Swing of SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS

Lower prices for poultry, hogs and some other livestock marred otherwise steady to strong southwest farm markets last week, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Unsettled conditions in the wheat markets during the past week left prices a little higher in the Southwest. Feed grains strengthened too, as continued active demand for corn found only moderate offerings from the new crop. No. 1 hard wheat closed Friday at \$3.07.

Southwest poultry markets experienced general weakness, and eggs eased off at some places. Northwest Arkansas broilers dropped to 30 to 32 cents per pound on the farm, and principal cities and 30 to 35. Heavy hens fell to 24 to 30 at New Orleans and from 20 to 25 at other points. Turkeys sold at or near support prices.

Cattle moved to markets at mostly steady to slightly stronger rates except at Fort Worth where considerable weakness appeared. However, slaughter cows held mainly steady to lower. Union bought common and medium cows at \$12 to \$14.50, and Oceano paid \$12 to \$15.50. Fort Worth took cutters and common cows at \$11.50 to \$13.

Hog prices continued downward the past week in losses of 25 cents to \$1. Closing top was \$25 at San Antonio, \$25.75 at Fort Worth, \$25.50 at Oklahoma City, \$25.10 at Wichita, and \$26.15 at Denver. Decimals on hogs fully equalled those on butcher hogs and closing prices ranged from \$23.50 to \$25.00 except San Antonio.

Cotton trading continued very active at about \$1 higher prices. Labor supply improved in the western part of the belt, but congestion at gins hampered movement.

Land Bank Loans

A greater volume of Land Bank loans was closed in Texas during 1946 than in any year since 1935, according to C. B. Morris of Clarendon, president of the Donley County National Farm Loan Association, and Secretary-Treasurer Rayburn L. Smith who attended a conference of NFLA leaders held in Amarillo this week.

"This increase in loans indicates a desire of land owners to put their financing on a long-term basis and tie down today's low interest rates," Mr. Morris said.

At the meeting in Amarillo, reports showed that the Land Bank has practically completed its program of decentralizing loan servicing functions begun 5 years ago. The result is that today most of the business farmers and ranchers have with the Land Bank can be transacted with their own home association. Operations of the local associations and plans for the annual stockholder's meeting of the Federal Land Bank of Houston in February were discussed.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston is completely owned by Texas farmers and ranchers through the 143 local national farm loan associations, Mr. Morris said. The Land Bank, with no government funds of any kind invested in it, now has combined capital, surplus, and reserves amounting to more than \$43,000,000. This is in addition to approximately \$6,000,000 in reserves and surplus of the associations in their own local accounts.

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June III for 1948; Marshall Plan Ready for Congress; Public Backs 'Tough' U. S. Policy

FOOD PUZZLE

Meat vs. Wheat

Domestic food situation in the U. S. is entering a critical stage, with two aspects standing out in sharp opposition to each other:

1. The government, determined to ship 500 million bushels of wheat to Europe by next June, is campaigning to save a major portion of that amount by cutting down on the feed consumption of cattle, hogs and poultry. That line of reasoning holds that smaller flocks and feeding to lighter weights will save more grain than any other single effort.

2. The supply of meat is going to be considerably less than it has been and the demand will be greater. Meat prices are expected to go much higher in 1948. Further curtailment of meat production by saving grain at the feed trough will intensify that already serious situation.

There is no danger of a bread or food shortage of any kind this winter because of the nation's bumper wheat harvest. The pinch, if it comes, will appear after the middle of next year, precipitated by a currently threatening drought and failure of the winter wheat crop. Added to that is the fact that domestic uses, plus exports, will leave from this year's harvest of 1.4 billion bushels only a 100 million-bushel carryover by the time of the next harvest—too small a volume in the event of a short crop.

Meat, which right now is a little cheaper than it has been because more animals are being slaughtered, will continue in great demand next year because consumer buying power will remain high.

The supply, however, will be less. The agriculture department estimates there will be only 21.5 billion pounds of meat produced in 1948, compared to 23.2 billion pounds this year. There will be 4 million fewer cattle on farms next January than last. Many smaller hogs will be sent to market and there will be no increase in the stocks of sheep, which are an 80-year low.

