Swing of SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS

Produce easiness prevailed on many farm markets last week, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Late-week cotton losses all but liquidated early advances of around \$5 a bale, as markets closed around \$1.50 higher for the week. Demand for most favored grades and staples continued good; but spot sales decreased.

Cattle prices weakened radically late last week, after gaining early in the period. Some markets still netted small advances, while others marked down values as much as \$1 or more. At Houston, common and medium cows ranged from \$12.50 to \$14.75; while Oklahoma City paid \$12.50 to \$15.50, and Wichita \$13.50 to \$16.50. San Antonio bought common cows at \$13 to \$14.75; Fort Worth took cutter and common at \$11.50 to \$14.50, and Denver moved common to good at \$15 to \$19.60.

Hog prices fell 50 cents to \$1 or more for the week. San Antonio held steady at \$27.75 for top butcher hogs, while Fort Worth dropped 25 cents to \$28.50. Closing top was \$29 at Oklahoma City and Denver, and \$28.50 at Wichita.

Eggs remained firm to slightly stronger last week, and poultry scored small advances at some markets. New Orleans paid 32 to 34 cents per pound for heavy hens and 42½ for fryers and broilers. Most other markets bought heavy hens at 24 to 26 cents and young chickens from 32 to 38. Most eggs came from storage of the North.

Leaving Stalks

The AAA office has started issuing approvals on the practice of leaving grain sorghum stalks on the land. Mrs. Mildred Ritter, ACA secretary, announced Tuesday.

The opening date for approvals on this practice was September 15, and approvals may be issued until November 15, Mrs. Ritter said. Practices must be reported by December 15.

One change has been made in the program this year. Previously stalks had to be left on the land until March 1, but this year farmers are required to leave stalks only until January 1. Mrs. Ritter pointed out that this was about the time stock are turned in on the land after harvesting anyway, and that the new date gives the farmer a better use of the land.

School News

Farm Bureau Meeting

A series of 23 Farm Bureau district meetings will be held in Texas September 29 through October 14, it has been announced by J. Walter Hammond, president of the state organization.

In order that more farmers will be able to attend and take part in the discussions, two meetings have been scheduled for the District 1 area. One will be held in Mulkey Theatre at Clarendon on Wednesday, October 1; the other will be held in the Herring Hotel at Amarillo on Thursday, October 2. The meetings will start at 10:00 a. m. and Joe M. Hatton of Amarillo state director, will preside.

The Texas Farm Bureau will attempt to get a cross-section on the thinking of farmers with reference to continuation of the national farm program, which is in jeopardy at this time, a farm-to-market road plan and many other critical issues.

Congressman Eugene Worley is being asked to appear on the program to talk on "Why Farmers should Be Organized."

Peanut Acreage

Any farmer who harvested peanuts during the period 1944 to 1947 must report the acreage to the local AAA office before an acreage allotment for 1948 can be made, according to an announcement by the ACA secretary, Mrs. Mildred Ritter.

Peanuts is the only crop of which there is a surplus, Mrs. Ritter said, here being around 25 per cent more peanuts than available market. For this reason there must be an acreage control before there can be a government price guarantee for the '48 crop he said.

Memphis, Tex.—Exhibit and display material is arriving here for the First Annual West Texas Cotton, Chemurgic and Ceramics Carnival, Oct. 2-4, and space is at a premium even though it is free.

Plans are being completed this week to welcome an all-time record crowd in the "Mardi Gras City of West Texas" for this gala occasion, dedicated to exploiting the natural and industrial resources of the entire area.

Exhibitors start placing displays in booths and locations Monday. Queens from more than 35 cities will arrive here by 6 o'clock the evening of Oct. 2, each seeking the title "Maid of West Texas" and hopeful of winning the all-expense-paid vacation trip.

Friday will be devoted to the midway, exhibits, public speaking, introduction of celebrities and dignitaries, rodeo parade and performance, football game, dancing, and impromptu acts.

The major day of the Carnival is Saturday, Oct. 4. In addition to all the above attractions and two performances of the championship rodeo, the "Parade of West Texas" gets under way at 10 o'clock to be headed by Gov. Beauford H. Jester and scores of other dignitaries, Will Rogers Range Riders, hundreds of horses and riders, more than a dozen bands, Queens, floats and a host of other outstanding units. Also, another added attraction for this day, in addition to those mentioned above, is a championship wrestling match to be followed by the Queen's coronation.

