Swing of SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS

Farm commodities moved to generally unsettled markets last week, with moderate to sharp declines on many products, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Spot cotton prices declined from \$4 to \$6 per bale during the week, and there was a further weakening of the basis. Demand was good for Army Purchase qualities but only fair for domestic purchases. Harvesting made rapid progress.

Cattle closed the week generally 50 cents to \$1 or more lower. Hogs were felt the heaviest pressure. Good calves sold at \$17.50 to \$19.50 at Houston, and choice heavy calves moved at \$21 to \$23 at Oklahoma City. Good and choice calves turned late in the week at mostly \$17 to \$19 at San Antonio, \$16.50 to \$19 at Fort Worth, and \$16 to \$18 at Wichita. Denver's practical top was \$21.50 for calves and vealers.

Hogs suffered losses of mainly 25 cents to \$1 for the week, and pigs fell as much as \$2 at some markets. San Antonio closed the week at a top of \$27.50, Fort Worth and Oklahoma City at \$25.50. Sows brought \$24 to \$25.50 at Fort Worth and Oklahoma City. Good demand held poultry prices firm during the week, and young chickens tended higher. Some turkeys moved largely at government support prices. Eggs remained fairly steady. Seasonally best candied oranges sold mostly around 50 to 55 cents per dozen, but some areas including New Orleans paid up to 60 cents or more.

The following appeared in the Houston Press for Friday, Sept. 26:

Mrs. Ruth Buchanan Hill, wife of the superintendent of schools in Kirklind and daughter of a prominent Presbyterian minister, died in the home of her sister, Mrs. C. W. Christian of 701 Avenue of Oaks, late yesterday.

Mrs. Hill, who was 50, was born in Fort Worth and moved to Houston with her family while still a child. She attended Rice Institute.

Her father, the late Rev. A. B. Buchanan, was pastor of the Central Presbyterian Church for about 20 years. After leaving Houston, he was president of Cumberland University in Lebanon, Tenn.

He also did missionary work in Tennessee before returning to Texas, where he became pastor of the College Port Presbyterian Church.

Mrs. Hill's husband, Chester O. Hill, was superintendent of schools in Hedley for several years. This year, he moved to Kirklind as superintendent.

Mrs. Hill is also survived by a son, Andrew Buchanan Hill of Lubbock; a daughter, Miss Anna Lee Hill of Kirklind and two sisters, Miss Mary Buchanan and Mrs. Christian, both of Houston.

Mrs. Hill made many warm friends during her stay in Hedley, who deeply regret to learn of her passing.

The funeral services were held at Houston Monday.

Dear Mr. Boliver: For some time now I have thought that I should let you know that I am getting the Hedley Informer each week and do appreciate it very much. It was a nice birthday present from Otis, my big old Lion brother.

And speaking of Lions, I've been awfully afraid of them ever since about three years ago when my oldest son Melven and I went deer hunting. It was late afternoon when we reached the range of mountains we wished to hunt in. It was the last day of season.

We were hunting in a deep canyon and the sun was sinking low in the west. We jumped two deer and I killed one of them. So I pulled it up to the side of a big log and covered it over with leaves, as my son had said, "Papa, let's go on up the canyon and see if we can't get another one." I marked the place with limbs and what not, so we could easily find it when we came back down the canyon. We kept going on up the canyon without seeing any more deer and before we realized it, it was getting dark.

So we started back down the canyon and it got dark so quick that we missed our deer going down. We kept looking and thinking we would come to it any time but we decided that we had already passed it, so we turned around and went back up the canyon a long ways until we decided that we had never got as far down the canyon as where the deer was, so we turned around and went back down the canyon until we came to the timber line. We knew then we had come past the deer and were way too far down the canyon. As we only had one flashlight and it was pretty rough going over rocks and cliffs, I said to my son, "You stay here and I will go back after the deer." I left my gun with him, just took hatchet and hunting knife. Well, to make a long story short, when I got back near the deer I was warned that I was not wanted and not to come any further as an old mountain lion had found the deer and had eaten a big hole in its shoulder and neck. As I attempted to approach further, the old lion let me know he was there and didn't want to give up that good meat. **Marshall Asks U. N. Reshuffle;
U. S. Reduces Grain Exports;
Tension High Throughout Italy**

SHOWDOWN:

Russia's Choice

Secretary of State George Marshall sounded like a man who was getting a lot of things off his chest. What he said in an address before the U. N. general assembly of 55 nations amounted to a call for a showdown with Russia.

The Soviets, he intimated, have held to their stubborn, veto-bound course in the United Nations long enough.

