



WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

Nazi Bigwigs Await Sentence; Dewey Faces Mead in Strategic Race for Governor in New York

WAR CRIMINALS:

Germany

Defiant to the last, Nazi bigwigs awaited sentence on war crimes after a 10-month trial at Nuernberg. Winding up the lengthy case, in which 3,000 documents were introduced and 5,000,000 words of testimony taken, former Reichsmarshal Goering denounced the allies for accusing the German leaders alone of violations of international law; ex-Foreign Minister Von Ribbentrop ripped the prosecution for refusal to admit as evidence an alleged warning by Churchill that Germany would be destroyed if she became too strong, and Finance Minister Schacht pleaded he had tried to avert the war.

Counsel for 27 high Japanese leaders on trial for war crimes in Tokyo was thrown into a dither by the rev-elation that officials of the war department had misused confidential information to tip off the prosecu-tion on its strategy. Knowledge that counsel would claim Japan was forced into the war by America's diplomatic moves and economic sanctions was radioed to the prosecution and accidentally fell into the hands of the defense.

Philippines

Concluding three days of fiery oratory before the people's court for his release on bail, Jose Laurel, Filipino puppet ruler under the Japanese charged with collaboration, declared everyone had worked for the enemy out of fear or other motives. Mentioning Japanese money, Laurel shouted that it was in general circulation throughout the nation and therefore everyone who accepted it had assisted the Nipponese.

AUTO OUTPUT:

Hits Lag

In calling a press conference in Detroit, Mich., C. E. Wilson, presi-dent of General Motors corporation, presented the company's case against both the government and production.

Pointing out that G.M. had turned out only 400,000 cars and trucks in the year following V-J Day instead of the 1,400,000 scheduled, Wilson charged the Truman administration with having attempted to appease labor unions by taking the lid off wages while at the same time stating that price increases were To Provide Comforts unnecessary. As a result, manufacturers were "put in the nutcracker," he averred.

Although G.M. has 88,000 more employees on its payroll than in 1941, production is about half, Wilson said. Tests on relative jobs have shown that worker productivity is about 80 per cent of the pre-war rate. Refusal of employees to extend themselves, a high absenteeism rate, inexperience and a large turnover partly due to the ease in collecting unemployment compensation all have contributed to the inefficiency, Wilson declared.



As the party lines were being drawn for battle, Dewey stood as the favorite to win because of his administrative record in office.

One could almost have heard the rattle down in Davey Jones' locker when the navy announced that it was air-conditioning the new cruisers, Salem and Newport News, to determine the best kind of equipment for eventually cooling all of its ships.

In announcing the navy's plans for providing additional comfort for crews on the bounding main, Vice-Adm. Edward L. Cochrane, chief of the bureau of ships, emphasized that air-conditioning had proved invaluable in boosting morale and fighting efficiency in combat.

Various types of new air-conditioning equipment will be used in the tests in the new 17,000-ton cruisers, with the cool air transmitted into all living and working compartments save machinery areas where the heat is too intense. Simplified coils will be shockproof and easily cleaned, it was said.

Farm Co-Ops Grow

Business volume and membership of farmers' co-operative associations wed a substantial increase in the 1944-45 marketing season over the previous season, according to Farm Credit administration.

Estimated membership in the agricultural co-operatives operating in the year ended June 30, 1945, was from \$5,160,600,000 to \$5,645,000,000.

VFW: Ask Vet Aid

Adoption of resolutions calling for increased benefits to World War I vets and satisfaction of domestic needs first before providing for those of other nations highlighted the Veterans of Foreign Wars na-

tional encampment in Boston, Mass. Congress was urged to authorize pensions for World War I vets for old age and disability, with pay-ments made for the latter regardless of whether the disabilities resulted from military duty. Such payments are made to Spanish-American war vets.

The government was asked to halt shipments of food to former enemy countries as long as any American was unable to obtain sufficient food stuffs to maintain proper health. A protest was raised against deliveries of grain abroad at the expense of U. S. brewers while beer was being imported from England, Belgium and Holland.