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Garden 'Greens' Can Be Continuous

Plenty of leafy vegetables, raw and cooked, are necessary in the diet of both children and grownups in order to promote vigor and well-being. In a home garden they can be continuous for many months if various kinds are grown. Leaf lettuce is one of the first green things to appear. The young leaves can be picked for the table when only a couple of inches in length while the smaller inner leaves are left to grow. The same is true of spinach; the tender new leaves are as good raw as cooked when chopped and served with oil and vinegar dressing. Or, treat them the same as "wilted lettuce" by pouring over them a mixture of hot bacon fat, vinegar, and bits of cooked bacon. To vary the flavor of these greens, add a small amount of peppercorns. The frilled curly foliage of this upland cress is as easy to grow as lettuce.

For long season greens swiss chard is a winner. No leafy vegetable stands hot weather better. The outer leaves should be kept picked, the inner ones left to continue growing, and the result will be tender, brittle stalks and leaves for a long time.

Of the numerous root tops used as greens, beet, mustard, and turnip are increasingly popular. Like all vegetables they are best when young. Mustard and turnip particularly should be used for greens only in the early stages. The tops of mustard and turnip combined are appetizing—a favorite of grandmother's day.

By sowing seed of kale in spring or summer in the North and August to October in the South, fresh greens can be picked from the garden even after the coming of frost and light snow. In fact, some frost improves the texture and flavor of kale, making it a real treat for late autumn and winter meals. Dwarf Curled Kale is one of the best varieties for home gardens.

Pastry Tricks

Now that cooler weather has come, we can all indulge in a few of the richer desserts that we've been avoiding during hot, sweltering weather. Since it's cooler you won't mind using the oven if baking the pie is required, and you won't mind taking the extra time for their preparation.

There was a time when we thought of pie as something with a crust made of shortening, flour and water, but now there are many new crumb crusts from which to choose—and sometimes these are even better with certain types of fillings. If you want a real taste delight, experiment with new crusts, novel fillings, and gather yourself a new and delicious collection of pastries from which to choose desserts. We all grow tired of eating the same things day in, day out, and there's so much new in the way of foods, it's just not a smart homemaker who doesn't find different touches to add to her menus.

Since fall is on the way, you'll be using pumpkin quite often. Here are two excellent variations of the old fashioned pumpkin pie, both of which are guaranteed to make a hit with the family.

Orange Pumpkin Pie (Nine Inch)

- 1 teaspoon ginger
 - 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1/4 cup boiling water
 - 3/4 cup brown sugar
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 2 eggs
 - 1 1/4 cups pumpkin
 - 1 cup evaporated milk (scalded)
 - 3 tablespoons orange juice
- Make a smooth paste of the spices and water. Add with the sugar, salt, and beaten eggs to the pumpkin. Stir to blend thoroughly, then add orange juice and pour immediately into an unbaked pie shell. Bake in a hot oven (425 degrees) 15 minutes, then reduce to a slow oven (300 degrees) and bake until filling is just set.

Pumpkin Chiffon Pie With Gingersnap Crust (Nine Inch)

- 3 egg yolks, slightly beaten
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 1 1/4 cups pumpkin
 - 1/2 cup milk
 - 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon ginger
 - 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
 - 1 tablespoon gelatin
 - 1/4 cup cold water
 - 3 egg whites
- Whipped cream**
- Combine egg yolks, 1/2 cup sugar, pumpkin, milk, and spices. Cook in double boiler until thick. Soak gelatin in water 5 minutes, add to pumpkin mixture. Mix and cool. When thick add remaining sugar and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour in pie shell and serve with whipped cream.

Crust

- 1 1/2 cups gingersnap or graham cracker crumbs
- 1/2 cup butter (scant)
- 1/4 cup confectioners' sugar

Simple Foods Are Easy To Dress Up

To steam means cooking in steam or in boiling water.

To parboil means to cook food partially in one way. Potatoes may be boiled and then to finish cooking by baking, for example.

Seasoned and cooked macaroni may be mixed with slivers of leftover frankfurters and mixed together with a cream sauce and served as a luncheon dish.