FINAL TOUCHES:

Marshall Plan

After caroming from praise to criticism to condemnation for the past few months, the celebrated Marshall plan to help Europe regain its feet is being whipped into final shape under direction of Secretary of State George Marshall, its progenitor.

One known fact loomed large in the mind of the American taxpayer: The plan may cost up to 20 billion dollars for the four-year period during which it will be in effect.

Marshall, who abandoned temporarily his debating in the U. N. general assembly, returned to his Washington office to put the finishing touches on his plan, which will be laid before congress when the special session opens November 17. The Marshall plan, subject to late revisions, may be outlined broadly in these main points:

1. U. S. would make available to Europe next year a combination of relief and recovery supplies totaling about six billion dollars. Relief

supplies (food) would be free; recovery supplies (machinery) would be financed with loans.

- Because of shifting conditions, it will be impossible accurately to forecast the amount of help Europe will need beyond the first year.
- Sums from the U. S. would decrease each year as recovery progress was made.
- The plan would be administered in the U. S. by a new government agency and in Europe by an organization representing the 16 nations which drew up their estimate of needs at the Paris conference.

GET TOUGH:

U. S. Approves

Soviet leaders, who cry "warmonger" every time an American diplomat splits an infinitive, are only in error if they suppose there is any major cleavage be-



tween the American public's views on Russia and the state department's so-called "tough" policy toward the Soviets.

That conclusion was brought out in a recent Gallup poll which indicated that, actually, the predominant mood of public opinion today favors an even tougher policy than the state department is following.

Answers to the question, "Do you think that in dealing with Russia and other countries the U. S. is insisting too much on having its own way?" were: Yes, 12 per cent; No, 78 per cent; No opinion, 10 per cent.

Further, 62 per cent of the American people believe that the U. S. is being too soft in its policy toward Russia. Only 6 per cent think it is being too tough, and 24 per cent say our official attitude toward the Soviets is about right.

HEADLINERS

PLAGUE:

Egypt Stricken

Cholera, the dreaded black plague is spreading so swiftly in Egypt that a total of 6,000 dead has been predicted by year's end.

With many stricken villages isolated by troops, other small communities are ringed with bonfires day and night in the belief that fire will keep out the disease.

Meanwhile, neighboring nations were taking steps to prevent the spread of cholera from the upper Nile valley. Greece, Italy and Palestine have discontinued international traffic, while private shipping lines will bypass Egyptian ports and air travel is diverted away from Egypt.

Outside help in combatting the disease is at a minimum in Egypt. Swiss scientists alone were said to be helping local health officers. There is a desperate shortage of vaccines, DDT and medical specialists.

LOW EBB:

Russian Trade

Two years after World War II, trade between the U. S. and Russia, wartime allies, has dwindled to the extent that shipment of U. S. goods to the Soviets is expected to reach the lowest point in 10 years before the end of 1947.

The United States today is sending a smaller percentage of American-made machinery and equipment to the Russians than it did in the years before Pearl Harbor

Convention

Philadelphia, city of Brotherly love, will be the site where, barring an unlikely upset, President Truman will be handed the Democratic presidential nomination next July.

The Democratic national committee accepted Philadelphia's bid for the party's 1948 national convention when that city proffered a certified check for \$200,000 and promised \$50,000 more for entertainment.

With no opposition, the committee also went through the formality of ratifying President Truman's choice of Sen. James Howard McGrath (Dem., R. I.) as chairman of the party organization to succeed Postmaster Gen. Robert Hannegan, who resigned because of ill health.

Among the more significant incidents occurring at the meeting of the national committee was the unanimous squelching of a resolution condemning the Republican-controlled 80th congress for placing "partisan politics above love of country."

It was a straw in the wind which seemed to prove that the Democrats were determined to give at least lip service to the bi-partisanship that will be so necessary if the special session of congress starting November 17 is to accomplish anything.

OREGON TRAGEDY:

Death Hits High

It wasn't a big plane crash as plane crashes go these days, but it was enough to leave the State of Oregon without a governor, senate president and secretary of state.