Other resolutions called for the trial of Yugoslav airmen who shot down American fliers; support of the Anglo-American recommendations for admission of 100,000 Jews to Palestine, and condemnation of the practice of awarding actors combat awards for troop entertain-

FOREIGN RELATIONS:

Russ Rap Envoy

From Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, the Federated Press dispatched a story hich read in part:

'Information has reached here . . . of a sensational warmongering speech delivered . . . in Buenos Aires by George S. Messersmith, U. S. ambassa-dor to Argentina. Messersmith's speech, a so-called "off-the-record" affair at a meeting of the American Legion post in Buenos Aires, pictured war between the U. S. and Soviet union as inevitable. . . .

Quick to respond to the alleged address, Pravda, the Communist party organ in Moscow, opined that the state department had sanctioned Messersmith's talk, thus directly charging this government with a hostile attitude. Pravda declared that Messersmith had said that his views were shared by higher-ups.

In Washington, Undersecretary of State William L. Clayton asserted that Messersmith had denied categorically that he had said war with Russia was sure to come.

MARITIME:

Big Walkout

Government authorities pressed hard to settle the walkout of 43,000 AFL seamen and avert a crippling strike of all 500,000 members of AFL and CIO maritime unions in sympathy with their protest over wage stabilization board ruling nullifying substantial wage in creases.

The trouble developed when the WSB ruled that ship owners were entitled to apply for rate increases only on the basis of monthly wage boosts of \$17.50 as established in the settlement of the threatened CIO walkout. The operators had grantgrants, who got his ed the Seamen of the Pacific a start in life as a monthly hike of \$22.50 and the Seafarers International Union \$27.50. In backing the AFL walkout, Big Joe Curran, CIO maritime leader, was quoted as saying wage boosts for any union were good for other workers in the industry. INDIA:

Showdown

Ominously the Moslem newspaper Dawn of New Delhi lamented

"India finds itself turned into a prison house for Moslems. The prison keepers must be overcome. The art of gentle persuasion having failed, the hard road of resistance alone remains,"

Even as the words were being written, bloody rioting, engendered by the initiation of a Hindu-dominated interim government, raged in Bombay. Following the pattern of costly outbreaks in Calcutta, mobs of Moslems and Hindus invaded opposing neighborhoods, knifed and beat their victims, smashed shops and homes and looted property.

With such violent riots long pre-dicted by the British in the event of their surrender of political control of the country, leaders of the large Hindu majority welcomed the outbreaks at the very inception of the new independent government as a test of their ability to maintain order. The Moslems, on the other hand, appeared equally determined to press the issue for "pakistan," a slem state within India.

VOLUNTEERS:

Local volunteer groups that performed valuable wartime services are "reconverting" to peacetime activities in many cities.

In Philadelphia, 500 auxiliary policemen, virtually all with experience in the civilian defense organization during the war, have been sworn in to serve in time of emergency and when major events are staged. Columbus, O., recently created a volunteer police force of 200 members.



Tells of Training Methods to Overcome Common Dog Faults

than the harum-scarum, "rough

dogs is jumping up on people. Usu-ally the dog does this in an over-exuberance of friendliness. But no matter how sociable the dog's intenmatter now sociable the dog's inten-tions are, no one wants clean cloth-ing smeared with dirty paw marks. The best time to start training against this habit is when the puppy is three or four months of age. Every time he jumps up, he should be pushed away with a sharp-toned command of "No!"

There are two good methods for training older dogs out of this habit. One system is to grasp the dog's front paws when he jumps up, hold front paws when he jumps up, hold them firmly, and at the same time reach out with one foot and step slightly on the dog's back feet. If this procedure is followed every time the dog jumps up, he soon learns to associate discomfort with jumping on people, and abandons the practice. Another cure for this habit is raising the knee just as the dog jumps so the knee just as the dog jumps so that the dog's chest will be hit, and he is thoroughly jarred and perhaps even toppled over backward. The knee should be raised and lowered as quickly as possible so that when the dog regains his balance and looks in the state of t up, he sees you standing quietly as though nothing had occurred.

A well-trained dog is a much more patience to cure him. The dog should agreeable and amusing companion than the harum-scarum, "rough is discovered on the furniture, and than the harum-scarum, "rough neck" dog that has never been taught the niceties of canine etiquette, says the Gaines Dog Research Center New York City. Either of these two methods, followed consistently, should stop the most persistent jumper. It will serve no useful purpose, however, to correct the dog on one occasion, and pet him the next time he flings himself joyously upon you. The procedure must be followed every time the dog jumps up. It is helpful if your friends can be persuaded to follow these same methods, then the dog soon learns he must not jump on any one at all, as he gets the same handling from everybody.

