Swing of SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS

Cotton, strawberries, and some grains and livestock strengthened last week, but other southwest farm products sold about the same or lower, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Despite seasonally dull trading in spot cotton, prices gained them again. around \$4.50 per bale. Middling 15-16 closed Friday at 36.60 at Dallas and New Orleans; and 36.35 Warning at Houston. Small supplies of high grades let lower classes sell better.

Most cattle sold lower at Texas west terminals paid generally higher prices. The bulk of common to medium steers and yearlings brought \$13.50 to \$17.50 at Informer Kates Houston; while medium to average good kinds turned at \$18 to \$22.25 at San Antonio. 

(Serves 6) 4 tablespoons cream corn starch

% teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons vinegar 2 cups tomato juice

Combine cream cornstarch, salt and vinegar. Gradually add tomato juice." Heat to

boiling point and boil 1 minute, stirring constantly. Pour into individual molds which have been rinsed in cold water. Serve on lettuce and top with dressing made by folding in cold,

Before storing away your galoshes, turn them inside out and dunk them in a tub of warm, soapy water. Scrub them with a brush, then rinse and dry them away from heat. Next season they will not dirty your shoes.





ALEMAN:

Cordial Welcome

First Mexican chief executive ever to make a state visit to Wash-ington, Pres. Miguel Aleman was given a cordial reception on his trip to the nation's capital.

As the personal guest of President Truman, the visiting dignitary participated in a full schedule of events arranged in his honor by the state, war and navy departments and Mexican embassy officials.

In speeches before the Pan-American union and congress. President Aleman urged Western Hemisphere republics to assure "the independ-ence of each nation through the solidarity of all."

The Mexican chief executive uti-lized the visit to begin preliminary discussions on a sizable American loan to aid in Mexico's industrialization, revision of trade treaties be-tween the two countries and other problems.

CANADA:

Trims Income Taxes

Personal income taxes of Canadians will be reduced about 29 per cent for the 1947-48 tax year. The lower levy has been made possible by paring the federal budget to two billion dollars. Many Canadians were disappointed, however, to hear that no change in luxury and sales taxes was contemplated.

The new tax schedule ranges from 10 per cent in the lowest brackets, to 80 per cent for persons earning above \$250,000 a year.

'UNKNOWN CHILD':

Honor War Role

Commemorating the thousands of children who died in concentration camps and in the fighting of World War II, the world's first monument to an "unknown child" was dedicated in Prague, Czechoslovakia. The little statue, which stands in front of the Cathedral of the Victorious Virgin, also honors the lost children of Lidice, whose parents were killed when the Nazis destroyed the city as a reprisal measure.



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

Long delayed, the task of trying to draw up a settlement of Russia's \$11,296,000,000 lend - lease account with the United States finally was commenced when American and Soviet officials got down to actual dickering.

Russia will be called upon in the negotiations to reveal for the first time the "secret" inventory of American lend-lease supplies still in use by the Soviet.

## STOPPAGES:

Hit Low Level

Although strikes still clouded the industrial horizon, a report of the bureau of labor statistics revealed that time lost in work stoppages during the first three months of this year was at the lowest level since end of the war.

Figures showed about 290,000 workers were involved in strikes or lockouts during that period, com-pared with 1,650,000 in the first quarter of 1946. Big strikes shut down steel, electrical, meat packing and automotive plants during the comparable period last year.
