Most southwest farm products sold at fairly steady to moderateketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.






BI-PARTISAN: Dewey's Idea

THE HEDLEL MP

Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York may not yet be a candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, but he continues to act suspiciously like he intends to join Messrs. Taft and Stassen in the ring at any given moment.

In his most recent public pronouncement, Dewey gave a broad endorsement to the Marshall plan for aiding Europe, urging prompt and effective help for free nations abroad but demanding that it be administered on a business-like basis under "genuinely bi-partisan direction.

Thus, he remained on reasonably safe ground politically, but at the same time offered

a constructive suggestion as to how the Marshall plan could best be carried out. -Dewey proposed that the program be administered in accordance with a statement of policy

to be written by congress which Governor 'will make it clear Dewey that the United

States has a settled policy and the means of carrying it out."

He did not mention, but probably was thinking, that such a scheme would offer less chance of administrative fumbling than if the program were to be steered by the arbitrary dictates of a single agency. Specifically, Dewey proposed a

six-point program covering terms of U. S. loans and methods under which the Marshall plan should operate.

NO RELIEF:

Food Shortage

Whatever the year 1948 brings to the American people, it won't be an-increase in the food supply.

Latest department of agriculture prediction is that food supplies on the U. S. home front will shrink even lower next year, while retail food prices will remain high for most of 1943.

Those forecasts supplemented a report by Sir John Boyd Orr, director general of the U. N. food and agriculture organization, that world supplies of bread cereals are 10 million tons short of the amount needed ing through the winter, was only to maintain even the present mea-

Good Sheep Dog Valuable Help To the Farmer


Many Countries Have Developed Their Own Special Shepherd Breeds

In the handling of large flocks of sheep on the farm, a good herd dog ofttimes accomplishes the work of two or three men, states the Gaines Dog Research Center New York City. An old saying goes that "There is no good flock without a good shep-herd, and there is no good shepherd without a good dog" In Scotland, where the work of the sheep dog has reached near perfection, no shepherd reached near perfection, no shephere would consider selling, as he would feel himself nelpless without his trained ally. The sight of a small black and white Border Collie driv-ing a flock of sheep along a road or through a village in a colm, business-like manner is so common in that like manner is so common in that country as to attract no attention whatsoever

country as to attract no attention whatsoever While it is believed that the dog's first association with man was as his hunting companion and helper, cer-tainly his second trust was as guard-ian of mankind's flocks and herds. Though there was little communica-tion between primitive peoples, the dog's ability as herder and guardian was early discovered and utilized by many different races and tribes. Many countries have developed shepherd breeds, and while these vary widely in size and appearance, their work is identical. Belgium produced the Bel-pian Shepdog and the Bouviers de Flandre. The Briard comes from France. Hungary developed the Pulik and the Komondorok. The Welsh Corgi, Old English Sheepdog, Border Collie; Shetland Sheepdog and Collie ill originated in the British Isles. The German Shepherd and the Giant German Shepherd and the Giant chnauzer are, of course, products of Cermany. The Australian Sheepdog, or Kelpie, has proven his value in the rugged sheep-raising country "down under." The Samoyede, though gen-erally considered a sledge dog, har





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
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