Sometimes a house-dog will decide the floor is not comfortable enough for him and will start using the chairs, sofas and beds for resting places. Once a dog has acquired the habit of sitting on furniture it requires a good deal of firmness and

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

Parade of Cakes

If you long to make a cake tender to the touch, feathery in texture, and delicate to the taste, then success is yours if you measure carefully, use good ingredients and bake carefully.

Maybe yours is one of those homes where the week-end does not begin unless there's a luscious cake reposing on the cake dish. If so, you'll want variety in addition to goodness,

and there will be a different cake here for several week-ends, if you just clip out these recipes and use them as you go This orange cake may be frosted

with either orange or chocolate frosting depending upon your taste: Orange Cake. (Makes 2 8-inch layers) 2 cups sifted flour

21/2 feaspoons baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt % cup shortening 1 cup sugar 3 eggs

11/2 tablespoons grated orange rind % cup orange juice Sift flour, measure, then sift again with baking powder and salt. Cream

shortening, add sugar gradually and cream until light and fluffy. Add well-beaten eggs and cream thoroughly, then add orange rind. Add dry ingredients alternately with orange juice, blending thoroughly after each addition. Bake in two layers in greased pans or as cup fluffy. Add whole eggs, one at a cakes or loaf cake. Use a moderate time and beat until mixture is fluffy.

(350-degree) oven for 30 to 35 min-Orange Butter Frosting: Cream together 1/2 cup butter with about 1 pound of powdered sugar (31/2 cups sifted). Add a few grains of salt, 11/2 teaspoons grated orange rind and 1 teaspoon lemon juice. Add enough liquid to make of

When You Bake Cakes: Use these tips to make your work more efficient:

Oven should be heated to desired temperature before placing the cake within it. A good work order to follow is to lay out your utensils and ingredients, then light the oven, and then mix your cake. In this way you don't have to stop during mixing to light the

The cake is done when it is lightly browned, and when it springs back lightly as touched. It may show very slight shrinkage from the edges of the pan.

I'd suggest you try a Prune Cake which will keep nicely moist for at least a week. Dress it up with orange frosting, sprinkled with shredded cocoanut.

Prune Velvet Cake. (Makes 3 8-inch layers) 11/2 cups drained, unsweetened, cooked prunes

1 cup shortening 2 cups granulated sugar 4 eggs, separated 3 cups sifted flour 1/2 teaspoon salt

2 teaspoons baking powder 1 teaspoon baking soda 1 cup sour cream or buttermilk 2 teaspoons vanilla

Measure prunes, then cut into small pieces. Cream together shortening with sugar and cream until Add sifted dry ingredients with sour cream, alternately, beating until smooth after each addition. Add prunes and vanilla last and mix Pour batter into three lightly. greased or oiled layer pans and bake in a moderately hot (375-degree) oven for 30 to 35 minutes. Frost when cool.

Maraschino Cherry Cake. (Makes 8 by 12-inch loaf)

34 cup shortening 11/2 cups sugar 1/2 teaspoon vanilla 14 teaspoon lemon flavoring

1/2 cup liquid drained from maraschino cherries or 1/2 cup milk 1/2 cup finely chopped maraschino cherries 3 cups sifted flour 3 teaspoons baking powder

¼ teaspoon salt 4 egg whites Cream together shortening and sugar. Add flavoring and chopped cherries. Add flour alternately

ووا with liquid or milk, after flour has been sifted three times with baking powder and salt. Beat until smooth,

then fold in stiffly beaten whites. Place in a greased shallow loaf pan and bake 40 to 45 minutes in a moderate (375-degree) oven. Cool and ice with boiled icing.

Sugarless Boiled Icing. 2 egg whites, unbeaten 11/2 cups white corn syrup 1 teaspoon vanilla extract Pinch of salt

Combine all ingredients except flavor in top of double boiler. Place over rapidly boiling water and beat with rotary beater for 7 minutes or until frosting stands in peaks. Remove from boiling water, add vanilla and beat until thick enough to spread.

This recipe is enough to frost the top and sides of two or three eight or nine-inch layers or an 8 by 8 by 2-inch cake generously. The top may be sprinkled with cocoanut; flavored with peppermint; or after the cake is iced, melted chocolate may be drizzled over the white icing.

To make chocolate icing from above recipe, fold in 2 to 3 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted, after finishing the beating.
