

Excess Profits Tax Is Urged; Touris's 'Victory Vacations' Are Crowding America's Parks

PROFITS TAL Urged by Eccl.

Renewal of the acess profits tax as a means of comeracting excessive price advance should the OPA finally be scrapped is being urged by Marriner S. Eccles, chairman of the federal reserve board, and others. Pressure will be put on the treasury and the White House to bring it about to curb profits and also as a deterrant to labor de-mands for higher wages.

Many believe that repeal of the profits levy provided a ma-jor impetus to mion efforts to gain wage corressions worth all the savings to the big corporations.

Opponents of the excess profits tax believe that, regardless of the treasury and the White House, congress will not accept a proposal to tax excess profits as was done during the war. Sairman Robert Doughton, chairman of the powerful house ways and means committee, is known to be gainst the profits levy, and he, with others, can provide a great obstacle to such a plan.

VACATIONS

Farther the Latter

Travel-hungry .mericans are taking their "Victor; vacations" in record numbers, "the farther away, the better as their motto, a mid-season surver shows. "West-ward Ho" is arother trend, with Yellowstone park far in the lead as the nation's favorite vacation spot.

A count of victors at Yellow-stone from the beginning of the travel year on October 1, 1945, to June 30, the year, indicates that 199,390 persons have en-tered the part in this current period, compared with 143,716 in the 1940-41 priod before the war. In Jun alone, 158,338 scenic beauty seekers passed the park gates

Colorado, the lack Hills and other western tourist spots show record numbers of visters. Next to the west are the orthern states of Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota. Boat cruises are more popular than for nany years on the Great Lakes and the larger riv-

CHINA: And UNRRA Relief

Charges of cisuse of UNRRA supplies by the Chinese government for political purposes brought about suspension of relief shipments to China except for emergency supplies. Chiang's covernment immediately protested the suspension as unfair

A Chinese povernment spokes-man concedes that there was some "petty "fering" and that poor people metimes sell the ve foods received more expens from UNRR, and buy cheaper food. He stated the quantity involved was small.

Members of the senate appropri-ations committee in Washington im-mediately call of upon Fiorella H. LaGuardia, dector general of UNRRA, to explain why he cut off relief and reh blitation supplies to China. LaGuara a stated that shipments would b resumed as soon as Chinese ports were cleared of jams of supplies.

BRITISH LOAN: Passage Predicted

The proposed \$3,750,000 British loan will be approved, although by a narrow margin, congressional leaders of both the Democratic and Republican parties have predicted for weeks.

Most of the opposition to the British loan has come from the Middle West. Supporters of the credit, therefore, greeted the defeat of Senator Shipstead of Minnesota, one of the loan's implacable foes, with great satisfaction. They believe his defeat will make passage of the British loan by the senate much easier when the measure reaches that body.

Harold E. Stassen, whose candidate defeated Shipstead, has announced that he will take the stump for candidates in other states to build "a progressive Republican party." This meant to most observers that he will continue to advocate passage of the loan bill.

MINNESOTA:

Stassen and Thye

Gov. Edward J. Thye, hand-picked candidate of Harold E. Stassen, piled up an impressive margin over Sen. Henrik Shipstead for the Republican senatorial nomination and started all over the argument about Stassen's political power and chance to become the GOP candidate for President of the U.S. in 1948.

Stassen, more than Thye, was made the issue of the campaign by Senator Shipstead who openly boasted of his vote against United Nations and the loan to Britain. Stassen, considered a liberal and an internationalist, had approved the U. N. and the

Friends of Stassen predicted that a Thye victory would put Stassen back on the presidential trail and regain the prestige he lost in some quarters when Governor Griswold, whom Stassen supported in the June primary in Nebraska, was defeated by Senator Butler for the GOP senatorial nomination. Others maintain that Thye's popularity was so great in Minnesota that he won despite Stassen.