Earl Snell, Oregon's governor; Marshall Cornett, senate president; and Robert S. Farrell Jr., secretary of state, were killed instantly when their Beechcraft struck a pine tree and scattered over the rugged, snow-covered terrain 36 miles south of Lakeview, Ore., their intended destination.

John H. Hall, Portland attorney and speaker of the Oregon house, was sworn in as governor to succeed Snell, a Republican, who had been serving his second term as the state's chief executive.

NEW RECORD:

Give and Take

American farmers are continuing to take in and pay out money on a record-breaking scale.

Prices received by farmers in the month ended October 15 continued to soar, establishing a new record of 289 per cent of the 1909-14 base period.

On the other hand, the bureau of agricultural economics reported, the index of prices paid by farmers for the same period also hit a new high, reaching an index of 239.

The increase in prices received was three points, or 1 per cent; but the increase in prices paid by farmers for goods was only one point. Both, however, were at record levels, adding further evidence to the current domestic inflationary trend.

More Contempt



Following a precedent set by John Howard Lawson, screen writer Dalton Trumbo (above) refused to tell the house un-American activities committee investigating Communism in Hollywood whether or not he was a Communist party member. The committee, also following precedent, cited him for contempt of congress, just as they did Lawson. Others cited for contempt were Albert Maltz and Alvah Bessie, both screen writers.

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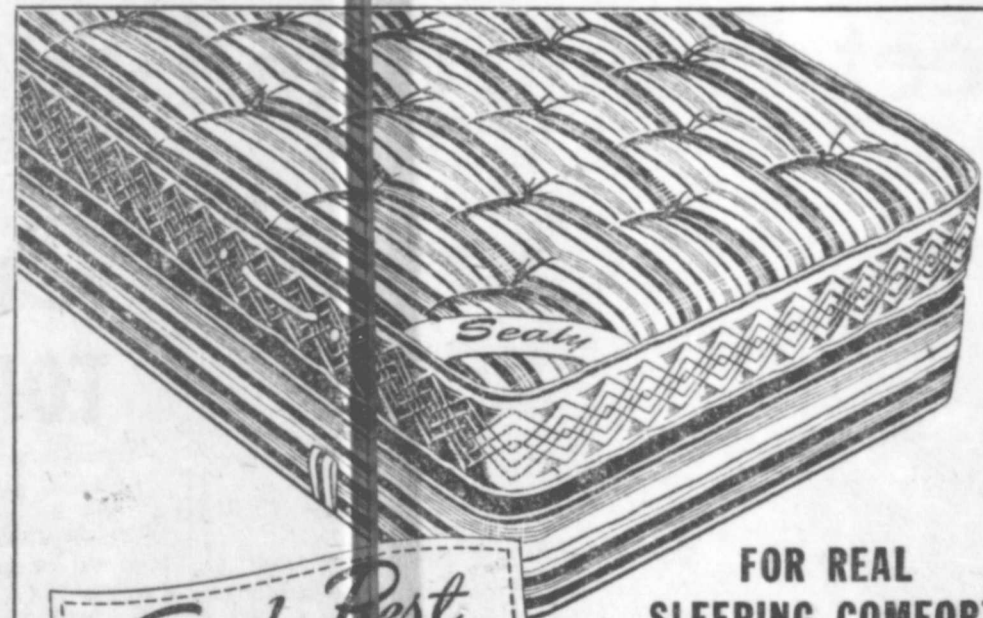

Baked Stuffed Tomatoes Save Meat (See Recipe below)

Meat Savet

Every now and then when we are called upon to save meat, it helps to have dishes with meat-like texture and flavor so appetites are satisfied. Fortunately there are certain combinations of vegetables which, when served with some cheese, are excellent just for such a purpose.

Tomatoes with a bit of bacon are satisfying for hearty appetites; so are squash and lima beans, with a bit of sausage. Au gratin combinations are interesting, too, from the point of view of satisfying appetites as well as the budget.