To make the delinquents come to time, Marshall proposed a four point plan of action to the general assembly:

1. He suggested creation of a new 4-vetoes committee of 55 countries which would operate without veto, and would remain constantly in session to consider world security questions and function as a board of appeals. Potentially, the committee would be a rival to the security council.

2. He announced that the U. S. was ready to relinquish, in all but the gravest cases, its veto privilege and implicitly challenged Russia to do likewise.

3. He blamed Russia for the U. S.-Soviet deadlock in Korea and said that America would submit the case to the general assembly for action.

4. He blamed Russia for using vetoes to protect Yugoslavia, Albania and Bulgaria from being pronounced guilty of meddling in Greece. He said the U. S. would ask the assembly to vote guilty for the three satellites and to demand that they refrain from interfering in Greece.

Undoubtedly, it was strong medicine—too strong, according to some jittery U. N. delegates. It apparently left Russia with a choice of two possible courses: Either cooperate in the U. N. or get out of the organization.

Many feared that hard-headed Muscovites in the Kremlin would choose the latter.

PRICE BATTLE:

Exports Cut

Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson had a "Horatio at the bridge" air about him as he announced that the government had made a drastic cut-back of grain and flour allocations for export in November.

The move generally was accounted as another noble stand against the forces which are causing domestic food prices to spiral dizzily. This one, however, had the blessings of the grain trade as "a step in the right direction."

Reducing the export allocations for November was in line with the government's surprise revision of the nation's 1947 export goal from some 450 million bushels of grain down to 350 million.

Export officials, still striving to meet the original, higher goal, were caught flat-footed by the sudden cut-back, but it had become clear that the U. S. administration now was trying to effect a program whereby western Europe's minimum food needs could be satisfied without aggravating the inflation trend at home.

(In a significant sidelight, Anderson scoffed at the prospect of returning to rationing by pointing out that such a program could not be put into effect before the need for it would be over.)

Next move, it was hinted, would be an attempt by Secretary Anderson to put through a sharp reduction of total food exports—not just grain—as the only practical way of pulling down prices.

The U. S. state department, however, committed to its "save Europe" program, no doubt would object vehemently to any such action.

HEADLINERS

IN LOS ANGELES... Prince Hamid Riza Pahlavi, 18, of Iran, told police that he had flown the coop from his Washington, D. C., school because it didn't have any girl students and because he was "homesick."

ITALY:

Trouble Grows

Italy was threatening to erupt. Communists, using Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito as their front, were trying to take over, or at least seriously harass, the recently established free state of Trieste. They also were hard at work on their campaign to seize complete power in the Italian government.

Along the Trieste-Yugoslav frontier, Yugoslav troops were threatening all of the 34 American outposts. Armed clashes were not considered impossible. Aggressive troops of Marshal Tito were forcing incident after incident along the line. Trieste itself was ugly with tension as Communists ordered 10,000 striking shipyard workers to stay out in defiance of American-British military government orders.

In Rome, Communists turned on the heat by issuing an outright demand that Premier Alcide de Gasperi resign to make way for a cabinet with Communist and left wing Socialist members.

The position of de Gasperi, who put the Communists and Socialists out of his cabinet almost four months ago, was precarious, as the Reds continued their program of strikes, instigation of social turmoil and threats of force.

U. S. officials harbored growing fears over the situation, for if the Communists were to take over Italy, heavy repercussions would be felt in France and the Marshall plan would be seriously crippled, if not wholly destroyed.

SPEED-UP:

Forrestal In

James V. Forrestal wasn't due to be sworn in as U. S. secretary of defense for another week, but President Truman manifestly alarmed over the trend of world events, ordered the former secretary of the navy to jump the gun in taking over his new job.



Mr. Truman observed that in view of conditions abroad, the nation should have its secretary of defense in office and functioning. The conditions, which he did not specify, probably were the current unrest in Trieste and the U. S.-Russian stalemate in the United Nations, topped off by Secretary of State Marshall's challenging speech before the general assembly.

Now presiding over the unified army, navy and air forces, Forrestal is the armed forces' only representative on the President's cabinet.

FIRE LOSSES:

New High

Fire losses in the U. S. during the month of August were estimated at \$51,359,000, an increase of 28.3 per cent over losses of \$40,019,000 in August, 1946, the national board of fire underwriters has reported. August losses brought the total fire destruction for the first eight months of 1947 to \$469,992,000. That figure marks a 24.2 per cent increase over the first eight months of 1946 when total losses amounted to \$378,323,000.

ROCKETS SOON:

Naval Weapons

Editors of "Jane's Fighting Ships," authoritative directory of naval power, predict in their latest edition that rockets will supplant 16-inch guns as the chief weapons on newest battleships "in a year or two."