WIND:

On Capitol Hill "Demosthenes earned his stature

by speaking against the sea, but I hate to speak against the wind." SECRECY PREVAILS

Ships Regrouped for Second Atomic Test

HONOLULU, OPERATIONS CROSSROADS -With much attendant secrecy the target fleet in Bikini lagoon has been regrouped for the second atom bomb test scheduled for July 25. Although most of the correspondents have geturned to the States, several made application to remain in Bikini during the interim so they could cover the arrangements being made for the second test. This request was refused by the navy, however, and all newspaper men were ordered to proceed to Kwajalein, where they were either transported immediately by air to the States or to Honolulu, or were housed aboard the press ship Appalachian.

In the meantime the Appalachian made a leisurely trip to Pearl Harbor where she underwent some minor repairs, and now is proceeding back to Bikini, where she is scheduled to arrive on B-Day minus 1, or

Nearest Center.

It has been announced that ships nearest the bulls-eye of the second test will include the battleship Arkansas, the heavy cruiser Pensacola, the Jap battleship Nagato, the aircraft carrier Saratoga, the destroyer Mayrant, the submarine Pilotfish, the transport Fallow and a tank landing ship.

It may be that the Pilotfish will be nearest the bomb burst, which, as has been announced, will be an underwater detonation. Other ships of the target fleet have been placed in various positions ranging up to 1,800 yards away from the blast.

The Arkansas, the Pensacola and the Nagato all were severely damaged as to superstructure in the first The Pensacola particularly suffered heavy damage to her fire control; her stacks were blown off and her deck plates buckled. This correspondent went aboard the Pensacola after the first test and noted that her decks amidship were driven downward about 12 inches and with such force that steel supports beneath were driven through the steel deck plating like toothpicks through paper.

Await Report.

There is considerable speculation as to the coming report of the Military Evaluation board as to the efficacy of the atom bomb as an offensive weapon in naval warfare. If the board decides that future naval construction must meet the dangers of atomic blasts, then we may expect an entirely different warship of the future.

The experience of the first blast indicates that firepower exposed upon high superstructure is particularly susceptible to the heat and blast of atomic power. The speculation is that to meet this threat, future construction will see streamlined warships with low superstructures, enclosed as much as possible, looking something like a modern deisel locomotive with curved surfaces to deflect blast.

Installation of ventilation systems also will be given close scrutiny since it was learned that the blast in some cases, particularly aboard

gasoline. But on most all the ships were placed live mines, bombs, shells were in guns or on loading apparatus, and each ship had a full load of ammunition. None of it was exploded and the safety crews which boarded the ships following the blast were careful in their examination.

Then the speculation goes to the use of lead lining against X-rays, rock wool or some other protection against heat, and concrete or some substitute against neutrons and other radioactivity.

Opinions Vary.

There are two schools of thought as to the damage likely to occur to ship hulls from the underwater blast. Having in mind the fact that depth charges of presently used explosives have sunk or damaged submarines and heavily damaged destroyers and other lighter craft, one school declares that the atomic bomb will play havoc with the target fleet and predicts that even capital ships closest to the blast will be capsized and sunk

Others, however, predict that much of the force of the blast will be absorbed by the water and that, although there is danger of light ships capsizing, the larger ships will merely roll with the water and their neavier underwater armor will not be damaged. They predict the heavily armored ships will not suffer as much underwater damage as could be inflicted with a torpedo This is all in the realm of speculation, however, and the navy remains mum about its own expectations.

In discussions aboard the Appalachian among scientists and off-the-record comment by naval officers, there is some reason to presume that the atomic bomb as an offensive weapon against ships at sea is not as effective as other weapons, However, its effectiveness against naval bases would be devastating and a fleet without naval bases would be rendered impotent.

Atoll to Remain.

This writer believes that Bikin. atoll and its cocoanut groves will be there after the second test is over and even after the third bomb scheduled for November or later is detonated in hundreds of fathoms of water in the ocean outside Bikini lagoon. 



Wheatless Meals

If you want to have fun, and at the same time, test your ingenuity, do what some of



serve completely wheat-free meals. You may even learn to like it so well, that you can stretch this to two days of the week and thereby help feed the famine-stricken coun-tries. Why not try it?

