Swing of SOUTHWEST FARM MARKETS

Most southwest farm products sold at fairly steady to moderately higher prices last week, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Unfavorable prospects for next year's winter wheat crop and large export demands still dominated grain markets. Wheat registered further substantial gains to sell Friday at \$3.11. Other grains held close to last week's levels.

Cotton harvesting and ginning continued active during the week, although cool days and sandstorms retarded progress somewhat in Northwest Texas and Western Oklahoma. Sales decreased slightly, despite net price advances of about \$4 a bale.

Week's cattle sales went largely at steady to stronger prices, with many lots going higher at Wichita and Denver. However, low grade cows at Texas markets moved counter to the trend to sell as much as 50 cents lower at \$8 to \$2 for canners and cutters. These grades brought \$9 to \$12 at Abilene City, \$10.50 to \$13 at Wichita, and \$11 to \$14 at Denver. Texas paid up to \$15 for union and medium cows.

Hog markets rallied some during the week but butcher classes suffered losses up to 25 and 50 cents at some terminals. Feeder pig prices dropped 50 cents to \$1 at San Antonio and Oklahoma City and \$4.50 at Fort Worth, where top offerings sold at \$20. Closing top butchers ranged from \$24.75 at San Antonio to \$25.50 at Denver.

Turkeys moved to market in greater volume for the Thanksgiving holiday trade. Prices stayed close to support levels at most places. Fryers and broilers in the Northwest Arkansas surplus area weakened further to mostly 28 to 31 cents per pound for 2 1/2 pound birds. Other eggs and poultry changed little for the week.

Big Four Meet Awaited With Gloom
Grain Men Ask 'Speculation' Probe;
Congress Hears Aid Fund Request

BIG FOUR:
Pessimism

With the imminence of the most vital international occurrence of recent months—the Big Four foreign ministers meeting in London on November 25—the mood surrounding the coming conference was predominantly one of pessimism.

That there was much justification for such pessimism, no one doubted. When the chief representatives of the U. S., Great Britain, France and Russia come together they will tackle the tough, deadlocked problems of writing peace treaties for Germany and Austria.

Deputy foreign ministers in London to dispense with preliminaries before Marshall, Molotov, Bevin and Bidault put their heads together, said the powers were as badly split as ever on major issues.

If the conference fails, as it is very likely to do, the U. S. will have to face the question of whether or not it wants to conclude a separate peace with that portion of Germany outside the Russian-occupied zone. Such a treaty, not involving the Soviets, probably would precipitate a final split between this nation and Russia.

Nevertheless, sentiment has been rising in the U. S. favoring such an action if the Soviets refuse to cooperate in straightening out the problems of Germany. James F. Byrnes, former secretary of state, advocated that course, as have other responsible officials.

The corollary to that proposition is that the U. S. then must follow through by keeping itself strong militarily and economically, proving to the rest of the world that it has embarked on a definite policy course and that that course is the right one.

INFLATION:
Grain 'Le'

Three of the nation's major grain exchanges, smaller under President Truman's accusation that their "speculation" is responsible for prevailing high prices of cereals, have carried the attack into the enemy camp by requesting a special congressional investigation by the joint committee on the economic report.

The request was made by the Chicago board of trade, Kansas City board of trade and the Minneapolis grain exchange in a letter to Sen. Robert Taft (Rep., O.) and Rep. Jesse P. Wolcott (Rep., Mich.), co-chairmen of the committee. Taft responded immediately with a promise of further hearings.

Countering Mr. Truman's repeated charges that gambling and speculation by grain exchanges have boosted food prices higher, the exchange officials contended that the real cause of the rise in grain prices is the administration's "extraordinary and ever increasing purchases of grain and flour export." Administration "bungling and lack of planning" also were cited by the grain officials.

Wherever the truth may lie—and it probably is somewhere midway between the government and grain exchange viewpoints—it should be recognized that a force akin to this particular controversy:

Normal government reaction, whenever grain prices shoot above what is considered a safe level, is to lay the blame on the grain exchanges, charging them with manipulating prices through speculation. That has occurred often enough in U. S. history to bear out the theory. Grain dealers, of course, invariably blame the situation on over-exporting.

