





Probe War Profits

Defy Injunction

Always jealous of its right to strike to enforce wage and other demands, organized labor presented a united front against a county court's anti-strike injunction against the In-dependent Association of Employees of Duquesne Light company in

Pittsburgh, Pa. In issuing the injunction, the three-judge court heeded the city solicitor's plea to act in the public interest in preventing a costly power strike. Though the order later was dissolved when the solicitor de-clared that it had served to force a resumption of bargaining between the disputants, IAE members re-mained adamant about returning to work as long as it stayed in effect. Apprehensive of the no-strike and no-picketing features of the injunction, AFL and CIO unions support-ed the IAE walkout. Labor charged that the court order was in violation of both the state and federal antiinjunction laws and there was no law requiring men to work against their wish.

Truckers Idle

Trucks remained idle in New York City and pickets patroled ferry, bridge and tunnel approaches to prevent admission of motor freight as big operators continued to hold out against AFL teamsters demands.

While smaller employers agreed to a proposal to pay the teamsters \$71.40 for a 40-hour week instead of the old \$64 for a 44-hour week, the big firms held fast to their offer for a \$3-a-week raise. They claimed 75 per cent of the trucks remained off the street and 10,000 men were idle.

Five New Jersey teamster locals co-operated with the embattled New York strikers in stopping freight movements into the city. Union stewards sought to tie up freight at starting points while pickets took up stations along strategic entrances into New York to guard against trucks slipping through.

Higher Earnings Deprive Workers of Low-Cost Housing

Not only the demobilized veteran but the demobilized war worker as well is being enmeshed in the critical housing shortage, according to the National Association of Housing officials. The dilemma centers on the need for construction of rental housing to fit families with incomes about but not much above \$2,000. The war is over; most of the boys are backbut public rental housing is still deep in the throes of reconversion. Big problem is to find other dwellings for higher wage earners to make room in public housing projects for those at the bottom of the income ladder.

In an attempt to put public housing back on a peacetime basis, hous-ing authorities have ruled that tenants with top family incomes ranging between \$1,500 and \$2,000 are no longer eligible for continued residence in public housing projects.

Binding its wartime wounds, the great Russian bear is on the way to a laborious and painful econom ic recovery. While outside experts have asserted that it would take many. years for the Soviets to get back on their feet, the masters in the Kremlin are exerting every force to speed up recovery.

Effect of the strenuous efforts to restore Russian industry is evident in progress reported in the war-rayaged Donets river basin, important prewar producing center. In the first six months of 1946, overall industrial output averaged 43.8 per cent of the 1940 level, with steel production at 40.4; coal, 44; pig iron, 40.2, and rolled metals, 39





Puddings and Sauces

As the weather grows cooler, there's nothing more delectable for dessert than a steaming hot -Sec pudding served with a mouthwatering sauce. And as for economy, the base of the pudding is frequently such

an inexpensive item as bread crumbs or cereal. What's more, puddings are usual-

ly chock-full of eggs and milk, dried fruits or such that make them healthful eating. If you're preparing an oven dinner and want to save heat, cook your pudding right along with the rest of the dinner. Pudding use less sugar than most

other desserts like cakes and ice cream, and this, too, makes them ideal for menu purposes. If you have spent more than your share of sugar on canning, try some of these suggestions for real economy. Marmalade Pudding.

(Serves 6)

cup soft bread crumbs l cup flour 3 teaspoons baking powder 1 cup ground suet 1/3 cup sugar cup orange marmalade

3 eggs, well beaten

3/4 teaspoon salt

l cup milk

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

Temper Preservatives: To prevent milk from scorching when heating, rinse saucepan in hot water first.

To keep eggs from cracking when boiling them, dip first in cold water, then add them to hot water. Let dry in cooking water. To keep candles from dripping, let them stand in refrigerator 24 hours before using.

To keep marshmallows fresh, keep them in the bread box. When you fry fish or meat that should not be covered, place a colander over the skillet and this will prevent the stove from be-

coming grease-spotted. To keep cheese from drying out, rub with butter then wrap in a lightly moistened cloth and keep refrigerated.

and peanut britused. Sprinkle lemon juice over last layers of apples. Bake in moderate oven for 1 hour, then serve hot or cold. Caramel Pudding. (Serves 6) 4 cups scalded milk 1 teaspoon butter 2 eggs 3/4 cup sugar

2 cups soft bread crumbs 1 cup caramelized sugar

Make caramelized sugar by allow ing 1 cup sugar to melt slowly in heavy skillet, turning constantly. Add bread crumbs to caramelized sugar, milk, butter and beaten eggs

and let stand for 1 hour. Add sugar and pour mixture into buttered custard cups and bake in a pan of hot water in a moderate (350-degree) oven for 25 to 30 minutes or until firm.

Sauces enhance puddings and take but a little time to prepare. Here's a sauce for every type of pudding:

Foamy Sauce. 6 tablespoons butter or substitute 2 tablespoons boiling water 1 cup powdered sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla 1/2 teaspoon salt 3 eggs

Cream butter, add sugar slowly, beating constantly. Beat egg yolks until thick and add to first mixture. Add water and salt and stiffly beaten whites. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly for 5 minutes. Add flavoring and serve at once.

Lemon Molasses Sauce. 1 cup molasses 2 tablespoons butter

1/3 cup lemon juice Heat molasses to boiling point, stirring constantly. Add butter and boil 1 minute. Add lemon juice and mix thoroughly. Serve with fruit puddings.

Orange or Vanilla Sauce. 1 cup sugar 2 tablespoons flour 1 orange, tind and juice 2 cups boiling water 2 tablespoons butter

1/4 teaspoon salt Combine sugar, salt and flour. Add water slowly, stirring constant-ly. Cook in double boiler, stirring

frequently, for 8 minutes. Add orange juice, rind and butter. Stir until blended. For vanilla sauce, use 1 teaspoon vanilla in place of orange juice and rind. This is good for fruit puddings.

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