What are some of the foods to use in place of bread and flour? Here is a partial list to help you: potatoes, corn and cornmeal, corn cereals, hominy, oatmeal, rice and other

wheat-free cereals. You might start off breakfast with cornmeal muffins or potato pan-cakes in place of the customary rolls, coffee-cake or toast. Use po-tatoes plentifully for both luncheon and dinner, and if you want bread, make some oatmeal gems, 100 per cent rye bread, or corn sticks. The family will appreciate them as a welcome change.

Non-wheat cereals like cornmeal ing and crumbing in place of bread or flour. Only in a very few cases will you be able to tell the difference, and even if you have on hard ence, and even if you can, you won't find that difference unpleasant.

Now that the vegetable and fruit season is here in earnest, fill the family on salads and fruity desserts. Everyone yearns for in-sea-son produce and large quanti-ties of fruits and vegetables will spell both health and pleasant eating to the family.

Look over these recipes which it is dished up for you today. Perhaps they will start you thinking about how you can help in serving some wheat-free meals every week and still give the family complete satisfaction at the dining table.

Potato Cups With Tuna Fish. (Serves 4)

1¼ pounds potatoes 1 cup water 1 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup mayonnaise 2 tablespoons vinegar 34 teaspoon grated onion 1/2 cup diced celery 1/2 cup dieed chopped olives ½ cup grated American cheese

Lettuce Wash and peel potatoes and cut into pieces. Cook until done in salted water. (Water should be evaporated by the end of the cooking time.) Press through a ricer, add milk, 1/2 of the mayonnaise, 4 teaspoons of the vinegar and 1/4 teaspoon of the grated onion. Beat un-til well blended, then spoon and shape into nests or cups and chill.

Add remaining ingredients to one 7-ounce can of flaked tuna fish, chill and then serve into potato cups. Sprinkle top with cheese and garnish with crisp greens.

LYNN SAYS:

Save flour when you bake: You can stretch your flour supply by adding fruits, meats and vegetables to your hot breads and dinner

For example, when you make pancakes or waffles, any of the following may be used to give you more from your recipe, without additional flour: chopped apples, mashed bananas, blueberries, diced ham and cheese, sausage meat partially cooked and drained, canned or cooked corn, and nuts.

When making home - baked breads, use dried fruits and oatmeal whenever possible, in muf-fins, bread and biscuits. Prunes, raisins and figs are fine for flavor

In place of bread, occasionally leftover cereals for the starchy food for breakfast. Add one cup of ground leftover meat to cereal and chill, then slice and fry. Or, add chopped apples to cereal, fry as for french toast and serve with syrup or honey. Sweeten and flavor cereal and bake with eggs and milk and serve as a dessert.

cornstick pans. Bake in a hot (425-degree) oven for 20 minutes or until done.

Savory Baked Beans and Hamburger. (Serves 4) 2 tablespoons fat or drippings

1/2 cup sliced onions % cup diced celery 1/2 pound chuck, ground 2% cups baked beans or cooked

Heat fat in skillet, then add onions, celery and ground meat. Cook uncovered for 10 minutes. Add remaining ingredients and heat thoroughly.



You don't need bread when you make meat loaf. In its place you can substitute oatmeal, chopped nuts, ground leftover vegetables or leftover mashed potatoes.

> Peach Melba. (Serves 8)

¿ cups fresh raspberries 1/2 cup currant jelly cup granulated sugar 11/2 tablespoons cornstarch 1 tablespoon cold water 8 canned peach halves 1 quart vanilla ice cream

Mash raspberries, add currant jelly and sugar and bring to a boil. Add cornstarch mixed to a smooth paste with cold water and cook, while stirring, until thick and clear. Strain and cool, Place one peach half, cut side up, in each sherbet glass, fill with ice cream and serve with sauce poured over the ice

This sauce Melba may also be served over orange ice cream or lemon sherbet for delicious effect.