The 1946-47 edition of Jane's, recently published, claimed that both Great Britain and the United States were revamping their navies for a possible era of atomic warfare.

Add Variety to Canned Pears

The pear crop seldom seems to fail and may be relied upon by home canners to provide summer fruits for winter tables. To break the monotony of plain canned pears the universally used Ball Blue Book on home canning suggests some tasty variations. Orange pears may be made by using the juice and rind of one-half orange to each quart of sirup. Remove the orange rind before packing the pears into jars. To make cinnamon pears use two or three tablespoons of "Red Hot" to each quart of sirup, or use stick cinnamon and a few drops of red coloring. Ginger pears are made by using ginger tea (water in which ginger root is boiled) instead of plain water for making sirup. Use pineapple juice instead of water for the sirup to make pineapple pears. For plum pears use tart, red plum juice instead of water for making the sirup. These variations are sure to "hit the spot" with your family.

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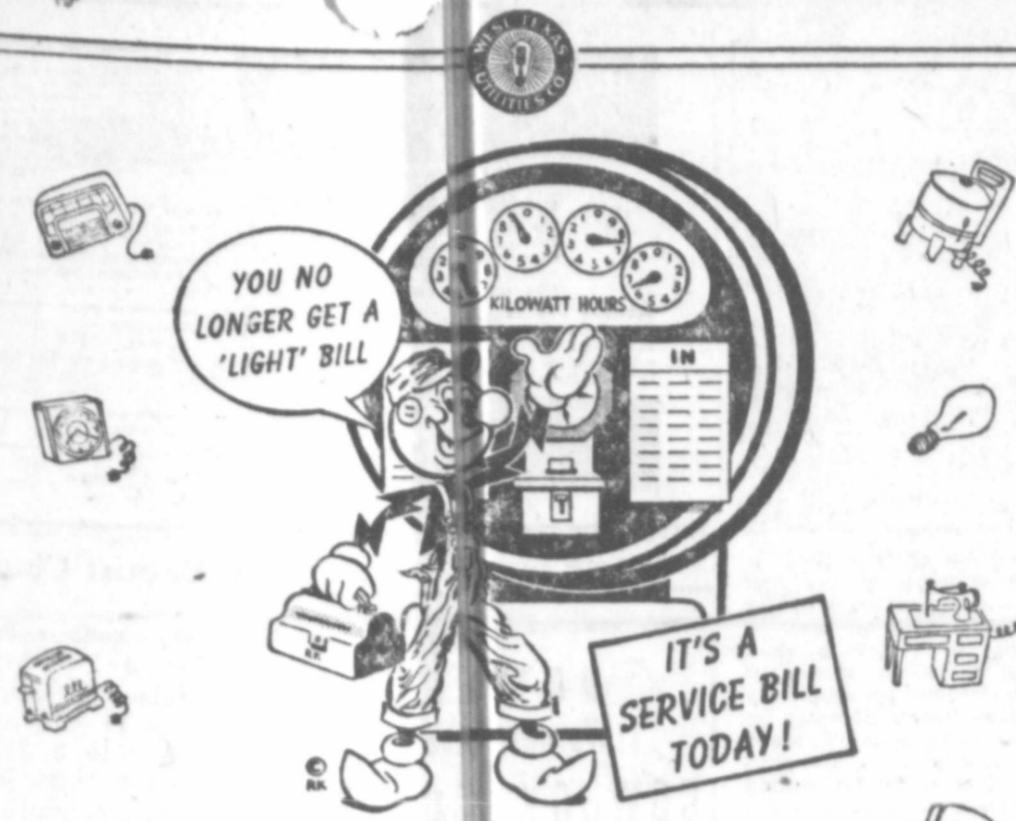

Quick Breads Take Little Mixing Time.

Tempting Breads

There is no aroma more appetite-provoking than that tantalizing one which comes from the oven in which bread is baking. And what is more of a treat than eating the bread itself?

Piping hot muffins add interest to the simplest supper; hot coffee cake is a delight to both early and late risers, while thick and thin slices alike—as long as they are of homemade bread—make superb sandwiches for school lunches or late snacks.

Many homemakers don't bother to make homemade bread because they think it is a time-consuming procedure. Actually, it's far simpler than mixing a cake or even cooking a vegetable, and the pleasure of it is so great, it's more than worth the little effort.

Orange Oatmeal bread is good when sliced thin for sandwiches. Moist and tender, it keeps its flavor easily and slices readily. The flavor actually improves when the bread is kept for a day before being cut.