LYNN CHAMBERS' MENU

- Green Peppers Stuffed With Meat
- Buttered Rice
- Asparagus Vinaigrette
- Grape and Melon Salad
- Muffins
- *Cottage Cheese Apple Pie

Combine all ingredients. Pat firmly into pan, chill for several hours. Fill with above filling and chill.

Lemon Chiffon Pie (Nine Inch)

- 1 envelope plain unflavored gelatine
 - 1/4 cup cold water
 - 4 eggs
 - 1 cup white corn syrup
 - 1/2 cup lemon juice
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
- Soften gelatine in cold water. Beat egg yolks, add corn syrup, lemon juice and salt. Cook in double boiler until of a custard consistency, stirring constantly. Add softened gelatine and stir until dissolved. Add grated lemon rind. Cool, and when mixture begins to thicken, fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into baked pie shell or crumb crust and chill.



Honey Crumb Pie Shell

- 3 cups oven-popped rice cereal
 - 2 tablespoons honey
 - 1/4 cup melted butter or margarine
- Crush rice cereal into fine crumbs. Add honey and butter; mix well. Press evenly and firmly around sides and bottom of pie pan. Bake in slow oven (325 degrees) about 10 minutes. Cool before adding filling.

***Cottage Cheese Apple Pie (Nine Inch)**

- 1 1/2 cups apples, sliced thin
 - 1/4 cup sugar
 - 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- Pastry**
- 1/2 cup sugar
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 2 eggs, slightly beaten
 - 1/2 cup cream and 1/4 cup milk, scalded together
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
 - 1 cup cottage cheese
- Combine apples, sugar and spices. Pour into pastry lined pie tin. Bake in a hot oven (425 degrees F.) 15 minutes. Meanwhile add sugar and salt to eggs, combine with hot milk and cream. Add vanilla and cottage cheese. Pour over apple mixture. Continue baking in a moderate oven (325 to 350 degrees F.) 40 minutes, or until mixture sets and is a delicate brown.

Date Cream Pie (Nine Inch)

- 1/2 cup sugar
 - 1/4 cup cornstarch
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 2 cups thick sour cream
 - 2 eggs, slightly beaten
 - 2 cups dates, quartered
 - 1/4 cup pecan meats, chopped
 - 1 teaspoon lemon juice
 - 9-inch baked pie shell
- Whipped cream**
- Combine sugar, cornstarch and salt. Add cream. Cook in double boiler, stirring constantly, until thickened. Add eggs, then dates and pecan meats, stir well, cool. Add lemon juice, pour into pie shell. Cool. Top with whipped cream.

Try some sliced, sauteed mushrooms with your pot roast if you want something akin to steak.

Tuna fish, salmon, meat and egg salads go further and look prettier if combined with hard-cooked eggs, chopped, macaroni, leftover peas, celery and green pepper.

Serve leftover sliced cold tongue with chili sauce on lettuce for a warm night or Sunday snack. Some will eat this as a salad while others prefer to make a sandwich out of it on rye bread.

Jenny Lind's Concert Tour Created Greatest Furor

America's greatest furor was that created by Jenny Lind, the Swedish singer, during her concert tour (1850-1852) says Collier's.

Its extent is indicated by a collection of Lindiana owned by the New York Historical society which contains, among its thousands of items, scores of the countless articles on which her name and portrait were used as a trademark or decoration, such as bonnets, beds, whiskies, wallpapers and even men's fancy vest buttons.

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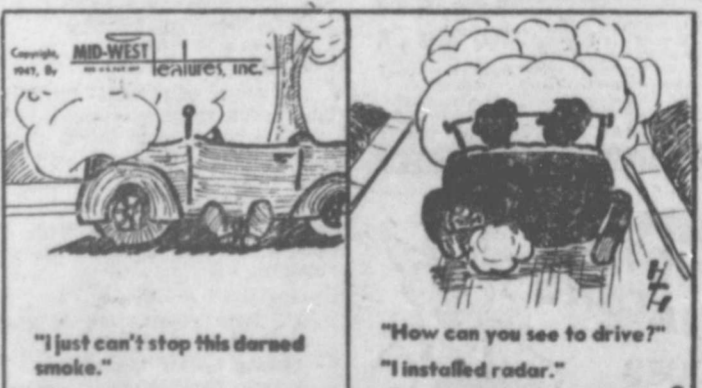
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
