the blast.

The Arkansas, the Pensacola and the Nagato all were severely damaged as to superstructure in the first blast. The Pensacola particularly suffered heavy damage to her fire control; her stacks were blown off and her deck plates buckled. This correspondent went aboard the Pensacola after the first test and noted that her decks amidship were driven downward about 12 inches and with such force that steel supports beneath were driven through the steel deck plating like toothpicks through paper.

There is considerable speculation as to the coming report of the Military Evaluation board as to the efficacy of the atom bomb as an offensive weapon in naval warfare. If the board decides that future naval construction must meet the dangers of atomic blasts, then we may expect an entirely different warship of the future.

The experience of the first blast indicates that firepower exposed upon high superstructure is particularly susceptible to the heat and blast of atomic power. The speculation is that to meet this threat, future construction will see streamlined warships with low superstructures, enclosed as much as possible, looking something like a modern diesel locomotive with curved surfaces to deflect blast.

Installation of ventilation systems also will be given close scrutiny since it was learned that the blast in some cases, particularly aboard the Pensacola, entered the ventilation openings and followed the ducts below decks, breaking out at the weakest points, shoving through a bulkhead and smashing other obstacles in its way deep in the ship.

This was particularly noticeable in a comparison with the German ship Prinz Eugen, which has no ventilation system and depends upon row upon row of portholes for ventilation for its crew. Not a porthole was smashed and no damage done below deck, but she was admittedly much farther from the center of the blast than the Pensacola.

In reflecting upon the damage done to the ships in the first blast, the remarkable thing to this writer is that not a single live mine, bomb, shell, bag of powder or any other ammunition aboard any ship was exploded either by the heat or blast force of the bomb. Torpedoes on the Independence exploded due to a fire which finally exploded her powder magazine and her aviation

Atoll to Remain. This writer believes that Bikini atoll and its coconut groves will be there after the second test is over and even after the third bomb scheduled for November or later is detonated in hundreds of fathoms of water in the ocean outside Bikini lagoon. We do not expect any 100-foot waves nor 1,000-mile-an-hour wind although some wave may wash over the island. A 15-foot wave could do that.

Rats Born in Defiance of Atomic Death

Despite deaths from radioactivity among animals aboard target ships in the Bikini atomic bomb test, the animal population remains almost stationary, reports from the USS Burleson, animal ship of Joint Task Force 1, reveal.

To offset the deaths from radioactivity, a litter of white rats was born aboard the USS Pennsylvania and the new arrivals were unaffected by the bomb. Originally there were 150 goats, 150 pigs and 3,100 white rats placed aboard 22 ships of the target fleet.

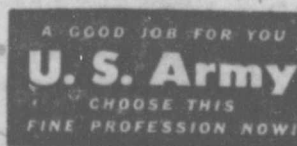

1. Enlistments for 1½, 2 or 3 years. (One-year enlistments permitted for men now in the Army with 6 or more months of service.)
2. Enlistment age from 18 to 34 years inclusive (17 with parents' consent) except for men now in Army, who may reenlist at any age, and former service men depending on length of service.
3. A reenlistment bonus of \$50 for each year of active service since such bonus was last paid, or since last entry into service, provided reenlistment is within 90 days after last honorable discharge.
4. Up to 90 days' reenlistment furlough with pay, depending on length of service, with prescribed travel allowance paid to home and return, for men now in the Army who reenlist.
5. Consult your Army Recruiting Officer for other furlough privileges.
6. Mustering-out pay (based upon length of service) to all men who are discharged to enlist or reenlist.
7. Option to retire at half pay for the rest of your life after 20 years' service—increasing to three-quarters pay after 30 years' service. (Retirement income in grade of Master or First Sergeant up to \$185.63 per month for life.) All previous active federal military service counts toward retirement.
8. Benefits under the GI Bill of Rights assured for men who enlist on or before October 5, 1946.