From that standpoint, at least, an investigation at this time should shed some new light on the long-standing controversy. It might even provide some real information on why prices are so high.

BIG REQUEST:
Relief Funds

Even before congressmen from all over the country had lugged their suitcases back to Washington to open the special session on November 17, word went around that President Truman was fixing to ask them to appropriate about \$1,155,000,000 in temporary European relief funds to tide the stricken continent through the winter.

Part of that amount, it was thought, would be given as a direct grant for stopgap help, particularly the sums allocated to France and Italy.

of the total appropriation would be earmarked to take care of the obligations Great Britain has failed to meet in her zone of occupied Germany. The British say they will be unable to carry out their half of the bargain in Germany because of their inability to get dollars to spend for supplies in the United States.

It all made for a confused and complex picture which well could be likened to the fantastic abstractions that pass for modern art—a jumble of weird forms largely incomprehensible to the eye of the average beholder.

But the interim relief, intended only as an oxygen tent to keep democracy in Western Europe breathing through the winter, was only part of the problem for congress. On top of that, it will have to consider the six or seven billion dollars to be requested in connection with the long-range Marshall plan for eventual recovery of 16 European nations.

RED CZECHS:
Go Communist

Add Czechoslovakia to the list of Communist-dominated nations in Eastern Europe.

A man named Klement Gottwald, Communist premier of Czechoslovakia, has emerged as a new strong man, "possessing complete authority from the national cabinet to rebuild the government of semi-autonomous Slovakia.

Rebuilding the government of the semi-autonomous nation will mean simply that Gottwald and his Communists will change Czechoslovakia from a nation whose people had at least a part measure of self-government to a nation under totalitarian rule.

Although the Slovak Democrats, predominantly conservative, are the majority party in the country, the Communists were able to place Gottwald, a former blacksmith, in complete power.

Thus Czechoslovakia has shifted from a position as a Soviet satellite with some will of its own to a lower position as a Russian dominated state with literally no self-determination. It has become another unit in the string of Soviet buffer states to the south and west.

HUGHES AND CRIES:
Inquiry Renewed

Howard Hughes had just barely smuggled his monster plywood flying boat back into its berth after making a tentative, mile-long flight in it over Long Beach harbor when the reopened congressional inquiry into the now celebrated wartime airplane contracts threw a fresh shower of sparks around the millionaire sportsman and industrialist.

Elliott Roosevelt, former air force brigadier general, was brought into the proceedings again because of his insistence that Hughes' F-11 photo reconnaissance plane be put into production for the army during the war.

A new issue was introduced in the form of a purported "tax deficiency" of almost six million dollars on the books against Hughes and his companies. Sen. Homer Ferguson (Rep., Mich.), chairman of the war investigating sub-committee, was quick to point out, however, that "no crime or fraud" was involved.

Russ Seek Doctors

The Russians are staging an intensive recruiting drive for physicians and surgeons to serve in the Red zone of Germany, issuing their appeals wherever they can establish contact with the Western zones.

A Soviet survey of medical resources has revealed that so many doctors, nurses, chemists, laboratory technicians and other person-

BI-PARTISAN:
Dewey's Idea

Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York may not yet be a candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, but he continues to act suspiciously like he intends to join Messrs. Taft and Stassen in the ring at any given moment.

In his most recent public pronouncement, Dewey gave a broad endorsement to the Marshall plan for aiding Europe, urging prompt and effective help for free nations abroad but demanding that it be administered on a business-like basis under "genuinely bi-partisan direction."

Thus, he remained on reasonably safe ground politically, but at the same time offered a constructive suggestion as to how the Marshall plan could best be carried out.

Dewey proposed that the program be administered in accordance with a statement of policy to be written by congress which "will make it clear that the United States has a settled policy and the means of carrying it out."

He did not mention, but probably was thinking, that such a scheme would offer less chance of administrative fumbling than if the program were to be steered by the arbitrary dictates of a single agency.

Specifically, Dewey proposed a six-point program covering terms of U. S. loans and methods under which the Marshall plan should operate.