Use the recipes given today when you want to save on meat; these dishes are not meant to be used as a vegetable side-dish for the average family as they are just a bit too much on the hearty side for such a purpose.

- *Baked Stuffed Tomatoes. (Serves 5)**
- 5 tomatoes
 - 5 slices of bacon
 - 2 cups bread crumbs
 - 2 tablespoons chopped onion
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 - 1/2 cup grated cheese
 - Sprigs of parsley

Cut tops off tomatoes and remove pulp. Cook bacon until crisp. Break into small pieces. Make a stuffing by mixing tomato pulp, bacon, bread crumbs, onion, salt and pepper. Fill cavities of tomatoes with the stuffing. Sprinkle tops with grated cheese. Place tomatoes in a heat-resistant glass dish. Bake in a moderately hot (400 degree) oven for 30 minutes. Serve garnished with parsley.

- Squash, Sausage and Lima Bean Platter. (Serves 4)**
- 2 1/2 cups cooked, mashed squash
 - 1 1/2 cups cooked lima beans
 - 1 tablespoon butter
 - 3 sausages

Arrange squash in four nests on a heat resistant glass utility platter. Place lima beans in center of each squash nest. Dot lima beans with butter. Place sausages around squash nests. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for 30 minutes or until sausages are done.

- Sausage Stuffed Eggplant. (Serves 4)**
- 1 medium eggplant
 - 1/2 pound pork sausage
 - 1/2 cup chopped onion
 - 1 clove garlic, minced
 - 1 green pepper, chopped
 - 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
 - 2 cups cooked brown rice
 - 1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning
 - Salt and pepper
 - 1/4 cup grated cheese

Cut eggplant in half lengthwise. Cook in boiling salted water for 10 minutes, or until it is almost tender. Cook sausage meat slowly in large skillet until lightly browned, stirring occasionally. Add onion, garlic, green pepper and parsley, and cook until vegetables are almost tender. Pour off some sausage fat, leaving about 1/4 cup in pan. Add rice. Scoop eggplant

pulp out of partly cooked halves leaving a half-inch shell. Chop pulp and add to sausage mixture; add poultry seasoning and salt and pepper to taste. Fill eggplant shells with the mixture. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) until well browned.

- *Baked String Beans with Mushrooms. (Serves 6)**
- 1 pound string beans, sliced
 - 1 pound mushrooms
 - 2 tablespoons butter
 - 2 tablespoons flour
 - 2 cups milk
 - 1/4 cup buttered bread crumbs

Cook green beans in boiling salted water until tender. Drain well. Peel, slice and saute mushrooms in butter. Dredge mushrooms in flour and add the milk. Cook until thickened. Combine with beans and pour into a buttered baking dish. Over the top sprinkle the bread crumbs. Bake just long enough to heat through and brown the crumbs.

- Onions with Potatoes. (Serves 4)**
- 8 Bermuda onions
 - 3 cups diced cooked potatoes
 - Salt and pepper
 - 1/2 cup milk
 - 2 tablespoons butter
 - 1/4 cup cheese, grated
 - Paprika

Peel the onions and cut a slice from the top of each. Parboil in boiling salted water for 15 minutes. Drain and scoop out, leaving just a shell. Season potatoes with salt and pepper. Place in an iron skillet over a low flame, cover with milk and dot with butter. When all the milk is absorbed, fill the onion shells with the potato mixture and cover with grated cheese. Dust with paprika and run under the broiler flame to melt the cheese and heat thoroughly.

- Corn and Bean Pudding. (Serves 6)**
- 1/2 cup butter
 - 2 eggs, separated
 - 2 tablespoons flour
 - 1/2 teaspoon sugar
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon white pepper
 - Paprika
 - 1 cup soup stock
 - 1 cup cream
 - 1 quart cooked and shredded green beans
 - 2 cups corn
 - 1 chopped green pepper
 - 1 chopped pimiento
 - 1 teaspoon chopped parsley

Melt butter; add yolks, then flour, sugar, salt, pepper and paprika. Add soup stock and cream. Fold in egg whites and vegetables. Pour into a greased baking dish and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for 30 minutes.