Orange Oatmeal Loaf. (Makes 4-by-7-inch loaf)

- 1/2 cup evaporated milk
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1 teaspoon grated orange peel
- 1 cup quick-cooking oats
- 1 cup sifted flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts
- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup molasses
- 2 tablespoons shortening, melted

Mix milk, orange juice and grated peel and add to oats. Let this mixture stand for an hour. Sift flour, salt, baking powder, soda and sugar. Add chopped nuts. Beat egg into oatmeal mixture. Add molasses and beat thoroughly. Stir in melted shortening. Add flour mixture and stir just to blend. Pour into a greased loaf pan and bake in a moderate (350-degree) oven for about 50 minutes, or until done.

Pecan Wheat Muffins. (Makes 12 to 16 muffins)

- 1 cup sifted whole wheat flour
- 1/2 cup sifted white flour
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup evaporated milk
- 1/2 cup water
- 3 tablespoons melted shortening
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans

Sift first four ingredients twice, returning bran in sifter to sifted mixture. Beat egg, add brown sugar, milk and water. Stir until mixture is dissolved, then add shortening. Stir liquid quickly into dry ingredients. With the last few stirs, add chopped nuts. Pour batter immediately into greased muffin tins. Bake in a hot (400-degree) oven about 20 minutes.

Raised Luncheon Muffins. (Makes 1 dozen 3-inch muffins)

- 1 package yeast, compressed
- 1/4 cup lukewarm water
- 1/4 cup milk
- 2 eggs
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup melted shortening
- 1 teaspoon grated orange rind
- 2 1/2 cups flour, sifted

Crumble yeast into lukewarm water to soften. Scald milk. Cool. Beat eggs in mixing bowl. Add sugar, salt, shortening and orange rind. Mix well. Add cooled milk and 1 cup flour. Beat smooth. Add softened yeast. Mix well. Add remaining flour. Beat 2 minutes. Fill greased muffin pans half full. Let rise in warm place until doubled (about 45 minutes). Bake in a moderate (375-degree) oven for 18 to 20 minutes. Date and Pecan Ring is an attractive as well as novel bread.

Date and Pecan Ring.

- Dates, halved
- Pecans, halved
- Honey
- 1 cup sifted white flour
- 2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup unsifted whole wheat flour
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup pitted dates, chopped
- 1/2 cup pecans, coarsely chopped
- 1 1/2 cups rich milk
- 2 tablespoons vinegar
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 2 tablespoons shortening, melted

Grease an 8-inch ring mold thoroughly. To prepare decorative topping, alternate halves of dates and pecans on bottom of mold and drizzle with honey. In a mixing bowl, sift flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Add whole wheat flour, brown sugar, dates, nuts and mix thoroughly. Combine milk and vinegar. Add shortening, then add beaten eggs. Stir in dry ingredients. Mix just until flour disappears. Pour into prepared ring mold and bake in a hot (425-degree) oven for 15 minutes, then reduce heat to moderate (350 degrees) and continue baking for 20 to 25 minutes.

*Swedish Pancakes With Berry Sauce. (Serves 4)

- 1 cup sifted enriched flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 cup milk
- 1 tablespoon melted shortening
- Sweetened berries or jam

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Combine egg, milk and melted shortening. Mix well. Add to flour mixture. Mix smooth. Using 2 tablespoons of batter for each cake, bake on hot griddle or skillet. Spread each cake with butter, then with berries or jam.

For a different egg salad, add a few capers to the chopped egg and a few herbs to the dressing used for moistening the mixture. Leftover weiners can be chopped or ground with pickle relish to be used as sandwich filling. Add a bit of mayonnaise or sandwich spread, if desired. When you can't slice cooked tongue any longer, cut off the meaty pieces and mix with chopped hard-cooked egg and boiled dressing for a very good sandwich filler.

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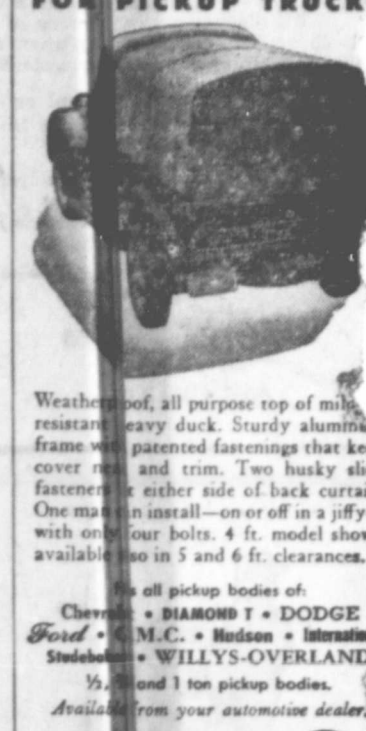