NO RELIEF:
Food Shortage

Whatever the year 1948 brings to the American people, it won't be an increase in the food supply.

Latest department of agriculture prediction is that food supplies on the U. S. home front will shrink even lower next year, while retail food prices will remain high for most of 1948.

Those forecasts supplemented a report by Sir John Boyd Orr, director general of the U. N. food and agriculture organization, that world supplies of bread cereals are 10 million tons short of the amount needed to maintain even the present meager rations in many lands.

When that figure is compared with the two million tons of grain which the U. S. food-saving campaign is expected to make available, the true scope of the food shortage becomes apparent.

There is no hope that the present shortage will end with the 1948 harvest," Orr said.

Meanwhile, the agriculture department estimated that U. S. consumers would have more sugar, cheese, butter, bananas and dried food in 1948 than in 1947, but supplies of lard, sweet potatoes, meat, chicken and some canned fruits are expected to be lower.

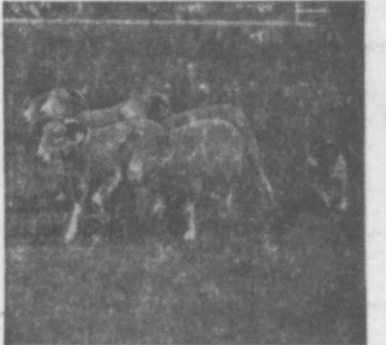

**Good Sheep Dog
Valuable Help
To the Farmer**

Many Countries Have Developed
Their Own Special Shep-
herd Breeds

In the handling of large flocks of sheep on the farm, a good herd dog oftentimes accomplishes the work of two or three men, states the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City. An old saying goes that "There is no good flock without a good shepherd, and there is no good shepherd without a good dog." In Scotland, where the work of the sheep dog has reached near perfection, no shepherd would consider selling, as he would feel himself helpless without his trained ally. The sight of a small black and white Border Collie driving a flock of sheep along a road or through a village in a calm, business-like manner is so common in that country as to attract no attention whatsoever.

While it is believed that the dog's first association with man was as his hunting companion and helper, certainly his second trust was as guardian of mankind's flocks and herds. Though there was little communication between primitive peoples, the dog's ability as herder and guardian was early discovered and utilized by many different races and tribes. Many countries have developed shepherd breeds, and while these vary widely in size and appearance, their work is identical. Belgium produced the Belgian Sheepdog and the Bouviers de Flandre. The Briard comes from France. Hungary developed the Pulik and the Komondorok. The Welsh Corp. Old English Sheepdog, Border Collie, Shetland Sheepdog and Collie all originated in the British Isles. The German Shepherd and the Giant Schnauzer are, of course, products of Germany. The Austral'ian Sheepdog, or Kelpie, has proven his value in the rugged sheep-raising country "down under." The Samoyede, though generally considered a sled dog, has



Border Collie rounding up sheep—also been used for the herding of reindeer on the tundras of Siberia.

In England, Scotland and America the Border Collie, which has been bred for herd work for 300 years, is the most frequently used sheep dog. The Border Collie is known for intelligence, obedience, and working ability. Standing about 18 inches at the shoulder, this dog has a dense coat of black with white markings on the collar, feet and tail tip. Weights run from thirty to forty pounds. The Border Collie's head is shorter and broader, and his eyes larger, than those of his big cousin, the Scotch Collie.

Puppies that come from working stock frequently display an interest in sheep as early as seven or eight weeks of age. The first lesson is usually taught at three to four months, when the puppy is taught to lie down on signal and to walk at heel on command. Training is simplified if the young dog can be allowed to follow the example of a well-schooled older dog, but many fine sheep dogs have been trained without ever having seen another dog work. The education of a sheep dog requires both time and patience, but once his dog is trained, the farmer or herdsman will wonder how he ever managed without his four-footed helper. Texas Press Association Sees Dawn of A New Era

November 1 will mark the dawn of a new era for the Texas Press Association in the opinion of Paul Fulks, president of the Texas association and publisher of the Wolfe City Herald.

On that date the daily and weekly newspapers of Texas join hands to form their own central office with a full-time staff of experienced press association workers in charge.

Texas Press Association directors have contracted with Vernon T. Sanford, for 13 years secretary-manager of the Oklahoma Press Association, to manage the Texas association affairs and endeavoring to locate office headquarters in Dallas.

Said Fulks, "Our central office will disseminate information bulletins to the newspapers, serve as an employment bureau for newspaper workers, look after the legislative interests of the publications, represent our newspapers in the sale of political and state advertising, and arrange our attention programs."

The IPA president also stated that plans call for activities not alone in the interest of the press of Texas, but for the state in general. Details of a promotion program for Texas will be announced as soon as the central office can complete arrangements with other interested groups and individuals who want to see the great state of Texas grow greater and greater."

Sanford has been with the Oklahoma

Sanford is a past-president of the Advertising Club of Oklahoma City; the Oklahoma City Chapter of the Southwestern Association of Industrial Editors; and of Newspaper Association Managers. He served for two years as chairman of National Newspaper Week and editor of the NAM Bulletin. He is a member of the board of directors of the Better Business Bureau of Oklahoma City and an honorary member of the board of directors of the Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce. He is also a member of the Oklahoma City Camera Club, the Midwest Circulation Managers' Assn., the International Council of Industrial Editors, and the Newspaper Advertising Executives Assn.

He belongs to the Legion of Honor of the Order of DeMolay, the Masonic Lodge, and the Methodist Church.

The new Texas manager is a graduate of the University of Oklahoma, with an AB in Journalism, and holds a Master of Arts degree from the University of Missouri. He was awarded a Fellowship by the University of Missouri and was presented with the first Meritt Award given to graduates of the University of Oklahoma's school of journalism for accomplishments in their chosen profession.

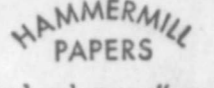

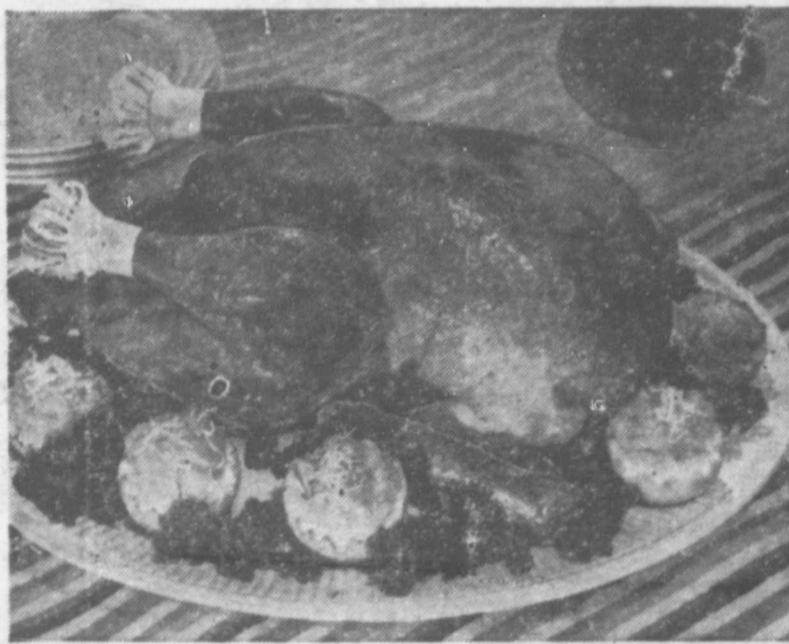

Thanksgiving Tips

As the days bring with them that cooler-than-fall feeling, as the frost gathers lightly on the pumpkin, we instinctively know it's time to talk of turkey and Thanksgiving.

If families gather at this season, as is the time-honored custom, you'll want a regal bird that's done to fork-tenderness, besides being golden brown and juicy. Around the bird, you'll want to assemble those foods that complement it best—snow-white onions with a bland cream sauce to mask their sharpness, crisp green brussels sprouts, savory—with stock and bread crumbs, and sweet potatoes, of course!

To prepare the bird, follow these three-steps to achieving the feast: Stuffing, trussing and roasting.

***Prune Dressing.**
(For 16-pound turkey)
3 cups cooked prunes
1 small grated onion
1 cup finely chopped celery
2 1/2 cups fried bread crumbs
1 cup prune juice
1/2 cup chopped pecans, if desired
1 teaspoon nutmeg
Salt and pepper

Wash and soak the prunes. Cook them in water in which they were soaked, until tender. Cool, remove pits and chop. Fry onion and celery in two tablespoons of fat until soft. Mix thoroughly with fried bread crumbs, prunes, prune juice, pecans and seasonings.

Season the neck and body cavity of the bird lightly. Fill neck with dressing and skewer the neck skin to the back. Bring wing tips onto back. Fill body cavity with dressing, but do not pack it tightly. Skewer or fasten opening to hold in the dressing. Tie leg ends down to the tail.

To roast the bird first grease the skin with melted or softened fat. Place the bird on a rack, breast down, in a shallow pan which is open. If the bird does not have a generous layer of fat, cover with a fat-moistened cloth that is large enough to go over the top and sides.

Roast in preheated oven set at proper temperature.

An 8 to 10 pound bird is set in a 325 degree oven for 3 to 3 1/2 hours.

A turkey four pounds heavier requires the same temperature oven but is allowed four hours longer to cook. For birds larger than 14 pounds use a 300 degree oven and add 1/2 hour of cooking time for each four pounds. A 20-pound bird, for example, will take five to six hours to roast.

Do not add water or cover pan while roasting. If drippings burn, the oven is too hot. If the cloth covering the bird dries during cooking, remoisten from fat at bottom of pan. Turn bird breast up when about 3/4 done. Remove cloth if more browning is desired.

Test for doneness when meat feels soft. This is done by pressing the thickest part of the drumstick with fingers. The leg joint also should move readily when turkey is done.

Ever use gingerbread as bread? It makes the perfect bread for dried fruit sandwiches. Try cream cheese for the spread in place of butter if you want a special treat.

Those apple pies you can't resist will be more so if you roll some cheese into the crust. And don't forget to brush the tops of the crust with milk or egg wash for a special gold.

***Savory Brussels Sprouts.**

Cook three pounds of carefully washed brussels sprouts until done in salted water. Drain and place in saucepan over low flame with two tablespoons of melted butter, tossing until all are coated. Pour in 1/4 cup strong chicken stock, season with salt and pepper. Place in serving dish and cover with 1/2 cup of coarsely rolled bread crumbs which have been browned in butter.

***Sweet Potatoes.**
(Serves 6)

- 6 medium sweet potatoes
- 3/4 cup brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons butter or substitute
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/4 cup water
- 1/2 cup sliced brazil nuts

Boil sweet potatoes until almost tender; peel and cut in half. Place in shallow baking dish. Combine brown sugar, butter, spices and water. Bring to a boil. Pour over potatoes; sprinkle with brazil nuts. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees) for 30 minutes or cook in a heavy skillet on top of the stove, basting frequently.

- *Cranberry Sherbet.
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 cups water
- 1 quart cranberries
- Juice of 1 1/2 lemons
- Juice of 1/2 orange

Make a syrup of the sugar and water, cooking five minutes after it starts to boil. Add the cranberries and cook until clear, then run all this through a fine sieve. Cool and add the fruit juices. Freeze in refrigerator trays. This may be made the day before using.

***Chiffon Pumpkin Pie.**
(Makes 9-inch pie)

- 1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin
- 1/4 cup cold water
- 1 1/4 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 2/3 cup milk
- 2 cups cooked pumpkin
- 1/2 cup whipping cream
- 1 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 9-inch crust

Soften gelatin in water. Add spices, salt, sugar and milk to pumpkin. Place in double boiler and heat to boiling point. Remove from heat, add gelatin and stir until dissolved. When cold fold in whipped cream and vanilla. Pour into crust and chill. Sprinkle with crumbs from 2 graham crackers.

Crust: To 12 finely rolled graham crackers, add 2 tablespoons of sugar and 1/2 cup melted butter or substitute. Press in an even layer against sides and bottom of a nine-inch pie plate.
